Board Meeting February 20, 2024

Because the new budget year will be so consequential in many ways, as well as having new, inexperienced Board members, there will be a short Board meeting on Feb. 20, 2024, to consider awarding a contract for the Structural Integrity Reserve Study (SIRS).

This is the study that will serve as the basis for determining the amount of reserves the Association may (or may not) be required to establish to comply with changes in the law enacted in the last few years.

The Board has historically established budgets for funding current work projects, staying ahead on building component capital replacement and annual maintenance costs, and we hope this practice is reflected positively in the study.

Determining which company is best qualified to perform the SIRS studies and is selected by the Board, will influence the budget, thus it is imperative to have a timely decision on a selection.

That Board Meeting will immediately be followed by a Budget Workshop to present a draft budget for the Board's discussion and consideration. The Management Company will present a draft budget laying out the regular maintenance operation work needed to keep the community functioning on a daily basis as well as discussing proposed capital improvement projects planned in 2024-2025. The Management Company will ask for Board Member input in whether or not to accelerate certain projects or stay to the current schedule of improvement work.



January. The purpose of this work is to replace the DiamondBriteTM finish on the pool. This particular surface lasts longer than Marcite TM, but any pool surface is still subject to degradation over time from pool chemicals used in disinfection. This work is on track to be completed by late February. For your safety and the safety of the workers, please stay clear of the jobsite.

Save A Life

I recently read an interesting article about AED devices by Stephanie Kuzydym picked up by the USA Today Network.

In the article she makes the point that "The Good Samaritan Law is the main federal law concerning AEDs. It encourages people to use CPR or an AED to save a life by giving them legal protection for their efforts."

AED devices are deployed around this community in amenities so that any ablebodied individual could use one to revive someone in cardiac distress. The article made the argument that these devices should be as ubiquitous as fire extinguishers inasmuch as both can save lives.

SCA Amenities Pinellas, LLC (SCA) has been changing out the older AED units with the most current. Yes, the AEDs do have an expiration date as do their batteries. It is a regular task to track each AED unit and make sure they are available and ready for use.

To this end, in 2024, SCA hopes to

Study, submitted their findings in very late unforeseen shortfalls or losses. December. The reports are well organized and present a tabulation of their findings.

There is good news and bad news.

The good news is we have received the final reports and the bad news is we have not received the summary reports for distribution to the residents. If any Phase II inspections are required, they need to be done within 180 days of summary report submittal. The Management Company is working with a vendor to create a secure website accessible only to residents for posting the complete studies.

Generally, any non-structural observations cited in the report are largely cosmetic and will be addressed by the Management Company in the normal course of maintenance work. Management is aware that there may be one or more buildings for which a Phase II inspection is recommended by the engineers. Within 180 days of submitting a Phase I inspection report, the Phase II inspector must submit a Phase II inspection progress report to the local permitting agency with a timeline for completion of the Phase II inspection(s).

Lease Extension Reminder

The Board recently received a few questions regarding lease extension and how residents can learn more about this.

As a reminder, 81 buildings at On Top of the World Clearwater have leasehold units. The leases were originally sold for a term of 99 years, but with OTOW now more than 50 years old, it is time for many residents to extend their lease to protect the value of their unit and to ensure that lenders would be comfortable with the remaining term of the lease.

When you sign the Amendment, your lease will be extended until June 30, 2119.

There is no additional payment required to extend your lease, no change in the way lease dues are currently being collected, no change in the amount of your lease dues, and it will have no impact on your property taxes or insurance.

Additionally, the lease extension includes annual increases limited at \$6 per year.

Please remember, another benefit of an HO6 policy is the personal liability coverage. Should you be the cause of a water leak or a fire event that damages adjoining units, you may be held liable for their damage, as well as any damage to the Association's area of responsibility between units.

The undervaluation of your contents may cause you a significant loss, but most likely will not bankrupt you. If you do not have personal liability coverage, you could lose all of your assets if you cause damage to units around you and you are not adequately insured.

