### Compliments to the Board for providing residents with valuable information at June 12 meeting

I would like to publicly compliment the current Board of Administration for conducting a very informative Board meeting on June 12. I found it delivered relevant information for the residents.

I will single out Vice Chairman David Kelly for his direct presentation of the budget and how he framed the difficult choices any Board will face.

There was a great deal to consider in adopting a budget for the new fiscal year. I predict this Association will continue to be faced with financial challenges and the need to balance those with the need for affordability of the community.

Voting results were strongly in favor of waiving reserves with 93.9 percent of all valid votes cast voting not to have reserves for fiscal year 2025-2026.

This budget advances additional elevators into the update program.

#### **Elevator Service Transition**

I asked Senior Manager of Parkway Operations Shawn Tobias to explain the elevator emergency communication situation. His response follows:

On Top of the World transitioned away from POTS lines (Plain Old Telephone Lines) for its two-way elevator communication needs many years ago. Since that migration, the experience has been that VOIP (Voice Over Internet Protocol) is overall reliable, but not without periodic connectivity issues.

Brief outages have been reported, but most of them are easily remedied. You may have experienced similar disruption on your home phone/computer

These outages can be caused by problems such as provisioning (signal misdirection) or hardware, to name just

Provisioning appears to be what the Association's telecommunication's provider, Summit Broadband, experienced when the community transitioned elevators to its new monitoring service in late May of this year.

Seventy-six elevator systems came over flawlessly over the course of more than a week's time, but the telecommunications vendor had over a half dozen VOIP lines that would not communicate properly with the destination phone number. This type of communication disruption required that the Management Company shut down service to these elevators in order to comply with State of Florida elevator code.

After six days of intensive troubleshooting and changing multiple origin phone numbers, Summit Broadband was able to resolve all of their connectivity issues with the exception of one, that being the elevator at Building 9.

Incidentally, this is the first elevator in the community that was required to install code-compliant video monitoring in cases where two-way communication, no-response (unresponsive) situ-



ations presented.

Between May 29 and June 10, myself and the Parkway elevator team, worked in tandem with no less than four telecommunication engineering support groups to reach a resolution. Ultimately it took the on-site involvement of a field operations director from Summit Broadband and the elevator hardware manufacturer to arrive at a solution, one that proved to be multifaceted.

On June 11, the elevator at Building 9 was inspected by the State and turned over for use by the community.

The takeaway from all of this is that today's communication technology isn't foolproof. Sometimes it requires indepth troubleshooting in order to reach the intended recipient, unlike the telephones of old where you simply picked up the handset and were miraculously connected to persons on the other end.

I can't help but reflect on the old days with AT&T, where one call got a response. Nothing is so simple any longer.

This program offers great flexibility to view your current account balance, make changes to your address, as well as email address and phone number.

Effective July 1, you will be able to initiate service requests in AppFolio, as

The app also offers access to all relevant Association documents.

#### Hurricane Season is Upon Us

As I noted in the June newspaper, every resident is encouraged to develop their own personal hurricane preparedness plan.

So all procrastinators beware. You may think you have time to get your plan together, but in reality, time is short to fully prepare as things can change very quickly based on recent experience.

That recent experience has shown that any hurricane or tropical storm can still be very disruptive to the Southeast in a big hurry. Not just damage from wind and rain deluge, but also damage from wind-driven rain and penetrating around doors or windows and penetrating through walls.

There is also the possibility of travel disruption should you choose to evacuate the area.

Those residents who chose to shelter in place experienced first-hand the force of back-to-back Category 4 storms.

#### What Can I Expect Post-Storm

After any natural disaster, when it comes to individual service requests, each request is evaluated based on severity and risk to life and property.

The damage is then stabilized, as needed, and resolved at the soonest possible time given all else that may be needing special attention.

It is important that each resident show patience and kindness to each other and to the workers who have left family to rally to the needs of the community.

