Recreation Card Information and Evening Event

Does your recreation card expire on or around Friday, July 1, 2016?

We are asking residents to come

into the Community Service Office in the community on Tuesday, July 26, starting July 1 to get their recreation cards punched. You will have through Monday, July 18, before all cards must be updated to utilize the facilities.

To ensure quick processing during normal business hours, you can request an appointment time with Nancy Rogers in the Community Service Office.

Can't make it during normal business hours?

The Community Service Office will once again host an evening recreation card event on Wednesday, July 6, from 4-7 p.m. at the CSO. Please mark your calendar to attend.

When renewing your recreation card, or getting a brand new one issued, please remember to bring a government issued ID, such as driver license or passport, and a current piece of mail indicating your name and property address.

Please note that no cards will be punched or processed without proper identification and address verification.

As a reminder, you must bring your valid recreation card with you when using SCA facilities and be prepared to show it upon staff request. All guests must be accompanied by a resident anytime they plan to use the SCA facilities, including the pool.

As another reminder, the resident needs to remain with their guest while they enjoy the facilities. Any noncompliance matters are directed to the On Top of the World Association.

F.L.O.W. Bus

The Florida Licensing on Wheels Bus (FLOW) bus is scheduled to be from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the East Activity Center North parking lot.





Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting for the On Top of the World Condominium Association was held at 10 a.m. on June 10, 2016, at the East Activity Center, 2069 World Parkway Blvd.

It was refreshing to see so large a turnout. The meeting was lively (mostly) and we received possibly the largest number of written questions. The meeting ran 2.5 hours with a short 10 minute break.

Leslee Colen gave a report on the status of recreation improvements and construction. Quite a bit has happened over a relatively short period of time. Here are the largest projects:

- Inspection and Enforcement Services have been ongoing;
- OTOWClearwaterInfo.com, the hub of communication and interest for residents, is regularly updated with items of interest affecting your community;
- Competitive pricing on paving allowed for resurfacing of 30 parking lots and six roadway sections;
- Roofing projects included four complete reroofs and two mansard replacements;
- Replaced railings on six buildings;
- Completed three, two-elevator upgrades, eight cab improvements, and one fire-related rehab;
- Completion of the replacement of potable water service lines from Columbia Drive south, affecting approximately 336 condos;
- Landscape alterations, 89 tree removal and replacements; and
- Addition of a Post Office into the Community Service Office.

Awnings

Awnings, and their failure to meet current building code for wind speed, were discussed.

It was noted that awnings with weak or failing attachments will cause damage to building structures and need to be removed at the owner's expense. As of June 10, 2016, more than 310 residents have removed their awnings.

On June 1, we moved into hurri-

cane season and already we had a tropical storm form in the Gulf of Mexico on June 3.

Let it not be said that forecasters don't know what they are talking about.

This brings me to the topic of awnings, which pose a serious risk to life and property and may detach in storm force winds. As noted in prior articles, the "clamshell" awnings do not meet the current building code for wind resistance. The Inspection Services Department is continuing to find many awnings with compromised connection points to the building common element. They have been reaching out to owners of the awnings to have the awnings removed and thereby limit any further damage to the building structure. Fortunately, there are new products that do provide shade and do meet the building code for wind resistance.

If you have an awning, please arrange for its inspection through the Community Service Office at the East Activity Center.

Washers & Dryers

The topic of improperly installed washer and dryers was also discussed.

To recap, this topic affects all condos built prior to 1986, as well as all condos on the east side of Belcher Road.

Improperly installed washer/dryer units represent a significant hazard for both direct water damage and fire, due to improper electrical connections into the main apartment panel that may easily cause an overload.

This risk is such a great concern, that the Association instituted an inspection requirement on all condos that are resold, regardless of when the condo was acquired, or who installed a washer/dryer.

This requirement applies regardless of what real estate agency the seller chooses to list with.