In the On Top of the World Condominium Association, buildings are insured under a master policy in the name of the Association. The deductible is \$10,000 for any casualty event per occurrence, including wind/hail related damage. Named storm events carry a separate deductible of 5 percent of the total value at the time of loss, at each location involved in the loss, subject to a minimum (community wide) deductible of \$250,000 for any one occurrence.

With respect to flood (rising water), earthquake and flood resulting from a named storm, all loss, damage and/or expense arising out of any one occurrence shall be adjusted as one loss and from an amount of each such adjusted loss there is a \$100,000 deductible.

Besides casualty insurance, other steps to protect your home are testing your smoke detector regularly and having an operable BC fire extinguisher at easy reach. Read the extinguisher operating instructions when you first purchase the unit and at least twice a year thereafter is also recommended.

The Community Service Office has handled numerous major leaks from improperly maintained water heaters. The replacement and maintenance of water heaters is the responsibility of the unit owner. In all cases, the owner found out how important having insurance is when faced with paying for the extensive damage to their unit, the adjoining units and the Association property between the units. The Association will seek reimbursement from the unit owner for its repair work in every instance.

Personal Insurance on Your Condo and Contents

Fire events or water damage are cautionary reminders for each resident to check in with your insurance agent and make sure the insurance coverage on your unit and contents is adequate. If you feel "lucky" and go without insurance, or believe you can selfinsure any loss, please reconsider. The cost of repair or reconstruction, as well as loss of use (being homeless pending restoration), may well exceed the value of your condominium many times over.

It is the obligation of every owner to insure the contents of their unit, including loss of use coverage. Loss of use coverage will allow your carrier to provide you living and lodging expenses should you become displaced. Displacement after a fire may be between six and 18 months!

This is a good point to segue into the limits of coverage that individual unit owners may wish to have. Contents coverage may vary greatly depending on what you own. As a basic point though, you need adequate limits to cover furnishings, personal items, floor coverings, appliances and cabinetry. All carriers write an HO6 rider that provides for loss assessment coverage in the event of a special assessment from the Association to cover

parked in the community, is not covered by your HO6 policy. State law requires you to maintain a policy on your automobile.

The prudent owner will purchase comprehensive or coverage other than collision that pays for damage to a vehicle from incidents other than a collision, including fire, theft, windstorm, vandalism or flood. It also covers damages caused by falling objects or from hitting an animal.

Feeling Flush?

Think first! The Management Company has recently been called out to deal with a range of plumbing blockages. Upon investigation of the several incidents in December, they found grout, washcloths, small hand towels, adult diapers, cat litter and "flushable" wipes stuck in the pipes.

Get the point?

The only thing flushable is human waste and toilet paper. Everything else is NOT flushable (even so called "flushable" wipes, which may flush, but don't break down and cause some dandy blockages).

A sewerage back-up can cause real problems and damage to ground floor neighbors. Please be responsible and mindful of your first-floor neighbors. Flush only human waste and toilet paper.

Building Condensation

As a reminder, buildings in the community experience condensation issues throughout substantial temperature swings and high humidity (similar to when you take a cold drink from the refrigerator to a warmer room). When this occurs, the buildings may have these condensation conditions occur multiple times. Please be aware of the conditions and watch your step-in areas where condensation is occurring.

When the condensation is particularly extreme, these conditions may have an adverse impact on your building's elevator components, which can result in the elevator being out of service.

Elevator service cannot be restored until conditions improve and the elevator can be inspected for a return to service. The Management Company continues to work to mitigate the conditions as quickly as possible.

OTOW-Alerts provides advance warning of severe weather events as well as other matters of critical concern to the residents of the OTOW Clearwater Condominium Community. It is not hyperbole to say an advanced warning may save lives!

Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office (CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted.

If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter. The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assess ment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled. Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received. From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request. It is not necessary to report service requests more than once. If you have any questions regarding your request, and until the Community Service Office reopens, please call the Service Request Line at 727-683-6981.

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is exclusive to the condo and is the owner's responsibility. The Association's responsibility is to the structure and common elements.

Upcoming Projects Painting/Waterproofing

The painting contractor will continue with improvements on the west side of the community in February with the front facades of Buildings 67 and 74 next on the schedule.

