Understanding Stormwater Drainage Flows

Besides tropical storms and hurricanes that deliver high volumes of water over several hours, there are also pop-up storms that can deliver an amazing volume of water in a very short time

The pop-up storms, also called pulse storms or air-mass thunderstorms, may form over land or water bodies, wherever there is high heat and high humidity, and tend to be very localized.

Some of these events can disburse up to 6 inches of rain in a two-hour window.

I'm sure many of you have been driving into an innocent looking storm, only to have it turn into a very intense event that then dissipates (in what may seem forever). Congratulations, you've just experienced a pop-up storm.

The significance of this intensity storm is that you may experience the over-topping of your building's gutters and some localized water holding on the back patio and in the courtyard.

Once the storm ends, the standing water will percolate normally into the soil, which limits harmful erosion, and drain slowly (up to 24 hours) into the stormwater collection system and move out of the community. Rest assured, the finished floor in any condo is generally 4 inches above the patio, so rising water intrusion is unlikely.

It may be concerning to watch water rise behind your building, but just remember that the stormwater collection system is lower than your floor slab.



Thus, the possibility of having rising water enter a home is unlikely.

Because the On Top of the World Condominium stormwater system is designed around high-volume rain events, there has never been an event of rising water entering a condominium that this author is aware of.

If you are curious about current flood zones, you may view FEMA maps at:

When prompted, enter in the address of 2069 World Parkway Boulevard East, Clearwater, Fl., 33763.

This is a good middle point to view the over-all boundaries of the OTOW Condominium Community. You will notice several areas displayed in an overlay color. Scroll down a little on the map and you will find a map legend that explains the colors and the flooding prob-

ability. You will notice that the majority of the community is not within any flood prone areas.

The areas of the community near creeks and other water bodies are in a very low probability zone (0.2 percent probability). This is not surprising given that creeks may top their banks under extreme conditions.

It should go without saying, NEV-ER drive into rising water. It is hard to gauge the depth and speed of the water.

Rising Water versus Wind-Driven Water

Wind-driven water is more common in high wind velocity situations where the rain is being pushed by the wind. In these situations, rain can literally be driven into the home around poorly installed windows and doors.


The old jalousie-style glass doors can be some of the biggest offenders.

The solution to that problem is to obtain Association approval to replace the


front or back doors, or leaking window frames with a Florida Building Code compliant door installed by a licensed professional.

It is also worth mentioning that poor owner maintenance on windows, like clogged weep holes, may play a substantial part in wind-driven water events. Swirling rain driven by stormforce winds may enter the building core and be blown beneath and around doors (especially the old jalousie type). This type of problem should be exceedingly rare. The solution is the samedoor replacement by a license professional

All this said, if you live on the first floor, and you are losing sleep worrying about another round of Category 3 hurricanes or greater storms, you always have the option of purchasing flood insurance individually. This author is not qualified to discuss this topic, other than to recommend you speak with your insurance broker.







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For water intrusion, create a ticket immediately

Gutters and Excessive Rain

Whenever there is an increased amount of rain, your Management Company and the Community Service Office may receive many concerns and inquiries regarding gutters.

Resident concerns include fear of water entering their condo through their windows and whether gutters will be able to hold large amounts of water received over a short period of time.

Requests include larger replacement gutters and inspections for water intrusions.

If your windows are properly installed and sealed, the water would naturally run down the building and not impact your condo.

Gutters are replaced when your building's new roof is installed. Gutters are sized for the roof area and anticipated storm events. That said, no gutter can capture all the runoff from a sudden, short-lasting cloudburst. In those cases, the overflow is deflected from the building by the gutter.

Should you experience water intrusion into your condo, regardless of whether it appears to be an internal source or external, please visit the Community Service Office in person or call 727-683-6981 to immediately submit a service ticket. This is for water intrusion only (and not the gutters).

If an incident is after hours, please call the after-hours number at 727-799-1115 and report it immediately. This allows staff to be more focused on rapidly finding the possible water source.

AppFolio

As a reminder, your Management Company has rolled out AppFolio property management software. It can be downloaded onto your mobile device and your home PC device by checking and downloading the app from the App Store or the Google Play Store.

The AppFolio portal gives you the capability to view such things as your current balance due, past payment history, full account ledger, as well as submitting a service request and viewing closed requests.

You also will be able to view shared documents, which include (but are not limited to) your Association's articles of incorporation, bylaws, declarations,

And finally, you can now update your personal information such as mailing address and/or email address.

Keeping your record up-to-date with the most current information ensures that you receive notifications and mailings from the Association.

Also, documents that would normally be posted only on the website will now only be posted to AppFolio.

If you did not receive an invitation or mistakenly marked the email as spam, please reach out to the Community Service Office for assistance. They can be reached at 727-683-6981.

Upcoming Projects Painting/Waterproofing

By mid- to late-August, the residents in Building 41 should be seeing the painting contractor working on the front façade of their building.

This important, ongoing work involves the pressure washing of the



hairline cracks, an ample treatment of surface sealer, and finally followed by the application of a high-performance coating.

Once again, please keep in mind that when the painting contractor is operating on the front façade of buildings that they may require residents to temporarily relocate vehicles and move personal property from porches in order to perform this work.

