charged, patriotic event. Every veteran should attend a flight in their lifetime. There are two additional flights scheduled for this year: Tuesday, Sept. 12


and Tuesday, Oct. 24. Interested in attending

We will be back on Thursday, Oct. 12, for Southwest Night from 5-8 p.m. in the Auditori-





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General Meeting was productive, provided valuable

General Meeting

The General Meeting for the On Top of the World Condominium Association was held at 11 a.m. on Thursday, June 15, 2023.

Approximately 350 residents attended the meeting in person.

To open the meeting to the greatest number of Association members, the meeting was broadcast live on YouTube and Community TV Channel 901.

We received many written questions beforehand, which helped facilitate a good exchange of information between the Board and members.

The meeting was over in three hours with no break.

The member meeting was chaired by Dessa Barabba. After the Board reports, and Management Company report, the remainder of the meeting was mostly devoted to answering questions submitted by members.

I want to take this opportunity to thank everyone who voted electronically through Conduu, voted in person, or by sending in a proxy on the key question of waiving/not waiving reserves.

Under Florida Statutes, in order to hold a meeting and conduct business, the Association needs a quorum of voting interests. Every vote counted regardless of how you voted!

I'm happy to report that a quorum was obtained before the start of the June 15 meeting, as nearly 2,711 members submitted their proxies or voted electronically in advance of the meeting.

Residents once again affirmed, by 54 percent of all voting interests cast, the choice to waive the establishment of reserves for replacement of elevators, roofs, paving and painting.

Your Board believes this is a wise decision because, through proper planning and budgeting, your Board has been able to stay ahead of the maintenance and replacement costs for community infrastructure.

The Board unanimously voted to approve a budget based on the members' vote to waive reserves for the 2023-24 fiscal year. As an alternative to funding reserves, this year's adopted operating budget includes the current fiscal year's operating expenses for maintenance and repairs for elevators, paving, roofing and painting.

The Board joins me in extending special thanks to member volunteers Frank and Renee Ingrassia, Thomas and Barbara Jamrozy, Ray and Trudy Willis, Thomas and Vicky Portsmouth, Maureen Bjorgo, Mark Blair, Theresa McAllister, Roger Nicoll, Mary Ann O'Neil, Suzie Trost and Mary Lou Wall, who



verbal abuse from one speaker, which was a new low.

During the Management Company's report, the Community Manager gave a detailed overview of exactly how the Management Company works for members in the management of daily community operation. During the presentation said member heckled the Community Manager rather than listen and learn. Ms. Barabba successfully manages a community we all love to live at and deserves our respect.

Dessa Barabba gave a comprehensive overview of Management Company operations, and of the status of recreation, building, grounds maintenance and construction activities over the past 12 months.

To recap, the year-to-date, includes:

• Four building roofing systems were replaced in their entirety. New gutter systems accompanied all of the new roof system installations as well as bringing the roofs up to the current wind code.

 Two building elevators had equipment modifications installed and their cabs completely remodeled with new lighting enhancements. Ms. Barabba pointed out the additional costs for elevator services should a third-party vendor be used instead of the actual costs budgeted by the Management Company for elevator maintenance and service. Using an outside third-party vendor would have cost the Association an additional \$20,000 per month for the 81 elevators, plus a \$400 service fee for a minimum of two hours.

· Recently the Management Company completed 22 door lock monitors, required by code compliance. Had this work been outsourced, the Association would have been charged over \$400,000.

· Four buildings had their front elevations repainted, while nine back elevations were waterproofed.

· Nine structures had their walkway and/or stairwell railings replaced with new, building code compliant systems.

• Ten buildings received new slip-resis-

problems with package delivery, this simple step can also prevent a problem from ever happening.

The Board approved the installation of these units and directed the Management Company to coordinate the installation with Amazon.

Senate Bill 154

Kenneth Colen asked Association Attorney Barrie Buenaventura to address the proposed contract for ESi Threshold Structural Inspections as mandated by SB154 and to give a recap of recently adopted condominium legislation relating to mandated structural inspections as well as the mandated reserve study.

Long story short, all condominiums (three-stories and greater) must now have an initial structural milestone inspection by December 2024, and every 10 years thereafter.

The Law (SB154) also requires the establishment of a "Structural Integrity Reserve Study (SIRS)" be undertaken prior to December 2024. This study will determine estimated replacement cost and deferred maintenance expense for all components mandated under SB154.

Budget

While the last couple of years have brought unprecedented challenges for the community, I remain proud of the progress made toward making OTOW-Clearwater an even better place to live. As we enter a new fiscal year, I am optimistic for the future of our community and excited to see what lies ahead.

Treasurer Guy Woolbright walked the meeting attendees through the proposed 2023-24 Fiscal Year Budget, specifically answering all the written questions submitted prior to the meeting. Having the questions submitted in advance of the meeting was very helpful.

