Come kick off the season with us. You will hear holiday pieces that you already know and others that you do not know, but soon might consider a favorite.


There will surely be a few singalongs — and I can guarantee some


goosebumps a time or two.

Holiday Safety

I want to remind you that home safety never takes a holiday. If you are cooking up a big meal or just making batches of cookies, never leave your apartment with food in the oven without first turning off the stove.

Seems basic right?

One of the most destructive fires the community has ever had was the day before Christmas and involved cookies in the oven. The owner left for a "quick trip" to the store. When she returned, her condo and the two above her were

Never leave your apartment with the

Same point goes for a lit Chanukah Menorah. Never walk away from open flames. Hopefully you have transitioned to an electric Menorah.

Holiday lighting is another area of concern. Hopefully you have transitioned to LED lights for your tree and home decorations.

Examine your extension cords. If there are any cracks in the insulation or exposed wires because (maybe you changed out the plug eons ago), please discard the cord and do not use it. It may well be a fire hazard. Never overload an extension cord with multiple devices plugged in.

Hopefully you have transitioned to an artificial Christmas tree, and don't have a combustible cut live tree. If you haven't, check the water reservoir daily. When needles drop, it's time to retire

By now you are rolling your eyes.

Seriously, it is easy to be a bit absent minded when you are juggling multiple priorities. Please put your safety and your family's safety first.

Which brings me to the next topic.

Insurance on Your Condo and Contents

Fire events or water damage are cautionary reminders for each resident to check in with your insurance agent and make sure the insurance coverage on your unit and contents is adequate.

If you feel "lucky" and go without insurance, or believe you can self-insure any loss, please reconsider. The cost of repair or reconstruction, as well as loss of use (being displaced pending restoration), may well exceed the purchase price of your home many times over.

It is the obligation of every owner to insure the contents of their dwelling, including loss of use coverage.

Also consider, if your unit is point of origin of the casualty, you are personally liable for all damage to the Association's property as well as any damage to other units. You need a general liability coverage provided in an HO6 policy to protect yourself from losing all of your assets. Loss of use coverage will cover expenses for living and lodging should you become displaced. Displacement after a fire may be 18 months or longer!

This is a good point to segue into the limits of coverage that individual condominium owners may wish to have.

Contents coverage may vary greatly depending on what you own. As a basic point though, you need adequate limits to cover furnishings, personal items, floor coverings, appliances, and

With inflation at a 40 year high, make sure you have the full replacement cost option selected on your content's cov-

All carriers write an HO6 rider that provides for loss assessment coverage in the event of a special assessment from the Association to cover unforeseen shortfalls or losses.

Buildings are insured under a master policy in the name of the Association. The deductible is \$10,000 for any casualty event per occurrence including wind/hail related damage.

Named storm events carry a separate deductible of 3 percent of the total value at the time of loss at each location involved in the loss, subject to a minimum (community wide) deductible of \$250,000 for any one occurrence.

With respect to flood (rising water), earthquake and flood resulting from a named storm, all losses, damage, and/ or expense arising out of any one occurrence shall be adjusted as one loss.

The problem with the highest insurance rates in the nation was not adequately addressed in the last legislative session. As a result, the market for insurance has worsened with the insolvency of several insurers and the catastrophic losses from Hurricane Ian.

I'm not optimistic the legislature will get much right in this upcoming session.

Besides casualty insurance, other steps to protecting your home are testing your smoke detector regularly and having an operable BC fire extinguisher within easy reach. Read the extinguisher operating instructions when you first purchase the unit and at least twice a year thereafter is also recommended.

I will end my article on this note, and wish each of you a very merry Christmas, a happy Chanukah, a wonderful Diwali, a safe and happy 2026.

A cold snap brought temperatures to freezing and then we saw average temperatures in the mid to low 80s.

December may bring some cooler temperatures, but it also brings the possibility of additional traffic in the community. Many residents will have guests visiting from out-of-town who are unfamiliar with the roads and traffic patterns. It is always important to obey the communities' traffic and directional signs, and now so more than ever.

Remember, all vehicles must come to a complete stop at stop signs, obey one-way signs, and the speed limit is posted at 20 miles per hour.

Along with the rules-of-the-road reminders outlined above, here are some decoration reminders for everyone:

- All outdoor lighting should be plugged into GFCI receptacles.
- Each building is permitted to have one common area Christmas tree. Each tree may contain up to 300 miniature lights or 600 reduced-wattage LED lights.
- Extension cords should not cross any walkway in or around any building.
- Please be considerate when using holiday decorations which make sounds singing, talking or sound effects. Please turn them off at reasonable hours and please limit the amount of time they are playing.
- Please do not hang or wrap decorations or cords from building lights, from any building railing or pipe work, or on or within any landscaping.
- Do not place screw extenders with plugs in any building lights or tap into the building power at any controller or light.
- Do not create penetrations into the common structure for the purpose of hanging holiday lighting. Self-adhering, temporary wall hooks are available at most home improvement and depart-



ment stores

- Do not wrap garland or decorations around the light poles at the end of stairwells on any building. This affects the proper operation of the light.
- Never cover your condo unit numbers with holiday decorations. Your unit number must always be visible to emergency personnel.