Storms and protracted electrical outages are periods of high stress. To paraphrase Abraham Lincoln, in challenging times we must look to "the better angels of our nature."

It does not take a storm event to setback scheduled ground maintenance. Really, all it takes is large summer storms to disrupt the schedule.

As you no doubt observe, the lawns and shrubs love the wet, warm weather and respond by doubling their growth. Put the two things together and lawn maintenance crews struggle to keep

#### Time for an Insurance Review

Hurricane season is a call to action for each resident to check in with your insurance agent and make sure the insurance coverage on your unit and contents is adequate.

If you believe you can self-insure any loss, please reconsider because the cost of repair or reconstruction may well exceed the market value of your condominium at the time of an event.

It is the obligation of every owner to

well as track the progress of such re- insure the contents of their unit. Please don't feel you can be "lucky" and go without insurance!

> Contents coverage may vary greatly depending on what you own and choose to insure. While the OTOW Condominium Association insures the building structure, it DOES NOT insure anything of a personal nature owned by a unit owner, including, but not limited to, your furnishings, personal items, floor coverings, appliances, cabinetry, as well as any electrical wiring that services your condominium unit exclusively (the demarcation of association responsibility is the connection to your electrical service panel).

> Your individual insurance coverage on these items listed above would cover this type of loss. In addition, all insurance carriers write an HO6 rider that provides for loss assessment coverage in the event a special assessment for unforeseen casualty losses made by the Association.

> The other critical element of a condominium owner's policy is coverage for Loss of Use should you be unable to occupy your condo following a casualty. This coverage is very inexpensive, but can provide funds for living expenses while you are displaced.

> Experience has shown that recovery to having a habitable dwelling can range from 18 to 24 months. Please consider having the Loss of Use coverage in your HO-6 policy to help cover the cost with rent, living expenses and all that entails for you to live away from your condo for an extended period of

> Why would anyone not want the sense of security that a Loss of Use property rider would provide?

> In the On Top of the World Condominium Association, buildings are insured under a master policy in the name of the Association. The deductible is \$10,000 for any event, per occurrence, including wind/hail related damage. Named storm events carry a separate deductible of 5 percent of the total building value at the time of loss, at each location involved in the loss, subject to a minimum (community wide) deductible of \$250,000 for any one occurrence.

> With respect to flood (rising water), earthquake and flood, resulting from a named storm, all loss, damage, and/or expense arising out of any one occurrence shall be adjusted as one loss and from an amount of each such adjusted loss there is a \$100,000 deductible.

## AppFolio will provide you with personal

#### **AppFolio Information**

Your Management Company will be rolling out AppFolio on July 1, 2025.

You can download the AppFolio application to your personal computer as well as to your mobile device by checking and downloading the app from the App Store or the Google Play Store.

The AppFolio portal gives you the capability to view such things as your current balance due, past payment history, full account ledger, as well as submitting a service request and viewing closed requests.

You will also be able to view shared documents, which include (but are not limited to) your Associations articles of incorporation, bylaws, declarations,

The calendar function is a great addition and will list items such as community events, club activities, or may simply contain community announce-

And finally, you can now update your personal information such as mailing address and/or email address.

Keep your records up-to-date with the most current information and ensure you will receive notifications and mailings from the Association.

By the date of receiving this newspaper, you should have received an invitation to set up your portal. If you haven't set up your portal already, please take the opportunity to do it now as it is a great way to have important information at your fingertips.

Also, moving forward, documents that would normally be posted on the official Clearwater website will now only be posted to AppFolio.

#### **Emergency Suspension** of Services

From time to time, especially during tropical storms/hurricane events, you may find that the Management Company has suspended certain services as a precaution.

The services temporarily interrupted may include elevator, laundry and trash

It is never an easy decision to make, but the safety of the residents and the community guides many of these difficult choices as to when services need to be temporarily suspended.