The adopted budget, as well as all building budgets, will be posted to OTOWClearwaterInfo.com.

Fertilizer

Fertilizer, when applied sparingly, is wonderful stuff to help plants grow. However, too much fertilizer can become quite a pollutant - which brings me to the topic of bulk cable and the "fertilizer" being spread around the community by a minority of very vocal residents.

Case in point: A resident recently called the Accounts Payable office to ask "how much money board members were making on the Summit Broadband deal."

Horse fertilizer!

It's disappointing that anyone would believe such foolishness much less spread such misinformation.

ciation has benefitted from very competitive insurance markets, with annual policy cost increases in the single percentage points.

This current renewal pointed out that global insurance markets are returning to a hard market (nationally and globally) as the capacity has left the market. He noted the cost of insurance litigation has reached the point that insurers spend more on litigation than actual property damage pay-outs.

The event deductible is the same as in the prior year's policy: \$10,000 deductible per non-wind storm occurrence, however, the wind storm deductible continues at 5 percent of the stated value subject to \$250,000 minimum for named wind storm.

The Association policy covers property from the interior drywall out, but does not cover finished surfaces, fixtures, cabinetry or other installations within a condo unit, nor the A/C unit within the limits of the condo.

Condo owners are directed to purchase a personal policy for portions of their condo not covered by the Association, as well as personal belongings "HO-6" policy.

In the case of a destroyed building due to a fire, the HO-6 policy pays the unit owner for new flooring, kitchen appliances, furniture, and it may even pay for living somewhere else while the unit is being repaired.

The HO-6 policy should have personal liability, loss of use, and loss assessment coverage bundled in with it.

Guy Woolbright discussed the NOAA and insurance underwriter forecasts for the current hurricane season. To recap, NOAA predicts:

12-17 named storms 5-9 being hurricanes 1-4 being major hurricanes

This is a little better than last year's prediction. Regardless of predictions, it takes a single large storm to wreak havoc across a wide area.

The FEMA Flood Zone maps were last updated 2019-20 and no OTOW condominium building falls within a zone of high flood probability.

That said, avoid driving on the roads after a major storm event as some roadways within OTOW may be flooded after ponds breach their banks.

Wind Mitigation

Your Association continues to receive numerous requests for Wind Mitigation Certificates. This is a document that states whether or

constituted the ballot and proxy counting committee, runners, door greeters, as well as Diane Like, who was the official timer.

The question was asked, "What is the difference between reserves and no reserves?"

The answer is an additional \$4.6 million added into the Association's operating budget.

Looking at it another way, your monthly community services fee (CSF) would have increased by approximately \$77 per month if full reserves were funded!

In an effort by the Board to provide more transparency of Association matters and detailed information to residents, the full meeting agenda was published on the community information website, www.OTOWClearwaterInfo.com under the Association Meetings tab. The information posted there provides a very detailed look at each order of business to be considered by the Board.

Besides the agenda, financial information is also posted in a format that can be easily understood by non-financial oriented residents. Generally, this website is kept up to date with current information.

Additionally, residents submitted requests to speak to each agenda item at the meeting. Your Board appreciates everyone who took the time to review the meeting agenda and speak on the individual items.

Overall, most residents who attended the meeting and/or spoke were respectful and provided valuable insight to the Board.

However, I believe I have to address those who were not acting with the betterment of the community in mind. One member went off on a very conspiratorial rant about the Chairman and Treasurer, and then announced her candidacy for the Board. Another speaker appeared in costume as a viking, to what end I could not really tell. Such attention grabbing antics distract from the purpose of the meeting and insult the general membership.

Community Manager Dessa Barabba gracefully endured extremely inappropriate tant walkway coatings on the second and third floor balcony walking surfaces.

 Seventeen buildings had new slip-resistant stair tread coatings applied on exterior stairwell locations.

 Sixteen buildings had the main sanitary stacks water-jet cleaned (project is nearing completion as of this update).

• Roughly two-thirds of the east side of property's gravity sanitary system has been inspected for operational integrity. This project is ongoing.

· Two buildings had end stairwell ornamental features either removed or had rehabilitation work performed to ensure their safety.

Email Glitch

Prior to the General Meeting, the Association learned that both Associationinfo@ otowfl.net and clearwaterinfo@otowfl.net addresses were able to receive emails from gmail accounts, however, the Association was unable to respond to them as the emails bounced back.

The Association has learned that the technical glitch has been fixed and the problem was related to an authentication error that gmail did not recognize either Associationinfo@otowfl.net or Cleawaterinfo@ otowfl.net email addresses which are hosted on the GoDaddy website.

Amazon Lockers

Ms. Barabba explained an Amazon secure locker project proposal to be installed in building center core areas.

There is no cost to the Association for this service if left in place for one year.

Residents not wishing to use the secure lockers can opt out of that use.

