Please review your insurance

The general election is behind us, the celebration parties (if any) are over, and it is back to work, once again.

Insurance on Your Condo and Contents

I am sure residents will get tired of me flogging the need to maintain owner contents insurance through an HO6 policy. The fact of the matter is that fire events or water damage are cautionary reminders for each resident to check in with your insurance agent and make sure the insurance coverage on your unit and contents is adequate.

If you feel "lucky" and go without insurance, or believe you can self-insure any loss, please reconsider. The cost of repair or reconstruction, as well as loss of use (being displaced pending restoration), may well exceed the purchase price of your home many times over.

It is the obligation of every owner to insure the contents of their dwelling, including loss of use coverage.

Also consider, if your unit is point of origin of the casualty, you are personally liable for all damage to the Association's property as well as any damage to other units. You need the general liability coverage provided in an HO6 policy to protect you from losing all of your assets. Loss of use coverage will cover expenses for living and lodging should you become displaced. Displacement after a fire may be 18 months or longer!

This is a good point to segue into the limits of coverage that individual condominium owners may wish to have.

Contents coverage may vary greatly depending on what you own. As a basic point though, you need adequate limits to cover furnishings, personal items, floor coverings, appliances, and cabinetry.

With inflation at a 40-year high, make sure you have the full replacement cost option selected on your contents coverage. All carriers write an HO6 rider that provides for loss assessment coverage in the event of a special assessment from the Association to cover unforeseen shortfalls or losses.

Buildings are insured under a master policy in the name of the Association. The deductible is \$10,000 for any casualty event per occurrence including wind/hail related damage. Named storm events carry a separate deductible of 3 percent of the total value at the time of loss at each location involved in the loss, subject to a minimum (community wide) deductible of \$250,000 for any one occurrence.

With respect to flood (rising water), earthquake and flood resulting from a named storm, all loss, damage, and/

or expense arising out of any one occurrence shall be adjusted as one loss, and from an amount of each such adjusted loss there is a 5 percent of location total insured value subject to a \$250,000 deductible per occurrence.

The problem of the highest insurance rates in the nation was not adequately addressed in the last legislative session. As a result, the markets for insurance have worsened with the insolvency of several insurers and the catastrophic losses from Hurricane Ian. I'm not optimistic the legislature will get much right in this upcoming session.

Besides casualty insurance, other steps to protecting your home are testing your smoke detector regularly and having an operable BC fire extinguisher within easy reach. Read the extinguisher operating instructions when you first purchase the unit and at least twice a year thereafter is also recommended.

Very important that owners rent

Over the past six months, there has been considerable discussion regarding our gate attendants and the level of security they provide.

In my view, when assessing risk, the greater concern is not how we monitor gate access, but rather whom we allow to reside within our community. Our strongest line of protection is not at the gate - it is our adherence to established rental guidelines.

The following question has been heard over and over again within our community:

"Why is it important for me, as an owner, to follow the Association's rules for renting my unit?"

Following the required approval process ensures that all essential steps are completed before a new resident moves into your unit. Conducting background and credit checks is a critical part of this process because it helps safeguard the property, the community and the overall financial stability of the Association.

These checks provide valuable insight into a prospective tenant's reliability, rental history and financial responsibility, reducing the risk of late payments, property damage, or disruptive behavior. By verifying a tenant's qualifications, owners and the Association are better equipped to make responsible decisions that promote a safe and respectful living environment for everyone.

Additionally, all owners agreed to comply with these rules at the time of purchase. In the long run, consistent screening practices protect individual investments while preserving the quality, reputation and long-term value of our entire community.

You might be reading this column and asking: "What should I do if I know someone who is residing in a unit without Association approval?"

Please submit a written notice to the Association that includes both the building number and the full address of the unit in question. You may send this information by email to clearwaterinfo@otowfl.net or deliver a hard copy to the Community Service Office located in the East Activity Center.

Please understand that occupancy concerns often take time to resolve. The Management Company must send up to three notices to the unit owner in an effort to secure compliance. If the matter remains unresolved, it is then forwarded to the Association's legal counsel and any related legal expenses may become the responsibility of the non-compliant owner.

The Association Board of Administration may also consider imposing monthly fines on owners who engage

in unauthorized rental of their units. Unfortunately, these necessary steps can result in extended timelines before a final resolution is reached.

While it may appear that little progress is being made, please be assured that we are actively and diligently working behind the scenes to address occupancy issues as efficiently as possible.

Are there other risks to our community?

Yes.

Our status as a 55-and-over community depends on strict adherence to federal age-occupancy requirements. If residents under the qualifying age are permitted to live here without proper screening and we fall below the mandated 80 percent senior-occupancy threshold, we risk losing our 55+ designation. This would subject us to full Fair Housing regulations and eliminate the protections that allow us to maintain a community designed around the needs and interests of seniors.

For the benefit and well-being of our entire community, it is essential that all residents adhere to the established leasing approval process.

Access Reminders for All Residents

In order to keep our community and facilities safe, secure and enjoyable for everyone, we kindly ask all residents to help us maintain proper access to these areas.

Please do not hold open, prop open, or leave the entrance gate/doors open for anyone who does not have an access card or should not have access to these areas.

While you may think you are being polite or helpful, these areas are designed to be accessible to anyone who has an access card and are authorized to utilize the area. When an area is left open or someone is let in without proper access, it can create safety, liability and security concerns for the facility and the entire community.