Did You Know

Hydro jetting continues

If you live in Buildings 63-83, you should be aware that your Management Company will resume a community-wide hydro jetting project on Jan. 12, 2026. This is when contracted work will begin on the extensive job of hydro jetting kitchen and bathroom sanitary drain lines.

There is a total of 197 Polyvinyl Chloride (PVC) common cleanouts and they will be replaced as needed.

Did You Know Rules for Driver Courtesy

One-way traffic signs are used to inform motorists that traffic on a street or parking lot entrance is traveling in one direction only. The one-way traffic sign

is a regulatory sign and drivers encountering a one-way sign must travel in the direction that the sign indicates. Drivers must not travel in the opposite direction of a one-way sign due to the risk of a head-on collision.

While a crisis may be avoided, the reality is that the consequences can be very real. Not following directional signs can be a dangerous decision that may not only have an impact on the driver involved, but others as well, and the outcome could be life altering.

So, the next time you encounter a one-way sign, please follow directions, for the safety of not only yourself, but for everyone in the community.

Painting/Waterproofing

The final month of 2025 will see the painting contractor transition to rear waterproof coating applications for the holiday season with Buildings 84 and 90 up next on the schedule.

As always, the painting contractor's process includes a thorough pressure washing, followed by the sealing of any hairline cracks in the masonry, and then the application of a high-quality coating.

As always, please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating closely to parking areas and front/rear porches which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or property.

Thank you in advance for your cooperation and keep in mind that inclement weather can affect start and completion dates.

Construction, Roofing and Large Scope Projects

Due to logistical and scheduling obstacles, an elevator improvement project previously scheduled for Nov. 3 has been moved to Dec. 1, which is about the same time that the community will be receiving this work update.

Building 96 has two elevators in total, but this project will only affect the unit on the east end of the structure across from Building 92.

The scope of work involves replacing operating components to provide for decades of future reliability. The remodeling of the elevator cab interior

is also part of the process, which provides new, updated laminate surfaces for residents and visitors to the community

The entire undertaking should be completed in roughly three weeks' time, barring any unforeseen conditions.

Because this building has two elevators, the elevator at the west end of the building will still be available for use.

Residents and visitors of Building 96 should be aware of active work zones and exercise caution in and around these areas while the elevator is out of service.

The 2025 Calendar Year Work in Review

2025 continues to bring many challenges with an ever-tightening labor market and materials costs challenges. The Management Company continues to experience extremely long lead times for contractors to provide estimates and start/completion projects.

Due to this, the Management Company continues to employ specific trades in-house and secure its own pricing for materials used in the community throughout the year. This is a proven benefit to the community as Parkway continues its commitment to keeping On Top of the World maintained to a standard it has held itself to since the late 1960s.

Still, it was a productive year for the Management Company and contractors awarded projects by the Condominium Association's Board.

During the 2025 calendar year, the following improvements were able to be accomplished in the community:

- 4 low-slope roofing projects
- 2 elevator equipment modernizations
 - 6 elevator cab remodels
- 5 building railing improvement projects
- 20 building parking lots were sealcoated
- More than 1700 fire extinguishers and 50 fire hydrants were inspected
- To date, 13 front façade painting improvements and 8 rear façade coating improvements






Water heaters traditionally last 10-15 years.

Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office (CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted. If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is working with someone else. Please be patient.

Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter.

The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled.

Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received. From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request. It is not necessary to report service requests more than once.


If you have any questions regarding your request, and until the Community Service Office reopens, please call the Service Request Line at 727-683-6981.

Popular response to survey shows residents really want a safe community

During the month of November, the board asked residents to voice their opinion on how they would like to proceed with entry gate services and gate attendants at all four entrances.

Did we need more?

Do we need less?


Do you have different ideas on how to make sure we have a safe community?

As I write this article in the middle of November, we're only halfway through the month and more than 500 residents have casts their votes and given their opinions. There are patterns developing in the submitted comments. We've gotten some very good ideas and I wanted to at least share the partial results

The recent review of comments reveals clear priorities and strong opinions about how to protect the community while managing costs. While individual viewpoints varied widely, four major themes consistently are rising to the top.

1. Growing Interest in Automated or Electronic Gate Systems

Many residents called for modernizing the entrances with updated technology — options such as automatic gate arms, transponders, radio frequency identification stickers (RFID), licenseplate recognition, or keypad entry systems gained significant attention.



Supporters believe these systems offer a more reliable, cost-efficient way to manage traffic into the community while reducing dependence on staffing.

Several residents pointed to the "Paradise-style" gate setup as a potential model, while others emphasized exploring contemporary access-control systems common in newer developments.

2. Strong Criticism of Current Gate Attendant Performance

A substantial number of comments expressed dissatisfaction with the performance of today's gate attendants.

Residents cited issues such as inattentiveness, limited interaction, lack of authority and inconsistent monitoring. Many felt the attendants provide little meaningful security and questioned the value of continuing the service in its current form.

This theme signals a broader desire for accountability, clearer expectations, and possibly a rethinking of how frontgate staffing should function.

3. Concerns About HOA Costs and the Need for Transparency

Cost remains a major factor in shaping opinions about future options.

Residents repeatedly asked for clearer financial details, particularly about what constitutes a "significant increase" versus a modest one. Without specific figures, many found it difficult to evaluate proposals involving more staffing or new security systems.