Generally, the idea behind the installation of the lockers is to thwart "door-step thieves" and provide better privacy to residents. It has become popular to use the Amazon pharmacy to save money on prescriptions

While I am unaware that there have been

the Association.

The Association is responsible for the collection of expenses related to the services provided and for payment to Summit Broadband of their earned fees.

To date, no payments for video services have been made to Summit Broadband by the Association, because of Summit Broadband's failure to provide consistent and reliable service.

Fees collected by the Association have been placed in a money market account belonging to the Association. If Summit Broadband can finally repair their service delivery problem, those funds are available to pay Summit Broadband for their service and relieve members of further service costs for much of the coming fiscal year.

The untenable situation with Summit Broadband and the current status was reviewed. The original plan voted on by a very high margin of members (63 percent) was to engage a capable and financially stable provider capable of providing both high-speed internet and video programming via fiber to the home.

Many members would realize a savings in costs with the switch to the bulk service.

For reasons beyond the Board's control, the chosen provider, Summit Broadband, has failed miserably in delivering on their contracted services.

As of this writing, Summit Broadband continues in default of their contract in the view of the Board. They have been afforded a time to cure the many problems that are seemingly of their own making.

Additional updates will be forthcoming as the matter evolves toward either resolution of problems or contract termination and all that entails.

Insurance Updates

At the General Meeting, Treasurer Guy Woolbright explained the policy renewal insurance coverage for the Association.

In the past number of years, the Asso-

not certain components of a structure comply with the 2017 Standard Building Code.

Because of the volume of requests, a form for each and every building address has been posted on otowclearwaterinfo.com. Simply open the website, click on the "General Information" tab and follow the link to the Wind Mitigation forms.

You, or your insurance agent, will need to enter in the name of the insured and the unit number. Otherwise, the form should be good to go.

In the event the Association is requested to fill out a different form, or for some reason must become involved in the process of dealing with your insurance agent, there is a minimum charge of \$15 payable in advance.

All of the buildings with roof replacements in 2021 to present should have an updated wind mitigation form on the website by July. They are all accessible by visiting www.otowclearwaterinfo.com. Click on General Information and then scroll down to Wind Mitigation Forms.

General Meeting Questions

Questions submitted prior to the start of the meeting were reviewed. Overall, there is a high degree of satisfaction with the community and what it offers. The comments from residents were insightful and provide some direction on future community improvement projects.

I thanked all the members who opted in to use digital voting as an alternative to paper ballots and reminded members that email addresses remain confidential and will not be used for any purpose other than voting by any vendor.

Landscape and **Architectural Controls**

Community Rules provide for the Association to exercise architectural control over the buildings and other common elements.

Inasmuch, it is your Association's re- uled for the month of July. sponsibility to provide for the continuous maintenance of the buildings, components, grounds, roadways, sidewalks, and the underground infrastructure (collectively called "common elements").

It is the Association that must have final say over any architectural or structural modifications in addition to making sure that contractors performing the work are properly licensed and insured.

Please remember that any building or landscape modification must receive prior approval from the Condominium Association. I am mentioning this in the hopes that we can all avoid unnecessary consequences of non-compliance with the rules and regulations of your Association.

You may obtain an application for modification from the Community Service Office or online at otowclearwaterinfo.com. Click the Inspection Services Department tab. Return the application with a detailed description of the work requested and a dimensioned drawing of the affected area. A representative of the Association will review the modification and advise the owner of approval or denial. Inspection of completed work is upon completion of the project.

Community Update Painting/Waterproofing

July's schedule for coating improvements will see the contractor return to working on the front facades of structures with Buildings 42 and 45 upcoming next.

As always, please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating in close proximity to parking areas and front/rear porches which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or property.

Thank you for your cooperation in advance and keep in mind that inclement weather can affect start and completion dates.

Recurring Reminders for All Community Residents

On March 1, 2023, the Management Company recommenced its enforcement efforts by removing all unapproved items placed in building common areas. This includes, but is not limited to, plants (live or artificial), personal items, non-exterior rated furniture, rusted chairs/tables or in disrepair, tchotchkes, etcetera, as these items are not permitted to occupy common spaces.

As has been referenced in the newspaper, on the community TV channel, and the bulletin boards posted in all building center core lobbies, these items will be removed and disposed of without further notice.

These ongoing efforts help keep the areas safe for first responders as well as maintain an aesthetically pleasing community for all to reside in.

We ask that residents help keep the community's common areas in compliance by reporting violations of this nature to the Management Company.

We appreciate the community's cooperation and support in reporting any violations of this nature so the Management Company can investigate and correct if necessary.

The Management Company would also like to thank the residents who live on the second and third floors for their cooperation in making the On Top of the World community a safer and more-aesthetically pleasing place to live by removing their floor mats from these common area.

The community's response for compliance was astounding, as has been the feedback regarding these efforts. Once again, thank you for your support in this undertaking.

