Live entertainment and club tables will return to auditorium in January

It's been a while since live music took place in the East Activity Center auditorium.

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Hydro-Jetting Project begins in January

If you live in buildings 1-15, you should have received notice from your Management Company regarding the up and coming sewer hydro-jetting project.

As a reminder, this was discussed during the June 11, 2021, General Meeting.

This hydro-jetting project is undertaken as a preventative maintenance measure. In January 2022, contracted work will begin an extensive project of hydro-jetting kitchen and bathroom sanitary drain lines and replacing common sanitary cleanouts.

Currently this project will commence with phase one (1) on or around January 10, 2022, with an anticipated completion date of no later than June 30, 2022.

In order to complete this project on time, the target goal is to complete four (4) first floor units and two (2) clean outs per day.

The project will begin with building one (1) and proceed in building numerical order until completion at building 15.

Access to your unit must be provided for approximately two to three hours with additional access provided at a later date should a follow-up be required.

The impacted units will be contained to first floor units exclusively and any necessary follow-up appointments will be scheduled by the Management Company.

If your unit will be vacant during this period, it will be necessary for you to appoint a representative to provide entry to your unit during your scheduled time.

In the event you do not have a personal representative, please complete the form attached and return it with your unit key to: On Top of the World Condominium Association, Hydro Jetting Project, 2069 World Parkway Blvd E, Clearwater, FL, 33763. Keys will be returned to you once the project has been completed.

A tentative schedule has been estab-



lished for this project, however, it is dependent upon ease of access into units and will be weather dependent. Should weather or other delays occur, notices will be sent out via an OTOW Alert. Be sure you are signed up to receive alerts prior to project commencement.

Additionally, notices will be posted in each building up to two weeks prior to the scheduled start date.

If you have not yet provided keys or contact information for a key holder who will be providing access in your absence, please do so prior to the end of December so that this project starts and stays on schedule. Your participation and cooperation is appreciated.

Lawn Bowl Court Closure

Recently, a small depression was found in the East Activity Center lawn bowl court that was quickly cordoned off by facilities management personnel as a safety measure.

Geotechnical engineers were called in to perform an initial site evaluation and provide direction to management personnel. After discussing the situation, it was recommended that a small area within the depression be excavated to determine if an old section of groundwater underdrain is at fault. After this work is completed, the engineers will return to the site to inspect the area, obtain boring samples, and perform penetrometer tests to determine subsurface soil conditions and provide a remediation plan as necessary.

Status updates will be posted on the otowclearwaterinfo.com website and at the Activity Centers. Information will also be posted on OTOW-TV channel 732 and sent via OTOW Alerts.

Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office (CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30, Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted.

If your call goes to voice mail, it is because staff is working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be gener-

ated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter.

The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled. Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received.

From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request.

It is not necessary to report service requests more than one time.

If you have any questions regarding your request, and until the Community Service Office reopens, please call the Service Request Line at 727-683-6981.

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is exclusive to the unit and is the owner's responsibility. The Association's responsibility is to the structure and common elements.

If you are unable to visit the Community Service Office, the OTOW phone number to submit a service request is 727-683-6981.

Please call for general building matters in the common areas only. Please do not leave health-related emergency information on the service request line as this will delay the amount of time it takes us to respond to non-emergency service requests.

The OTOW after-hours phone number is 727-799-1115 for matters such as water intrusion into your unit. For all other inquiries regarding general matters or questions that are not service related, you will need to come in person to the Community Service Office.

In the event of a life threatening emergency, please dial 911.

First half of 2022 is packed full of On

I want to thank everyone who voted and participated in the December 2021 annual meeting.

Unfortunately, 20 percent of the membership's vote in the Board election had not arrived by the time the Annual Meeting started. There was not a quorum. The Board believes that many ballots were still in transit in the United States Post Office system.

As a result, no business could be conducted at the Association level.

To ensure that all residents who wished to vote in the election for the Board have the opportunity to do so and have that vote counted, the Chairman adjourned the meeting and the election was rescheduled until Jan. 5, 2022.

To ensure that all residents have the opportunity to cast their vote, electronic voting was reopened until Jan. 3, 2022.

A quorum of the Board was present so the Board was able to conduct its meeting as advertised.

The Chairman thanked all those in attendance, in person or remotely, and wished them all a very happy holiday season, a merry Christmas and a safe, happy safe New Year.