Further, it is incumbent upon the owner to list the washer/dryer as a material defect in the home, unless the matter was previously corrected by a licensed electrician, plumber, or appliance specialist.

Proof of the correction must be provided to the Association before approval for the sale to close will be granted.

The Association's restructured Inspection Services Division enforces rules, standards, awareness and compliance in this community. Inspections assist in keeping your community beautiful and safe. Inspections also provide a way to maintain architectural control to enhance and protect the values of this community.

Reserves Vote

I want to take this opportunity to thank everyone who voted in person or by proxy to waive reserves.

Under Florida Statutes, in order to hold a meeting and conduct business, the Association needs a quorum of voting interests. So every vote counted regardless of how you voted!

By a majority vote of ballots and proxies, residents once again affirmed the choice to waive the establishment of reserves for replacement of roads, roofs and painting.

Your Board believes this is a wise decision because through proper planning and budgeting, your Board has been able to stay ahead of the maintenance and replacement curve on community infrastructure, especially with respect to painting, paving, and roofs.

Every building budget includes an estimate of the remaining useful life for painting, roofing, and paving. This estimate is updated annually.

As a component nears the end of the estimated useful life, it is inspected to determine if replacement needs to be accelerated or if there is still serviceable life left. If this latter is the case, then the target period can be extended for a determined period. There is no good reason to incur expense if a roof or a parking lot is still serviceable for an additional term. If it is determined that the component continues to be serviceable, the frequency of inspections are increased. At the point that it is determined the component is ready for replacement, that item is then included in the next budget cycle.

Property Insurance Update

At the annual meeting, Guy Woolbright provided a detailed report to the Association on property coverage. He noted that the Association is still required to "...obtain and maintain adequate insurance" for the condominium property. "Best efforts" and "adequate insurance" are not defined.

I'm pleased to report that your Board was able to bind full limits of coverage this year. Premiums remain flat over last year.

The event deductible continues the same as in the prior year's policy: \$10,000 per non-wind storm occurrence, however, the wind storm deductible continues at 5 percent of the stated value subject to \$250,000 minimum for named wind storm.

The Association property policy covers property from the interior drywall out, but does not cover finished surfaces, fixtures, cabinetry or other installations within a condo unit, nor the A/C unit within the limits of the unit. Unit owners are directed to purchase a personal policy for their unit and belongings "HO-6" policy.

Association's fiscal year

In the case of a destroyed building due to a fire, the HO-6 policy pays the unit owner for new flooring, kitchen appliances, furniture, and it may even pay for living somewhere else while the unit is being repaired. The HO-6 should have personal liability, Loss of Use, and Loss Assessment coverage bundled in with it.

Your Association continues to receive numerous requests for Wind Mitigation Certificates. This is a document that states whether or not certain components of a structure comply with the 2001 Standard Building

Because of the volume of requests, a form for each and every building address has been posted on www.OTOWClearwaterInfo.com. Simply open the Website, click on the "Community Information" tab and follow the link to the Wind Mitigation forms.

You, or your insurance agent, will need to enter in the name of the insured and the unit number. Otherwise, the form should be good to go.

In the event the Association is requested to fill out a different form, or for some reason must become involved in the process of dealing with your insurance agent, there is a minimum charge of \$15 payable in ad-

All of the buildings with roof replacements in 2012 to present should have an updated wind mitigation form on the Website by August. They are all accessible at: http://www.OTOW-ClearwaterInfo.com/wind-mitigationforms.aspx

Architectural Controls

The Community's Declaration provides for the Association to exercise architectural control over the buildings and other common elements.

Inasmuch as it is your Association's responsibility to provide for the continuous maintenance of the buildings, components, grounds, roadways, sidewalks, and the underground infrastructure (collectively called "common elements"), it is the Association that must have final say over any architectural or structural modifications in addition to making sure that contractors performing the work are properly licensed and insured.