During tropical storm events, Duke Energy may experience widespread power outages similar to the interruptions that the community experienced during Hurricane Irma in 2017. Outages of that magnitude can take days or weeks to remedy.

During one of these outages, if elevators were not shut down, it would be highly possible that a resident could become entrapped inside.

If wind speeds have exceeded a safe operational threshold, the Management Company suspends elevator services. County and local municipalities also suspend many essential services, including 911 call responses.



If there were an entrapment in an elevator during those conditions, it could be hours before the person could be

Given this possibility, and for your safety, the Management Company acts accordingly by suspending services during such storm conditions.

Power outages are also one of the many reasons laundry services must

Trash service interruptions during tropical storms/hurricanes takes place because of possible storm hazards and to protect the safety of the service provider's employees.

Recognizing that it is simply unsafe to be outside of your unit during extreme weather events like these should make it clear why the Management Company makes the decision to temporarily suspend these services.

#### Maintenance and Service Requests

To ensure the most efficient processing of your maintenance or service request, please submit your request online at: www.otowclearwaterinfo.com/ service-department-request-form/.

If you are unable to access the online system, please call the Community Service Office (CSO) at 727-683-6981 and we will return your call as quickly as we can during normal business hours.

Submitting your request yourself is the only way to ensure that your request has been conveyed correctly and has been received. Please do not rely on neighbors or service requests on your behalf. Once your request is received, a service order will be generated and forwarded to the appropriate department for resolution.

In some instances, we may need to contact you for additional information or clarification regarding your request.

Be sure to provide accurate contact information, detailed information regarding your request, and respond promptly to any inquiries.

Submitting multiple requests for the same issue is unnecessary and may slow down our response time.

If you have questions about your request, please call our Service Request Line at 727-683-698.

Should you see something that needs to be repaired, please report it and don't assume that someone else has reported it. Keep in mind that non-emergency requests are typically addressed in the order in which they are received.

If you are experiencing a life threatening emergency, dial 911 immediately. In the event of a power outage, please contact Duke Energy directly at 800-228-8485.

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is the responsibility of the condo owner, while the Association is responsible for maintaining the structure and common elements.

#### **Upcoming Projects** Painting/Waterproofing

The community's painting contractor will continue working on front façade paint application projects in July with buildings 46, 32, 38 and 40 being next on the schedule.

As always, please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating in close proximity to parking areas and front/rear porches which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or property. Thank you for your cooperation in advance and keep in mind that inclement weather can affect start and completion dates.

#### Construction, Roofing

and Large scope projects Building 14 will be the next structure

to have its walkway and stairwell railings improved with the project slated to begin in late July - early August, pending permitting from Pinellas County.

As with other railing projects, a licensed contractor will affect the complete removal and replacement of the aluminum components on the second and third floor balcony walkways and center core and end stairwells. The improvements are estimated to be completed in 5-7 weeks from the start of the

Notices will be posted in advance of the start date so residents should keep an eye on their bulletin boards for updates. As with all other improvements, please exercise caution in the areas where this work is taking place.

A vendor under contract to the Condominium Association is tentatively scheduled to begin the next fire alarm/ fire recall project in July. Exact dates have not been determined as of this update, but residents in building 96 will see the contractor on-site performing the work required to install the components.

This scope of work is required in advance of elevator improvements scheduled for the upcoming budget cycle. Noise and dust is a normal byproduct of the work, so residents should do their best to avoid active work zones or be prepared for delays in specific areas of the structure until workers can safely halt their activities.

The community's annual elevator inspections are another undertaking that will occur this summer. The management company, in conjunction with an authorized inspection company, will be performing state mandated assessments of all of the property's vertical conveyance equipment. This process traditionally takes a few weeks to complete and guarantees that the equipment meets all of the rigorous requirements that are required to receive certification from the state.

If you do happen to come across an elevator going through the inspection process, please be patient as it is a necessary step to ensure the continued safe operation for the riding public.