Upcoming Projects Painting/Waterproofing

January will bring the painting contractor to Buildings 5 and 15 to apply rear façade waterproof coatings.

The application process includes a thorough pressure washing, followed by the sealing of any hairline cracks in the masonry, and then the application of a high-quality paint coating.

As always, please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating in close proximity to parking areas and front/rear porches which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or property. Thank you for your cooperation in advance and keep in mind that inclement weather can affect start and completion dates.

Construction, Roofing and Large Scope Projects

Building 83 will be the next structure to have its stairwell railings improved with the work kicking off in the month of January, pending permitting approval from the Pinellas County building department and Clearwater Fire.

As with other stairwell specific railing projects, a licensed contractor will affect the complete removal and replacement of the aluminum components in the second and third floor center core and end stairwells

The improvements are estimated to be complete in 3-4 weeks from the start of the project. Notices will be posted in advance of the start date so residents should keep an eye on their bulletin boards for updates. As with all other improvements, please exercise caution in the areas where this work is taking place.

January and February will also see maintenance crews performing work on the ornamental towers at Building 36. The scope of work involves the removal of masonry elements above the end stairwell towers. This will allow a specialty licensed and insured architectural foam contractor to install lightweight elements in their

place which closely resemble the components which were removed.

Being that this work will be performed from aerial lifts, we are asking all residents to please stay clear of active work zones. This project is anticipated to take 2-3 weeks to compete, once again pending permitting from Pinellas County.

The Management Company maintenance elevator and construction departments will begin their next improvement project in January as well, with Building 89 being on the schedule for elevator equipment upgrades and a total cab remodel beginning on Monday, Jan. 24. The work entails the replacement of the elevator control operating panel and software with a new state of the art unit including new hallway fixtures.

During this upgrade, the construction division will be remodeling the interior of the cab with new wall coverings, handrails, and ceiling components.

Being that both projects are coordinated at the same time, a bevy of activity will be taking place in and around the building's' center core area. While every safeguard is taken during this work, we ask that residents utilize the outside stairwells if at all possible when entering or exiting the building.

Top of the World community projects

At the conclusion of the work, a State of Florida elevator inspector will be called upon to approve the work and allow the Management Company to return the unit back to operation. Thanks for your cooperation while this two-week project is underway.

Recurring Reminders for all Community Residents

Building walkway repairs will continue as construction crews perform maintenance to the second and third floor walking surfaces.

Many buildings will see these restoration crews as the Management Company focuses its efforts on these types of repairs. This work requires the use of specialized power tools and may cause a temporary inconvenience in the form of noise and dust. Repair crews will do their best to limit the inconvenience during this necessary work. These small repair areas will also be coated as a future preventative. As always, we ask that residents please limit any foot traffic in and around any work area they may encounter.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle. This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hangar brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future.

The Management Company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the Community Service Office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard.

Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt, water softeners are permissible in the community. Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the Management Company. Thanks for your advance cooperation.

Although the majority of clamshell awnings have been removed, there are a few holdouts. Usually the awnings develop compromised connection points to the common element. In response, Inspection Services have been reaching out to affected unit owners to have the awnings removed and limit any further damage to the building

As noted in prior articles, the "clamshell" awnings do not meet building code for wind resistance and have been marked for elimination by your Board. For condo owners who refuse to comply, the sale or transfer of that unit will be blocked by the

Association until the awning is removed.

Scam Alert

Avoid Being Taken Advantage of

It seems like a day doesn't go by that I don't get a card in my mailbox to the effect of "Urgent that You Contact Me! I'll buy your home."

My first thought isn't printable. I'd like to believe this sort of scam violates Florida law. The jury is out on that, I suppose.

There's another part of this scam. Perhaps, many of you have seen it. In this one, there's a message on your phone that so and so is in the neighborhood and is looking to buy your home and the condition of it doesn't matter.

If you answer the card, or if you return the phone call, the scammer knows you are interested. You become the "mark" and then they will prey.

So what is going on?

If you received either of these scams, and that's what they are, you have possibly been contacted by someone who either wants personal information and who wants to buy your home cheaply and flip it for a large profit. They make it sound like its quick and easy money by offering cash for a quick sale of your home or condo.