All residents are asked to follow the same rules and use their own card for access to these areas. If you do not

have an access card, please visit the Community Service Office located at the East Activity Center to obtain one.

We ask that you always make sure the gates/doors are closed securely behind you. Don't hold open the gate/door for someone who cannot access it themselves.

Encourage your neighbors to bring their access cards each time they visit the pool, learning lab, or fitness center.

If you notice the gate won't latch or stay closed, please report this to management immediately.

We would like to thank everyone in advance for helping us to keep our facilities and community safe and enjoyable for everyone. Remember, your cooperation does make all the difference!

Did You Know

SCA Pool Hours

Pools in Pinellas County are regulated under Florida Administrative Code 64E-9 through the local Health Department.

According to these rules, a pool cannot be open at night.

State regulations define this as 30 minutes before sunset to 30 minutes after sunrise unless certain lighting and safety requirements are met. For night swimming to be permitted, the pool and the deck area must have proper lighting that has been approved by the local building department, certified by a licensed professional and documented on the official health department pool permit as "Night Swimming Approved."

Also, the posted pool rules sign must explicitly note that "Night Swimming" is authorized and it must also include the official pool hours of operation.

While the code does not mandate specific operating times and gives the operator/owner flexibility to set hours, for safety reasons, SCA personnel close the pools, and will continue to do so, from dusk to dawn.

Painting/Waterproofing

Building 88 will see the contractor painting the front façade of this structure in January. We ask that residents in building 88 be mindful and remove any outside holiday decorations by Jan. 6 in preparation of the arrival of the painting contractor. This will avoid delays in the contractor meeting their schedule for the month.

Your assistance is greatly appreciated.

Please also be aware that the painting contractor may require residents to temporarily relocate their personal vehicles or personal items on front/

rear patios in order to reach all areas of the building. All start dates are approximate, and inclement weather can affect scheduling.

A specialty painting contractor will be arriving at Building 22 in January to paint the roofline element that was damaged extensively by Hurricane Milton in 2024. This work will require aerial lifts and is anticipated to take 2-3 weeks to complete. Parking along the front of both sides of the building will be affected during the work and will require that residents relocate their vehicles.

Resident bulletins advising of the work will be posted in the building. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.

Construction, Roofing and Large Scope Projects

The new year traditionally marks the commencement of the community's roofing improvements and 2026 will keep that same pattern.

The residents of Building 75 will be the first to see the roofing contractor arrive with a start date of Jan. 5, pending favorable weather.

As with all roofing system replacement projects, the staged closure of the building's two parking lots, either partially or in their entirety, will be necessary to allow for the safe and efficient operation by the contractor. Bulletins will be posted in the building's lobby area advising of the contractor's activities during the duration of the project along with the dates of when vehicles and equipment will need to be moved.

As always, please observe all cordoned off areas in the interests of safety during this work. Thanks for your help!

Railing replacement projects are another improvement undertaking that the association contracts out to a licensed, insured and qualified vendor. The vendor is currently estimating a start date of Jan. 6 for the project at Building 21.

As with other railing projects, the contractor will affect the complete removal and replacement of the aluminum components on the balcony walkways and in the second and third floor stairwells, after which they will install code-compliant elements in their place to meet life-safety codes. The improvements are estimated to be completed in 3-6 weeks from the start of the project. Notices will be posted in advance of the start date so residents should keep an eye on their bulletin boards for updates. As with all other improvements, please exercise caution in the areas where this work is taking place.

The elevator at the west end of Building 96 will be the next unit undergoing renovation. The scope of work involves replacing operating components to provide for decades of future reliability.

The remodeling of the elevator cab interior is also part of the process which provides new, updated laminate surfaces for residents and visitors to the community.

The entire undertaking should be completed in roughly three weeks' time, barring any unforeseen conditions. Because this building has two elevators, the elevator at the east end of the building will still be available for use. Residents and visitors to Building 96 should be aware of active work zones and exercise caution in and around these areas while the elevator is out of service.

The vendor awarded the contract to restore the World Parkway Boulevard creek is scheduled to be on-property sometime in late January/early February to begin this project. Roadway detours or periodic stoppages in traffic are anticipated as heavy equipment will be needed to execute the work. The ultimate goal is to restore the creek's cross sections and conveyance to historical conditions. Once a start date has been determined, the community will be made aware via the community's RAVE messaging system.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle.

This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hanger brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules,

these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future.

Inspection services representatives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproof coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you are not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit from the coating vendor. We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a success across the community.

First floor unit owners will continue receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department as the Management Company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike.

The Management Company asks if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stones at the earliest convenience.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The Management Company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas. Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the

future. Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Many times, decorative rocks or landscaping is installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you install.

Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office (CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted. If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter. The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled.

Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received. From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request.

It is not necessary to report service requests more than once.

If you have any questions regarding your request, and until the Community Service Office reopens, please call the Service Request Line at 727-683-6981.

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is exclusive to the condo and is the owner's responsibility. The Association's responsibility is to the structure and common elements.

Results of gate survey are in

In November, a community-wide survey was conducted to gather resident input on gate services.

We received 749 completed responses, along with six additional submissions that contained comments but did not select an option. Of the total responses, 289 were paper surveys and 460 were submitted online through the Box Office website.