Some residents opposed any cost increase due to rising living expenses, while others said they would consider paying more if the improvements resulted in a meaningful enhancement of security.

4. Strong Support for Expanded Use of Security Cameras

Another prominent theme was the call for better camera coverage at entrances and throughout the community.

Suggestions ranged from licenseplate readers, perimeter cameras, and recorded video access, to the creation of a central monitoring hub.

Many residents saw cameras as a practical way to expand coverage and

improve documentation, with or without gate attendants.

Cameras were frequently mentioned as a cost-effective supplement — or alternative — to traditional gate staffing.

A Community Engaged in Its Future

Taken together, the comments the board received shows a community deeply engaged in the conversation about safety, technology and financial responsibility. Residents clearly want a system that is both effective and sustainable, whether that means reimagining the gatehouse roles, investing in new technology, enhancing camera coverage, or finding the right balance among all three.

The full results of the survey will be posted in the January edition of the OTOW newspaper. As the board reviews options in the coming months, these four themes offer valuable insight into the preferences, concerns and hopes of the community.

Thank you to everyone who completed the survey by cutting it out of the November newspaper or going online to the Box Office.

The survey ended on Nov. 30.



Don't wait for the United States Postal Service (USPS) to deliver your ballot to you or to deliver it back to the Association. You have an option to vote electronically (online) if you desire. For more information, please visit www.otowclearwaterinfo.com/electronic-voting/. Your Association highly recommends voting online to prevent delays.

If you are already registered to vote electronically with CONDUU, there is nothing more for you to do except vote. Electronic voting was already open as of delivery of this newspaper on December 1, 2025.

Please remember, Florida Statute requires the Association to mail the voting documents to you so you also will be receiving the same information via USPS.

Electronic voting will close December 8, 2025, at 10:00 AM (48 hours prior to the start of the Membership Meeting) so don't delay,

If you wish to vote by paper ballot, a ballot will be included in the Second Notice of Election, which must be mailed to owners 14 days prior to Election Day per Florida Statute. Your Association is striving to mail it earlier. Instructions for completing the ballot will be included in the Second Notice of Election voting packet. Please make sure to follow the instructions exactly to ensure your vote is valid and can be counted. Make your vote count!

Once completed, you may return the paper ballot to the Community Service Office, mail it in the self-addressed, postage paid envelope (included in the Second Notice of Election mailing -- remember to allow sufficient time for delivery), deposit it in the secured ballot box located in the lobbies of the East and West Activity Centers, or bring it with you to the meeting. Please make sure it is turned in prior to the Chairperson's announcement that voting is closed (shortly after 10:00 AM on Election Day, Dec. 10). Any ballot, regardless of the method submitted, must be received prior to the Chairperson's announcement or it will be marked as DISREGARDED per Florida Statute and your vote will not be counted. Don't let your vote go uncounted.

Make sure your mailing address is correct. The easiest way to do this is through AppFolio. More information on this new option available to OTOW condominium owners is shown below.

Instructions for Completing and Returning An Election Ballot

- 1. Each unit is allowed to vote ONE (1) time regardless of how many individuals own the unit.
- 2. Mark the Election Ballot for the candidates of your choice (up to nine (9) individuals). DO NOT VOTE FOR MORE THAN NINE (9) or your ballot will be "disregarded" (not counted).
- 3. Place the completed Election Ballot in the inner, smaller envelope (marked Ballot Secrecy Envelope) and seal the envelope securely. If the voter owns more than one unit, a separate inner envelope must be used for each Election Ballot submitted. THE BALLOT MUST BE PLACED IN THE BALLOT SECRECY ENVELOPE TO BE COUNTED.

Modify the information on file with the Association, such as your mailing address, email address, and phone number. This is very convenient for "Snowbirds."

View your financial ledger with the Association including details of your charges.

3. View and download documents that have been shared by the Association including your Declaration of Condominium, the bylaws, the rules and amendments, minutes of Board Meetings, and many other important documents.

Submit maintenance requests for qualified areas (common areas and outside your condo).

5. View a calendar with important dates and events in the Community.

How can you request access?

On a Personal Computer, laptop, or tablet:

1. Visit parkwaypinellas.appfolio.com/oportal/users/sign_up

Enter the email on file with the Association.

If the email address matches the Association records, you will receive an activation email.

 If you do not receive an activation email, see the instructions below. Click the ACTIVATE NOW button to continue the activation process.

If you are using an Android cell phone

1. Visit the Play Store and download the AppFolio app then follow the instructions.

If you are using an iPhone cell phone

1. Visit the Apple Store and download the AppFolio app then follow the instructions

The email address you use to sign-up for AppFolio must be the same address on file with the Association and it must be unique to you. If you request access and do not receive an email invitation, check your spam or junk folder. If it is not in that folder, the email address you are using is different than what the Association has on file. You can try another email address that you still have access to or you can visit the Community Service Office or send an email to cso@parkwayclw.com. Either method will require you to complete an Owner's Information Change Form since we are required to have a signed/dated document before we can change your personal information. We will NOT provide your email address over the phone. This is for your protection.

Scam Alert

Question: Are scammers after you? Answer: Of course, they are!

Emails, text messages, phone calls, letters. We are bombarded. It's impossible to avoid them.