"Cool" you may think, but hold on a minute. A sales price isn't mentioned. How do you know what your home is really worth?

The prospect of easy money, fast and probably without a commission, may be enticing, but how do you know if this is a real deal or just another scam to obtain private and personal information from you—which, by the way, is what it is.

For that matter, how do you know what your home is really worth on a true real estate market?

How would you feel if you left \$20,000 to \$40,000 in real value on the table?

This unfortunately happens often. It is common that homeowners, often seniors, find themselves enticed into selling their homes for below a fair market value. Scammers are not stupid. They know that our seniors have the money and are often easy prev

According to the Florida Attorney General's office, retirement communities are targets for these predatory home-buying practices for many reasons. We may become frail from illness and need to move to a care facility. Maybe you've lost a spouse and can't bear to be in the home you shared together. Maybe medical debt is a burden and you see no other way than get living expenses before going on to lord knows what.

Oftentimes, these "fast money buyers" employ deceptive or high-pressure tactics to cheat an owner out of their home or to obtain personal and private information.

I recently read a story of a woman in a downtown Atlanta neighborhood who refused to sell, despite repeated offers. The aggregator reported her to the city for code violations. Finally, after being dunned by multiple warnings from city code enforcement, and lacking the funding to make the necessary repairs, the woman relented and sold for a below-market price. The home shortly thereafter was sold for multiples of

what she was paid. Flipping is the term for this practice, and this is the goal to begin with: fast money.

It takes some patience and restraint, but your real estate may be your most valuable asset. Know its value.

Of course, the most reliable way to value your home and also to sell it is to work with a reputable real estate brokerage firm and establish an estimate of market value based on recent sales of comparable properties.

This is fast and most brokers will do it as a courtesy.

Of course, you may be asked to sign a listing contract for the sale of your property. But that's fair if you are serious about wanting to sell. And if you are not serious, why would you ever be talking to these scammers.

Finally, a broker moderated sale may take a little longer (not by much in this market!), but you can be comfortable that you are not leaving value on the table.

If you get a mailer, ignore it. If someone leaves a phone message to the effect that he or she is in the neighborhood and wants to buy your home, do not respond. Scammers are all over us these days. Be careful, be alert and don't be afraid to ignore these calls and letters.

Personal Insurance on Your Condo and Contents

Fire events or water damage are cautionary reminders for each resident to check in with their insurance agent and make sure the insurance coverage on their unit and contents is adequate.

If you feel "lucky" and go without insurance, or believe you can self-insure any loss, please reconsider. The cost of repair or reconstruction, as well as loss of use (being homeless pending restoration), may well exceed the value of your condominium many times over. It is the obligation of every owner to insure the contents of their unit, including loss of use coverage. Loss of use coverage will allow your carrier to provide you living and lodging expenses should you become displaced. Displacement after a fire may be between 6 and 18 months!

This is a good point to segue into the limits of coverage that individual unit owners may wish to have.

Contents coverage may vary greatly depending on what you own. As a basic point though, you need adequate limits to cover furnishings, personal items, floor coverings, appliances, and cabinetry. All carriers write an HO6 rider that provides for loss assessment coverage in the event of a special assessment from the Association to cover unforeseen shortfalls or losses.

Please remember, another benefit of an HO6 policy is the personal liability coverage. Should you be the cause of a water leak or a fire event that damages adjoining units, you may be held liable for their damage, as well as any damage to the Association's area of responsibility between units.

The undervaluation of your contents may cause you a significant loss but most likely will not bankrupt you. If you do not have personal liability coverage, you could lose all of your assets if you cause dam-

age to units around you and you are not adequately insured.

In the On Top of the World Condominium Association, buildings are insured under a master policy in the name of the Association. The deductible is \$10,000 for any casualty event per occurrence including wind/hail related damage. Named storm events carry a separate deductible of 5 percent of the total value at the time of loss, at each location involved in the loss, subject to a minimum (community wide) deductible of \$250,000 for any one occurrence. With respect to flood (rising water), earthquake, and flood resulting from a named storm, all loss, damage, and/or expense arising out of any one occurrence shall be adjusted as one loss, and from an amount of each such adjusted loss there is a \$100,000 deductible.

Besides casualty insurance, other steps to protecting your home are testing your smoke detector regularly and having an operable BC fire extinguisher at easy reach. Read the extinguisher operating instructions when you first purchase the unit and at least twice a year thereafter is also recommended.