Here's how residents voted:

Here's How Residents Voted

Option A – No gate attendants

203 responses (27%).

Option B – No gate attendants at entrances, but retain roving patrols from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m.

118 responses (16%).

Option C – Limited gate attendants (Sunset Point & West Belcher 7 p.m.–7 a.m., East Belcher 7 p.m.–11 p.m.):

283 responses (38%).

Option D – 24/7 gate attendants

148 responses (20%).

Association Board

The comments echoed many of the concerns highlighted in the December issue of the On Top of the World newspaper. The most common themes included:

1. Interest in automated or electronic gate systems.
2. Concerns regarding current gate-attendant performance.
3. Desire for greater transparency regarding HOA costs.
4. Support for expanded security camera usage.

As we move into the new year, many residents have asked about costs and options related to gate services. Below is a summary of service levels and their

associated annual costs, as proposed in June, along with the per-condo breakdown for easy comparison. We remain on a month-to-month plan for now.

Cost of Gate and Security Services (April 2025)

- Sunset Point, East Belcher, West Belcher: 7 p.m.–7 a.m., 7 days a week. Annual Cost: \$344,107, Per Condo: \$69.28/year or \$5.77/month.

- Sunset Point & West Belcher: 7 p.m.–7 a.m., 7 days a week, East Belcher: 7 p.m.–11 p.m., 7 days a week. Annual Cost: \$270,161, Per Condo: \$54.39/year or \$4.52/month

- Property-Wide Roaming Patrol (Automobile provided by vendor): 9 p.m.–7 a.m., 7 days a week. Annual Cost: \$169,087, Per Condo: \$34.04/year or \$2.84/month

- 24/7 Coverage at All Three Entrances. Annual Cost: \$602,917. Per Condo: \$121/year or \$10.11/month.

Any decisions moving forward will rest with the newly elected board. Given the timing and the holiday season, significant changes are unlikely before 2026.

The feedback from residents offers valuable direction. The board met with Allied Universal to establish clearer expectations and responsibilities for gate attendants. Currently, attendants are primarily instructed to log vehicles using a mobile system.

Some residents also commented on past identification systems. Years ago, vehicles were issued "On Top of the World" front license plates, making it easier for attendants to quickly distinguish residents from visitors. A modernized alternative, such as windshield stickers, could streamline identification and help reduce misuse of visitor parking spaces.

These are early ideas only. Full discussion, updated pricing, and feasibility reviews will follow under the new board's leadership. Any related budget adjustments would be part of the 2026–2027 financial planning process.

We sincerely appreciate the thoughtful input from everyone who took part in the survey. Your comments and participation continue to guide our efforts to keep the community secure, efficient, and welcoming.

Community elects new board

On Top of the World residents made a statement on Election Day, Dec. 10.

Seven members of the previous Association Board of Directors were elected to return to the board for a two-year term. They were Russell Bolin, Kathleen Cassel, Janet Hooper, Dave Kelly, Diane Like, Lester Meneilly and Dale Prunoske.

Two newcomers also were elected to the board: Stephen Faiella and Lori Kleifgen. This brought the board back to a full nine members heading into 2026.

The fact that the previous seven board members were voted back probably did not come as a surprise to many, but after all nine members were announced, Diane Like nominated

Dave Kelly for chairperson and Dale Prunoske nominated Diane Like for chairperson.

Dave Kelly then received six votes. Diane Like received two votes. Russell Bolin abstained from selecting a chairperson.

Receiving a majority of the board's votes, David Kelly was announced as the new chairperson.

"I just want to take a moment to express, not only on my behalf, but on everyone's behalf, Diane Like's leadership since she took on the role of chair," Dave Kelly said. "Those of you who have been here a while will recognize she took on this role at a time of unsettledness in the community ... certainly a different time. She brought structure

and purpose and clear direction. Thank you for this time of leadership."

Janet Hooper nominated Diane Like for vice chair and the board vote was unanimous.

After the nine board members were seated, public questions were taken.

During the board meeting, Parkway Management Vice President Dessa Barabba gave a community report. She gave urgent information on a big problem in this community.

Recently, Parkway Management had to take costly action as a result of residents pouring grease and "flushable" wipes down drains. And for the record, "flushable" wipes are not flushable.

Dessa said at one building, a pipe blockage affected six units on three

floors. At another part of the community, a sewer blockage of at least 10 feet long affected drainage for five different buildings. Dessa said these blockages can only be resolved by hydro-jetting the lines.

Dessa's message to the community: Please stop pouring grease down your drain and stop flushing "flushable" wipes." Your actions are compromising not only neighboring units, but neighboring buildings.

The next board meeting is tentatively scheduled for 10 a.m., Thursday, Jan. 8, 2026, in the East Activity Center Auditorium. If you cannot make it in person, the meeting will be broadcast live on OTOW-TV channel 901 and on the Box Office (otowboxoffice.com).



PSTA Bus Leaves OTOW

Attention residents who previously rode the PSTA bus in our community.

PSTA bus stops in our community have been removed and replaced with a new rider option: Snapper on Demand.

Snapper is a shuttle bus service to connect residents to regular bus routes operated by PSTA.

Snapper is available Monday through Saturday, 7 a.m. – 6 p.m. You contact Snapper to pick your day and time. Snapper will pick you up anywhere inside the OTOW community and take you to either the Countryside Mall or downtown Clearwater transit center. From either hub, riders can board a regular bus for other destinations.