#### **Recurring Reminders for** All Community Residents

As a reminder, in 2023 the Management Company recommenced its enforcement efforts by removing all unapproved items placed in building common areas. This includes, but is not limited to, plants (live or artificial), personal items, non-exterior rated furniture, rusted chairs/tables or in disrepair, tchotchkes, etcetera, as these

items are not permitted to occupy common spaces.

As has been referenced in the newspaper, on the community TV channel, and the bulletins posted in all building center core lobbies, these items will be removed and disposed of without fur-

These ongoing efforts help keep the areas safe for first responders as well as maintain an aesthetically pleasing community for all to reside in.

We ask that residents help keep the community's common areas in compliance by reporting violations of this nature to the Management Company. We appreciate the community's cooperation and support in reporting any violations of this nature so the Management Company can investigate and correct if necessary.

The Management Company would also like to thank the residents who live on the second and third floors for their cooperation in making the On Top of the World community a safer and more aesthetically pleasing place to live by removing their floor mats from the common area.

The community's response for compliance was astounding, as has been the feedback regarding these efforts.

Once again, thank you for your support in this undertaking.

Now that the notification and compliance piece has been completed, the Management Company will continue the ongoing compliance enforcement of these common areas where the mats were once located, as well as repainting areas that could not be cleaned to community standards.

As a reminder to all residents and in keeping with condominium rules governing common areas, any floor mats placed in the second or third floor balcony walkways or center core areas will be removed without any further notification. Please assist us in keeping these walkway areas clear while making your community a safer and more beautiful place to live.

#### **Inspection Services Division**

The Inspection Services Team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle. This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hanger brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future.

Inspection Services representatives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproof coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you are not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit from the coating vendor. We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a success across the community.

First floor unit owners will continue receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department as the Management Company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping and have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike.

The Management Company asks if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stones at the earliest convenience.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The Management Company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas. Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Many times, decorative rocks or landscaping are installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you install.

Inspection efforts continue to focus on the tagging and removal of portable barbeque grills, including propane, charcoal, or electric, which are not permitted in any buildings common areas as they pose a fire risk to the structure and residents. Only grills meeting the approved Clearwater Fire Department standard are permitted on the patio of first floor units.

If you're a first-floor unit owner and not sure if your grill complies, please stop by the Community Service Office to request a visit from our friendly Inspections Services staff.

The Management Company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the Community Service Office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard. Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt, water softeners are permissible in the community. Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the Management Company. Thanks for your advanced cooperation.

As a reminder, when signing up for community and emergency alerts, be sure to enter your building number. You can select to receive notifications via text, telephone call, and/or email. You can select one, two, or all three notification options.

#### Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office (CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted. If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is

working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter.

The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled.

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is exclusive to the condo and is the owner's responsibility. The Association's responsibility is to the structure and common elements.

#### What To Do When You Feel Threatened?

Do you know what to do if you find yourself in a situation where you feel threatened? You should contact 911 or if the situation is not an emergency, you can contact the Pinellas County Sheriff's Office non-emergency number at 727-582-6200.

When speaking with the responding deputy, be prepared to provide specific details of statements made and make them aware that you fear for your personal safety.

Remember, there are factors that go into deciding to arrest someone. Each situation is unique and whether a threat is considered credible depends on various factors. A vague or ambiguous statement might not necessarily be considered a credible threat unless it can be backed by actions or other evidence to suggest that there is real intent to do harm.



## PREPARE TODAY FOR A HURRICANE

Don't wait for a bad storm to be hours away.

Don't think, "It will never hit here."