In a recent event involving a kitchen fire, having and using an operable fire extinguisher may have greatly limited the damage.

The service department has handled numerous major leaks from improperly maintained water heaters. The replacement and maintenance of water heaters is the responsibility of the unit owner. In all cases the owner found out how important having insurance is when faced with paying for the extensive damage to their unit, the adjoining units and the Association property between the units. The Association will seek reimbursement from the unit owner for its repair work in every instance.

Damage to your vehicle while it is parked in the community is not covered by your HO6 policy. State law requires you to maintain a policy on your automobile. The prudent owner will purchase comprehensive or "other than collision" coverage that pays for damage to a vehicle from incidents other than a collision including fire, theft, windstorm, vandalism or flood. It also covers damages caused by falling objects or from hitting an animal.

Feeling Flush? Think First!

The Management Company has recently been called out to deal with a range of plumbing blockages. Upon investigation of the several incidents in December, they found grout, washcloths, small hand towels, adult diapers, cat litter, and "flushable" wipes. Get the point?

The only thing flushable is human waste and toilet paper. Everything else is NOT flushable (even so called "flushable" wipes, which may flush, but don't break down and cause some dandy blockages).

A sewerage back up can cause real problems and damage to ground floor neighbors. Please be responsible and mindful of your first-floor neighbors. Flush only human waste and toilet paper.





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

Certified copies of deeds are free - do not pay for one

Scam Alert

I recently wrote an article for the On Top of the World press in which I discussed a scam where persons who've closed on a new purchase soon receive a letter saying they need to have a certified copy of the deed to their recently closed property.

In many of the letters I've seen that are like this, there is no mention of a certified copy of the deed—just a plain copy.

In one of these letters, the charge was \$89.

That's money you never need to spend because you never need a copy of your deed.


Whv?

Because it's recorded in the public records and you can download it for free.

Of course, if you have a copy that you got from the title company that handled the closing, you can make a copy of it, also for free.

And while I'm at it, let me keep going on scams.

- 1. That cute sounding Susie, who wants to talk to you about your warranty, whatever it is, is trying to scam you. She doesn't know what warranties you have. That's why her phone message doesn't mention it by name. She's a scammer. Hang up or don't answer and don't call back!
- 2. That letter, or other message, from a roofing company with the fabulous testimonials, that just happens to be in the neighborhood and wants to climb up on



your roof for free and give you a free estimate, is probably a scam. Wanna bet that the "free estimate" will inform you of a gazillion things that must be fixed and it won't cost you a bit because you will just be told to sign an assignment of benefits from your insurance company?

Just say no!

- 3. That guy who, without any notice, knocks on your door and says he just "did your neighbors windows" and will give you a free estimate. He probably never met your neighbor. If he or she makes an unsolicited knock on your door with an offer of a free whatever, he/she will be a scammer. Send her or him on their way.
- 4. That letter you received giving you a great opportunity to have some company pay your utility bills for you, is probably a scam. Do not sign that form. Contact your utility company directly and ask them about it. You will find out the company

charges you a fee to use your money to pay your bill. Bummer. Don't respond.

5. That guy with the stern voice who says, "Don't hang up this is not a scam!" is a scammer. Hang up. If he leaves a message and says you are about to go to jail, then check to make sure your wife hasn't already put your clothes on the curb with a note to your jailer where to find you. (Well, my wife said she did think about it.)

Q. I've been widowed for 20 years. I am now age 68. I've been seeing a widower, age 90, but he acts much younger. He's a joy.

Now we turn our attention to the new year. It is that time of year when we pause and give thanks for the liberties and freedoms we still enjoy. We are living in the best country on this planet.


Life isn't easy, but it doesn't get any better anywhere else.

After hours, you can drop off your completed forms and checks in the secure mail slot located at the front of the East Activity Center.

Finally, yet importantly, I want you to know that if I had the time to sit with each of you as you complete your forms, I, happily, would. However, it's simply not possible with the number of duties I must carry out.

Of course, if you have questions that will take more time than an email or phone call, we can certainly schedule a meeting.

Activity Card Renewal

When renewing your activity card, or getting a brand new one issued, please remember to bring with you a government-issued photo ID, such as a driver's license or passport, and a current piece of mail indicating your name and On Top of the World property address.