Painting/Waterproofing

Buildings 50 and 49 will both have new paint coatings applied to the front façade of the structure in July, weather all start dates are approximate and inclement weather can affect scheduling.

Inspection services representatives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproofing coatings during the 2015/2016 improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you were not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit by the coatings vendor. We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a success across the community.

Construction, Roofing and large scope projects

The railings improvement project at Building 30 should continue into July with an anticipated completion date by the end of the month.

Otherwise, there are no other large scale construction or improvement projects scheduled for the month of

Reoccurring Reminders

The management company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit.

A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the Community Service Office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boule-

Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt water softeners, are permissible in the community. Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the management company. Thanks for your advance cooperation.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle.

This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the

permitting. Please keep in mind that last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hangar brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

> In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future.

> Many first floor unit owners will be receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department over the coming months as the management company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. Stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but has the propensity to damage association and personal property alike.

> To keep all residents in the community aware of this compliance issue, the notice will be published in upcoming editions of the OTOW newspaper. The management company asks that if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stone at the earliest convenience.

Walkway Repairs

Building walkway repairs will continue as construction crews perform maintenance to the second and third floor walking surfaces.

Many buildings will see these restoration crews as the management company focuses its efforts on these types of repairs. This work requires the use of specialized power tools and may cause a temporary inconvenience in the form of noise and dust. Repair crews will do their best to limit the inconvenience during this necessary work

These small repair areas will also be coated as a future preventative. As always, we ask that residents please limit any foot traffic in and around any work area they may encounter.

Walkway coating improvements will continue across property. These improvements involve preparation of the surface (and occasionally sub-surface) concrete, the addition of acrylic fortified materials to stairwell surfaces, and then the application of a quality slip-resistant barrier coating. The end result is intended to provide longevity to the balcony walking surfaces as well as returning the look to its original conveyed color scheme.

The management company will post notices on affected building's

bulletin boards concerning the dates crews are expected to commence the work. Please be aware of "Caution" and "Wet Paint" signs in and around these work areas.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The management company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas.

Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Many times decorative rocks or landscaping is installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you install.

Inspection efforts are focused on the tagging and removal of personal furnishings and belongings placed in outside stairwells of buildings. These obstructions present a fire concern, block egress, or are of a nature that they do not comply with written community standards. The management company would like to reiterate to residents that barbeque grills be it propane, charcoal, or electric, are not permitted on any balcony areas, as they pose a fire risk to the structure and residents.

Clutter Enforcement

Clutter enforcement has always been one of the most reoccurring compliance issues at On Top of the World. These efforts make for an overall safer community in which to live.

If you receive notification that an item is out of compliance, please correct the issue immediately. If you have a question and were not able to speak with a compliance representative at the time of the notification, please stop by the Community Service Office and request an appointment. Someone will be glad to contact you.

Please remember that items tagged in common areas may be removed and disposed of without further notice. Please help make your community safer by complying if you receive a violation tag/door hanger. Your continued cooperation is appreciated.



More than 125 residents attend seminar on memory loss and brain diseases

More community seminars ahead

The East Activity Center auditorium was the site for a special seminar in June.

The Community Service Office invited Lisa Hrenko of Brain Fitness Center and Cyrena Duncan of the Alzheimer's Association to speak with On Top of the World residents about brain health.


More than 125 residents attended. Between the two guest speakers, their audience learned about early warning signs for diseases which impact the brain.

Residents were also given general ideas how these diseases are treated, how successful treatments can be, and best ways to prevent such diseases from impacting an individual's life.

There was a general discussion on where to go for prognosis and treatments, and a brief rundown on how insurance plans cover, or don't cover, such treatments.

Those in attendance learned that getting treatment for brain diseases can actually extend someone's life 5-20 years longer compared to someone who does not seek treatment.

For someone who wants to make a solid effort to keep their brain and memory functions at first class work-

ing levels, it was recommended to learn something new everyday - such as a new language - or play a game which requires a great deal of thinking and memory - such as bridge or mahjongg.