Our best, and only, chance to protect ourselves is constant vigilance.

But what if we are caught or trapped by a scam?

Maybe it's the grandparent scam, the romance scam, the I.R.S. imposter scam, the telemarketing scam, the "you committed a crime and are going to jail"

Maybe a trusted advisor, a friend, even a relative, fraudulently got you to invest in some worthless scheme where they made money while you were defrauded.


It's never-ending.

Remember this: You did nothing for which you should be ashamed. You were the victim. I urge you not to hide what happened. Instead, you should report it to your local sheriff's office whether in Marion County, Pinellas County, Hillsborough County or Pasco County. They are eager to help and are kind and courteous.

And, of course, for the tech savvy among us (I'm not one), you should also report fraud to the Federal Trade Commission (ftc.gov) or the F.B.I. (fbi.gov). You will find that no one will blame you or shame you.

Scam Alert

The Office of the Statewide Prosecutor under the Florida Attorney General's Office has announced the arrest of six



persons who are part of a nationwide criminal enterprise that targets folks who park in parking garages, malls and other parking lot areas. They look for whatever you leave uncovered inside

If you left a car door open, you made it easy. If you lock your doors and they see something they want, they smash a window and steal whatever they can grab. They get important personal items in purses left in cars. Stolen items include cash, credit cards, checkbooks, driver's licenses, social security numbers, Medicare numbers and other personal information.

Statewide Prosecutor Stephanie Bergen asks us to help law enforcement by helping yourself. Leave nothing in your car. If you must leave something, lock it in the trunk.

If you frequently, or even sometimes, leave valuables in your car, break yourself of the habit and do it NOW. Protect yourself and help law enforcement in the process.

Q. Where do you get questions for your newspaper column? I know you get questions from letters and emails. Do you get any from Facebook or other social media?

A. I get some questions from emails, but nowadays, none from letters, although if I did get them, I would consider them.

I get the bulk of my questions from my clients or from people I know or whom I meet, and they ask me something I want to print.

Since questions presented to me are almost always in the Q and A format, I just follow through when I respond.

I NEVER post anything that might be on Facebook or X (formerly Twitter.) or any social media. I cannot imagine a worse place to find anything worthwhile among the garbage that is spewed from them.

Two things. Whether I use a question or I don't, I destroy all reference to where I got it. No exception. And I should add that those sometimes cutesy questions at the end of a column are all true.

Q. Is it true that if I sign a durable power of attorney, the person I name can control my assets and steal from

me if I become incapacitated?

A. Yes. It would be a criminal act and they could be arrested for exploitation or theft. However, my partners Rachel Wagoner and John Beck, and I believe that because a durable power of attorney is an extremely important estate planning document, folks should only select someone they absolutely trust. So, always discuss this with your attorney — always.

Guidelines for Riding the Shuttle Bus

1. You MUST have a valid Activity Card and present it to the driver upon entering the bus. The SCA bus service is exclusively for use by Association-approved residents and tenants only. If you do not have a valid Activity Card, you may not ride the shuttle bus.

2. Reservations are REQUIRED - please call 727-799-3417 Option 7 no later than 10 a.m. the day prior to your planned trip. Monday's trip deadline is 10 a.m. Friday. Please be present in the core of your building at your scheduled pick up time. 3. Shopping time is one hour for grocery stores and one hour for Walmart. Shopping time

begins when you are dropped off at your destination. 4. Although appreciated, the driver is prohibited from accepting gifts and tips.

5. The driver may not assist you with enterting or exiting the bus, or with your packages. Please do not ask the driver to do so.

6. The start time listed is when the shuttle bus departs the Community Service Office. The pick-up schedule will rotate wekly between low and high buildings, meaning one week pick-up will start with lower-numbered buildings and the following week it will start with the higher-numbered buildings.

7. Seats are not assigned. They are first-come, first-served.

8. Seatbelts must be fastened during bus movement and must remain fastened until the bus comes to a complete stop.

9. Eating, drinking, smoking, vaping, fighting, distracting the driver, or any other unacceptable actions at the discretion of the driver are strictly prohibited on the bus. Violation of the above guidelines may result in your bus privileges being revoked. All route changes are at the discretion of management.

Honor Flight of West Central Florida continues its heartfelt mission to honor those who served our nation flying veterans free of charge from St. Petersburg-Clearwater International Airport to Washington, D.C., for a one-day visit to reflect at the memorials dedicated to honor their service and sacrifice.

Honor Flight proudly reports that they have now escorted nearly all of the area's World War II veterans to Washington.

Now, Honor Flight is focusing their efforts on locating and honoring Kore-



an War veterans and those who served in the Vietnam era or before.

Honorably discharged veterans, who have not previously participated in an 1975, are eligible to apply.

Deployment or combat experience is not required, and every veteran who qualifies will receive the full Honor Flight experience at absolutely no cost.

Applications from the wait list will be selected based on the service dates and the date the application is submitted.

Top priority will be given to qualified veterans with terminal illness and World War II veterans.

Each Honor Flight carries 75–80 veterans aboard a private, chartered aircraft, departing four times a year from St. Petersburg-Clearwater Airport. Each veteran is assigned a personal guardian to be by their side all day. A wheelchair is available for every vet-



Survey shows 95 percent of residents read OTOW News

Every once in a while, an advertiser in On Top of the World News will ask, "How many residents read your newspaper?"