Heavy equipment and specialized spraying equipment is used by the contractor so please keep this in mind and proceed safely in these work areas. Please use caution in these areas while the improvements are underway and be aware that inclement weather can affect these approximate start dates.

Construction, Roofing and Large Scope Projects

There are no large-scale projects scheduled for August as this article goes to print.

Recurring Reminders for all Community Residents

As a reminder, the Management Company performs enforcement efforts by removing all unapproved items placed in building common areas. This includes, but is not limited to, plants (live or artificial), personal items, nonexterior rated furniture, rusted chairs/ tables or in disrepair and tchotchkes etc., as these items are not permitted to occupy common spaces.

These items will be removed and disposed of without further notice.

These ongoing enforcement efforts help keep the areas safe for first responders as well as maintain an aesthetically pleasing community for all to reside in. We ask that residents help keep the community's common areas in compliance by reporting violations of this nature to the Management Company.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle.

This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hanger brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affix-

Inspection Services representa- agement Company. tives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproof coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you are not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit from the coating vendor.

First floor unit owners will continue receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department as the Management Company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike.

The Management Company asks if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stones at the earliest convenience.

The removal of plantings located above and around potable water meters that service individual units is also ongoing.

The Management Company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas. Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Many times, decorative rocks or landscaping are installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you install.

Inspection efforts continue to focus on the tagging and removal of portable barbeque grills, including propane, charcoal, or electric, which are not permitted in any building's common areas as they pose a fire risk to the structure and residents.

Only grills meeting approved Clearwater Fire Department standard are permitted on the patio of first floor units. If you're a first-floor unit owner and not sure if your grill complies, please stop by the Community Service Office to request a visit from our friendly Inspections Services staff.

The Management Company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the Community Service Office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard.

Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt water softeners, are permissible in the community. Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the Man-

The On Top of the World emergency after-hours phone number is 727-799-1115. Please call this number, after hours, in the event of an emergency, such as a water intrusion into your condo. For all other inquiries regarding general issues or questions that are not service-related, you will need to come in person to the Community Service Office.

Signing up for OTOW-ALERTS (powered by RAVE) is incredibly easy. Simply go to www.otowclearwaterinfo. com and from the home page scroll down to the bottom of the page and the "Sign Up Now" box will be located to the left of the screen. Click to enroll.

You can also sign up from the "Stay Informed" tab located at the top of the home page.

This is without obligation or cost to you. Your email and cell phone numbers are secure, never shared, and never solicited. Alternatively, you may visit the Community Service Office to apply.

OTOW-ALERTS provides advance warning of severe weather events as well as other matters of critical concern to the residents of OTOW Clearwater Condominium Community.

As a reminder, when signing up for community and emergency alerts, be sure to enter your building number. You can select to receive notifications via text, telephone call, and/or email. You can select one, two, or all three notification options.

Should you wish to change your notification options you can do that by visiting the Community Service Office, calling 727-683-6981, or email at www. associationinfo@otowfl.net.

Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted.

If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter. The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled.

Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received. From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request.

It is not necessary to report service requests more than once.

Let's all get on the same page with trash -OTOW adopts new recycling guidelines

Recycling has been sparking conversations across On Top of the World and it's no surprise why.

It's the last topic I thought I would write about, but community interest has led the way.

I learned buildings have posters in their trash rooms outlining what can and can't be recycled, but here's a twist: Not all the posters match.

That's led to a lot of confusion and questions from residents who genuinely want to do the right thing.

To help clear things up, I dug into the Waste Connections website and spoke directly with our local representative.

The goal?

To get the facts straight and share them with you.

The Glass Conundrum

Yes, it's true.

One of the most common questions asked is, "Can we recycle glass?"

The answer might surprise you, "No, we can't."

Waste Connections confirmed that glass of any kind — bottles, jars, etc. is not accepted in our recycling stream. If it's glass, please toss it into the regular garbage bin.

While some programs do accept glass, our program simply does not.

Helpful Recycling Habits

What to do (and what not to do).

Even small missteps can cause big headaches for recycling facilities. Here are two simple things we can all do to keep the process running smoothly:

Plastic Bags

It's fine to carry recyclables in plastic grocery bags (Publix bags, for example), but don't drop the bag itself into the recycling bin. Empty the contents into the blue bin and toss the plastic bag in the black garbage can.

These bags can jam machinery and contaminate an otherwise good load of recyclables.



Delivery Boxes

We all love our deliveries, but those cardboard boxes can be a nuisance if left unflattened.

Please take a moment to break them down before putting them in the bin. A full-sized box takes up valuable space in a building's recyclable bin and can leave the next person with no room for their recyclables.

Greasy Boxes and Tricky Questions

Residents have asked some great questions:

"Should I rinse my containers?"

"Can I recycle greasy pizza boxes?"

"What if something has both paper and plastic?"

We've compiled answers from Waste Connections and outlined what's recyclable and what's not. You'll find the most common items listed at right consider it your go-to cheat sheet for smarter recycling.