Now that the notification and compliance piece has been completed, the Management Company will continue the ongoing compliance enforcement of these common areas where the mats were once located, as well as re-painting areas that could not be cleaned to community standards.

As a reminder to all residents, and in keeping with condominium rules governing common areas, any floor mats placed in the second or third floor balcony walkways, or center core areas, will be removed without any further notification. Please assist us in keeping these walkway areas clear while making your community a safer and more beautiful place to live.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services Team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle.

This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hangar brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future.

Inspection services representatives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproofing coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied. If for some reason you were not at home when this work took place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit by the coatings vendor.

We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a success across the community.

First floor unit owners will continue

receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department as the Management Company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The Management Company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas. Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the Condominium Association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Many times decorative rocks or landscaping are installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator.

Please, always apply for approval before you install.


Inspection efforts continue to be focused on the tagging and removal of portable barbeque grills, be it propane, charcoal, or electric, which are not permitted in any building common areas as they pose a fire risk to the structure and residents.

Only grills meeting approved Clearwater Fire Department standard are permitted on the patios of first floor units. If you're a first floor unit owner and not sure if your grill is in compliance, please stop by the Community Service Office to request a visit from our friendly Inspections Services staff.

The Management Company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the Community Service Office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard. Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt, water softeners are permissible in the community.

Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the Management Company.

Get acquainted with OTOW's rules for using generators.

- 7. Recharge cell phone batteries and use only when necessary.
- 8. If you are evacuating, tell people where you are evacuating to and leave you contact information with different people.
- Bring lawn furniture and outdoor decorations indoors.
- 10. Make sure you have a first-aid kit, including bandages and ointments.
- 11. Make sure important documents are safely stored.
- 12. Don't forget rain gear, blankets and home entertainment. Don't panic, but you may not have internet service for days.

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Starting July 10, Fitness Center, swimming pools and Learning Lab will require new Access Card

With a focus on safety and enjoyment at three Card. of the most popular amenities offered at On Top of the World, a new electronic Access Card will be required to enter the Fitness Center, the East and West Activity Center swimming pools and the West Activity Center Learning Lab beginning July 10.

Entry to the Fitness Center has already required an access card for several years, but due to technology changes, the new scanning system will not be compatible with the current card.

The renewal of activity cards for the 2023-2024 fiscal year began in June for owners and residents. This was also the first day the new Access Card was issued.

To renew your activity card, obtain a new activity card, and to receive the new Access Card, please visit the Community Service Office Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. (closed from noon to 12:30 p.m. for lunch).

The Community Service Office also will be open on Saturday, July 15, from 8 a.m. to noon, if you are unable to visit during regular business hours.

If you already have an access card for the Fitness Center, you will receive the new Access Card (at no cost to you) when you renew your activity card.

You will continue to use your current access card to gain entry to the Fitness Center until the new scan reader is installed on July 10.

If you do not have the current Fitness Center access card, you may still obtain the new Access Card. There will be a one-time fee of \$7. You must still have a valid activity card in place to get the new Access

Please note, your current Fitness Center access card will not work at the Fitness Center, at the Learning Lab or at either swimming pool after the new scan readers are initiated on July 10.

The new Access Card will look very similar to the current access card, but there will be an identifier added to the new card to distinguish the difference.

For Association approved tenants, your activity card is valid for your approved lease term so renewal may not be required during the month of June.

To renew or acquire an activity card, or obtain an Access Card, you must bring a valid, government issued photo ID, a recent piece of mail showing your name and OTOW address, and your most recently issued activity card (if applicable) to the Community Service Office.

There is no fee for renewals, however, if your activity card has expired (all fiscal years have been punched at the bottom), a new activity card is required and the fee is \$3.

If your issued activity card is lost, damaged, or stolen, there is a \$25 charge for a replacement.

To expedite the process, you may complete the Waiver of Liability Form located on the official On Top of the World website: otowclearwaterinfo. com. Select "Community Services" then "Waiver Form." Please fill out the form prior to visiting the Community Service Office. This form will be required for activity card renewals or access cards.

If preferred, you may obtain a copy of the form from the Community Service Office.

In November we return to the Dunedin Golf and Country Club for a special threecourse meal with beautiful views of the golf course. Come to eat and then stay awhile for the view.


The year ends with a three-day, twonight bus trip to Saint Augustine where we will stay in a beach-front hotel. At night we are taking the famous holiday lights tour.

For the donor: Platelet donations are done through a process called automation, which allows us to take only platelets and not red blood cells or plasma. Therefore, there are fewer side-effects and a faster recovery.

The platelet donation process does take longer than giving whole blood - approximately 60- 90 minutes on average.

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

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Getting legal advice is one thing following through is another thing

Scam Alert: Well, you've paid your taxes by now, or maybe you didn't have to pay. Either way, the months of May, June and July (plus all months) are opportunities for scammers to place spoof calls.