Activity Cards will not be punched or processed without proper identification and address verification.

In addition, for renewal, you will need \$3 and your expiring/expired card. If you do not have your card, you will need to bring \$25 for purchasing and processing of a new card.

As a reminder, you must bring your valid activity card with you when using SCA facilities and be prepared to show it upon staff request. Any noncompliance matters will be directed to the On Top of the World Association.

The Byrnes Brothers will bring lively music and dance from Ireland to the EAC


on Feb. 24 at 7 p.m. Tickets are \$15 for members and \$17 for nonmembers.

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


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Jesters tickets go on sale in auditorium starting Jan. 13

One review about Carole King's music stated she presented "a joyous celebration that cleverly threads together a memorable catalog of early rock hits such as "Take Good Care of My Baby."





Laurie is looking for people to assist him with the Golf Fun Day event as is





On Saturday, March 5, our club will be marching in the Irish Club parade. Organizers are planning a float and a couple of convertibles, so plan on participating.


If you are watching the parade from World Parkway Boulevard, you will be sure to see our group.



As early as late November, passersby could see Santa hats, Christmas baking and general merriment on display at the structure.


But it wasn't until Dec. 10 that the place really turned up the heat. That's when Lambda had it's annual Christmas party and gift exchange.



Neighborhood Watch does not patrol but can educate

A friend asked me recently if Neighborhood Watch did patrols.

He had seen a car cruising slowly along the street one night and thought it looked suspicious.

I told him that it was most likely someone looking for a building address and was having trouble finding it, but no, we don't do watch patrols here.

In chartering our group with the Sheriff's office, we were explicitly told that they did not want us to do patrols. Police work can be dangerous.

We have all probably heard stories about older folks fighting off would be muggers. But the more likely outcome is a badly injured senior citizen.

Instead, the Sheriff's office told us that we should educate our residents here about getting good descriptions of suspicious characters and reporting it to them.

The non-emergency Sheriff's number is 727-582-6200. They are best equipped to deal with these situations.

Some other recommendations that were made by the Sheriff's office were:

- Have deadbolts installed on your doors

- Have a peephole installed in your

- Don't leave your windows open at
 - Have a camera doorbell installed



Recently, a small depression was found in the East Activity Center lawn bowl court.

That area was quickly cordoned off by facilities management personnel as a safety measure.

Geotechnical engineers were called in to perform an initial site evaluation and provide direction to management company personnel. After discussing the situation, it was recommended that a small area within the depression be excavated to determine if an old section of groundwater underdrain is at fault. After this work is completed, the engineers will return to the site to inspect the area, obtain boring samples, and perform penetrometer tests to determine subsurface soil conditions and provide a remediation plan as necessary.



Key West food and bar hopping



My wife, Cheryl, and I have been to Key West many times. If you have not driven to Key West, I would recommend you do it at least one time. The drive on US1 through the Keys is beautiful.

We have eaten in many restaurants during our visits.

The Cuban Queen has the best Cuban sandwiches I have ever had.

For breakfast we like Pete's and Blue Heaven.

At Blue Heaven, you sit on the patio behind the restaurant and watch the chickens run around, and of course, you have to try the mile high Meringue Key Lime Pie.

For dinner we enjoy The Grand and Martin's.

Also, we have taken sunset dinner cruises. Bar hopping is like New Orleans. There are tons of bars, but only a few stand out. They are Hog's Breath, Sloppy Joe's and Captain Tony's just to name a few.

Now about the food.

Key West seafood is inspired from fresh catches along its own sparkling waters. This includes shrimp (called Key West Gold), snapper, yellowtail, grouper and conch.

Most of the cooking influences come from the Southern U.S. and the Caribbean.

Here are a few Key West recipes I think you will enjoy and they are easy to prepare.



Seared Grouper with Peasant Meat Juices

Snapper Meuniere

Ingredients

Four 6-ounce snapper fillets
Old Bay Seasoning
2 tablespoons olive oil
1 cup all-purpose flour
1 stick cubed unsalted butter, softened
1 tablespoon minced shallots
2 tablespoons white wine
1/4 cup lemon juice
2 tbsp chopped fresh parsley leaves
Freshly ground pepper

Directions

1. For the snapper meuniere: Preheat the oven to 200 degrees F.

2. Lightly season the snapper fillets with the Old Bay Seasoning. Lightly dredge the seasoned snapper in the flour, shaking off any excess. Set a 10-inch saute pan over medium-high heat and add the olive oil to the pan. Once the oil is hot, place the snapper fillets to the pan, 2 at a time, and cook for 2 1/2 to 3 minutes per side. Place the cooked snapper on an oven-proof platter and place in the oven while you cook the remaining fillets.