Quick Reference What Goes Where

Paper Products

Acceptable (Blue recycle bin):

- Newspapers
- · Paperback books
- Cereal, cracker, and pizza boxes
- Milk cartons
- Amazon boxes (flattened, please!)
- Clean pizza boxes

Not Accepted (Black garbage bin):

- Wax-coated cardboard
- Paper bags with foil or plastic linings
- Paper towels, napkins, tissues
- Contaminated pizza boxes

Plastic Containers

Acceptable (Blue recycle bin):

- Bottles (water, juice, soda)
- Jugs (milk, detergent, tea)
- Tubs (butter, cool whip)

Not Accepted (Black garbage bin):

- · Motor oil or antifreeze containers
- Garden hoses
- Biodegradable or compostable plastics
- Plastic wrap, baggies, rope
- Paint cans, toys, furniture
- Blister packs (gum/pill packaging)
- Coffee pod lids, absorbent meat pads

Styrofoam? Toss it in the black garbage bins.

Steel and Metal Containers

Acceptable (Blue recycle bin):

- Soda and iced tea cans
- Metal food containers (tuna, veggies, soup)
- Hair spray and shaving cream cans
- Disposable pie tins and baking trays

Not Accepted (Black garbage bin):

- Paint cans, propane tanks
- Coat hangers (return to your dry cleaner)
- Pots, pans, non-disposable bakeware · Appliances, hardware, scrap metal
- Extension cords or metal wiring



You're driving along and come across a funeral procession - do you know what to do?

You are driving down a road and encounter a funeral procession. Do you know how to respond?

Most important, be respectful. This is a solemn occasion.

A funeral procession is defined as two or more vehicles accompanying a deceased person's body, with headlights lit, and the lead vehicle (unless it's law enforcement) displaying a flashing amber light.

Pedestrians and other vehicles going in the same direction must yield to the procession, except for emergency vehicles or when directed by a police officer

Drivers going the opposite direction do not need to follow these rules.

Most importantly, the procession has

the right of way. Once the lead vehicle passes through a green light, or a stop sign, the entire procession continues through without stopping.

So, if you are approaching a green light and a procession is going through a red light, you must yield to the procession.

Proper Identification

The procession must be clearly identified. This typically involves the lead vehicle having a flashing amber light (unless it's a law enforcement vehicle) and all vehicles in the procession having their headlights on.

Following Closely

Vehicles in the procession are ex- in a funeral procession must yield to

pected to follow the preceding vehicle as closely as is practical and safe.

No Cutting In

Other drivers are prohibited from driving between vehicles in the procession if vehicles in the procession have headlights on.

You may drive between vehicles in a procession only if directed by a police officer

Can you pass vehicles in a procession? Yes. You may pass the procession if the road has two or more lanes traveling in the same direction.

Yielding to Emergency Vehicles

Even with the right-of-way, drivers in a funeral procession must yield to

emergency vehicles that give an audible or visible signal.

Police Direction

Drivers in a procession must also yield when directed to do so by a police officer.

Due Care

While granted the right-of-way, vehicles in the procession must still exercise due care to avoid collision.




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A salute to everyone working after retirement - and the people who made it possible

Margaret Kuhn

It's hard for me to imagine my grandmother, at age 65, facing mandatory retirement in the late 1960s.

My grandmother was a nurse. She was affectionately known as "Mimi" and she did not want to retire.

She was a healthy-living role model to her grandchildren and an even greater inspiration than Popeye, who encouraged people to eat more spin-

Mimi would flex her amazing upper arm muscles before serving each portion of spinach.

My Mimi lived to be 101 and so this mandatory retirement was particularly unfortunate for her.

But it was hospital policy, as well as the law of the land, that forced this mandatory retirement.

In fact, mandatory retirement in America was not fully abolished until 1986. The law might still be in effect if not for one intrepid activist by the name of Margaret Eliza "Maggie" Kuhn, who was born on Aug 3, 1905.

Margaret worked as a social worker for the United Presbyterian Church in New York for 25 years. She commuted from her home in Philadelphia and held various positions within the church's national office until she was forced to retire at the mandatory age of 65.

Rather than accept this as the end of her professional life, she viewed it as an opportunity to advocate for change.

In 1970, Margaret founded the Gray Panthers, an organization known for their bold actions, including public protests, to challenge ageism and better policies for older Americans.

Her philosophy was that everyone, regardless of age, has the right to participate fully in society and to influence the policies that affect their lives.

In the late 1970s, Margaret appeared on Johnny Carson's Tonight Show and other talk shows. I remember her first appearance with Johnny Carson and a weekly Grav Panther broadcast on New York public radio. I was only 18 years old, but thought this old bird has spunk!

She was certainly one-of-a-kind and born to lead this movement. A documentary was done about her life. It was called, "Maggie Roars."

Margaret passed away in 1995 at the age of 89, but the Gray Panthers continued to grow and became an international organization involved with combating ageism, protecting Social Security and Medicare, and transforming long-term care and broader social justice issues.

Today, whether you decide to continue working or stay active exploring new interests, no one will ever say, "You're too old!"

We have Margaret to thank.



Scammers learn from psychologists how to sweet talk people into making mistakes

Scam Alert

I am getting anywhere from four to five texts every day warning me that Social Security checks are being stopped, or this disaster is happening or that calamity will take place, blah, blah, etc., etc.

All I have to do is donate to this cause or that one or who knows what and I'll be saved.