According to the Alzheimer's Association, memory problems can be caused by depression, side effects from medication, excessive alcohol use, thyroid problems, poor diet, vitamin deficiencies, urinary tract infections, and Alzheimer's disease and related dementias.

Warning signs of Alzheimer's Disease include memory loss that disrupts daily life, problem solving becoming a challenge, routine tasks at home becoming difficult, confusion, forgetting time or place, trouble understanding visual images, problems speaking or writing, losing things, forgetting where someone has been, an increase in poor judgment, withdrawal from work or social activities, and a noticeable change in mood or personality.

Anyone concerned they may be

showing signs of a brain-related disease is encouraged to contact their local doctor.

This seminar was organized by the OTOW Community Service Office and future events are already being planned for later in the year.

Just because your phone rings, does not mean you have to answer it

SCAM ALERT No. 1: I recently received a phone call from someone (I have no idea who it was) and the caller said one of my banking accounts was going to be "flagged."

I was then told that the message is "encrypted" and that I should call such and such number for further information.

Of course, I did not call any such and such number and you shouldn't either.

If you ever receive a phone call from someone or other, and you are asked to call a further number, do NOT return that call. Just hang up the phone.

SCAM ALERT No. 2: Many of us already know, if we get a phone call from an area code we do recognize, or actual phone number we don't recognize, just let the phone ring and see if the caller leaves a voice message.

Now, I have to admit, scammers sometimes do leave a message and give you a return number. An I.R.S. scam is a good example. So even if you do receive a message, you still have to be cautious.

Remember this: Neither the I.R.S., nor the United States Marshals office, will ever call you (except to return your call to them). Neither will ever demand money from you.



When a caller starts to demand money from you, just hang up, and under no circumstances should you try to speak with these folks. They'll just cause your blood pressure to go sky high.

SCAM ALERT No. 3: If you get a letter which asks you to pay money to obtain a certified copy of your deed, throw that letter in your trash.

No one — NO ONE — ever needs a certified copy of their deed. You don't even need a copy because odds are you have the original.

Q. My neighbor told my husband and I that the correct way for a married couple to hold the title to any property is in "and/or." Is this correct?

A. Nah! First of all, if it's a homestead, I cannot possibly think of one reason why a homestead owned by a married couple should ever be held in anything other than "and" status — never "or" status.

When a couple is married, and it is intended that both parties have an equal ownership interest in property -- be it a homestead, or other real property or personal property, such as banking or investment accounts -- the wise thing to do is leave them in "and" status.

For example: "Joe and Mary" husband and wife. This creates what is known as an Estate by the Entireties (It's also called a Tenancy by the Entireties.).

This is known as the husband and wife estate; or the married couple estate.

In fact, holding title in the name of "John and Mary" husband and wife or "John and Mary" a married couple, is an asset protection mechanism in and of itself

The reason is, if only one of the couple is sued and a judgment entered against just that one party, the judgment creditor won't be able to attach property held in the name of the two of them if it is in "and" status. "Or" status creates an ambiguity whereas "and" status does not.

Example: If property is held in the name of John or Mary, then a judgment creditor can attach the property in satisfaction of a judgment because, after all it is owned by either one of the parties.

I suppose, that if you have an automobile in "or" status, that's OK. It would allow one or the other of the parties to that title to sell it without the joinder of the other.

However, even so, a car, as an asset, can be attached by a judgment creditor of one of the parties if the title is in "or" status.

And while I'm on this subject, let me go further and address the holding of title to property where the couple are not married.

(1) If the idea is that if one party dies then the other gets the property, it should also be held in "and" status, but with the added words "joint tenants with rights of survivorship."

(2) If the couple both claim an ownership interest, but they don't want it to go to a survivor, in the event one of them passes on, then it should still be in "and" status, but with the added words tenants in common. This is actually not a simple matter, so if you are in doubt as to how to hold the title to a piece of property, it's always wise to contact your attorney.