Well, now we know - about 95 percent (or a projection of more than 7,500 residents per month).

During a survey taken at the 2025 Fall Festival and Expo, 125 residents filled out a survey form correctly.

About 95 percent said they read OTOW News on a regular basis. About 2 percent said they never read OTOW News.

About 84 percent said OTOW News provides them with enough information to understand what is taking place in our community.

The top six features in OTOW News were the community calendar, Entertainment Committee news, Kenneth Colen's column, Association board stories, Jerry Colen's "Is It Legal" column and Tom Butcher's food page.

The question was asked, what type of news do you want to read in OTOW News. About 70 percent said "hard news" informational stories, 41 percent said "soft news" feature stories and 28 percent wanted a mixture of hard and soft news.

The question was asked, where do you learn about entertainment activities happening in the community. About 83 percent said from the newspaper. The second best resource is building bulletin boards (57 percent) and the third best resource is talking to friends or neighbors (52 percent).


Also in November, the Press Association held its annual Writers Workshop taught by Editor Doug Kates.

The event got started when Activity Director Nancy Rogers announced the Press Association won "Best of Show" at the fall festival. Our table was mainly organized by President Tom Butcher, Vice President Donna Gagnon and Secretary Joanne Cordes, with help from Doug.

Then the workshop started.

This fun writing class was attended by 40 staffers who came to learn OTOW News writing styles and guidelines, or simply get a refresher course on basic writing.

Doug reminded everyone that all 90 storytellers on staff have to use the same writing style. We cannot have 90 people all freelance writing using what-

ever grammar style they feel comfortable using.

The Associated Press has a guide book that staffers can review. OTOW News follows most of the AP style guidelines.

The class went over those guidelines.

Doug also asked storytellers to begin each story with a clever first paragraph. He asked everyone to avoid writing weather reports in their stories. And while deadline day is always the 15th of each month, he asked storytellers to turn in reports earlier if possible. Out of 50 stories submitted for the November newspaper, 30 were turned in between Oct 13-15 which burdens the editorial process.

All 40 staffers took an oath they would never put a quotation mark inside a period again.

Everyone took another oath to always use a.m. and p.m. when telling time.

AND EVERYONE SAID THEY WOULD NOT TYPE ENTIRE SENTENCES WITH UPPERCASE LETTERS BECAUSE IT LOOKS BAD AND IS HARD TO READ.

Tom Butcher made a homemade dinner for everyone and beverages were available to help staffers get through Doug's lecture.

The On Top of the World Art Guild raffled off artwork and painting supplies during the 2025 Fall Festival and Expo on Nov. 1.



This year's show is one you will not want to miss. The cast and crew are going all out to make this show spectacular.





Our keynote speaker of the evening was Sheriff Bob Gualtieri. He was elected sheriff more than 14 years ago and is the former president of the Florida Sheriffs Association.

Bob spoke to us about the issue of "open carry" of weapons in Florida. He mentioned places open carry isn't allowed: playgrounds, school yards, airports and government buildings. Private buildings, such as restaurants, grocery stores, etc., may not allow open carry either, depending on their own preference. Improper exhibition of weapons at a protest is also against the law in Florida. A weapon may never be pointed at someone at any time.

Bob noted that Florida has abolished Obama's law whereby the government was not allowed to help ICE officers. The sheriff also explained that the reason we have long-term facilities for dangerous illegal immigrants is that it can take up to four years for the immigrants to have a court date.

The sheriff then reminded us, for emergency issues please call 911 and for non-emergency issues call 727-582-6177.



There is no competition and no long term league - just laughs. We are out by



In 2025 I feel that we have accomplished that goal.


Florida, and especially the Tampa area, have so much to offer in the way of adventure, culture and entertainment to explore. It helps to keep our members active.



Never heard of lawn bowling? Well, you are probably in the majority at On Top of the World.

Until my husband and I joined the Lawn Bowls Club four years ago, I had never heard of lawn bowling either.

Ten pin bowling, of course, we'd been doing that since high school.

Bocce, sure, we never played, but we knew people who did.

Now, whenever someone asks me about lawn bowling, I say it is like 10pin bowling or bocce ball.

"Yes, there are some similarities, so if you like either you should give lawn bowling a try," I say.

My husband and I did and it was love at first roll!

The object of lawn bowling is to roll your bowls (yes bowls, not balls) closer to the target than your opponents. Unlike both 10-pin bowling and bocce, the bowls are elliptical and weighted with a bias. The sport is played on a court that has a surface of either grass or rubico. At OTOW, our courts are rubico which is a durable synthetic surface that mimics the look and feel of grass.

Fun facts - lawn bowling can be traced to ancient Eqypt, with artifacts dating to 5000 B.C. It evolved over the centuries in both Greek and Roman societies. The sport was popular in medieval England but was often banned by monarchs who feared it distracted from archery.

The modern version of lawn bowling, with organized rules, first appeared in Scotland in 1848. Although not an Olympic event, the sport is currently played worldwide.

The U.S. has a national lawn bowl-

ing team called Team USA. Sandy Walls, an OTOW resident, was the former coach of Team USA. Sandy continues to compete internationally and greatly enjoys coaching the members of our club.

