




Get your grilling mitts ready for summer!

AAA Driving Course



Annual Meeting Recap

OTOW reviews plans for pavilion project - you



Reality Check: 2018 is shaping up to be a year in which your Association will be undertaking several ambitious projects related to enhancing your recreational amenities.

EAC Pavilion Project

I discussed this briefly last month, so now it seems we are finally complete in our permitting.

First order of business is to remove the fencing around the tennis courts and all vertical structures on the site. Then install construction fencing and secure the entire work area.

The staging and lay down area will consume at least one lane of parking at the East Activity Center. We apologize in advance for any inconvenience this may

Demolition of the existing tennis and shuffleboard courts will happen fairly quickly, so underground drainage can be placed and all electrical conduit run.

Vertical work will begin soon after on the new tennis and shuffleboard courts, horseshoe pits, pavilions with grilling area, and pond overlook.

Annual Meeting recap

Unemployment in Pinellas County is 3.1 percent, that and affordable housing is in very short supply.

The net effect is that your Management Company is paying a premium for staffing. We see no end in sight for this trend. On the one hand, this is what many people have worked to achieve. On the other hand, be careful what you ask for.

Other challenges your Association must deal with are increasing property insurance costs into the 10 percent range. These higher operational costs all filter through the budget.

The insurance industry experienced \$25 billion in hurricane related losses this year. Compare that to \$5 billion in losses due to Hurricane Katrina.

The other insurance expense of note is higher worker compensation rates in the range of 15-18 percent. We have not received the final quotation, but believe it will be consistent with that.

When it comes to health insurance, that is anyone's guess right now.

We will be finalizing the Association budget in May and distributing it to residents. The budget meeting will be in June 2018



At the Annual Meeting in December, Chairman Kenneth Colen updated residents on community improvement projects, including work along Belcher Road, road signs and surveillance cameras at each gate.

Between now and then, we hope to be able to refine cost even more

Personal Insurance on Your Condo and Contents

Fire events or water damage are cautionary reminders for, each resident to check in with your insurance agent and make sure the insurance coverage on your unit and contents is adequate.

If you feel "lucky" and go without insurance, or believe you can self-insure any loss, please reconsider. The cost of repair or reconstruction, as well as loss of use (being homeless pending restoration), may well exceed the value of your condominium many times over.

It is the obligation of every owner to insure the contents of their unit, including loss of use coverage. Loss of use coverage will allow your carrier to provide you living and lodging expenses should you become displaced. Displacement after a fire may be between six and 18 months!

This is a good point to segue into the limits of coverage that individual unit owners may wish to have. Contents coverage may vary greatly depending on what you own. As a basic point though, you need adequate limits to cover furnishings, personal items, floor coverings, appliances and cabinetry.

All carriers write an HO6 rider that provides for loss assessment coverage in the event of a special assessment from the Association to cover unforeseen shortfalls or losses.

In the On Top of the World Condominium Association, buildings are insured under a master policy in the name of the Association. The deductible is \$10,000 for any casualty event per occurrence, including wind/hail related damage. Named storm events carry a separate deductible of 5 percent of the total value at the time of loss, at each location involved in the loss, subject to a minimum (community wide) deductible of \$250,000 for any one

With respect to flood (rising water), earthquake and flood, resulting from a named storm, all loss, damage, and/or expense arising out of any one occurrence shall be adjusted as one loss, and from an amount of each such adjusted loss there is a \$100,000 deductible.

Besides casualty insurance, other steps to protecting your home are testing your smoke detector regularly and having an operable BC fire extinguisher at easy reach. Read the extinguisher operating instructions when you first purchase the unit and at least twice a year thereafter is also recommended.

In this recent event, having and us-

ing an operable fire extinguisher may have greatly limited the damage.

The Community Service Office has handled numerous major leaks from improperly maintained water heaters. The replacement and maintenance of water heaters is the responsibility of the unit owner. In all cases, the owner found out how important having insurance is when faced with paying for the extensive damage to their unit, the adjoining units and the Association property between the units. The Association will seek reimbursement from the unit owner for its repair work in every instance.

Upcoming Projects Painting/Waterproofing

January will see a painting contractor continue with rear waterproof coating applications throughout the east side of property.

The next buildings slated for this scope of work are 46, 47, 25, 10 and 9.

The process includes a thorough pressure washing, followed by a the sealing of any hairline cracks in the masonry, and then the application of a high quality waterproofing membrane.

As always, please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating in close proximity to parking areas and front/rear porches which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or property. Thank you for your cooperation in advance and keep in mind that inclement weather can affect start and completion dates.