You can catch the Snapper by

(A) Downloading the Snapper app and booking a reservation in the app.

(B) Calling PSTA and reserving a ride.

(C) Standing at the Countryside Mall hub or downtown Clearwater hub and getting on the bus and telling the driver where you want to go at OTOW.

What is Snapper on Demand? Snapper is an on-demand transportation op-



tion serving Safety Harbor and parts of Clearwater. The service is designed to help you connect to PSTA bus service either as the first leg of your trip or the final leg of your trip between PSTA transfer centers.

Will I be sharing a ride?

Possibly, yes. Snapper operates smaller buses that seat multiple riders, so your ride may be grouped with other passengers headed to the same destination or somewhere nearby.

How much does it cost?

Snapper follows the same fare structure as PSTA buses. Most riders will pay \$2.25. Seniors, disabled passengers and students with proper ID will pay \$1.10.

How do I book Snapper? What info do I need to provide?

The easiest way to book a Snapper ride is by registering an account at Grouper.psta.net or by downloading the Grouper app from the Apple Store or Google Play Store.

Once registered, you will only need to provide a mobile phone number, first name and last name to sign up. You will need to provide your pick-up and drop off location to request a ride.

Credit card information is not required, but you may optionally enter a credit card if you want to pre-pay for your ride.

Alternatively, you may call 727-540-1900 to request a ride over the phone with one of the customer service agents.

Can I use my UPASS ID, Veteran's Pass, TD Pass or Flamingo Care Card/App to Ride Snapper?

Yes!

All Snapper vehicles are equipped with the same Flamingo fare card readers as PSTA buses. When booking a Snapper, select "Cash" and present the driver with your UPASS ID or tap your Flamingo card when boarding.

Can I travel between two locations in the Clearwater and Safety Harbor zones?

No. Travel is only permitted between a zone and a transfer location. When riding from Clearwater, you can request a ride to Park Street terminal or Countryside Mall.

Where is the pick-up/drop off location at the Countryside Mall?

You can request a Snapper pick up

drop off to any location within the mall.

Guidelines for Riding the Shuttle Bus

1. You MUST have a valid Activity Card and present it to the driver upon entering the bus. The SCA bus service is exclusive for use by Association-approved residents and tenants only. If you do not have a valid Activity Card, you may not ride the shuttle bus.
2. Reservations are REQUIRED - please call 727-799-3417 Option 7 no later than 10 a.m. the day prior to your planned trip. Monday's trip deadline is 10 a.m. Friday. Please be present in the care of your building at your scheduled picking time.
3. Shopping time is one hour for grocery stores and one hour for Walmart. Shopping time begins when you are dropped off at your destination.
4. Although appreciated, the driver is prohibited from accepting gifts and tips.
5. The driver may not assist you with entering or exiting the bus, or with your packages. Please do not ask the driver to do so.
6. The start time listed is when the shuttle bus departs the Community Service Office. The pick-up schedule will rotate weekly between low and high buildings, including one week pick-up will start with lower-numbered buildings and the following week it will start with the higher-numbered buildings.
7. Seats are not assigned. They are first-come, first-served.
8. Seatbelts must be fastened during bus movement and must remain fastened until the bus comes to a complete stop.
9. Eating, drinking, smoking, vaping, fighting, distracting the driver, or any other unacceptable actions at the discretion of the driver are strictly prohibited on the bus. Violation of the above guidelines may result in your bus privileges being revoked.
10. All route changes are at the discretion of management.

Driving 20 not only prevents accidents, but reduces the chances of a severe accident

Did you know that the speed limit (that means maximum speed limit) is 20 miles per hour on all On Top of the World-Clearwater streets?

People have told me it's hard to drive 20. OK. You can try to get away with 25, but it's illegal and over the speed limit.

You can also go 45 or 50, but you would be the reason I am writing this story!

What's your rush?

Please keep in mind that you might save five minutes when driving 45-50 versus 20, but is that five minutes worth the chance that you might not see something you need to avoid hitting?

Why is the speed limit so low in our community? Why 20?

First, On Top of the World commis-

sioned a traffic study and the 20 mile per hour speed limit came as a recommendation.

The world wide web states, studies show that by driving 20 miles per hour

you reduce the chances of having a collision because you have more reaction time. Even if there is a collision, if both vehicles are going 20, the impact won't be severe. If two vehicles collide going 40-50, there will be problems.

We have congested roads. We have an influx of pedestrians and cyclists on our roads. Please don't make them your Florida memory.

We have numerous visitors who don't know where they are driving to and others who are looking for specific streets and buildings.

We have people in walking lanes who don't dress appropriately and can blend in with the environment.

We have walkers and bike riders who dart into traffic or make unadvised turns because they think they can get away with it on community roads.

If a motorist is going 20 and a walker crosses in front, chances are good of avoiding a serious injury. If that same walker makes a bad decision, and crosses in front of a vehicle going 45, the outcome is not going to be a good one.

Another reason to drive 20. Noise. We've all heard vehicles whiz by on Sunset Point Road or Belcher Road going 50, 60 or 70 miles per hour. Speed creates noise.

Going 20 keeps our community peaceful and helps the environment. You also will save on gas.

Do the speed limit. Make an effort to keep everyone around for a Happy New Year this year and next year!