I am 100 percent positive that most of you have received the same or similar messages. Please, block and delete them, or just delete them, but DO NOT REPLY.

Most of these messages are true phishing scams. Some may not be actual scams, but even so, once you contribute, they've got you!

Delete, delete and delete.

There are three words with which I want you to be familiar. Three wonderful words: "BLOCK," "DELETE" and "NO."

Block scam texts and emails.


Delete scam texts and emails.

Say NO to texts and emails (or to anyone) asking for money.

NO is such a wonderful word and it is easy to spell and easy to say. It works for scams, even for children and grandchildren scams.

Scam Alert

How about this one! A few days ago, I was on a website



and all of a sudden without any warning, a pop up ad appeared on my com-

It said my computer was infected by some virus, or whatever, and it was terribly harmful.

All I had to do was click on a link that was right there on the pop up.

Well, folks. One thing I knew NOT TO DO was click ANYWHERE on that pop up.

And I didn't.

Instead, I shut down my computer— "Control-Alt-Delete."

I'm technologically challenged, and I did know that was the wrong way to shut down a computer, but I didn't have one of my grandchildren around to look with pity at me, sigh and then say, "Do this, grandpa."

So, I shut down and hit restart and that took care of the problem.

The pop up was gone. Look here!

If you ever receive a pop up ad that just suddenly appears on your computer screen, it is always, always, always a scam. No exceptions. Do whatever you have to do to get rid of it immediately. It is a scam!

Q. You seem fixated on scams. Do you think that we are not educated enough, or not smart enough, to be able to handle them?

A. Well, I don't know about you, but I'm not even close to being educated enough or smart enough to protect myself from being scammed.

Scammers are more and more sophisticated and intelligent enough to fool anyone.

I've recently learned from a seminar put on by the office of the Florida Attorney General's office, that many scammers hire psychologists to teach them how to engage with folks who resist them or who might be skeptics.

Scamming is a multi-billion-dollar industry. Yes, an industry. And over the years I've had several clients who have lost thousands upon thousands of dollars to phishing scams. Worst of all are the romance scams.

So, yeah. I am fixated on scams.

Q. Do you talk just the same way as vou write?

A. Yeah. But I cuss a lot, too.

Residents learn about the latest scams

July 9 and more than 30 residents attended to make sure they wouldn't become the next scam victim.

Anna Marie is an investigator and outreach coordinator for Pinellas County Consumer Protection. She makes it her job to try to protect residents from becoming victims of scams. Problem is, the scammers keep getting better and better, and even people who think they know what a scam is, can get hooked right into the next scam.

Anna Marie told On Top of the World residents about one of the longest-running scams in the world - the grandparents scam. That's when you receive a phone call or email from someone claiming to be a relative, who is allegedly homeless, in trouble with the law, in jail and desperate for a loan. Many times, the scammer on the other end of the phone call or email message simply says "this is your grandson" without giving a name. "I need money."

Please don't fall for it.

Anna Marie said she gave this lecture one time and are workers assigned to your unit, don't let them in.

a resident admitted to being scammed out of \$1000. Even if the workers look professional, don't let them Anna Marie Fiallos was back in our community on The victim really thought her grandson needed money. Then another gentleman spoke up and said he was scammed out of \$10,000. He received a phone call that a relative desperately needed \$5000 and a short time later the same relative needed another \$5000. The victim was scammed out of \$10,000.

How do you avoid the grandparents scam? Get the name of the relative. Tell the relative you are hanging up the phone and will call them back. If the relative is not home, or claims to be in jail or in custody, then call the parents of the relative.

Ask questions. Ask the relative simple questions over the phone. See if they provide answers. Most likely, the scammer will hang up.

Anna Marie said you might receive a message on your computer that your computer has been locked and you have 72 hours to pay to have it fixed. This is a scam. You don't need to pay \$75 or any amount to have someone unlock your computer.

If two people come to your front door and say they

Anna Marie talked about a distraction scam where one worker will talk to you at the front door while the other worker goes inside your unit looking for things to steal. Don't fall for it! If you have an appointment with a company, make sure you ask for company ID. Look for the company truck in the parking lot. Look for a logo on their shirt. If you are not sure what to do, lock your door and find a neighbor to assist you.

Anna Marie also talked about the Toll Booth Scam. You may receive a letter that you have not paid a toll and you are in serious legal trouble. This is a scam. Do not send money to pay a toll. If you do happen to drive through a toll and receive a bill from the state, pay it immediately so you will have no doubts later that the bill was already paid.

Anna Marie will be back again another day. You might think you are invisible to scammers, but think again. They are getting better and more clever. It might be a good thing to come and listen to Anna Marie the next time she visits On Top of the World.



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

Is it time for you to upgrade your computer to Windows 11? Computer Club members can help

Microsoft Windows, the software that runs your computer, is undergoing a major change on Oct. 14.

Windows 10, which you may have currently, is no longer going to be supported.

What does that mean?

It doesn't mean that Windows 10 won't work. It means that Microsoft will no longer provide security updates to your computer.

That's a problem.

The computer you are using may become vulnerable to attack by dishonest people, such as hackers.

So what can you do?