Construction, Roofing and large scope projects

The new walkway light fixture project is continuing across property with buildings 61, 60, 44, 43, 41 and 40 scheduled for January.

These improvements require that work crews perform the work in close proximity to condo unit entrances, so please be mindful and exercise caution in and around these areas. As always, we appreciate your cooperation.

Building 54 will be the next structure to have its walkway and stairwell railings improved with the work kicking off in mid-January, pending Pinellas County permitting. As with other railing projects, a licensed contractor will affect the complete removal and replacement of the aluminum components in the second and third floor balcony walkways and center core and end stairwells. The improvements are estimated to be complete in 5-7 weeks from the start of the project.

Notices will be posted in advance of the start date so residents should keep an eye on their bulletin boards for updates. As with all other improvements, please exercise caution in the areas where this work is taking place.

The new year traditionally marks the start of roofing improvements as the weather is usually favorable for these types of projects.

should be reviewing your insurance coverage

Building 49 is slated as the starting point for this year's improvements and residents will begin seeing materials and equipment delivered for the job around the first two weeks of January.

This will require the staged closure of the building's two parking lots, either partially or in their entirety, to allow for the safe and efficient operation by the contractor. Bulletins will be posted in the building advising of the contractor's activities during the projects duration. As always, please observe all cordoned off areas in the interests of safety.

Reoccurring reminders for all community residents

Building walkway repairs will continue as construction crews perform maintenance to the second and third floor walking surfaces.

Many buildings will see these restoration crews as the management company focuses its efforts on these types of repairs. This work requires the use of specialized power tools and may cause a temporary inconvenience in the form of noise and dust. Repair crews will do their best to limit the inconvenience during this necessary work.

These small repair areas will also be coated as a future preventative. As always, we ask that residents please limit any foot traffic in and around any work area they may encounter.

Walkway coating improvements will continue across property. These improvements involve preparation of the surface (and occasionally sub-surface) concrete, the addition of acrylic fortified materials to stairwell surfaces, and then the application of a quality slip-resistant barrier coating. The end result is intended to provide longevity to the balcony walking surfaces as well as returning the look to its original conveyed color scheme.

The management company will post notices on affected buildings' bulletin boards concerning the dates crews are expected to commence the work. Please be aware of Caution and Wet Paint signs in and around these work areas.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle.

This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hangar brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future.

The management company would

like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the community service office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard.

Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt, water softeners are permissible in the community. Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the management company. Thanks for your advance cooperation.

Inspection services representatives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproofing coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you were not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit by the coatings vendor. We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a success across the community.

Many first floor unit owners will be receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department over the coming months as the management company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike.

To keep all residents in the community aware of this compliance issue, the notice will be published in upcoming editions of the OTOW newspaper. The management company asks that if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stone at the earliest convenience.

The Inspection Services Division is continuing to find many awnings with compromised connection points to the common element. In response, they have been reaching out to affected unit owners to have the awnings removed and limit any further damage to the community.

As noted in prior articles, the "clamshell" awnings do not meet building code for wind resistance. Fortunately there are new products that do (see photo on page 6).

If you have an awning, please arrange for its inspection through the Community Service Office at the East Activity Center.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The management company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas.

Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Many times decorative rocks or landscaping are installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you install.


Inspection efforts are focused on the tagging and removal of personal furnishings and belongings placed in outside stairwells of buildings. These obstructions present a fire concern, block egress, or are of a nature that they do not comply with written community standards.

The management company would like to reiterate to residents that barbeque grills be it propane, charcoal, or electric, are not permitted on any balcony areas, as they pose a fire risk to the structure and residents.

Clutter enforcement has always been one of the most reoccurring compliance issues at On Top Of the World. These efforts make for an overall safer community in which to live.

If you receive notification that an item is out of compliance, please correct the issue immediately. If you have a question and were not able to speak with a compliance representative at the time of the notification, please stop by the Community Service Office and request an appointment. Someone will be glad to contact you.

Please remember that items tagged in common areas may be removed and disposed of without further notice. Please help make your community safer by complying if you receive a violation tag/door hanger. Your continued cooperation is appreciated.

DIRECTIONS






Pool resurfacing project




The third Thursday we do a book share on what we are all reading now. It's a great way to get suggestions and reviews on books to read.




"Some reporters are still confused

The On Top of the World Computer Club has elected its 2018 officers. Officers are as follows:


Joe Wisinski, president

Scam Alert: I, myself, recently received a text message from someone who did not sign the text nor ever said who he or she was.

When I read the text, it seemed that the person knew me and was "checking in."

Baloney!

This is a classic way for a scammer to get you to respond to the text and then obtain whatever information they can get and use it in some form of identity theft.