The contractor will be utilizing pressure washing and aerial lift equipment in the main parking areas and surrounding secondary lots which will require residents to relocate their personal vehicles as necessary.

Bulletins are posted by the contractor in advance of the work so please keep an eye on the building's bulletin boards for details.

As always, please watch your step and exercise caution in these areas while the improvements are underway and be aware that inclement weather can affect the approximate start and completion dates.

Construction, Roofing and Annual **Community Maintenance Projects**

The December 2023 work update article regarding roofing system improvements had stated that the start of the replacement cycle would begin at Building 40 in early February, but due to logistical and roofing supply delivery schedules, the work will begin at Building 83 instead.

The contractor will begin the staging of materials and performing of preliminary roof replacement activities at Building 83 just days before this newspaper reaches you.

Being it has been a rather unseasonably cool winter, with above average rainfall so far, the project may take longer than the typical three weeks to complete.

Buildings 60 and 59 are also scheduled for the month of February so residents in those buildings should also be prepared for when the contractor arrives at their respective locations The vendor uses low volatile organic As with each year's improvements, the (Continued on page 5)

compound (VOC) adhesives during the installation of these roofing systems. Low VOC means they have a reduced amount of volatile organic compounds, therefore giving off a reduced amount of odor. Know Your Water Heater



Water heaters traditionally last 10-15 years.

If your water heater is leaking around the base unit, is not producing normal amounts of hot water or has become noisy, it's time to consider replacing your current unit with a new one.

If your water heater fails, it could not only flood your unit, but units below you. You may be financially responsible if it causes damage to your neighbors' units.

to allow for the safe and efficient operations by the contractor, is necessary at all roofing project sites.

Bulletins with work start dates will be posted in the respective building in advance of the contractor's arrival. As always, in the interest of safety, please observe all cordoned off areas and watch your step.

February will also see the return of a vendor, under contract to the association, who will install code-compliant walkway guardrail and stairwell components to Building 91. The vendor will be focusing their work on the Paradise section of the community in early 2024 before the work transitions back to the East side of property in the next fiscal year.

This state licensed and insured contractor will be replacing or adding aluminum components to the walkway guardrails and stairwell handrails, so please exercise caution in the areas where these improvements are being made.

The improvements are estimated to be complete in 4-6 weeks, depending on the scope and the size of the structure. First floor residents may need to temporarily relocate items on their patios and all residents should be prepared for elevated noise and dust levels as a by-product of the work. Notices will be posted in advance of work so residents should keep an eye on their bulletin boards for updates.

The community's annual fire extinguisher inspections are another project scheduled for February, though the exact date is still being finalized with the vendor. This very important yearly fire suppression check-up takes roughly 2-3 weeks to complete and looks at all facets of the safe, reliable and efficient performance of these life-safety devices.

The Management Company works closely with the licensed vendor to ensure that each location on property is serviced according to the National Fire Protection standard.

Building walkway repairs will continue through winter and into spring as construction crews perform maintenance to the second and third floor walking surfaces. These small-scale repairs require the use of specialized power tools and moving their floor mats from the commay cause a temporary inconvenience in the form of noise and dust. Repair crews will do their best to limit the inconvenience during this necessary work. These small repair areas will also be coated as a future preventative.

Walkway coating improvements will continue across the property in the winter and spring. These improvements involve preparation of the surface (and occasionally sub-surface) concrete and then an application of a quality, slip-resistant barrier coating. The result is intended to provide longevity to the balcony walking surfaces as well as returning the look to its original conveyed color scheme.

The Management Company will post notices on the affected building's bulletin boards concerning the dates crews are expected to commence the work. Please be aware of "Caution" and "Wet Paint" signs in and around these work areas and exercise care when near these improvement locations.

Recurring Reminders For All Community Residents

On March 1, 2023, the Management Company recommended its enforcement efforts by removing all unapproved items placed in building common areas. This includes, but is not limited to, plants (live or artificial), personal items, nonexterior rated furniture, rusted chairs/ tables or in disrepair, tchotchkes, etc., as these items are not permitted to occupy common spaces. As has been referenced in the newspaper, on the community TV channel, and the bulletins posted in all building center core lobbies, these items will be removed and disposed of without further notice.