55-and-over communities were legally created to provide communities with peace and quiet

I want to take a moment to discuss "over-55 communities" and how they apply to condominium and homeowner associations regardless of where they exist in the United States.

First, the concept of an "over-55 community" stems from Federal legislation, "Housing for Older Persons Act of 1995 (HOPA)."

Before that Act was passed, condominium and HOA Associations could exclude occupancy of its units to persons below a certain age, usually to prevent young families with young children, or minors or other folks perhaps too young (or pregnant) to reside in the community. This created a housing crisis for young families.

So, the United States Congress stepped in and passed the legislation.


There are other types of older persons housing, but I am only going to discuss "over-55" communities.

Basically, in that type of community, the HOPA provides that in order to maintain the over 55 status, at least 80 percent of the units must be occupied by at least one person who is 55 years of age or older. Notice that I've emphasized "occupied," not owned.

If the over-55 status is lost, then Federal Law prohibits any kind of discrimination in housing.

So, keeping that status is critical for communities where older persons want to reside in an adult environment.

What does this all mean for folks who live in and who occupy a residence in either of the On Top of the World communities in Ocala or in Clearwater? It



means that 80 percent of the units must have at least one person, IN OCCUPANCY, who is 55 or older.

What happens if a couple has one occupier who is 55, and that person passes on. Can the other person younger than 55 still remain in the property?

Yes. At OTOW, the 20 percent number allows the surviving occupier to remain in the occupancy.

What about an inheritance? Can a child under-55, who inherits a unit, move in and occupy the property?

Yes. Once again, at OTOW 20 percent allows for inheritances.

What if the beneficiary is a charitable entity?

If an official from the charity is 55 or older, of course, he or she can occupy the property. However, if the charity selects one of its officials to occupy the property, and that official is under age 55, he or she would not be eligible to occupy the unit.

Q. My lawyer said that I should name my trust as the beneficiary of my IRAs and by doing that, there will be no probate of what's in those accounts when I pass. I am an 84-year-old woman, who has been widowed for the last three years. I have always been told that trusts are the only way to avoid probate. I'd like your views on what my lawyer said.

A. I am not about to criticize your attorney without knowing what facts he had in front of him. Second, I was not there when he said whatever it was, he said.

What I can say is that there can be potential adverse federal income tax consequences to the beneficiaries of an IRA if a beneficiary is a trust.

Under the Secure Act, if the beneficiary of an IRA is a trust, then the amount in the IRA must be withdrawn in five years from the death of the owner.

However, if the beneficiary is a person, then he or she or they have 10 years to withdraw the funds.

In addition, if the sole purpose for having an IRA is to avoid probate, then an IRA is in and of itself a probate avoidance mechanism. So, I suggest you go back to your attorney or find one who is familiar with income tax laws.

Q. What is wrong with me getting married to a woman who is still married and won't divorce her husband for religious reasons. She and her husband are separated for years, and he doesn't

live in Florida. We don't want just to live together. We want something more binding. So, what's wrong with this?

A. Oh, I don't know. Maybe it's that bigamy is a third-degree felony in Florida and maybe it's that your "marriage" is not a marriage and would be null and void as a marriage? And there are a few more etc. etc. etc., but why go into them now, eh?

our dues are still a pretty good bargain.


In March, the On Top of the World Snowbirds Line Dance Club will help sponsor an event for our community veterans.





Just after the pandemic, the number of singers in the Chorus was dwindling. One Christmas concert depended on full audience participation for every


carol and the number of male singers was closing in on zero.

Italian can be learned for upcoming trips or just because it's a cool language to speak out loud

Ready for something different?

Come to the Italian Language class sessions on Friday mornings from 10:30 to noon in the Dunedin Room of the East Activity Center.

From Jan. 9 through the end of March, two On Top of the World residents will share their knowledge and love of Italian.

Gemma Cima is an Italian native who moved to the United States as a young bride and taught languages in Michigan before moving to OTOW.

Abby Doronizio lived in Rome as a child and continues to visit Italy every year.

Both have taught Italian at OTOW every winter for the last few years.







OTOW Softball League reaches 43 players and even enters a team in Three Score League

The oldest current major league baseball player is Justin Verlander, age 42. The youngest is Didier Fuentes, 20 years old. That is a gap of 22 years.

On Top of the World Softball has regular players who are 55 years old. Our oldest is 89 - a gap of 34 years.

Visiting guests can be much younger, but whoever is playing, we roster players not only of a wide range of ages, but a wide range of skills and abilities.

Despite the differences, everybody contributes to the fun.

Blue 8, White 8, Red 6

After three innings, White led Red and Blue 7-3-2 and seemed about to rout the opposition. But White was held scoreless over the next three innings while Red and Blue rallied. Blue forced an 8-8 tie.

The early scoring was built on Ray Woolsey's bases loaded double in the first inning and mammoth two-run home run in the third inning.

The game featured four home runs, the above mentioned over the fence by Ray, and solo blasts over the fence by Lenny Segall and Bill Holland. The fourth homer was an inside-the-park slam to the fence that Elbe Ramirez earned by circling the bases before the ball even got back to the infield.

Elbe's blazing speed was matched by Robert Bannick who scored from first base on a single, running through his third base coach's stop sign to beat the throw home comfortably.