And finally, (3) "and/or" status is always ambiguous because who knows what the intention is. I mean, is title held so that both own the property and both have equal rights in it, or is it held in such a way that either one of the parties can sell it and keep the proceeds of the sale for himself or herself?

Q. I went on a singles cruise and met this really nice guy and we had a great time together. He now wants to come to Florida and move in with me to "see how things work out." What do you think and are there legal things I need to know?

A. I think that before you "see how things work out" you need to know one heckuva lot more about him than that he was a nice guy that you met on a cruise. Legal "things" can come after you find out much, much more about him

You can design, create and paint your own puzzle pot

Are you looking for something different to do this summer?

Why not try your hand at making a Puzzle Pot?

Classes will take place on Tuesdays and Fridays, starting July 5. Tuesday classes are noon to 4 p.m. and Friday classes are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Classes will take place in the East Activity Center Kitchen/Craft Room and run by the Ceramics Club.

Each class will be \$2. You need to bring a clay pot. The size of the pot should match the size you want your puzzle pot to be.

Jewel Chamberlain, ceramic coordinator and teacher, will supply the clay for the puzzle pots, plus rubber gloves and turn table. The clay will cost \$10 for each pot made.

To create your own puzzle pot, you will roll strips of clay into thin, flat strips. The strips are then weaved into the pot on the bottom edges and sides and pressed against the pot. You can make any style of weave, large or small.

This is shown in the pictures at right. It takes about a week to dry. Come back and carefully take the weave out of the clay pot. You might have to carefully make some of the attachments firmer. It then has to be put in the Kiln and fired. It will cost \$3 for the firing.

When the firing is done, you can paint the pot any color or design you want. Glaze paint should be used to make it water proof if you wish to put it outside. When you are done, you have a wonderful piece of sculpture.

If you are not sure about making the Puzzle Pot, just stop by and take a look. Jewel will be so glad to let you know all about the project. It is a lot of fun and we have made many new friends.

If puzzle pot-making doesn't sound like a challenge to you, ceramics class continues to offer bottle melting.

You can make a spoon rest, or cheese and crackers tray, from bottles. Many of our residents have made several creations since OTOW News publicized the idea last year. You can see finished samples in the Craft Room.



Do you know the difference between "more than" and "over?"

"More than" and "over" are two of the most common grammar errors in the English language.

In the dictionary, the word "more" means a quantitative comparison for amounts, measurements, numbers, degrees, etc.

The word "over" means a physical place or position, generally above something. "Over" should never be used when numbers are in the same sentence.

OK. So you probably didn't just learn anything new, but how many of you are guilty of using the word "over" to describe numbers?

These two sentences are correct:

The library has "more than" 500 books on its shelves and the coffee pot can make "more than" 12 cups of coffee.

The exception is, the maintenance man nailed 100 "over" the front door so emergency personnel could determine the address. In this case, "over" is correct.

"Over" is best used when talking about height, distance or physical location of an object.

Sound simple? It really is.

But next time you write a story for OTOW News, check your grammar. Make sure "more than" and "over" are being used correctly.

East Activity Center gets new two-tone paint job

Work started in mid-June to repaint the complete exterior of the East Activity Center, including the wall surrounding the swimming pool and the pool pump house.

For years the EAC has stood out in its sunny, yellow paint. With the makeover, the EAC will now be brown with a green accent.

The project began with the EAC getting a bath — the entire exterior of the building was pressure-

washed and cleaned. The first layer of paint took place along the entrance to the woodshop and lapidary rooms, and soon after, the top of the building was repainted, followed by the main walls.

As part of the process, the old "French-look" wall surrounding the pool had its "brick cutouts" covered with stucco. By mid-July, the stucco will have hardened and the entire pool wall will be painted the same colors as the EAC.

Dessa Barabba said, "We have received great reviews on the colors selected with most residents indicating that during various times of the day the EAC has a different look to it."