These ongoing efforts help keep the areas safe for first responders as well as maintain an aesthetically pleasing community for all to reside in. We ask that residents help keep the community's common areas in compliance by reporting violations of this nature to the Management Company. We appreciate the community's cooperation and support in reporting any violations of this nature so the Management Company can investigate and correct if necessary.

The Management Company would also like to thank the residents who live on the second and third floors for their cooperation in making the On Top of the World community a safer and moreaesthetically pleasing place to live by reeas where the mats were once located, as well as repainting areas that could not be cleaned to community standards.

As a reminder to all residents, and in keeping with condominium rules governing common areas, any floor mats placed in the second or third floor balcony walkways or center core areas will be removed without any further notification. Please assist us in keeping these walkway areas clear while making your community a safer and more beautiful place to live.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services Division, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle. This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hanger brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future. Thank you for your cooperation.

Inspection services representatives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproofing coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you are not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit by the coating's vendor. We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a suc-

Company asks that if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stones at the earliest convenience.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The Management Company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas. Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Often decorative rocks or landscaping are installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you install.

Inspection efforts continue to be focused on the tagging and removal of portable barbeque grills, be it propane, charcoal, or electric, defined as violating life-safety and fire codes in any building common areas or kindled in proximity to the structure as they pose a fire risk to the building and residents. Only grills meeting the approved Clearwater Fire Department standard are permitted on the patios of first floor units. If you're a first-floor unit owner and not sure if your grill complies, please stop by the Community Service Office to request a visit from our friendly Inspections Services staff. We're always happy to educate or assist the community as much as possible.

The Management Company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the community service office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard.

Due to original conveyance, not all units are able to add a softening system. Please check with the Management

The community's response to compliance was astounding, as was the feedback regarding these efforts.

Once again, thank you for your support in this undertaking. Now that the notification and compliance piece has been completed, the Management Company will continue the ongoing compliance enforcement of these common arcess across the community.

First floor unit owners will continue receiving notifications from the Inspection Services Department as the Management Company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike. The Management

Survey shows at least 1 of 3 newspaper readers is checking out everything in this publication

On Top of the World residents apparently enjoy all the contents in this monthly newspaper, which is great news to all the volunteer writers who contribute.

Back in November, OTOW News staff conducted a survey during the 2023 Senior Expo outside the East Activity Center. Staffers asked people walking by to take our simple survey and 183 people from 75 different buildings agreed.

The most-read stories each month, according to the survey, were the club stories. More than 88 percent of those surveyed stated they read the club stories.

Second most popular was the community calendar (77 percent) and third most popular was Kenneth Colen's column (68 percent).

Also extremely popular were building stories, travel stories, Nancy Roger's community column, Pet of the Month, Around the Bay and Gerald Colen's "Is It Legal."

And those were just the favorites. Every category and every columnist was read by at least 1 out of every 3 people who took the survey.

"These were very positive results," said Editor Doug Kates. We had 16 different regular features listed in the survey and all 16 were widely read. This was very positive feedback for our newspaper."

One resident stated, "I don't see how you can add anything else (to the newspaper). It is great."

Another resident stated, "Overall, the newspaper includes all aspects on On Top of the World life. I enjoy reading it very much."

And a third person commented, "I like the comprehensive articles and feel I know what is happening in On Top of the World by reading our publication."

Some people asked for a comic section, restaurant reviews, crime reports inside the community, obituaries, more pet articles, more updates on community improvement



projects, more puzzles, more recycling information, more coupons, more stories on how to live longer and happier, and photographs with the classified ads.

There were several requests for story writers to please list contact information at the end of their stories so people with questions can contact a club or building associate.

A common request was a list of important phone numbers. This already exists on the same page as the table of contents, and usually at the end of the third section.

One person asked for someone to start a Latino Club. Go talk to Nancy Rogers in the Activities Office if you would like to be the founder. Then your new club will be included in future editions.

The survey also asked residents if there are too many newspapers left over in their building bin at the end of the month. More than 38 percent of those taking the survey stated no newspapers were left over and 45 percent said very few newspapers were left over, so it sound like just enough newspapers are being produced without little paper getting wasted.