The game was also marked by some excellent outfield play. Ray went to his knees to catch a sinking line drive into center field while Jim Costello robbed a batter of a hit with a fine running catch in right field. Joe DeChiaro angled back in deep left center field for an over-the-shoulder catch of a long fly ball.

The game ended when Bo Voigt charged a slow roller and fired a strike to catcher Bob Rittner to nab what would have been the winning run for White.

Red 9, Blue 9, White 6

Led by perfect three-hit days from Tara Gunning and Ray Woolsey, whose batting line included two doubles, the Red team broke out to a 4-0 lead by the third inning.

But Blue and White rallied, and at the end of five innings, the score was tied at 6.

In the sixth inning, singles by Jim Tiano and Tara, and doubles by Jim Costello and Ray, plated three runs, but Blue immediately countered with three runs as well.

Bill Holland, Mary Anne Benuzzi and Jim Maid each singled to load the bases, and all three scored on Mike Blaa's double. Jim's single was his third hit in a perfect day at the plate.

Red pitcher Guy Bertuzzi quieted White's bats allowing just one hit over the last two innings to fix the final score.

Players took note of brilliant defensive plays by Mary Anne, who had to lunge to catch a twisting high pop-up that was befuddling other fielders.



Shortstop Ralph Scunziano unleashed a perfect throw to catcher Jim Tiano, who stretched to just nip a runner at home plate. And Eric Ortiz, at first base, made fine short-hop grabs of throws to put out base runners.

The catch of the day was by Ron Shields, a long, high fly ball into deep right center field that he raced to and backhanded saving at least a triple.

The longest hit of the game was a grand slam to right field by Barry Yellets.

White 13, Red 8, Blue 5

Home runs dominated the game.

With the short fence down, any hard-hit ball that eluded the outfielders would roll so deep that the batter could circle the bases, and five of them did.

Ironically, three of the homers, those hit by Ray Woolsey, Ralph Scunziano and Bob Dembinski, were for the Blue team that ended up last in the scoring.

In the second inning, after Tara Gunning led off with a double, Ralph Scunziano launched a missile deep over the center fielder's head so that he could have walked around the bases.

Immediately following that blast, Bob Dembinski hit another bomb deep over the center fielder's head and also had no trouble circling the bases.

In the fourth inning, Ray followed Jim Kemp's single with his own rocket that seemed airborne for minutes. Thus was completed the scoring for the Blue team.

Mary Anne Benuzzi, in the second inning, drove in three runs for White with one swing when she split the outfielders with her line drive and raced around the bases for her home run. That opened the scoring for White, and they added one more the next inning when Bill Holland doubled, moved to third on a ground out and scored on another infield grounder.

But with the score now 5-4-2 in favor of Blue and with Red trailing both, the White team launched a barrage of hits, scoring with three runs in each of the fifth through seventh innings as Mike Blaa, Joe DeChiaro, Robert Bannick, Steve Letourneau, Mary Anne, Bill Holland and Guy Bertuzzi each had two hits, including a double by Mary Anne and a double and triple by Bill.

Blue's bats went cold, and in the last inning, the Red team rallied for five runs, the first coming in when George Morgan tripled and scored on Jim Tiano's single, three more then scoring on a Barry Yellets homer over the right

fielder's head. The scoring concluded when Bob Rittner singled with two outs to bring home Frank Whitney from second base.

But the rally fizzled, and although Blue then loaded the bases after two were out, they could not bring anyone home.

Blue 14, White 11, Red 9

Twenty-nine is an awkward number in our softball league. A perfect roster has 12 players with 11 and 13 being manageable. But with 29 players, we can create two teams of 15 and 14 or three teams of 10,10 and 9 players. The former is too crowded and the latter too sparse.

But we manage, and with the sitting team providing one or two substitutes for unoccupied positions, we had a fun game.

With fewer people on the field, defense becomes more difficult. But our players rose to the occasion. Virtually every fielder did something outstanding, even spectacular.

A few examples will suffice although not giving fair praise to everyone.

In left-center field for Red, Joe DeChiaro robbed a potential home run by racing back on a blast and catching it over his shoulder.

Also for Red, a dangerous power hitter popped up a ball near the third base fence, and Don Mandeville raced over to grab it before crashing into the fence.

And again for Red, Melvin Tennille made a series of excellent plays at second base, the most difficult, a slicing bouncing ball that he grabbed and tossed to first base for the out.

For the Blue team, Jim Kemp raced from right center field into right field to grab a screaming line drive on the run. And shortstop Bo Voigt caught a number of short hops and made pinpoint throws to nab runners hustling to first base. But his best highlight was rushing into left field to catch a twisting fly ball. Had it dropped, the Red team was in position to rally and tie the game.

Bo was assisted in maintaining Blue's defense by middle infielder Reto Guruswami, who turned two double plays on hard hit balls over second base and by first baseman Lenny Segall who saved several errant throws by holding his foot on the base while stretching for potential wild throws. Second baseman Mary Anne Benuzzi also contributed with her catches of swirling pop-ups.

White maintained the game's theme of solid to great defense. Jim Maid at middle infield and Tony Martinez at second base ranged far and wide to stop balls from reaching the outfield grass, and making accurate throws to force runners at second base.