First, check to see which operating system you are using on your computer, Windows 10 or 11. Here's how to check:

- 1. Click in the search field at the bottom of your screen and type "about" (without the quotation marks). A screen will open.
- 2. Click on "About your PC." Another screen will pop up showing which version of Windows you have (scroll down if necessary).

See the graphic accompanying this story for an example.

If your screen says, "Windows 11 Home" or "Windows 11 Pro," you're all set. You don't have to do anything.

But if your screen says, "Windows 10 Home" or "Windows 10 Pro," you'll have a decision to make. Here are some options:

1. Continue using Windows 10. But if you do, your computer will not be as safe. Cybercriminals continually devise new attacks and threats. Without security updates, your operating system could be at risk.

Windows 11 Pro

- 2. Buy a new computer. All computers manufactured today run Windows 11 and will receive security updates from Microsoft.
- 3. Utilize Microsoft's Extended Security Updates program. For \$30, you can get security updates for up to a year. This is not a long-term solution, but a temporary bridge to give you more time.
- 4. Update to Windows 11. Not all computers are upgradeable to Windows 11, but generally, if you purchased your device in 2018 or later, it might be upgradeable.

computer is upgradable is beyond the scope of this story, but you can bring your laptop to a Computer Club weekly help session. We will check it free of charge.

Club members are available in the Learning Lab, which is the West Activity Center, from 8:30 to 10 a.m. every Wednesday.

There's no need to be apprehensive about the transition from Windows 10 to 11. But be ready for it to keep your computer safe.





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
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More magic from the woodshop






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Above are some of On Top of the World's best dancers joining Carla Hines during a song in the Auditorium. At right are dozens of strawberry shortcakes ready to be consumed.





Second, Audrey intends to provide "coaching" to anyone who wants to learn how to act. Each short coaching session will immediately follow the end of each general meeting commencing in September.



Golf doesn't have to be cancelled because of heat - just prepare ahead of time

It's hot and humid at the On Top of the World golf courses!

With temperatures reaching over 100 degrees at times, playing golf in the heat isn't easy, but the Friday Mixed Golf League is not letting a day in the summer golf season slip by because the sun is shining too bright and hot.

So here are a few tips for playing golf in extreme hot heat.

(1) Drink lots of hydrating fluids, such as water and electrolyte-filled sports drinks (Gatorade). Take a sip after every shot, or at the very least, have a few every time you step off the green and head to the next hole. Avoid high sugar content drinks like soda, coffee and alcohol because they will dry you out

(2) Wear a hat. Best ways to protect your head from the sun is to wear a classic baseball-style hat, a bucket-style hat or a wide- brimmed hat.

(3) Look for shade on the golf course. You should always look for shade when waiting around. If you are not using a golf cart or umbrella, look for shade under trees or a supported roofed structure or under your towel by putting it

over your head.

(4) Carry an umbrella when playing golf. As was just mentioned, carrying an umbrella in your golf bag is more useful than you think as it can protect your head and skin from the sun, keeps you from getting drenched by showers and it can cover your clubs while hitting the ball.

(5) Wear the proper apparel in the heat. Choose clothes with lighter ma-

terials than cotton. Apparel that has a Dri-Fit feel (or something similar) will be best in the heat. Also avoid dark colors and favor lighter ones as they are more likely to reflect the rays of the sun instead of attracting them.

(6) Carry a cold towel. Carrying a towel with your golf bag is essential, but when playing in the heat, you should bring another towel along, simply for you to wipe your face on. Ideally, if you have a cooler with you, you'll want to keep this towel cold so you can break it out whenever you're looking to cool down.

(7) Wear sunscreen. This should be a priority whenever you're on a golf course or not on a sunny day. On hot days where you're more likely to sweat a lot, don't forget to apply that sunscreen regularly so it remains effective. At the very least, make sure to put on some for the front-nine and the backnine.

Though you may not need all these tips listed above, using a few of them will make your golfing experience much better on a hot summer day.










Investigative reporter digs hard, but finds no connection between pickleball and pickles

The Hunley discovery is described as probably the most important (underwater archaeological) find of the 20th century. The Hunley was built in Mobile, Ala., in 1863, with the goal of breaking the Union blockade of Charleston, S.C. It was a tiny submarine ... a 40-foot long, iron-hulled vessel, powered by a hand-cranked propeller. The Hunley was designed to attack by ramming a torpedo (a copper canister filled with black powder) attached to a spar into the hull of an enemy ship. In 1864, it was the first submarine to achieve such a feat in combat, after which it disappeared to the ocean floor. After 136 years, it was raised to the surface in August 2000.

The old Blue Ribbon Market fire occurred in central Ybor City on August 11, 2000. The building had operated a popular local supermarket since 1970. The blaze caused \$1 million in damage and altered plans to renovate the 79-year-old building into Ybor City's largest dance club. Architectural renderings showed a restaurant, multilevel dance floors and huge television screens. Instead, it became a private-pay parking lot. The site had been the location of the first cigar rolling company in Ybor City in 1886.

Sports

On Aug. 12, 2000, at Shea Stadium in New York, the San Francisco Giants get two unusual runs in the fourth inning as Mets outfielder Benny Agbayani catches what he thinks is the third out and gives the ball to a kid (Jake Burns) in the stands. The mental lapse of not knowing there was only one out allows both runners on base to score. But the Mets still manage to prevail, beating San Francisco, 3-2. Agbayani gave another ball to the fan who had given the previous one back.