You've see the flashing signs but do you know what to do?

You've driven Sunset Point Road and have most likely seen the bright yellow flashing lights come on at the crosswalk signals pictured at right.

But do you know what you are supposed to do?

This type of signal is called a rectangular rapid flashing beacon. The main purpose is to alert drivers that someone is about to cross the road in a designated crosswalk along the Duke Energy Trail.

Trail users press a button to activate the signal and yellow lights flash.

The information below is provided by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and tells you what happens next:

Trail users

» Press the button to activate the signal and wait for the flashing lights to come on before stepping into the crosswalk.

» Stay on the trail, do not enter the crosswalk, until any approaching vehicles have stopped.

» Some motorists may not be aware of the need to stop, so make sure all motorists see you before you cross the road

» Cross the road only after all vehicles have stopped.

Motorists

» When approaching these signals, look to the left and look to the right of the crossing for approaching trail users, even if the flashing lights are not activated.

» Slow down and be prepared to stop for trail users.

» Stop or yield according to the road signage.

» If you do stop your vehicle, STOP BEFORE THE CROSSWALK so



Markissia has been a commissioned portrait artist for 35 years. Her work includes full-size portraits and miniature portraits as well as other fine art.


Markissia has an amazing amount of awards and is an active member in many prestigious art societies. Presently, she is an instructor at the Dunedin Fine Arts Center.







"The Snowbirds Club does a fantastic job showing our veterans a night of gratitude with a bite to eat and a splendid show," Pam said.



Marina and her husband moved to On Top of the World from Atlanta in December 2022.

Marina quickly became involved in many activities here, including the 8 a.m. ladies exercise class, line dancing and pickleball.

Once a month the exercise class is treated to a class with Marina sharing her expertise with us.

Marina is a flexibility expert with more than 30 years of experience working with all different types of athletes from all over the world, including gymnasts, dancers, cheerleaders, contortionists, ice skaters, sports acrobatics, aerobic fitness, divers and aerial artists.

She was an owner/head coach of United Gymnastics Academies in Jacksonville and Atlanta. She has trained gymnasts from novice to Olympic level and has traveled all over the world as an USA Team Coach.

Marina has taught numerous workshops, seminars and lectures. She says she is three quarters retired now, but still trains clients on-line and travels to gymnastic facilities in Tampa and Sarasota monthly to instruct classes.

She developed her techniques for teaching flexibility after seeing so many gymnasts have to quit the sport from injuries due to improper stretching, lack of stretching or poor body alignment.

Marina created her program with a unique blend of non-invasive stretching techniques from studying Russian, Ukrainian and Bulgarian experts, sports physical therapists, Pilates instructors, sports doctors, flexibility studies, and working with thousands of athletes from various sports.

Marina was born in the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic. In 1975, Marina was a political refugee from the USSR. Days after her 22nd birthday, she took action on the most difficult decision of her life and left everyone and everything she knew behind for the chance to be in a place where her family would no longer struggle with constant fear, hunger, cold and decrepit living conditions.

She, her husband, mother-in-law and 16-month-old child were among the few lucky recipients who were granted exit visas, escaping the Soviet totalitarian system.

After eight months of displacement with no money and no grasp of the language, Marina's family arrived in this country, worked tirelessly, and thanks to our freedoms she earned the safety, security and happiness they never could have achieved under a socialist regime.

Happily married for more than 50 years, Marina has three beautiful daughters and four grandchildren.

French Culture Class restarts for 2024 - give your brain something new to think about in the new year

After a two-week hiatus during the Christmas season and New Year's Eve celebrations, the French Language and Culture Society of On Top of the World reconvened on Jan. 2, from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. and will continue every Wednesday.

As we start the new year, any resident of OTOW who wants to delve into the fascinating world of French culture, cuisine and fine arts, and learn basic French, is cordially welcome.

As we start our sessions, we always begin our class with a moment d'humour (or a humorous joke or skit) which any member can contribute and make us laugh. Then we add two wonderful activities: a French song followed by a 10 minute French film - either with spoken French or French subtitles.