A spoof call is when the scammer is able to call your phone, but make your caller ID appear to show a valid company or agency that is calling.

The IRS has been warning of spoof calls where the caller appears to be from the Taxpayer Advocate Service (TAS), which is an independent organization but within the IRS.

Sometimes it's a robocall and other times it's a real voice.

If you should speak to a real person, he or she will happily give you a "badge number." The caller might even have the last four digits of your social security number or have other personal information about you.

Don't be fooled!

Whatever the call is, you must always keep in mind that the IRS never calls you to demand immediate payment. Nor does the IRS ever call you and demand payment from a credit card or ask you to give your credit card numbers to the caller.



Simple thing to do: NEVER provide credit card numbers, social security numbers, bank account numbers, your name, address or phone numbers to anyone on the phone.

Don't try to talk to these people. The longer they keep you on the phone, the more likely you will make a mistake and provide them with personal information.

Please, just hang up.

Scam Alert

Many of us use Facebook as a way to connect with friends, relatives or just the outside world. There are many different and interesting Facebook pages to which we can subscribe for special interests, hobbies and news reports.

The list goes on and on.

However, as with all social media, scamers are lurking and waiting to harm you.

Facebook warns of several scams. Here are a few of the worst of the worst:

(1) Romance scams, where the scammer tricks you into communicating with him/her and gets your trust and confidence and then asks for money.

(2) Requests for money so you can receive a gift card, a prize or a loan.

(3) A request for an advance fee to obtain a job.

(4) Folks who claim to represent large companies, but with no verification as to

(5) So and so is a friend or relative with an emergency that always ends up with a request for money.

(6) You are asked to move your chat to a "secure" or "private" email location.

Folks, it takes courage to refuse to send money to someone you think is a friend. And it takes courage to realize that the guy or gal who claims to love you or need you, whether you've met them or not, is really a thief who is trying to steal your money.

Q. My mother signed her trust about eight years ago in a (western) state. We have a letter from her attorney that a trust will avoid probate in any state.

About three years ago, my mom moved to Florida. She recently passed. Her home was here (in Florida), where she had the exemption. She was told that she didn't need a lawyer here because everything was already taken care of in the trust. She had brokerage accounts and bank accounts and also a home in (the western state) she did not get around to selling. All of her assets were in her name, which she and my sisters believed was fine because she had a trust.

Now, I was told that her estate both in Florida and in (the western state) have to go through probate. This isn't her fault, so why should that be, since she had a trust for which, by the way, she paid a bunch of money?

Since she had a trust, there should not be any probate.

Is this how Florida treats folks? I am mad about this.

A. It's pretty simple really. Obviously, everything was not taken

care of, and she did need a Florida attorney. She probably had a wonderfully drafted trust, filled with all sorts of important provisions. However, apparently, she never had her assets transferred from her own ownership and into the trust-ownership.

So, now there's a probate needed.

Whose fault, is it?

I have no idea.

However, somewhere along the way, she either got no advice, or bad advice, or good advice that she never followed through and thus did not complete the work needed to make her trust worth what she paid for it.

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
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

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

Computer Club members share first-hand experiences of near-scamming attempts

The On Top of the World Computer Club recently discussed many ways that seniors are falling prey to online scammers.

Several club members shared personal experiences with scam attempts.

Thankfully, most of them had the foresight not to fall victim to the fraudulent presentation.

Here are three of the more common scams we discussed. Keep in mind, scammers are very creative and there are a lot more out there.

1. Telephone scams - the caller represents himself as a bank employee, law enforcement officer, IRS agent and so on.

The caller requests personal information, including bank account numbers, claiming there has been a hack, a fraudelent charge to a credit card and other things.

Scam callers always sound very professional while soliciting bank account numbers, dates of birth and other personal information.

In a case involving one of our own club members, the resident did not accept the caller's presentation and immediately hung up. Good lesson to learn.

2. Email scams - one of our club members received an email that appeared to be from a reputable company.

(In past cases, popular fraudulent senders included, but were not limited to Geek Squad, PayPal, IRS, various banking institutions, vacation companies, and so on.)

Our club member remembered one of the discussions at a recent Computer Club meeting and did not open the email.

Even if you open a suspicious email, never follow the instructions contained therein.

3. Text message scams - is one of the fastest growing scams currently being observed.

One of our club member received a text message from what appeared to be a repu-



table company, requesting the recipient click on a link in the text to proceed with some kind of financial investigation.

Again, the club member remembered information presented a recent club meeting where this kind of scam was discussed.

The resident, thankfully, did not click on the link as requested in the text message.

These are just a few of the scams the Computer Club discusses on a routine basis, so that club members do not fall prey to these scammers.

Scams present themselves in a myriad of forms and you need to be aware of them.