TV Contribution

On Aug. 23, 2000, Richard Hatch, a 39-year-old corporate trainer from Rhode Island, wins the season one finale of the reality television show "Survivor" and takes home the promised \$1 million prize in a 4-3 vote by his fellow contestants. Richard was known for walking around naked on the island in Borneo where the show was shot.

Medical News

Aug. 1, 2000: In one of the most important events of 2000, the Jarvik 2000 is first received by a patient. This is the first completely artificial heart that maintains a blood flow as well as generating a pulse. It is no longer used as a long-term replacement. However, a descendant of the Jarvik-7, the SynCardia Total Artificial Heart, is still used as a temporary bridge to transplant in patients awaiting a donated heart.

The popular Acropol Family Restaurant on Sunset Point Road, close to On Top of the World, advertised in our newspaper. Back in the August 2000 paper, its menu offered lamb shank with orzo meal for \$5.65 on its expansive menu. The restaurant opened in 1979 by Peter and Stella Stavrakos, immigrants from Greece. Their son and daughter-in-law ran it in later years. It closed its doors in 2024 after 45 years of loyal service.

Amongst a lifetime of experiences, Yoshimitsu resident saw Hindenburg on its final flight

By the time we move into a 55-plus community, odds are high we've seen a thing or two.

My friend and Yoshimitsu neighbor, Harry Urguhart, is the 13th of 13 siblings. He has seen his share of things.

Amongst his experiences are three treasures he will never forget.

Long before handling Ma Bell's telephone service for Presidents Ronald Reagan and George H. W. Bush during their visits to Wisconsin, Harry served aboard the USS Ashland LSD 1 (Dock Landing Ship) in the "Forgotten War" -Korea.

It was during a return trip from, literally, the top of the world - the Arctic Circle - that he spotted a strange blip on his ship's radar screen.

But more on that in a minute ... let's go back in time.

What kid, when underfoot, hasn't heard his mother tell him more than once, "Boy, go out and play."

Harry heard that command one particular day, May 6, 1937, and did so.

The family lived near "Stop 12" in Elmont, N.Y., just a couple blocks from Belmont Racetrack. That particular Thursday, Harry was outside playing when he saw an unforgettable sight.

Passing low overhead was the dirigible Hindenburg blimp, gliding toward its fate in Lakehurst, N.J.

Harry, just over 4 years old, never forgot seeing that huge airship. Moments later it turned into a day in our country's history books.

Another treasured moment was in 1941 when young Harry looked out his upstairs bedroom window and saw three huge black cars swoop down on his neighbor's house. He saw men in suits carry out boxes and boxes, and lead a handcuffed-man away.

Years later, with the help of his wife, Jill, and her internet sleuthing, Harry would learn what he saw that day. The FBI was hunting a member of the Duquesne Spy Ring, a 33-member spy espionage network working for Adolf Hilter's German Reich.

The person he knew as his playmate's "Uncle" was Everett Roeder, who would soon be convicted of espio-



nage against the US and sentenced to 16 years in prison.

So now, back to that radar blip. What

The object in the radar blip appeared round. It was 60 miles straight ahead and about a mile above the USS Ashland. It measured 1500 yards across and 500 yards top to bottom. And it was blanketed by dense fog.

Harry tracked it aboard the USS Ashland for 12 hours. The captain of the ship alerted, ordered a change of course out of the fog and then issued a Notice to Mariners (NtM) reporting an Unidentified Flying Object.

There isn't anything to report after that because no object was ever positively identified. Nobody knows what happened to the mystery blip, but it was recorded as a UFO.

Now to 2024.

You may not know Harry, but you probably know his pride and joy - a maroon 1972 Olds 98.

Harry could be seen regularly tinkering and fixing his ride in the Yoshimitsu parking area after his regular early morning fishing adventures off the Dunedin Causeway.

His ride was a popular car with passerbys, young and old, right up to the day in early 2024 when he donated it to the Disabled American Veterans organization.

With his fishing and car tinkering days behind him, Harry is compiling his family stories and history to share with others.

There's so much to share.

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
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A beautiful mountain wedding in Arizona


The trip included visits to various locations tied to World War II. She visited many United Nations Educational, Scientific and Culture Organizations, which covered history and controversial subjects.

Their adventure had some top-notch spots. Claire was particularly fond of the high tea aboard the ship, Peggy's Cove, and the architectural style of Quebec.





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For your next holiday party, create your own charcuterie

(Fancy word for meat and cheese platter)



What the heck is charcuterie and why do you want it at your next party?

There's no better way to appreciate something than to learn about its history. And when it comes to something as universal as the art of charcuterie, we want to learn everything we can.

Charcuterie comes from the French terms "chair," which means flesh and "cuite," which means cooked.

But when we say charcuterie, we mean "cured meats" or preserved meats.

A traditional charcuterie is a place where the cured meats are sold, like a delicatessen.

Preserving meat is an old tradition that stretches back thousands of years. In the days before refrigeration, the simple techniques of salting and drying meat were enough to ensure their preservation for months. This is because salting meat quickly gets the moisture out, which makes it an inhospitable environment for bacteria.