After the EAC is completed, pressure washing and repainting will also take place at the West Activity Center. The same color scheme will be used on the West Side.

Finally, July 4, 1776, became the date that was included on the hand-written copy of the Declaration of Independence that was signed in August and is now on display in the National Archives in Washington, D.C.

In 1870, almost a hundred years after the Declaration of Independence was written and signed, a bill to officially recognize several holidays, including Christmas, Congress first declared July 4th to be a national holiday.

This year it will be 240 years since the Continental Congress decided to declare our independence from England. During those 240 years, many honorable people fought and many died for our freedom. Please remember them as you have your picnics.

Here's a bucket list must-do: visiting the Dali Museum

If you haven't had the opportunity to visit the Salvador Dali Museum in St. Pete, you may want to add that to your to-do list.

The Dali collection is on display in a whimsical, modern architectural building with undulating glass windows, a winding staircase and a lovely garden that overlooks the water.

The museum's café menu tilts a little towards Spanish tapas. It offers both indoor and outdoor garden seating.

To many people, Dali's surrealist paintings are an enigma. And it's not a wonder. Some say Dali had an IQ of 180. Whether true or not, Dali incorporated math, science, history and psychology into his paintings.

Tom Portsmouth said, "It is important to listen to a tour guide or you will not understand the layering of the artwork because there is always a painting within a painting."

"Gala Contemplating the Mediterranean Sea" is a good example of this. At first glance, the painting depicts Dali's wife, leaning against a railing. However, as you stand a good distance away from the painting, it becomes a portrait of Abraham Lincoln.

If you asked Jean Counts what she liked the most about the



Dali Museum, she would say, "I loved the painting "Discovering America by Christopher Columbus" (which is filled with symbolic imagery and history), along with the building layout and the lovely lunch. We are lucky to have the museum close by."

Leatha Simard was eager to see the new Dali museum. Her favorite work was "The Hallucinogenic Toreador." "Without our informative tour guide, we wouldn't have gained insights into the painting," she said.

And Vicky Portsmouth, amazed at Dali's work, said, "Dali's paintings are like large history books."

Dali is both a master of detail and technical skill. And as everyone soon finds out, his work is extremely cerebral, surprising us with each brushstroke.


It was a beautiful, patriotic day, organized by Audrey Jones. Thanks to all who participated.


Northern trips offer relief from the heat


Basic Hurricane Preparation Tips

Know where to go. If you are ordered to evacuate, know the local hurricane evacuation route(s) to take and have a plan for where you can stay. Contact your local emergency management agency for more information.

Put together a disaster supply kit, including a flashlight, batteries, cash, first aid supplies, and copies of your critical information if you need to evacuate.

If you are not in an area that is advised to evacuate, and you decide to stay in your home, plan for adequate supplies in case you lose power and water for several days and you are not able to leave due to flooding or blocked roads.

Make a family emergency communication plan. Many communities have text or email alerting systems for emergency notifications. To find out what alerts are available in your area, search the Internet with your town, city, or county name and the word "alerts."

Save this background info on Memorial Day for future use

Remember the words Decoration Day and seeing the Red Poppies? Most of us probably do.

That's the glue that holds our residents together here in On Top of the World, sharing the past.

Memorial Day is a federal holiday in the United States for remembering the people who died while serving in the country's armed forces.

The holiday, which is observed every year on the last Monday of May, originated as Decoration Day after the American Civil War in 1868, when the Grand Army of the Republic, an organization of Union veterans founded in Decatur, Illinois, established it as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the Union war dead with flowers.

The red poppies were an idea from Moina Michael in 1915. Making them herself, she sold them to her friends and co-workers. In 1921 the Franco-American Children's League sold them to benefit the orphaned children and widows. Ms. Michael wrote the poem, We cherish too, the Poppy red That grows on fields where valor led. It seems to signal to the skies that blood of heroes never dies.