For those of you who send and receive text messages (and yeah, I know our grandchildren prefer to communicate that way), the rule should always be that if you either don't know someone or you are not 100 percent sure that you know someone, you should refuse to reply with your own text. It's safer that way.

Scam Alert: The certified copy of deed scam is still around, and as with all scams, there's no indication that it will ever go away.

The scam works like this. Sometime after a deed to property is recorded in the public records, a letter is sent to the person or persons now owning the property.

In one form or another that scam letter says that you need a certified copy of your deed. Some of the letters don't mention a certified copy of a deed. Those scam letters say you need a copy of it.

Keep this in mind: You NEVER need a certified copy of your deed. For that matter, YOU don't even need a copy of it because you will have the original recorded deed. If you want to make a copy of it, just go ahead and do it.

I don't know about other attorneys, but our office never charges someone who calls us, reads the letter and asks us to explain that this is a scam. I will bet you that your attorney won't charge you either.

Q. I've been told by a financial ad-



visor that you, and he specifically mentioned your name, are opposed to annuities because you don't really understand their benefits. A lot of us are interested in a reply from you.

A. I understand annuities quite well, thank you very much.

However, whether I do or do not understand them is beside the point since I am not the one who needs to understand

The person who is going to buy an annuity needs to understand them. The buyer should learn about and understand every single aspect of how an annuity works and this includes (1) what the actual costs are, (2) what the sales commission is, (3) what the charges might be if you need to get your money out of it and have to surrender it, (4) what the penalty period is, and (5) what the mortality charge is.

Then there is (6) if you have your funds in one investment plan in the annuity, what is the charge to move it to any other investment plan (there shouldn't be but there might be).

And (7) if there's what's called a "bonus" then what's the charge for the bonus and (8) if the annuity allows you to surrender the policy without a penalty because you are going into a nursing home, then what's the cost of that?

If you are going to exchange one annuity for a different one because you've been told it has better "bells and whistles" then what is the new surrender penalty for the new annuity?

I could go on and on and on but perhaps you get my point already.

Q. I am 95 years old, in good health and I really do have all my marbles.

In the last few years, I've become distanced from my children, for reasons that I think I understand, but maybe I don't.

Whatever the reasons might be, I do not want to leave them anything from my estate. My concern is that if I make a Will and cut them out, they will file a lawsuit and contest what I've done because of my age. I would like your thoughts.

A. Recently, I've been suggesting to clients that if they have any reason to think there could be a Will contest or a Trust contest, they might want to consider having a video made of what they are doing and why they are doing it and what the reasons are for wanting to delete someone as a beneficiary.

Sometimes, I just suggest it only for the time the Will is signed. Other times, I might suggest that there be a video of a meeting with the attorney just to explain what is wanted in the Will and then a second video when the Will is signed.

It might also make sense to have a letter from your physician, in which he or she states that you do have the capacity to make a Will. There are some physicians that do this as a matter of practice. Others charge a modest fee.

Q. I am going on a cruise with someone I met. We will share a room, and to be blunt, it's a same sex arrangement. I worry about what my children might say and whether there's any potential legal issues. I'd like your advice.

A. I think the only persons whose opinion should matter is yours and your friend's. As for my advice: Have a nice time and watch out for the midnight buffet. It's gonna be loaded with calories.



outlet with a great group of people.



Long-time OTOW resident reflects on Sidney Colen's vision to create a beautiful place to live and stay active

Like many of us, Ceil Marchand likes to take a moment to look back on the past as she embraces another new year.

She graciously agreed to take us back through her memories of On Top of the World

It was an interesting journey. Why don't you join us?


Ceil has been a Wisconsinite for most of her life. She left North Dakota at 17 to marry her sweetheart. After they tied the knot, Ceil's brand new hubby, Maurice, left to serve his country in the Korean Conflict. Ceil returned to North Dakota temporarily to finish her nursing degree. Then she and Maurice spent the rest of his days together in Wisconsin and here at OTOW.

Ceil has always loved the natural beauty of the north, but the same cannot be said for its cold winters. That's why she has spent at least part of the last 31 winters right here in this little piece of paradise

When she and Maurice arrived here, Ceil launched herself into the OTOW lifestyle. She joined golf, line dancing, a sewing club, and the "Married Women's Club," an active, social, women's club that included events like art shows and short excursions.

Ceil used her medical training as a volunteer to monitor blood pressure. She served as a building reporter for the Mallorca Building and as a proofreader for the fledgling OTOW leaflet that would grow into the OTOW newspaper you are holding or reading online.