Gail Potter in the outfield kept line drives in front of her and threw bullets to cutoff fielders keeping runners from advancing on the bases. Bob Dembinski played an error free shortstop for White, but also served as the substitute left fielder for Blue and patrolled his area against the righty power hitters, frustrating them by catching numerous

long fly balls that ordinarily would have been extra base hits.

Despite the great defense, some batters managed to break through, the best example being White's Ray Woolsey who in consecutive at bats blasted long home runs into right field. Ralph Scunziano of Red also homered.

Nobody on the Blue team homered, but Lenny Segall and Bo Voigt each managed perfect five-hit days, and between scoring and driving runners home, accounted for nine of their team's 14 runs.

Field 1

Blue 16, Red 11

Field 2

Red 5, White 5

With 43 players, we created four teams for the first time this season.

On Field 1, despite Ralph Scunziano's home run and Joe DeChiaro's three-hit day that included a double, the Blue team romped behind airtight defense and four hit days from Ray Woolsey (the cycle), Tara Gunning (three doubles and a single) and Don Mandeville (a double and three singles).

On Field 2, the Red team fielded a secret weapon, Christian Manns, whose father is one of our regular players. Christian blasted three home runs plating five runs and showed a strong and accurate arm at third base.

Bill Holland also homered for Red while Jim Maid slugged a two RBI four bagger for the White team.

Highlights of the game included running catches in deep center field by Bob Dembinski of Red and Gene Abood of White, as well as strong shortstop play by White infielder Gary Zimmerman in his first game back from his summer in the north.

Three-Score

A number of OTOW softballers play in the Three-Score Softball League as well. Bob Rittner and Bob Dembinski noticed that there were enough of us to make up a team, so Bob Dembinski created a 13 player team to compete against a Three-Score team of non OTOW players. On paper, the teams were evenly matched.

The OTOW team was pitcher Bob Rittner, catcher Burnell Hoekstra, first baseman Bill Holland, second baseman Mary Anne Benuzzi, middle infielder Tara Gunning, third baseman Don Mandeville, shortstop Bo Voigt, left fielder George Morgan, left-centerfielder Bob Dembinski, right-centerfielder Joe DeChiaro, right fielder Mike Blaa, rover Melvin Tennille, and rover Henry Zussman.

The OTOW team won 18-11 sparked by five home runs slugged by Bill Holland, Don Mandeville, Bob Dembinski, Bo Voigt and Henry Zussman. Every player drove in at least one run.

Most exciting was the enthusiasm and spirit in the dugout as cries of OTOW rang out after every play and spirits were raised by constant chatter about our identity..



World News

On Jan. 1, 2001, the Euro currency was officially launched, replacing the former European currencies in 12 European countries. This marked a significant step in European integration and economic cooperation, facilitating easier trade and travel among member states.

Business World

The U.S. Federal Trade Commission approves the merger of America Online and Time Warner to form AOL Time Warner. It was historic to merge a traditional media giant with a burgeoning internet company, creating the largest media and entertainment company at the time. It is a cautionary tale about a failed synergy between different corporate cultures and the impact of the dot-com bubble's collapse, resulting in billions of dollars in losses and a reputation as one of history's worst mergers which ultimately failed.

Technology News

The Wikipedia site went live on Jan. 15, 2001. The very first edit was also made that day. Wikipedia is a free Internet-based encyclopedia that operates under an open-source management style. The significance of Wikipedia's creation lies in its role as an user-generated encyclopedia that democratized knowledge and became the world's largest reference site that is constantly updated by volunteers.

Sports World

On January 28, 2001, The Backstreet Boys sang the national anthem at Super Bowl XXXV in Tampa. Ray Charles also performed "America the Beautiful" as part of the same ceremony. Meanwhile, the Baltimore Ravens defeated the New York Giants at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa 34-7, winning their first Super Bowl title.

The last time the sketch aired, January 20, 2001, was her last day as Attorney General of United States. She appeared as herself, alongside her imitator, Will Farrow. She was the first woman to serve as the U.S. Attorney General, a position she held from 1993 to 2001. Janet was a native Floridian.


"Wonderful World" evoked feelings of nostalgia.


Your On Top of the World library now has application forms and addressed envelopes for NLS. The telephone contact number is 888-657-7323.

later at an outstation near Eschwege on Mount Meissner.

His work was quiet, disciplined and largely unseen, but it carried responsibility and purpose.

Those same qualities guide him today.

The flag he raises now represents far more than fabric and color. It represents duty, remembrance and respect — for

the country he served, for those who served alongside him and for the community we now call home.

Most residents pass by the flagpole without ever knowing who replaces the flag or how it gets there. And that's exactly how my husband prefers it.

He doesn't seek recognition. He simply believes that the American flag should always be treated with care and should always be worthy of the people who live beneath it.

So, the next time you see the flag flying fresh and bright on any ordinary day in front of the Old World Spanish, know that it is there because someone quietly cared enough.

Sometimes patriotism doesn't speak loudly. Sometimes it simply shows up — and gets the job done.

tions provided by resident's contributions. We celebrated the holidays and all faiths practiced by the residents living in the building.


Our previous tree was showing its age, being bought in 2012 by one of our residents, and was offered to any person that needed a new tree.