While these simple techniques began long ago, it was 15th century France that developed more sophisticated curing techniques. Experimenting with different curing solutions, drying times, and cuts of meat, the French developed varieties of delicious cured meats that are part of the charcuterie

Traditionally, cured meats were made out of pork. However, these days, we have offerings like beef salami, turkey bacon and duck prosciutto.

Then, of course, there are products like salt cod and beef jerky that might not make it on your charcuterie board, but are still great examples of cured meats.

Charcuterie is the culinary art of preparing meat products such as bacon, salami, ham, sausage, terrines, galantines, ballotines, pates and confit.

Someone that prepares charcuterie is called a charcutier.

So why is charcuterie suddenly a rage?

As the saying goes, "Everything old is new again."

Like many traditional foods that are making a comeback, charcuterie is a culinary art developed from necessity. Just like pickles, fermented vegetables,



home drafted beer, broth and kombucha, charcuterie has been revived and brought front and center by the traditional food movement. And, in my humble opinion, front and center is exactly where it deserves to be.

How to be a charcuterie for your next party

The fabulous thing about serving charcuterie at your own party is that there are no rules! You can keep it as simple as you like (just the cured meats maybe) or dress it up with fresh or dried fruits, a variety of artisan breads, plus crackers, olives, cheeses and spreads (like honey, preserves or jams).

You can also keep it budget-friendly by setting out a small plate or go all out with a large platter.

Charcuterie is perfect for the holidays

Putting together a charcuterie board is a snap, which is why it is perfect for

holidays parties.

Just visit the specialty department in your grocery store and pick what looks amazing. Then set it on a board!

Honestly, when something is this easy and delicious, why would you make anything else?

Tips for making your own charcuterie board

Offer 3-5 types of meats.

While we can technically eat piles of prosciutto, it's a good idea to have at least three varieties of cold cuts. Try not to serve too many types of meats as that can also get overwhelming.

Vary the texture. A good rule of thumb is to have a few dry-aged choices (since these tend to be the most popular). One option is wet-cured (such as Italian mortadella), and one type of sausage (cut into bite-sized pieces).

Balance it with something acidic. It's no secret that cold cuts are fatty. Bring some balance to the decadence with an acidic ingredient such as brined olives, cornichons or pickled peppers.

Add something sweet to enhance the flavors of salty cold cuts. I recommend stacking your charcuterie board with some fresh fruit and sweet jams.

The fabulous thing about creating charcuterie at your own party is that there are no rules! You can keep it as simple as you like or dress it up.

So let's get started.

Don't forget the wine

Last, but not least, try to include a wine pairing with your charcuterie board. Make sure that the wine you serve is acidic to cut through the fattiness of the cold cuts.

While both red and white wines can be paired perfectly with a charcuterie board, I recommend sticking to regional varieties.

So if your charcuterie board consists of Italian cold cuts, then try a bottle of dry, bold Chianti.

These raspberry-lemon muffins will make an early morning worthwhile

Why choose a healthy muffin? It's about getting a treat and the benefits.

- · Healthy Aging: There is a 31 percent greater likelihood of healthy aging if you eat high-quality carbs versus a diet heavy in low-quality carbs.
- Better Nutrition: Healthy muffins often use whole grains, natural sweeteners, fruits, nuts or seeds. That means more fiber, vitamins and minerals compared to standard muffins made with white flour and lots of white sugar.
- Stable Energy: A healthy muffin can offer slow-digesting carbs and protein, helping maintain steady blood sugar levels. That means fewer crashes and more lasting energy.
- · Weight Goals: People trying to manage or lose weight may choose a healthy option to control calories and avoid empty carbs. The biggest gain is achieved eating a standard-size muffin rather than a jumbo muffin two to three times larger.
- Healthy Muffins Taste Good: When done right, healthy muffins can be just as satisfying as regular ones — sweet, moist, and flavorful — without the guilt.

To sell a reluctant friend on eating a healthy muffin, you've got to be smart about it - lead with taste, not with a lecture. People eat with their senses first. If it looks good, smells good and tastes good, they're in. Health can be the bonus, not the headline.

Nutritional Value

Whole wheat flour adds more nutrition, such as complex carbohydrates and fiber, plus a pleasant nutty flavor, to baked goods fiber.

White flour is a refined ingredient which — like granulated sugar—can cause a rapid rise in blood sugar. Diets high in refined carbohydrates increase the risk of heart disease.

Whole foods, like raspberries and lemons, are packed with vitamins and minerals, while also providing sweetness and moisture.

Natural sweeteners, like brown sugar, help decrease overall sweetness due to their complex flavor.

So, a chef can use less white sugar while still attaining a pleasingly sweet taste.

can also create a tender texture.

Buttermilk provides several benefits. It adds moisture and tenderness, contributes to a lighter crumb, and enhances the overall flavor of the muffin.

Additionally, buttermilk can aid in activating baking soda, promoting lift and rise in the batter. It is also lower in fat and calories than milk.

Eggs provide structure, leavening, richness, color and flavor and protein to baked products. The height and texture of baked goods is determined by the balance between eggs and flour, which both provide strength.