Defensive plays get credit for four games decided by two or less runs

One of the most difficult plays to make in senior softball is catching a foul pop-up behind the catcher. When they are popped high in the air, they are difficult to track, often forcing catchers to crane their necks over their backs to find their trajectory.

Mary Szafranski caught her second high pop-up in one game and was in position to nab a third until the backstop nicked it and changed its direction.

Two batters were sent packing.

The Red team scored 9 runs, the Blue team 8 and the White team 6 in a game where two teams took turns playing defense while each team batted.

The White team led briefly when they scored three runs in the fourth inning for a 6-5-3 margin. The runs came courtesy of Jim Tiano's leadoff single followed by Reto Guruswami's double and then singles by Bo Voigt, Robert Bannick and Tony Martinez.

White 11, Red 7, Blue 7

Key hits were delivered by Ralph Scunziano, who tripled home a run in the first inning and scored on Tara Gunning's single to contribute to a three run outburst.

Ralph then hit a three-run homer in the third inning giving his team a 6-5-4 lead and hit a sacrifice fly in the fifth inning to drive in the third run of that inning. That would provide White with a lead they would not relinquish.

On that sacrifice fly, Bob Fields made a fine catch in deep right center field, but speedy pinchrunner Robert Bannick beat the throw home.

George Morgan and Bob Dembinski each had perfect 3-for-3 days at the plate, each slamming a double and driving in and scoring a run.

For the Blue team, Ray Woolsey continued his assault on pitchers hitting line drives that seemed to leave a jet trail in the air, and Mark Manns had a perfect four-hit

The Red team was led by Lenny Segall's 3-for-3 day that included a double and Eddie Ramirez, who also had a perfect 3-hit outing.



The fielding stars were Bo Voigt of Blue who gobbled up every ball hit near him and Mark Manns who manned the hot corner, aptly named as he snagged numerous whistling line drives near third base.

White 8, Blue 7, Red 6

A furious rally, keyed by Barry Yellets' two run inside-the-park-homer, brought Blue within one run of White and left runners on second and third with just one out.

But Gene Abood caught a pop-fly behind second base and when the runner on third tried to score, Gene threw a strike to catcher Bob Fields to seal White's victory.

To add to his game MVP credentials, it was Gene, whose triple leading off the last inning, led to the run that separated winners and losers as he was driven home with the eighth run on a Mark Manns single into left field.

Bob Dembinski, with a single, double and triple and four RBI was the hero for Red while Barry added two doubles to his log for Blue.

Also noteworthy was the airtight defense of Melvin Tennille at second base, short circuiting Blue's scoring opportunities at least three times. His gold glove defense gobbled up grounders and short hops over and over.

For Red, Mike Blaa made a spectacular over the head catch of a long line drive into left field, while Gail Potter corralled a soaring fly ball in right center field to stymie a White scoring opportunity.

Blue 14, Red 12, White 7

Gold Glove fielding kept scores down. Among the defensive stars were Reto Guruswami of Red who ranged far and wide to catch line drives or turn hard grounders into outs. Charles Kovarik of Red manned the hot corner stopping smashes and shot hops down to third base and throwing bullets to first base for numerous outs.

Jim Costello of Blue had to back up to snag a long fly ball destined for the fence while teammate Ray Woolsey turned a series of long fly balls into centerfield into outs as well.

But the highlight play of the game was a running catch along the right field fence by Jim Tiano, robbing the batter of a certain triple and possible home run. His last second stretch to catch the swiftly dropping liner brought all players to their feet.

On offense, Mark Manns slugged a home run deep over the left field fence and newcomer Hunter Christian, in his first ever at bat with us, tripled to right field and followed that up with a double and home

Gail Potter had a perfect three-hit day, scoring two runs and driving in two more.

The key to Blue's victory was a five-run sixth inning which brought them from last place into a tie for first and led to the win by scoring the maximum three runs allowed over each of the next two innings. Bob Dembinski's two triples in that onslaught led to four of the runs as he scored twice and drove in two more. The winning margin came on Robert Bannick's two run inside-the-park homer.

Blue 14, White 8, Red 5

In a dazzling display of quick thinking and determination, catcher Karin Robinson pounced on a ball a few feet in front of the plate and went sprawling, but reached with her bare hand to grab the ball and with her glove hand stretched to touch the plate to force out a runner trying to score. All three teams applauded.

The White team, behind 12-1 in the sixth inning, scored six runs, the last four runs on consecutive homers by Tom Holland and Ray Woolsey to pull within hailing distance of the leader.

But the Blue team was relentless, driven by perfect four-hit days by Elbe Ramirez and Bo Voigt, and strong defense led by second baseman Melvin Tennille, who snuffed out two rallies with a stop of a short hop and later scooping up a low line drive before it hit the ground.

Elbe's hitting line showed a home run and triple, and Bo laced two doubles among his four hits.

White 8, Blue 7, Red 5

With one out in the bottom of the last inning, Tara Gunning laced a hard single into left field scoring Ray Woolsey with the winning run.

Ray had already hit two balls over the fence and doubled. Now he singled to lead off the last inning, moved to second

on Tony Martinez's single and after a fielder's choice moved him to third base. He scored the winning run on Tara's hit.