3. Once the snappper is cooked, return the skillet to the stovetop and set on medium heat. Add the butter to the pan and once melted, add the shallots. As the shallots cook and the butter stops foaming, after about 30 seconds, add the white wine, lemon juice and parsley to the pan. Continue to cook for 15 to 20 seconds, swirling the pan occasionally. Remove the snapper from the oven and pour the sauce over top of the fish. Serve immediately.

Shrimp Scampi with Cherry Tomatoes

Ingredients

3 1/2 tablespoons kosher salt
1 pound spaghetti or fettuccine
3 tablespoons olive oil
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 pound cherry tomatoes sliced
1 tablespoon paprika
1 teaspoon chili flakes
1 cup white wine
1 cup heavy cream
1 pound large shrimp, peeled and deveined
1/4 cup chopped fresh chives
3 tablespoons fresh parsley leaves, chopped
2 shallots, minced

Directions

1. Fill a pot with water over high heat. Add 3 tablespoons of salt and bring to a boil. Add the pasta, and gently stir using tongs to make sure the pasta doesn't stick to itself. Cook the pasta till al dente, drain & set aside.

2. In a skillet set over medium heat, add the oil. When hot, add the garlic, tomatoes and the 1/2 tablespoon salt, Sauté until the shallots are translucent, 2 to 3 minutes. Stir in the paprika and chile flakes, and sauté for 1 to 2 minutes. Pour in the white wine, scraping up any bits on the bottom of the skillet. Bring to a simmer. Add the cream and return to a simmer for 1 minute. Add the shrimp and cover with the sauce. Cook, stirring to make sure the shrimp cooks through, 3 to 5 minutes. Add the chives and parsley, and toss to mix. Serve the shrimp and sauce over the pasta.

Seared Grouper with Peasant Meat Juices

Ingredients 4 (6 ounce) grouper fillets

Creole seasoning

4 tablespoons olive oil

1 medium eggplant, peeled and diced

1 cup chopped yellow onion

Freshly ground black pepper

1/4 pound Kalamata olives, halved

1 tablespoon chopped garlic

1/2 cup milk

salt

3 tablespoons chopped green onions, green parts only

1 tbsp finely chopped fresh basil leaves 1/2 teasoon chopped fresh thyme leaves

2 cups chicken stock Celery Root Mashed Potatoes

1 pound celery root, peeled and cubed

3/4 pound Idaho potatoes

peeled and cubed

Freshly ground pepper

3 tablespoons butter

3 tablespoons butter

1/2 cup peeled, seeded and chopped fresh Italian tomatoes

Directions

1. Season both sides of the grouper with Creole seasoning. Heat a large non-stick saute pan, over medium heat, add 2 tablespoons of oil. Sear the grouper for 2 to 3 minutes on each side. Remove from the pan and set aside. Add the eggplant and onions to the pan. Season with salt and pepper. Saute for 3 to 4 minutes. Add the tomatoes, olives, green onions, and herbs. Season with salt and pepper. Saute for 2 minutes. Add the reduction and bring to a boil. Simmer for 2 minutes. Return the grouper to the pan. Cook for another 2 minutes, basting the fillets with the sauce.

2. Put the celery root and potatoes in a large saucepan and cover with salted water. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to medium and cook until tender about 15 to 20 minutes. Drain, then return the potatoes, celery root to the pot. Add butter and stir and mash until it melts completely. Add the milk and stir to mix.

To serve, lay each fillet on top of a mound of potatoes in the center of the plate and spoon the sauce around the grouper. Garnish with parsley.