In 1921 the league disbanded and the VFW was approached for their



help. In 1922 the VFW became the first veterans organization to nationally sell the poppies using disabled veterans to make them.

In 1948 the U.S. Postal Service honored Ms. Michael with her silhouette and poppies on a red three-cent stamp.

I didn't mean to go all history on our readers, sometimes I just want to know why something is the way it is. I'm sure we all enjoyed the three-day holiday giving us time to be with friends and relatives, and eat lots of good food.

Of course, truly imaginative people have been doing this through books for hundreds of years. That experience often led them to want to actually see what they had read about.

This begs two questions: Are we truly experiencing what we see on the Internet, and, what are we missing by not being there? I decided to drive to South Dakota to look for some answers.

After driving some 1,900 miles, I was perhaps less enthusiastic about this trip than I had been when it was planned.

Then, driving along a winding road and looking through trees up at the mountains, I got my first glimpse of Mount Rushmore, off in the distance (see photo at top right).

Not only did my enthusiasm return, along with a sense of the awesomeness of the sight, but the word I came out with was "Wow." I felt like I did the first time I saw a Broadway play, "The Music Man," with Robert Preston and Shirley Jones. Both situations seemed almost magical. I've never experienced that



looking at someone's slides or viewing it on the Internet.

Walking up to the Mount Rushmore plaza was almost anti-climactic, except I saw the enthusiasm of everyone that was there. It felt like being at the United Nations with all the flags of the states and the people from all over the world, snapping pictures, and taking selfies with the monument in the background.

Looking up at the work of sculptor Gutzon Borglum, I was nearly overwhelmed. Imagine the work and care that went into creating this monument over a period of years from 1927 and 1941. Over three million people visit there each year. This has to be seen to be truly experienced. And, sharing the experience with others

makes it even more special. Several people asked me to take their pictures so they could record this moment.

There are many other places and sights worth seeing in that part of South Dakota. The Crazy Horse Memorial dwarfs Mount Rushmore. Started in 1947, it is far from finished.

My favorite spot was Custer State Park. The herds of buffalo, antelopes, deer, prairie dogs, elk, bighorn sheep, and wild donkeys make it a place wellworth visiting (see photo). The rock formations, man-made lakes, and twisty mountain roads invigorate your senses.



So, is watching something on the Internet really the same as being there? One thing for sure that is missing from the experience is you. Take the opportunity to visit. I'm glad I went though, in retrospect, I might have enjoyed it even more if I had flown out there.



Guidelines for Riding the Bus

- The OTOW bus service is for the exclusive use of OTOW residents with a valid recreation card.
- This service is provided to our residents at no charge.
- Thank you, but the driver is prohibited from accepting tips.
- The bus driver picks up passengers with reservations only.
- You must be able to transfer on your own to ride the bus.
- Medical devices may be restricted due to passenger load.
- Eating and drinking on the bus is prohibited.
- Shopping bag limits and size restrictions are at the driver's discretion.
- If space allows, residents with current recreation cards may catch a one-way ride home on the bus.
- If you create a safety hazard or cause unsafe distractions to the

- driver, you will not be permitted on the bus.
- Shopping time is 90 minutes and begins at the first drop off.
- Due to limited seating, we cannot accept multi-day reservations.
- Reservations are first come, first served, and may only be made 24 hours in advance.
- The reservation phone number is for seat reservations only. Please leave your name, trip request, building and unit number, and phone number.
- If you live on the second floor of a two-story building, or if your building's elevator is out of service, the driver will carry your bags to your front door. The driver is strictly prohibited from entering your unit.
- The SCA staff takes their directions from SCA management. Please refer all questions and concerns to the Community Service Office.

Cody's Roadhouse was the meeting place for our June luncheon, with nine in attendance. Everyone enjoyed their lunch and conversation.


Our building lunches usually take place on one Saturday each month. We encourage all of you to join us, and if you are new to our building, we would love to meet and get to know you.