Through five innings, the game was tied at five runs for each team. White forged ahead with two runs in the sixth inning but was tied by Blue in the middle of the seventh inning. Richard Mierzejewski led off that inning with a home run, and tied the game when Bill Holland followed with a single and scored on a long double by Bo Voigt.

Red had begun the game with three consecutive hits, but failed to score. Their star hitters, Mark Manns and Barry Yellets performed well, each with perfect three-hit day, but the supporting cast kept coming up short.

For Blue, Richard, Bill and Bo carried the offense, each with three hits while Ray's heroics inspired clutch hits from Tony, Tara, Charles Kovarik and Guy Bertuzzi.

Also critical in the game was defensive excellence at second base by Melvin Tennille for Blue and Tony. Bill Holland made a spectacular running catch in left field to save an extra base hit, and Barry Yellets threw out two runners at the plate.

Blue 10, Red 6, White 5

Led by Bo Voigt's perfect three-hit day, and a long three RBI double by Elbe Ramirez, Blue romped to victory.

Ray Woolsey's spectacular running catch at the outfield fence of a line drive as well as pristine outfield play by Hunter Christian kept the Red team at bay.

After putting down the Red team in order in the first inning, Guy Bertuzzi allowed just one hit in the second frame and one more in the third inning. He allowed more than one run in just one inning, that coming on George Morgan's two RBI triple.

December 2000

World Events

December 1, 2000 – Vicente Fox won the Presidency of Mexico, as the opposition candidate to the long-ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party party (PRI). PRI had held the presidency continuously for more than 70 years since the1929 Mexican Revolution. With Fox's landmark election, Mexico's image changed to that of a modernizing democracy and credible economic partner. The U.S. saw Fox as someone who "spoke their language" economically and politically. Fox supported the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) enthusiastically. U.S. businesses welcomed Fox's pro-market approach. He was seen as friendly to U.S. investors and open to expanding cross-border cooperation. Unfortunately, he was unable to maintain power and lost the next presidential election.

Reactor Shut Down

December 15, 2000 – Ukraine shut down the last working reactor at the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant, marking the official end of operations at the site, which was the scene for a nuclear disaster in 1986. There is only speculation that a sudden 1986 shutdown would have left Ukraine with very minimum electricity and would have impacted Russia's supply as well. Outside pressure from Europe primarily led to full closure.

U.S. Business Events

December 28, 2000 – Montgomery Ward, one of the oldest American retail chains, announced it would close all 250 stores and 10 distribution centers, ending 128 years of business. It was under competitive pressure from big-box discounters like Walmart and Target, and had trouble keeping up with changing retail trends. The fall exposed that the traditional department store model was no longer competitive in price, experience, or selection. The shift was to specialized stores or massive discount chains. This accelerated the long-term decline of indoor shopping malls, especially mid-tier ones.

Sports

On Dec. 2, in Atlanta, in the ninth annual Southeastern Conference Championship Game, the No. 7 Florida Gators defeated No. 18 Auburn, 28-6. With that win, Florida attained its sixth conference title in 10 years - the first since 1996. That was the same year the Gators also claimed the national championship. Steve Spurrier was the head coach for both of these big wins. He won the most games as coach in Florida's football history. He reigned as coach the next year. Steve led the Florida Gators for 12 seasons from 1990 to 2001.

Movies

Cast Away, with Tom Hanks in the lead, was the most popular movie in December 2000. This classic movie had such powerful storytelling. Tom delivered a mesmerizing performance and the film's theme of survival, isolation and hope struck us. Behind the waves was a production so extreme it pushed Tom and the crew to their breaking points.

Florida's Infamous Faux Pas

For five weeks, Florida's Election Board was unable to determine who had won the state's electoral vote – stalling declaration of the presidency. On Dec. 12, 2000, the US Supreme Court released its 5-4 decision in George W. Bush vs. Al Gore, settling the recount of the "hanging chads" dispute in favor of George over Al. Immediately, then-Gov. Jeb Bush pushed for changes that make it easier for residents to vote and easier for officials to tabulate the results. Since that embarrassing faux pas, Florida has been recognized as one of the best systems in the nation with further refinements made as warranted.

Clearwater News

In 2000, The Catholic Shepherds of Christ Ministries purchased the former Seminole Finance building, located at 21649 U.S. 19 N, for about \$1,400,000. They did so to maintain the vision on the build's glass wall which was first noticed around Dec. 17, 1996. When first noticed, the Atlas Obscura reported nearly 500,000 visitors flocked to the site in the first few weeks. The vision is about 60 feet tall by 20 feet wide with rainbow/iridescent qualities that led people to perceive it as an outline of Lady Mary in prayer. In 1998, a hand-carved 18-foot cedar crucifix was mounted outside in front of the vision. Even to this day, believers and curious visitors sometimes come to the site to pray or leave flowers. On Dec. 12, 2000, a very large number visitors (particular from the Hispanic community) gathered for devotions.


Some of the guests who had planned to just drop for a few minutes had so much fun they stayed for the whole evening.



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
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Englander recognizes two 90th birthday parties - one in Memphis and one in the WAC

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

Christmas celebrations can look different for everyone.