The Computer Club suggests some simple actions that residents can take to prevent falling victims to these scams.

1. Telephone Scams - with most people having cell phones or caller ID on their home phones, if you do not recognize the caller, don't answer the phone.

If it is a legitimate caller, that person will leave a message.

If the caller does leave a message concerning calling back to verify any personal or financial information, do not call the number

provided.

If you do answer the phone and are presented with suspect information, hang up immediately without saying a word.

2. Email scams – if you do not recognize the sender, delete the email without opening it.

If you do open the email, do not follow any of the directions requesting any information. Instead, delete the email or report it as either junk or phishing (a relatively new term used to identify fraudulent requests used to solicit personal information).

3. Text message scams - Block the sender without clicking on any links contained therein and delete the message.

In conclusion, scammers are responsible for senior citizens being scammed out of billions of dollars every year. The suggestions presented in this article are just that, suggestions. They will not guarantee that you will not fall victim to a scam.

Recently, the popular television show 60 Minutes did a very informative report on senior citizen scam victimization. The Computer Club strongly suggests that everyone who reads this article watch this show and share it with your friends and family members.

The simple way to find the show is to go to the search engine in your computer, tablet or cell phone and type:

Cyber scammers target parents, grandparents for digital theft | 60 Minutes.

You can also view the show electronically on the OTOW Box Office website (otowboxoffice.com) - simply look for the picture link shown above, click and watch. You will automatically be directed to the 60 Minutes show.



Have you heard about the programs that students are using to write term papers?

Is it cheating?

Writer's Ink writers decided to learn more about it.

In November 2022, a company called OPEN AI launched a powerful advanced chatbot named ChatGPT. It was so successful that it gathered more than 100 million users within the first two months. That beat TikTok's record of nine months for the same number of users!

"Chat" refers to chatbot, the kind of conversational robot that can answer questions.

"GPT" refers to Generative Pre-Trained Transformer. You can Google what that means to get a thorough explanation.

Briefly, these programs use vast sources of data to synthesize and transform raw data into natural human language results.

Just imagine Siri, Cortana or Alexa on steroids.

ChatGPT has a library of templates to help the user make requests to the system. Pick the template that matches your purpose and you are off and running, no training



necessary.

In the experiment at right, the template is bolded and you can see the request as I filled in the blanks:

Notice that ChatGPT claims to ensure proper English grammar, however, in this example, the grammar has problems. The description of creativity's frequency is questionable and the quote seems out of place.

I tried several iterations using the same template and adjusting words in the request fields. The outputs were varied. I finally went with my own approach but could just as eas**Introductory Paragraph Template**

There are local bands, food and merchandise vendors, and several sections of the road are blocked for people to walk.



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French class has been very successful in its first season - learning to sing is very helpful

Since the French Language and Culture Society's initiation and first session, which began on April 6, our group has come a long way in so short a time.

Personally, I had no idea that our community members would have such an interest in the French language as well as French culture, but I knew they would always have a soft heart for French wine and French cuisine.

I use a different instruction method than what is common in most schools. We start with a short introduction with the mission of the sessions, then with a moment of humor.

Someone will tell a joke or I shall tell a joke and that gets the class laughing and ready to carry on.

The joke is usually about situations in France or difficulties facing Americans in France or Québec.

For example, the name of a French professor is Monsieur Bellemare. He always tells his students to pronounce his last name as Monsieur "Bellmaar" not "Belle-mère" (which in English means mother-in law).

So the professor emphasizes in each first class: "I am not anyone's mother-in-law!"

Then we go to learn basic words and vocabulary for shopping, going to a restaurant, renting a car, French wines, and French cooking.

Recently we had a professional speaker, Madame Joan Galante, who presented our group with proper instructions on how to make a good Quiche Lorraine.

Our participants were really enthralled with her knowledge of French cuisine and her detailed explanations.

The third part of our session is when one of the participants gives a 10 minute talk on a French subject in French and English, or just in English.

We have already had speakers of the society talking about their experiences in France or with French people.

This was important since their encounters were always positive instead of negative.

There is so much to talk about when it comes to French culture.

Some people do not know that France is America's first and longest ally.

The French gave us the Statue of Liberty and the Americans helped them in turn free their country during the two world wars.

During our class there's a 5-10 minute showing of a French film. These film extracts are often followed by singing French songs such as "Alouette, gentille alouette," "Sur le pont d'Avignon," "Joyeuse anniversaire (Happy Birthday)" and "La mer."


It's 90 degrees outside stay cool indoors with us!

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

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
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Italian culinary traditions are famous around the world

Aromatic sauces can often be assembled in the time it takes pasta to boil.


The Italian diet, which is high in vegetables and carbohydrates, and low in animal fat, is a healthy one.

It also tastes exceptionally good.

The many regions of Italy contribute to a rich culinary tradition that is one of the most popular in the world - from the colorful dishes of Venice, through the hearty Tuscan dishes at the heart of Italy, to the fish and seafood of Sicily.