#### Your Pre-Storm Checklist

- 1. Map out an evacuation route and choose a final, fortified destination well-inland. Tell family and friends where you intend to be during a storm. You should have one post-disaster contact one person who is out of the danger zone, who you can contact and who will share your information with other loved ones. You may be short on power so consider limiting your contacts to one person.
- 2. If you stay behind, keep the following in stock: 1 week supply of bottled water and non-perishable foods, refill prescriptions, bottle opener, flashlight and battery operated radio. Do you know where these items are stored? Don't go searching for them as a storm is closing in. Keep tape and cardboard handy should a leak develop.
- 3. Create an inventory of your home. Use photos and videos in case some day you need to replace your items or determine the value of items lost. Special items should be stored away from your home in a safe place. Store important documents in sealable, water proof containers.
- 4. Bring in porch items and anything outside that could become a projectile.
- 5. Fill vehicle with gas. Don't wait until the mad rush starts.
- 6. Don't assume a storm is over. Stay indoors. Please use a flashlight and not candles. Keep refrigerator closed as much as possible.
- 7. Get cash. Money machines could be out for weeks.
- 8. Review your insurance policy once a year to make sure you are covered for a major storm. If you need to file a claim, do so immediately after a storm. Make a list of damaged items. Keep receipts. Be patient.
- 9. The OTOW activity centers are not storm shelters. They will not be open during a storm. If you live on an upper floor or may need assistance after a storm, plan ahead. There are nearby evacuation shelters.
- 10. OTOW will provide weather updates if possible using RAVE, OTOW-TV 901 and the Box Office (otowboxoffice.com).

#### WHEN A STORM HAS PASSED

- A. If you evacuated, do not return home until authorities give you the OK.
- B. Do not go outside. Do not begin cleanup on your own. Let OTOW management personnel remove limbs, wires and all damage.
- C. Do not drive into a flooded road. Turn around don't drown.
- D. Traffic lights may be out. Stop at all intersections where a traffic light is not working. Treat each intersection as a four-way stop.
- E. Do not use sink water until authorities give the OK. Do not eat spoiled food.
- F. Do not wear flipflops outside. Wear sturdy shoes.

## Community overwhelmingly agrees to waive reserves and budget is approved

June was a busy month full of community discussion, especially around the reserves and the budget.

Much of the confusion stemmed from changes to the required reserve amount if they weren't waived.

At a June 5 presentation, board members explained that Parkway Maintenance used their original and time-tested method to develop the reserve amount, but by law, the required amount must be based on the Structural Integrity Reserve Study (SIRS).

When the ballots were counted, the community spoke clearly: The majority did not want reserves, regardless of the cost.

Thank you to everyone who voted — we had a record number of proxies returned!



We also want to thank the number of owners who helped their neighbors understand why they needed to vote. The turnout was beyond expectations.

Finally, thank you to all the owners for being engaged in this important decision. To waive reserves, Florida law required 2,485 votes.

We received 3,188 before the dead-

line:

- 2.875 voted to waive reserves
- 186 voted to have reserves
- 127 were invalid

(An additional 27 came in after the deadline and were not counted.)

Please remember, per Florida law, voting to waive the reserves is required when we approve a budget, so you'll continue to vote on this annually.

We expect to receive an updated SIRS this fall, as mentioned at the June 5 meeting.

The 2025–2026 budget was approved at the June 12 meeting. This was the first year the board was involved from start to finish and there was a learning curve for both the board and Parkway Management & Maintenance

We requested and received additional information to ensure informed

decisions.

The overall budget increased by 5.5 percent and reflected rising costs we're all seeing — at the grocery store, gas pump and beyond.

With nearly 5,000 condos, differing opinions are expected. What we can promise is that we did our homework, reviewed the facts carefully and made choices to keep On Top of the World moving forward.

Now that the budget is complete, the board is turning its attention back to our 2025 goals. We'll share updates next month — stay tuned!

In closing, we'd like to welcome our newest member of the board, Kathleen Cassel, who has worked with Condominium Association Management companies and we looking forward to her joining our team.

Art Guild general meetings have been suspended for the summer until November.





Did you know Medicare turns 60 this month?

July marks the 60th anniversary of Medicare, the nation's largest health insurance program.