While some people have huge parties with large families, others book a vacation, spend time with friends or plan a festive night with just one other

Whatever your holiday tradition may be, one thing that always remains important is the food. From Christmas cookies and sweets, to crowd pleasing Christmas appetizers, festive side dishes and breakfast bakes, the holidays are a time to cook up something special and celebratory.

As I have said many times, there are two types of people. Those who eat to live and those who live to eat. I am the latter. I am a true foodie. This is the time of year I live for. This is my Daytona 500, my Indy 500, my Masters and my Super Bowl all rolled up into one.

I love to plan for the feast, put together the guest list, get out old recipes and use special dinner plate settings.

There are a couple things I like to do before the special holiday. Once I get the guest list completed and the menu



planned, I like to mail out the menu to the guests. This also gets them excited.

I also like to set up the dining room table a couple of weeks in advance. Because every time I walk by it, it gets me in the mood and more excited.

Now for planning the feast.

As I said, during the holiday season I start pouring over all my cookbooks and dragging out old family recipes.

My wife, Cheryl, had a father who made the best Four Rose Egg Nog! Yes, I will share the recipe with you.

Then there is the shopping. I love going to different types of gro- Burgundy.

cery stores searching for the various ingredients for the feast.

But let's not forget the old standards: turkey, baked ham, Beef Wellington, Christmas goose and gingerbread

And this time of the year I like to think outside of the box with meats and vegetables.

If you are serving baked honey glazed ham, serve with a German Gewürztraminer or a Riesling.

If you are serving a Beef Wellington, flavor is deeply satisfying. serve with Cabernet Sauvignon or a

If you are serving a Christmas goose, serve with White Zinfandel or a Beaujolais.

Slow-roasted duck is my go-to recipe for when I want to really impress people at a holiday feast, especially when there are no rules dictating the menu.

I still love turkey, but a truly excellent roast duck brings something altogether more special to the table. When done right, a bite of duck is ridiculously tender and succulent. Its assertive, robust

Slow Roast Duck

Ingredient

2 (5 1/2 to 6 pound whole duck

1/4 cup plus 2 teaspoons kosher salt

2 naval orange, halved

4 cups water ½ soy sauce

1/4 cup honey Working

Directions

- 1. Set wire rack in rimmed baking sheet. Working with one duck at a time, use your hand to remove large fat deposits from the cavity opening. Using kitchen shears, trim excess neck skin from top of the breast and from cavity. Remove tail and first two segments from each wing, leaving only dru-
- 2. Rub 2 teaspoons of salt into the cavity of each duck. Rub remaining 10 teaspoons of salt onto the skin of the ducks (5 teaspoons on each duck). Place ducks on prepared rack. Refrigerate uncovered for 24 to 48 hours.
- 3. Adjust oven rack to lower-middle position and heat oven to 300 degrees. Set-rack in roasting pan. Stuff cavity of each duck with two orange halve. Tie legs together with kitchen twine. Position ducks breast side up, crosswise in V-rack, in opposite directions, leaving space between ducks.
- 4. Bring water, soy sauce and honey to a boil in a small saucepan over high heat. Remove from the heat. Ladle boiling water mixture over tops of the ducks, allowing mixture to pool in the bottom of the roasting pan. Roast ducks until thermometer inserted into thickest parts of thigh registers 190 to 195 degrees, which will take 3 1/4 to 3 1/2 hours.
- 5. Remove ducks from the oven and increase oven temperature to 450 degrees. Once the oven has reached 450 degrees, continue to roast the ducks until the skin is deeply browned all over, 10 to 25 minutes. Let ducks rest on the Vrack in the pan for 45 minutes. Carve ducks and serve.

Cajun Fried Sweet Potatoes

Ingredients

5 tablespoon sugar

1 ½ teaspoons ground cinnamon

2 pounds lard for frying 1 ½ teaspoons salt 4 pounds sweet potatoes peeled and sliced 1/4 inch thick

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Directions

- 1. Whisk sugar, cinnamon and salt together in large bowl. Set aside. Line two rimmed baking sheets with triple layer of paper towels. Melt lard in large Dutch oven and heat over medium-high heat at 350 degrees.
- 2. Add one-third of sweet potatoes to lard and fry until tender and lightly browned in spots, 8 to 10 minutes. Transfer sweet potatoes to one prepared sheet. Return oil to 350 degrees and repeat twice more with remaining sweet potatoes, dividing fried potatoes evenly between prepared sheets.
- 3. Transfer sweet potatoes to bowl with sugar mixture and toss to coat. Add vanilla, if using, and toss again.

Four Roses Egg Nog

Ingredients

6 eggs 1 pint of milk 1 cup sugar

1 pint heavy cream 1 gallon vanilla ice cream

1 ounce rum 1 pint Four Roses (Whiskey)

Directions

- 1. Separate six eggs whites and the yolks into two separate bowls
- 2. Beat the whites and yolks separately
- 3. Add ½ cup of sugar to yolks while beating, and add ¼ cup sugar to the whites after they nave been beaten very stiff.
 - 4. Mix the egg whites with the yolks.
 - 5. Stir in 1 pint of heavy cream and 1 pint of milk.
 - 6. Add 1 pint of Four Roses. (Whiskey)
 - 7. Pour the mixture into a punch bowl and top with scoops of ice cream.
- 8. Let people serve themselves.