Each region has its own specialty, but each is based on the use of fresh local ingredients to create flavorful dishes.

Delicate cheeses, aromatic herbs, homemade sausages and cured meats, and a wide range of fresh vegetables combine to create a national cuisine rich in variety and character.



Slice of Tenderloin with Balsamic Vinegar

This quick and simple dish always makes a great impression, even for an elegant dinner party

Ingredients

2 tablespoons butter 4 slices of beef tenderloin 5 ounces each salt and pepper 1 shallot, finely chopped 1/2 cup balsamic vinegar 1 tablespoon cornstarch

Cod Meuniere

The delicate flavor of Cod makes it one of the most highly prized of all fish.

Directions

Melt the butter in a skillet over high heat. When it is foaming, add the shallot and then the meat. Cook for about 4 minutes each side. Pour in the balsamic vinegar and season with salt and pepper. Cook for 1-2 minutes more. Set the meat aside in a warm oven. Return the cooking juices to the heat until they foam, then stir in the cornstarch. Pour the sauce over the meat and serve hot with a green salad.

Spaghetti with Garlic and Oil

This is one of the simplest and most satisfying pasta dishes of all.

Ingredients

1 pound spaghetti 3 cloves garlic, chopped 6 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil 4 tablespoons fresh parsley

Directions

Drop the spaghetti into a large pot of boiling salt water.

In a large skillet, heat the oil and gently sauté the garlic until it is barely golden. Do not let it brown or it will taste bitter. Stir in the parsley. Season with salt and pepper. Remove from the heat until the pasta is ready.

Drain the pasta when it is barely al dente. Pour the spaghetti into the skillet with the oil and garlic, and cook together for 2-3 minutes, stirring well to coat the spaghetti with the sauce. Serve at once with the grated Parmesan cheese.

Simple Tomato Sauce

Oil-based tomato sauce goes well with all dried, hard-wheat pasta, such as spaghetti, penne, bucatini and fusilli. It is also good with spinach and whole wheat pasta.

Ingredients

- 3 garlic cloves finely chopped2 tablespoons fresh basil leaves, torn1 small onion chopped2 stalk celery
- 4 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil 1 28 ounces can chopped tomatoes 2 carrots chopped

Directions

Combine the olive oil, garlic, onion, carrots in a large skillet and sauté over medium heat until the vegetables are soft. Add the basil and tomatoes. Season with salt and pepper, simmer for about 15-20 minutes, or until the oil begins to separate from the tomatoes.

Ingredients

4 pieces, 8 ounces Cod
1 cup of all-purpose flour
4 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil salt and white pepper
juice of 2 lemons
1/2 cup dry white wine
1 tablespoon parsley, finely chopped

Directions

Lightly flour the cod just before cooking. Melt the butter with the oil in a large skillet and fry the cod for 3-4 minutes each side, turning them carefully twice.

Season lightly with salt and pepper.

Moisten with the lemon juice and wine and cook for another four minutes.

Turn the cod in the sauce and sprinkle with the parsley. Place on a preheated serving platter.

Pour the pan juices over the top and serve with boiled peas sautéed in garlic and parsley

Pasta with Coppa and Eggs

Ingredients

2 tablespoons butter 2 eggs, lightly beaten 4 ounces coppa, cut into 2 inch matchsticks 1 pound pasta 1 cup freshly grated parmesan

Directions

In a skillet heat the butter and sauté the coppa pieces for 2 minutes, stirring frequently. Remove from the heat and set aside.

Cook the pasta until al dente, then drain and put it in a heated dish. Keep warm. Return the skillet (with the coppa in it) to the heat. Add beaten eggs to the coppa and stir as you would for scrambled eggs. Then pour the egg and coppa mixture onto the pasta at the precise moment when the eggs are beginning to thicken so that they present a slightly granulated appearance without being as thick as scrambled eggs. Stir the pasta mixture with a wooden spoon so that the egg and coppa mixture is evenly distributed, add half the parmesan cheese, and serve immediately with the remaining parmesan cheese separately.`



Kidney beans are as much of a holiday tradition as the Fourth of July holiday itself

This food column comes with a warning! Baked kidney beans are a classic side dish for meat on a Fourth of July gathering.

Beans were one of the three sister plants known to the native Americans who may have provided the Pilgrims with beans. Baked beans have been a staple throughout New England since the time of the Pilgrims, not to mention in the rest of the colonies.

Pilgrims found beans helpful because they could be prepared the night before and served as a "convenience" food on the Sabbath day, which Pilgrims devoted to worship. It is quite likely beans were on the menu for the very first July 4th celebration.

There are several ways to cook baked kidneys and many different recipes.

This column focuses on dried kidney beans. But why fool with dried beans?