Of all the changes here, Ceil regards our newspaper as the single most important improvement she has witnessed. She credits editor Doug Kates' hard work and community attitude, with the newspaper's popularity and its much improved readability.

took me three minutes to read to one that takes me three days to read," Ceil says with a mischievous smile.

She can still remember the days when building reports came in hand-written or typed. Each of these reports had to be retyped and then pasted onto contact sheets by hand before they could be sent out for printing.

She spent many long hours proof-reading – a job that Doug is always grateful to have help with, especially now.

Ceil is quick to point out that volunteers, both past and present, are the back-

bone of the interesting and diverse activities we enjoy here at OTOW.

Our trip down memory lane included some interesting memories about the farmhouse on the west side of Belcher Road that was nestled in the orange groves, and the East Activity Center Veranda Room, which used to be an open veranda, complete with its ornate wrought iron columns and railings.

In those days, east side construction was ongoing to the north of the 18 hole golf course, the west side was still just a plan and Paradise existed only in Sidney Colen's imagination.

Without a doubt, Ceil's fondest memory is that of Sidney Colen.

"Now there was a man who cared about people," she states emphatically. "He made this place our home. He made this place his own home, and he and his wife attended many functions. He was a wonderful, unpretentious man who you could really talk to."

She remembers a time when the community held a party in Sidney's honor and there wasn't a spare seat in the house. Clearly this man's caring nature made an impression.

Ceil grows a little reticent as she recalls earlier days when beautiful works of building art still adorned the walls of the East Activity Center auditorium.

"I guess that's what they call progress." she says with a strained smile.

One last memory brings a twinkle back to Ceil's eyes.

When they decided to buy in OTOW and winter here, their son, Gregory, then in his late 20s, asked, "You bought where? In that old folks home?"

Now that he is 60 plus, you'll never guess where Gregory regularly comes to visit his mom and make some of his own memories.





OTOW Wants You To Know

Never Plug A Space Heater Into a Power Strip

This time of year, you've gotta do some work to keep your home and office warm and cozy. Christmas lights, decorations, putting an extra throw blanket on the couch ... and, of course, a space heater.

But with all those decorations, plugs are at a premium. "No problem," you think, "I've got a power strip."

Well let me say: "Nooooooooooo!"

As the cold weather approaches, people may tend to utilize portable electric heaters. While they can be an efficient way to warm a work space or a room in a house, portable electric heaters can also be a fire or electric shock hazard if not used properly.

If you follow these rules, compiled from the Atlantic County Office of Fire Safety and other colleges nationwide, they will help you in using your portable heater safely.

- Portable electric heaters shall be listed and approved by Underwriter's Laboratories, Inc. (UL) or Factory Mutual (FM). These heaters are tested to meet specific safety standards, and manufacturers are required to provide important use and care information to the consumer.
- Unlisted heaters are not permitted as consumers have less assurance that safety features and operating instructions are adequate.
- Portable electric heaters should be the fail-safe types, which are equipped with an automatic tip-over safety shut-off switch.
- Older style heaters with exposed glowing red radiant wires are not permitted.
- Plug portable heaters directly into a wall outlet. Do not plug a space heater into a surge protector, multi-outlet box or extension cord! The high current flow can cause components to deteriorate, leading to a breakdown of solder joints eventual failure of the multi-box outlet, and excessive heating that can cause fire.

- Portable electric heaters should be placed at least 3 feet (1 meter) away from paper, garbage and recycling containers, furniture, clothing, or anything else that can burn. Please pay particular attention to the clearances as recommended by the manufacturer.
- Never leave your electric heater running when you leave the room. To prevent electrical shocks and electrocutions, always keep portable electric heaters away from water. And never touch an electric heater if you are wet.
- Do not use an electric heater to dry clothing such as gloves, scarves, hats or jackets as these materials may catch on fire when placed over a heater.
- Do not extend the electric cord of the heater through wall openings, under doors or floor coverings. Arrange the cord away from traffic areas where it will not be tripped over or otherwise subject to damage.
- Do not operate an electric heater with a damaged cord or plug. Inspect the power cord regularly.
- Unplug the heater by pulling the plug straight from the outlet. Check periodically for a secure plug/outlet fit. If the plug does not fit snugly into the outlet or if the plug becomes very hot, the outlet may need to be replaced.
- Do not plug any other electrical device into the same outlet as your heater. This could result in overheating.

So there you have it! Please follow these simple safety tips for your space heater and we will all be safe and warm!



Valencia Building meeting to convene Jan. 30


Valencia building is more than a building — it is our neighborhood. This is never more evident than during the month of December.


Wow — it sure has been busy at Swedish Traditional the last couple of months! Time flies while having fun.