For example, we recently saw Maggie Smith speak superb French in the film, "Tea with Mussolini." Her French was impeccable because it was dubbed which was translated from the original English version.

Other past films in French were "Molière," "Le fantôme de l'Opéra" (version 1944), "Le comte de Monte-Cristo," etc.

Everyone also enjoyed singing old classic songs like "Sur le pont d'Avignon," "Frère Jacques," "Les parapluies de Cherbourg" and other songs by Jacques Brel, Charles Trenet, Gilbert Bécaud (What Now, My Love/ Eh, maintenant), etc.

After a petit goût or a little taste of French culture, we learned to speak conversational French. During that time we learned

about French wines and liqueurs and basic doctors recommend that senior citizens learn foods that French people love. However, there are certain regions in France where the cuisine varies and some people keep it secret, especially some personal age-old restaurant recipes which may even be locked in a hidden safe.

Besides additional and practical vocabulary, we use a text with English and French dialogues entitled French Made Simple (by Pamela Rose Haze and E. Jackson, 2006 Edition, Broadway Books) which can be purchased at Barnes & Noble.

An added note is that we ask for a \$5 donation a month to cover printing fees for outlines and handouts, and also gas costs to pick up films at a library.

From a psychological viewpoint, some

a foreign language since the brain needs to be active and charged just like the rest of the body. A constant learning activity, they say, can help prevent dementia and keep one's brain sharp by exercising the memory.





• Located closer to the equator for more n. They are outdoors a lot and that would get them much sunshine and natural vitamin D. We discussed getting Vitamin D from sunshine. It depends on location, season and time of day and that sunscreen blocks that. We brought up Vitamin D supplementa-



tion, but it was agreed that there are all kinds of recommendations for how much.

We closed the meeting with a little discussion on Omega-3 fatty acids that a vegan or plant-based diet must contain. Walnuts, soaked chia seeds and flax seeds ground into meal are easy and healthy sources.

Whoever is still in the round, after all betting is complete, is eligible to win the pot. If there are still two or more players holding cards, the best poker hand wins.



In every game, we see wonderful plays afield, running and short-hop catches, bullet throws to cutoffs, diving stops and heads-up plays.


White 13, Red 7, Blue 5




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Presentation, color, spices, desserts In the early days of French cuisine, everything was a science



In the 14th century, Guillaume Tirel, a court chef known as "Taillevent," wrote Le Viandier, one of the earliest recipe collections of medieval French.

In the 17th century, chefs Francois Pierre La Varenne and Marie-Antoine Careme spearheaded a movement that shifted French cooking away from its foreign influences and developed France's own indigenous style.

The two forms of cooking played different roles regionally, with many variations and appellation d'origine controlee (AOC) regulated appellation laws.

Cheese and wine are a major part of the French cuisine.

Knowledge of French cooking has contributed significantly to Western cuisine. Its criteria are used widely in Western cookery school boards

The French medieval cuisine banquets were common among the aristocracy. Multiple courses would be prepared, but served in a style called service en confusion, or all at once. Food was generally eaten by hand, meats being sliced off in large pieces held between the thumb and two fingers. The sauces were highly seasoned and thick, and heavily flavored mustards were used.

Pies were a common banquet item with the crust serving primarily as a container rather than as food itself. It was not until the very end of the late Middle Ages



that the shortcrust pie was developed

Meals often ended with an issue de table, which later changed into the modern dessert, and typically consisted of dragees (in the Middle Ages, meaning spiced lumps of hardened sugar or honey).

Kitchen gardens provided herbs, including such as tansy, rue, pennyroyal, and hyssop, that are rarely used today. Spices were treasured and very expensive at the time, including pepper, cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, and mace.

Sweet-sour flavors were commonly added to dishes with vinegar and verjus combined with sugar (for the affluent) or honey.

A common form of food preparation was to thoroughly cook, pound and strain mixture into fine pastes and mushes something believed to be beneficial to make use of nutrients.

Visual display was prized. Brilliant colors were obtained by the addition of, for example, juices from spinach and the green part of leeks. Yellow came from saffron or egg yolk, red came from sunflower and purple came from Crozophora tinctoria or Heliotropium europaeum.