Ingredients

Savory French Crêpes with Ratatouille filling

Crêpe

2 large eggs

3/4 cup milk

1/2 cup water 1 cup flour

3 tablespoons butter (melted and browned)

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon dried oregano

Yields: 12 crepes = 4 servings

Ratatouille filling

6 cups (1 pound) eggplant, 1/2 inch pieces

½ cup mushrooms

½ teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon lemon-pepper seasoning

½ cup cherry tomatoes, sliced lengthwise in quarters

1/4 cup red onion, diced

½ cup yellow pepper, diced

2 tablespoons black olives, chopped

Yields: 2½ cups for 12 crepes

The Science

Refrigerating batter allows bubbles to subside so crepes will be less likely to tear during cooking.

Also, this rest period permits its protein to relax and the starch to expand, creating a velvety texture. (iii)

Crepes are similar to thin pancakes. The main difference is that pancake batter has baking powder. Without baking powder, a crepe does not rise (as pancakes do) and its edges become crispy while the center remains soft.


It is perfectly acceptable for a crepe to have irregular edges.

Browning the butter adds a nutty richness to the crepe. It's a very French touch.

Crepes are a wrap with a bad rap — many people have the impression that crepes, being a French creation, are difficult to make. Truth is, crepes are easy. They make a fancy entree at a New Year's brunch.

Crepes are either sweet or savory. This column will, of course, focus on savory crepes since sweet crepes are a high-caloric sugary overload. Savory crepes are healthy and are becoming immensely popular with healthy fast-food restaurants. (i)

Savory is a flavor difficult to describe. It's definitely not sweet or sour. Steak, mushrooms and roasted vegetables are savory.

that result in taste receptors dancing in your mouth. Here are some classic suggestions for savory crepes fill-

Savory foods are often rich and dark and have a flavor

Here are some classic suggestions for savory crepes fillings:

- · Ham, gruyere cheese, roasted tomatoes.
- · Mushrooms, spinach, shredded mozzarella, hollandaise sauce.
 - · Smoked salmon, dill cream cheese.
 - · Eggs, bacon, chives.
 - · Chicken, pesto, provolone cheese.

Instructions

- 1. Blend crepe ingredients for 10 seconds. Refrigerate batter one hour.
- 2. Meanwhile, sauté eggplant and mushrooms. Mash eggplant with a fork. Stir in remaining ingredients. Remove from heat.
- 3. Have all utensils, equipment and plates arranged on counter before starting to cook crepes. The process goes quickly, so pay attention to avoid overcooking,
 - 4. Heat a 10-inch nonstick pan over medium heat and coat with butter. Heat until butter sizzles.
- 5. Pour a scant ½ cup of batter in circles around the center of pan. Swirl pan to spread batter into roughly an 8-inch circle. Swirling is important to get a thin crepe.
- 6. Cook 45 seconds until edges begin to brown. Gently flip, using a thin spatula. Cook for 30 seconds, then move it to a large platter.
 - 7. Cover platter with towel, until all are ready to be served.
 - 8. Repeat until all batter is used.
 - 9. Add generous tablespoon of filling to lower portion of crepe. Then fold crepe in half.

Batter will keep for up to 48 hours refrigerated so you can pre-make the batter a day before a busy New Year's Brunch. You could even make the crepes several hours prior to brunch. Store them up in a single layer in a reusable plastic bag (no refrigeration needed.)

Don't worry if your first crepe fails. That is common. Just keep going and the next ones will be great.

Health Value

Compared to pancakes, crepes contain fewer calories because they are quite thin.

Gluten-free crepes can be made using chickpea flour instead of wheat flour. Chickpea flour boosts protein, plus is high in iron and fiber, but is low in carbohydrates. Bob's Red Mill makes a chickpea flour.

Use a nonstick pan to avoid oiling pan between each crepe. The French famously use fat-rich ingredients. Recent studies have found whole-fat dairy is not bad for heart disease, especially for those later in life. Avoiding butter and cheese is less important than once believed. (ii) However, my dear chefs, we want to minimize fat intake due its high caloric level.

Adventures in Hawaii awaited OTOW resident, sister

"Hawaii is paradise born of fire." So wrote Rand McNally, American map publisher.

From the moment I made a spontaneous decision to go to Hawaii for the first time with my sister, Debbie Gagnon Rivera, we began to plan, yet nothing could have prepared me for the breathtaking beauty that awaited us. Debbie has been to Hawaii several times and she was excited to experience it again.

We were greeted at the airport with Aloha hugs and Pikake (Arabian Jasmine) leis from my niece, who lives on Oahu.