One muffin has 220 calories, 9 grams of fat, 32 grams of carbohydrates, and 4 grams of protein.

The Science

Dear chefs, did you notice the recipe The sweetness and fat in a muffin calls for a combination of whole wheat and all-purpose flour?

Why?

Whole wheat flour can sometimes make the finished product seem drier and produce a coarser texture than using the more refined all-purpose flour.

Plus, substituting whole wheat flour 100 percent for white flour will lower the

Why?

Mainly because whole wheat flour absorbs more liquid than white flour and produces a stiffer dough. The stiffer/drier the dough, the harder it is for it

So, a more pleasing result is attained with a mix of flours.

Whole wheat flour can be used in a crumble topping for muffins, but it will result in a denser, more rustic crumble with a slightly nutty flavor compared to all-purpose flour.

All-purpose flour produces a lighter,

more airy crumble topping.

For muffins, select an oil carefully.

One possibility is a neutral oil which does not have a flavor, like vegetable oil or avocado oil. This enables the flavor of the fruit to shine through.

Another more challenging choice is an oil that adds a complimentary flavor to fruit. Examples include extra virgin olive oil, which boosts a fruity flavor or refined peanut oil. The impact is a nutty

Fresh raspberries are the best choice, if available. Frozen ones discolor the batter. Be sure to dice the raspberries small with a sharp knife so that they are evenly distributed in the batter.

If using liners, also spray the liners on the inside to be sure the liner smoothly peels away from the muffin. This is especially important for low-fat muffins.

Raspberry-Lemon Muffins

Ingredients

- 1 cup whole-wheat flour
- 1 cup all-purpose flour • 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup buttermilk
- ½ cup granulated sugar ⅓ cup neutral oil, such as extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 large egg
- Zest of 1 lemon
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1½ cups fresh raspberries

Directions

Preheat oven to 400 degrees farenheit. Coat a standard 12-cup muffin tin with cooking spray.

To prepare crumb topping

Combine ¼ cup flour, ¼ cup brown sugar, 1 teaspoon lemon juice and a pinch of salt in a small bowl. Add 11/2 tablespoons oil and stir until crumbly.

To prepare muffins

Whisk buttermilk, sugar, oil, egg, lemon zest and va-

· Whisk whole-wheat flour, all-purpose flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt in a large bowl.

nilla in a medium bowl until well combined. Add the buttermilk mixture to the dry mixture and fold until almost blended. Gently fold in the cups raspberries.

- Use a standard muffin tin with 2 oz. cups. Divide the batter evenly among the prepared muffin cups. Sprinkle with the crumb topping, gently pressing to adhere.
- Bake until golden brown and a skewer inserted into the center comes out clean, about 20 minutes. Let the muffins cool in the pan on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Transfer the muffins to the rack and cool at least 5 minutes more before serving.



PREPARE TODAY FOR A HURRICANE

<u>Don't wait for a bad storm to be hours away.</u>

Don't think, "It will never hit here."

Your Pre-Storm Checklist

- 1. Map out an evacuation route and choose a final, fortified destination well-inland. Tell family and friends where you intend to be during a storm. You should have one post-disaster contact one person who is out of the danger zone, who you can contact and who will share your information with other loved ones. You may be short on power so consider limiting your contacts to one person.
- 2. If you stay behind, keep the following in stock: 1 week supply of bottled water and non-perishable foods, refill prescriptions, bottle opener, flashlight and battery operated radio. Do you know where these items are stored? Don't go searching for them as a storm is closing in. Keep tape and cardboard handy should a leak develop.
- 3. Create an inventory of your home. Use photos and videos in case some day you need to replace your items or determine the value of items lost. Special items should be stored away from your home in a safe place. Store important documents in sealable, water proof containers.
- 4. Bring in porch items and anything outside that could become a projectile.
- 5. Fill vehicle with gas. Don't wait until the mad rush starts.
- 6. Don't assume a storm is over. Stay indoors. Please use a flashlight and not candles. Keep refrigerator closed as much as possible.
- 7. Get cash. Money machines could be out for weeks.
- 8. Review your insurance policy once a year to make sure you are covered for a major storm. If you need to file a claim, do so immediately after a storm. Make a list of damaged items. Keep receipts. Be patient.
- 9. The OTOW activity centers are not storm shelters. They will not be open during a storm. If you live on an upper floor or may need assistance after a storm, plan ahead. There are nearby evacuation shelters.
- 10. OTOW will provide weather updates if possible using RAVE, OTOW-TV 901 and the Box Office (otowboxoffice.com).

WHEN A STORM HAS PASSED

- A. If you evacuated, do not return home until authorities give you the OK.
- B. Do not go outside. Do not begin cleanup on your own. Let OTOW management personnel remove limbs, wires and all damage.
- C. Do not drive into a flooded road. Turn around don't drown.
- D. Traffic lights may be out. Stop at all intersections where a traffic light is not working. Treat each intersection as a four-way stop.
- E. Do not use sink water until authorities give the OK. Do not eat spoiled food.
- F. Do not wear flipflops outside. Wear sturdy shoes.

But he did.


After winning again, the whole room cheered on him and his wife. Terry wrapped her arms around him saying, "Honey, money can buy you love."