Gold and silver leaves were placed on food surfaces and brushed with egg whites.

Culinary tourism and the Guide Michelin helped to acquaint commoners with the cuisine bourgeoisie of the urban elites and the peasant cuisine of the French countryside starting in the 20th century. Many dishes that were once regional have proliferated in variations across the country.

Parisian Potage (Potatoes & Leeks Soup)

Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 large leek split, washed, and finely minced
- 1 pound potatoes Yukon Gold peeled and held in cold water
- 4 cups chicken stock
- 1 cup water
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley
- 1/2 cup grated Gruyere cheese

Directions

Heat the oil and butter in a large saucepan. Add the leeks and cook over medium heat for three minutes, stirring occasionally.

Cut the potatoes into sticks about 3/4 inch thick and slice the sticks crosswise into 1/8 inch slivers. The potatoes should be kept in water after peeling, but they should not be washed after they are cut into slivers. This would wash away their starch, which helps to make the soup smooth.

Add the stock, water, salt and pepper to the leeks, then mix in the potato slivers. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, and boil gently for 12 minutes.

Serve the soup with a grated cheese and sprinkling of the parsley on top.

Small Chuck Roast with Red Onion Sauce

Ingredients

2 pound boneless beef chuck roast 1 tablespoon hoisin sauce (optional) 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon olive oil

Sauce 1/4 cup chopped red onion

1/4 cup chopped fresh chives

- 1 teaspoon minced fresh sage
- 1 teaspoon chopped garlic
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground pepper
- 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
- 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

Preheat the oven to 170 degrees. Rub the roast on both sides with the hoisin sauce, and sprinkle with salt.

Heat the oil in a large ovenproof saucepan until very hot. Cook the roast over high heat for 2 1/2 minutes on each side for medium-rare. Transfer the roast to the oven and let it continue to cook for 30 minutes and rest for at least 15 minutes (the roast can be left in the low oven for as long as 30 minutes.

Meanwhile for the sauce: Mix all the ingredients together in a bowl.

Cut the roast on a diagonal into thin slices and serve with the red onion sauce.

Baked Rabbit with Mustard Crust

Ingredients

1 small rabbit 1 3/4 to 2 pound	s 2 tablespoons olive-oil	
1/2 teaspoon salt	1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper	
1 large slice firm white bread cut into 1-inch pieces		
1 large garlic clove, crushed	2 teaspoon olive-oil	

1 large garlic clove, crushed 3 tablespoons Dijon mustard

Directions

Preheat the oven to 425 degrees. Put the rabbit open side down on a cutting board and, using your hands, press down on it to make it of a more equal thickness throughout.

Heat the oil in a 12-inch skillet. Sprinkle the rabbit with the salt and pepper and place it open side up in the hot oil. Cover and cook over high heat for four minutes. Turn the rabbit over and cook it on the other side, covered, for another four minutes.

For the crust: Put the bread cubes and garlic in a food processor and process to coarse crumbs. Transfer to a small bowl and toss with the oil to moisten the bread.

Remove the rabbit from the heat, uncover the pan, and brush the top and sides with the mustard. Spread the crumbs on top of the mustard. Bake for 20 minutes. Remove from oven let rest for 5 to 10 minutes. Cut the rabbit into pieces and serve.

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With cost of chocolate rising, consider rice pudding this Valentine's Day

Here is bad news for Valentine's Day, especially to those who love chocolate. During the past three to six months, the cocoa-producing West African region, which produces 70 percent of the world's cocoa supply, has experienced extreme rainfall due to El Niño. This poses a significant risk of crop losses.

Furthermore, high inflation in the region has created a cash crisis in which cocoa suppliers are unable to access affordable fertilizers and pesticides and cannot pay for laborers and farmers.

Cocoa prices have surged to a 46-year high. (i)

In America, the concentration of chocolate production among a few major companies has amplified the supply impact,



Decadent Rice Pudding

Ingredients: 1/2 cup RICO® medium-grain white rice, 3/4 cup water, 3/4 cup whole milk, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cinnamon sticks, 2 butter pads, ¹/₂ cup sugar, 2 teaspoons vanilla, one 15-oz can evaporated milk, 1/4 cup brandy-soaked golden raisins (optional).