Matzo Ball Soup

Ingredients

1 whole chicken
4 cloves garlic, crushed
3 bay leaves
1 teaspoon black peppercorns
Kosher salt
3 celery stalks diced
2 medium carrots, peeled and diced
1 small onion, peeled and diced
3 sprigs fresh parsley
4 large eggs
1/3 cup plain seltzer water
2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh dill, plus small sprigs for garnish
1 cup matzo meal



Directions

1. Place the chicken in a large pot so it fits snugly. Fill the pot with enough water to cover the chicken by 1 inch. Bring to a boil over high heat then reduce the heat to maintain a simmer.

Cook for 15 minutes, using a ladle to skim the foam that rises to the surface. Add the garlic, bay leaves, peppercorns and 1 tablespoon of salt and continue cooking for another 30 minutes.

Skim any fat that rises to the surface and reserve. You should have about 1/4 cup. If necessary, add vegetable oil to 1/4 cup and set aside to cool slightly. Add the celery, carrots, onion and parsley to the pot and continue to cook until the vegetables are soft and the chicken is tender but not falling apart - about 45 minutes.

2. Meanwhile, whisk together the eggs and chicken fat in a medium bowl, then stir in the seltzer, chopped dill, matzo meal and 1 1/2 teaspoons salt until combined. Cover and refrigerate. Chill until the mixture is firm - at least 30 minutes and up to two hours.

3. When the chicken is cooked, carefully remove it from the broth with a slotted spoon along with the garlic and bay leaves and place on a rimmed baking sheet to let it cool.

Return the both to a simmer. Scoop heaping tablespoon of the matzo mixture, using your hands to gently roll them into balls (wet your hands to prevent sticking). Carefully drop the matzo balls into the simmering broth. Cover and simmer on

low until the matzo balls are completely cook through and fluffy, about one hour.

4. While the matzo balls cook, pick the meat from the chicken and roughly chop it, discarding the skin and bones.

5. When ready to serve, return the chicken to the broth. Increase the heat to high to bring the soup to a simmer, then remove from the heat.

Gently ladle the soup in to serving bowls, being careful not to break up the matzo balls.

Garnish with fresh chopped dill and serve.

Jewish cooking defined by rich and varied flavors, and a lot of tradition

Jewish cuisine is a collection of tradition and history, found with the threads of many generations. It's a culinary journey that spans continents with each dish preserving the flavors of Jewish heritage.

From the fragrant aroma of freshly baked challah on Shabbat, to the sizzle of latkes frying in a pan during Hanukkah, Jewish food tells an enthralling story of resilience, adaptation and the deep bond between culture and cuisine.

From the matzo ball soup that warms hearts during Passover Seders to the sweet hamantaschen shared in celebration of Purim, each dish is a delicious chapter in the story of Jewish life.

The rich and varied tapestry of flavors define Jewish cooking, a testament to the global Jewish diaspora's ability to transform humble ingredients into culinary masterpieces.

Let's talk Kosher:

Most kosher guidelines forbid pairing

meat and dairy together and allow you to only eat the meat of certain animals. Kosher guidelines also provide direction on preparation.

Kosher is a term used to describe food that complies with the strict dietary standards of traditional Jewish law. The English word is derived from the Hebrew root "kasher" which means "to be pure, proper, or suitable for consumption."

Kosher dietary laws are comprehensive and provide a rigid framework of rules that outline which foods are allowed or forbidden and mandate how permitted foods must be produced, processed and prepared before consumption.

For many Jews, keeping kosher is about reverence and adherence to religious tradition, not just health or food safety. However, not all Jewish communities adhere to strict kosher guidelines. Some individuals may choose to

follow only some rules or none at all.

Diverse Traditions:

Jewish cuisine varies significantly among different communities, including Ashkenazi (Eastern European), Sephardi (Mediterranean and North African), and Mizrahi (Middle Eastern) traditions. Each group has its unique dishes and cooking styles often influenced by the local cultures where they settled.

Jewish cuisine is not just about food, it is a reflection of history, culture and identity. Each dish tells a story of resilience, adaptation, and bonds of community.

Whether through the rich flavors of Ashkenazi dishes or vibrant spices of Sephardi cuisine, Jewish food continues to be a vital part of cultural heritage and celebration.

Here is a list some popular Jewish dishes: matzo ball soup, latkes, gefilte fish, knish and blintzes, challah and noodle kugel.

Potato Latkes with applesauce, sour cream or cottage cheese

Potato Latkes

Ingredients

1 1/2 pounds russet potatoes peeled
1/4 cup finely chopped shallots
2 large eggs, lightly beaten
2 tablespoons flour
1 1/2 teaspoons salt and freshly ground black pepper

Directions

1. In a food processor, grate the potatoes. Line a sieve with cheesecloth and transfer potatoes to the sieve. Set sieve over a bowl, twist cheesecloth into a pouch, squeezing out some moisture. Let mixture drain for 15 minutes.

After 15 minutes, pour off liquid from the bowl, but leave the white potato

starch that settles in the bottom of the bowl.

2. Add starch to the eggs, flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt and freshly ground pepper. Return drained potatoes to this mixture and toss to combine.

3. Preheat oven to 200 degrees. Line a baking pan with paper towels. When you are ready to eat, in a large

skillet heat 1/4 inch of oil over medium high heat until hot. Drop heaping tablespoon of potato mixture and cook for 3 to 4 minutes a side. Latkes should be golden and crisp on both sides.

Eat right away or keep warm in oven. Serve with applesauce, sour cream or cottage cheese mixed with sour cream.