For almost three weeks Debbie and I explored popular tourist sites and places considered off the beaten path.

A personal goal for me was to be able to make the steep climb at Makapu'u Point Lighthouse trail within the Kaiwi State Scenic Shoreline, at the southeastern point of Oahu. This lighthouse, which was built in 1909, has the largest lens of any lighthouse in the United States. The elevation of the lighthouse stands at 637 feet above sea level. The winding and steep path can be unforgiving due to the sun and heat, but unforgettable because of its panoramic picturesque views. There are various legends about Makapu'u. Some believe she was a Tahitian goddess that lived in a cave on this volcanic slope.

The many lookouts along the scenic drive were spectacular with tidal pools, Halona Blowhole Lookout, a sandy beach, Koko Crater Botanical Gardens and beautiful colors with clear water.

Between late November and May you can see migrating humpback whales playing in the ocean. We were able to see the outlines of other Hawaiian Islands in the distance.

Our reward for making the climb up to Makapu'u Point Lighthouse was the exhilarating feeling of accomplishment and the endless views and a local treat known as malasadas, which is Portugese sweet bread.

On another day, we hiked Manoa Falls Trail. It was muddy and rocky and spectacular. The slope up took us to an 800-foot elevation gain. We were in a rainforest environment with lush and magnificent views at every turn of the winding path. The sounds of birds, including cockatoos and parrots surrounded us as well as the stream flowing beside us. At the top of our assent we were able to view the 150-foot waterfall. Debbie climbed down to the basin for more photos while I stayed at the viewing area above.

The climb back down to the bottom was a challenge because of the mud and rocks. This was much different from the lighthouse hike because of the elevation gain being greater at the falls than the lighthouse, which was a steep paved path. My sister has a Garmin watch that indicated that our climb was equivalent to 28 flights of stairs. Our reward for this amazing hike was açaí bowls served in half of a carved-out pineapple and the unforgettable memories of this experience.

O'ahu is known for its craters and the Ko'olau mountain range which was

our daily view as well as Kane'ohe Bay and Mokoli'i Island, a constant reminder that we were really in paradise. Some of our other adventures include visiting the following places:

Ho'omahalia Botanical Gardens is a 400-acre rainforest environment with many plants from around the world. It was created as flood protection for Kane'ohe.

Kualoa Ranch, a 4,000 acre living ranch was a stunning place where the mountains touched the bay. We did a catamaran tour of Kaneohe Bay and a Jungle Expedition Tour which took us 1,700 feet up to glorious views of the bay and the mountain range.

Another day, we drove to Hale'iwa

on the north shore for more coastline and surf. The Polynesian Cultural Center was a wonderful experience of six island cultures and customs as well as a Hawaiian buffet and show entitled "Ha," which means "Breath of Life." The use of fire and torches took my breath away.

Diamond Head Lighthouse above Waikiki Beach was fun to see and because of the time of year, more surfers were spotted here than on the north shore.


During a stroll around Kilauea, we discovered a chocolate factory that sources its cacao from Hawaii. Because Hawaii is close to the equator, it is the only state to boast of its cacao production. We enjoyed a chocolate-tasting experience.

Our final hike, a day before our return to Florida, was to the point of the western side of O'ahu called Ka'ena Point. This was a much easier hike along the rugged and stark coast, totally exposed to the sun.

I hope I'm lucky enough to return someday. There is so much more to see and experience and know about this paradise island. The "aloha spirit" of family and community is strong.



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
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


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Decorations were brought back to life just in time

Did you know the United States flag should never be flown at night unless it is illuminated?


For years, the Costa Rican Drive side of the Mandarin building has been putting out a small United States flag every morning and taking it in every evening before dark.

The callers had the correct names of the grandchildren, the correct towns and the correct grandparents' phone numbers. However, the phone

call was a scam to try to get the grandparents to fork out large sums of cash. Investigators believe the scammers may have read this newspaper online to gather information.

Since the first such incident, the OTOW News is requesting that building writers no longer list the names and locations of grandchildren in stories. All residents should be aware that this is a common

scam everywhere in Florida and the entire country
— not just here at On Top of the World.

If you get a call claiming that a family member needs money, ask questions and double-check the information.

Try to check on the whereabouts of the child in question yourself. If it sounds suspicious and you think it may be a scam, call the police.



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