Instructions

1. For Valentine's Day, my dear chefs, you want to get fancy. Pre-soak raisins in brandy overnight, drain and pat dry the next day.

2. Cook the rice in a large pot, following package directions. Mix water, milk, rice, cinnamon sticks and salt. Add a couple of pads of butter. Stirring often, bring to a boil. Continue at simmer covered for 15 minutes.

3. Stir in sugar, vanilla and raisins. Slowly add evaporated milk while stirring as the mixture is gradually bought to a boil again.

- 4. Remove from heat, uncovered, allow to sit five minutes.
- 5. Ladle into serving dishes. Dust with powdered cinnamon.

leading to ever higher chocolate prices in 2024.

Reports have also described chocolate manufacturers replacing cocoa butter with palm oil or sunflower oil, causing chocolate lovers to complain about "waxy and artificial" texture.

Manufacturers are quietly

modifying their recipes to save money and maintain their profit margins. The phenomenon, which has been called "skimpflation" and "flavorflation," is a way to hide the impact of inflation and avoid passing higher costs on to the consumer. (ii) But by replacing expensive ingredients with cheaper ones, companies are also making food less tasty, less healthy and less satisfying.

Here is the good news.

There is a Valentine's Day alternative.

It's nostalgic and comforting.

Now, more than ever, people want foods that are familiar. Events in recent years have triggered fond memories and this has influenced movies to street fashion to food trends.

Rice pudding conveys such feelings and we are seeing a resurgence.

My dear chefs, you can jazz up rice pudding to be a decadent Valentine's Day dessert.

The fresher the rice pudding is, the tastier. Fortunately, it is an easy dessert to make fresh at home. There are many recipe variations out there. Some include sweetened condensed milk. Others use whole milk or evaporated milk. Some use a combination of all three!

6. Let cool. Then refrigerator for minimally two hours to solidify. Keep refrigerated until served. Serves 4 - 6.

The Science

Opinions vary on which type of rice is best suited for this dish. Most feel medium-grain is best. (iii) Because this rice releases more starch, it creates a creamy consistency ideal for rice pudding. RICO® is a medium-grain rice grown in Puerto Rico. It is excellent in a rice pudding. Arborio is another, but it is expensive and hard to find. Long-grain rice like aromatic Basmati rice works well.

Notes

· Avoid rinsing rice if you're making pudding. American Test Kitchens found that rinsing washes away surface starch and compromises the desired creamy consistency.

• Stir often to ensure rice doesn't stick to the bottom of the pot and milk doesn't burn. With sufficient stirring, rice hydrates, gelatinizes and releases starch, thickening the mixture to a pudding-like consistency.

• If your rice pudding has ended up too thin, it is likely that it didn't cook long enough to thicken. If so, continuously stir in one beaten egg to thicken. If it thickens too much, stir in a splash of milk until it reaches desired consistency.

• If the rice is mushy, the problem is over-cooking which causes the rice to absorb too much water. Water over-absorption causes the rice grains to split open, ruining the texture and creating a mushy, gummy result.

• If your rice pudding is crunchy, then the heat was too high. Water evaporates before rice has a chance to fully cook. Plus, you risk an undesirable scorched taste. And if you don't cook the rice long enough, the center of the rice grain doesn't soften.

Nutritional Value

While this is a dessert, it does offer some nutritional benefits, such as protein and 15 percent of the daily recommendation for bone-building calcium per cup. When you're feeling nauseated, it can be one of the best things to help soothe the stomach.

Evaporated milk will add richness and creaminess to the pudding. It has about the same consistency as cream. It is not sweet, so granulated sugar must be used. The pudding will thicken as the evaporated milk cools.

A creamy rice pudding should not be runny, but not too solid. This is why I use evaporated milk. I find sweetened condensed milk is much too sweet and too thick for my preference. Plus, evaporated milk is less expensive than either condensed milk or cream.





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
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Building dues are being collected so we can have more fun in 2024

By the way, if you like Mexican dominoes, Camille is an expert.