Dried beans are less expensive and taste better than canned beans. They have a firmer texture that is superior to mushy canned texture. They can be stored in dried form without losing nutritional value.

There are several ways to flavor kidney beans:

Beans have very little fat so add fat for flavor.

It is tasty to simmer them in a broth or sauce.

Add aromatics such as onions, garlic, and celery.

If you want to give cooked kidney beans a more robust flavor, you can sauté them in oil. This will give them a crispy texture and allow them to absorb the flavors of the oil.

You can also roast cooked kidney beans in the oven. This will give them a nutty flavor and a slightly crunchy texture.

The Health Value

Kidney beans are a good source of protein and fiber. They can be used as a replacement for meat in many recipes.

Beans are high in antioxidants. They contain probiotic strains, as well as a few vitamins and minerals. They are an excellent choice for healthy and nutritious meals.

When dried red kidney beans are not properly cooked, they contain toxic levels of lectin protein which can cause vomiting, diarrhea and gastrointestinal problems for several hours.

Dried red kidney beans are the only beans with sufficient concentration to temporarily harm humans. BUT it's simple to remove the toxic levels of lectin in beans by cooking at boiling temperature. To be safe, scientists recommend 30 minutes at 212 degrees farenheit.

Warning: Don't use a slow cooker for cooking dried kidney beans. It likely won't get hot enough, even on a high setting (1) Studies of slow cooker casseroles demonstrated that the internal temperature on a high setting didn't typically exceed 167 degrees.(2)

The Science

Soaking beans overnight is critical. If you have no time for overnight soaking, place them in very hot water and let them soak for four to five hours. When the beans are plump and slightly softened, throw away the soaking water. Soaking beans before cooking them can help reduce the cooking time and it can also help to make them more digestible. Additionally, soaking beans can help remove some of the indigestible sugars that can cause gas and bloating. Soaking breaks down the bean's cell walls and the proteins are dissolved by water inside the bean. As a result, the kidney bean has a softer, more edible texture. The beans will become creamier and more tender.



Tangy "Baked" beans Ingredients

 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt ¹/₂ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce 1 teaspoon mustard powder 1 teaspoon minced garlic 1 tablespoon bourbon (optional)

8 ounces dried kidney beans

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup catsup

¹/₂ cup chopped onions

¹/₄ cup firmly packed light brown sugar

2 tablespoon apple cider vinegar

1 tablespoon yellow mustard

After soaking, rinse and drain.

Place unused ones in a freezer bag, squeeze out the extra air and freeze them for later use. They can be frozen for months for later cooking.

Kidney beans are challenging to tenderize. A couple of tips to help tenderize beans is to add baking soda to the soaking brine. Baking soda also helps tenderize beans by speeding the deterioration of pectin, essential to plant cell structure and strength. Use 1/4 teaspoon per pound of dried beans.

If you're using hard water, this same amount of baking soda offsets the effects of high calcium and magnesium. Beware that too much baking soda can taste like soap, so measure carefully.

- Directions
- 1. Rinse beans and inspect for stones.
- 2. Overnight soak dry beans in a brine of 3-4 cups water, 1 teaspoon each of salt and ¹/₄ teaspoon baking soda.
- 3. Next morning, drain and rinse beans.
- 4. Add 3 cups of water to beans, bring to boil, then cover and simmer for 40 minutes.
- 5. Drain from cooked beans any excess water.
- 6. Mix catsup and remaining ingredients except bourbon.
- 7. Stir in catsup mixture and cover. Simmer for another 30 minutes until slightly thickened.
- 8. Add bourbon when cooking finished.

Serves 3-4

Beans have a long shelf life of extended 2-3 years. Beyond that time, they may become impossibly tough. A teaspoon of baking soda in 3 cups of hot water may tenderize a cup of aged dried beans.

Another possible cause for tough beans is acid. They can react with the starch in the cell and prevent the cell from swelling. This is why even after hours of cooking, the beans remain hard.(3) So, add acidic ingredients only when the beans are tender towards the end of cooking. Otherwise, it will not be possible to fix the hard beans. Acidic ingredients include onions, tomatoes/tomato sauce, wine, vinegar, lemon juice.

More than 10,000 musicians reported joining in from all parts of the United States the first year.


Please note, both the East and West side swimming pools will be open the Fourth of July from 9 am to 7 pm More and more front porch musicians tuned during following years.

And if you don't have an eagle - well - I guess you can proudly display a parrot!



She also enjoys Lenny Segal's and Kathy Ahren's barbeque and karaoke parties and their Christmas extravaganza decorations and celebrations.


What she enjoys most are the people here at OTOW who are not only friendly, but really care about each other and look out for one another.

married for the last eight. They have three sons and four grandchildren, the youngest being just 8 months old.


Bill, a retired junior high school teacher, has a treasured collection of model railroad trains packed away in storage, and enjoys collecting and displaying his assortment of all things Disney.