Originally signed into law in 1965 by President Lyndon B. Johnson as Title XVIII of the Social Security Act, Medicare officially began on July 1, 1966.

Today it provides essential health coverage to nearly 50 million Americans, including more than 4 million residents in Florida.

Did you know you can apply for Medicare online even if you're not yet ready to claim retirement benefits?

Understanding your Medicare eligibility and knowing when to enroll is crucial. Most individuals become eligible for Medicare at age 65 with a sevenmenth initial enrollment period that begins three months before and ends three months after their 65th birthday.

Missing this window may result in late enrollment penalties and higher monthly premiums.

Many people are unsure of how to navigate their Medicare options. That's where SHINE (Serving Health Insurance Needs of Elders) comes in.

SHINE is a program of the Florida Department of Elder Affairs operated locally through the Area Agency on Aging of Pasco/Pinellas Counties. SHINE offers free, unbiased, one-onone counseling to help individuals understand their Medicare, Medicaid and other health insurance options.

In Pinellas County, where a significant portion of the population is aged 60 and older, SHINE continues to be a vital support system. Each year, the program helps thousands of seniors, retirees, individuals with disabilities, and other Medicare beneficiaries understand their health coverage and make informed decisions.

Additionally, Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) Programs work to empower and support Medicare beneficiaries, families and caregivers in preventing, detecting and reporting suspected health care fraud, errors and abuse through education and outreach.

Individuals seeking assistance can speak with a trained SHINE counselor by calling 1-800-96-ELDER (1-800-963-5337). Appointments are available at local SHINE counseling sites, community enrollment events, or by phone.


#### **Activity Card Renewal**



- Reservations are REQUIRED please call 727-799-3417 Option 7 no later than 10 a.m. the day prior to your planned trip. Monday's trip deadline is 10 a.m. Friday.
   Please be present in the core of your building at your scheduled pick up time.
- 3. Shopping time is one hour for grocery stores and one hour for Walmart. Shopping time begins when you are dropped off at your destination.
- Although appreciated, the driver is prohibited from accepting gifts and tips.
- The driver may not assist you with enterting or exiting the bus, or with your packages.Please do not ask the driver to do so.
- 6. The start time listed is when the shuttle bus departs the Community Service Office. The pick-up schedule will rotate wekly between low and high buildings, meaning one week pick-up will start with lower-numbered buildings and the following week it will start with the higher-numbered buildings.
- 7. Seats are not assigned. They are first-come, first-served.
- 8. Seatbelts must be fastened during bus movement and must remain fastened until the bus comes to a complete stop.
- Eating, drinking, smoking, vaping, fighting, distracting the driver, or any other unacceptable actions at the discretion of the driver are strictly prohibited on the bus. Violation of the above guidelines may result in your bus privileges being revoked.
- 10. All route changes are at the discretion of management.

## Don't let a monthly credit card statement go unnoticed - check for unknown charges

Scam Alert: Sometimes there might be a rather small charge that pops up on your credit card statement. Maybe it's from some company you don't remember, or maybe the small purchase is something your don't remember.

You already know what to do, don't you?

In today's world, you must check your account statements as soon as you get them. If you pay bills online, you must constantly check to make sure you know, for sure, that the charge is valid. It's just the world in which we now live.

Scam Alert: According to the office of the Florida Attorney General, here are a couple of "red flags" that warn you of a data breach, resulting in identity theft:

- (1) Suspicious withdrawals or charges on bank or credit card statements.
- (2) A warning from a bank or a creditor about unusual activity on your account(s).
- (3) A bill for something you don't remember ordering.
- (4) A call from a debt collector about some unknown debt.


There are, of course, many more red flags. The thing to do is what I've been saying over and over and over in this column.

Trust no one.

Check and then check and then check

If someone calls you and demands money, do not talk to the person. Hang up.

And if you are given any notice to call for information about a credit card,



don't call the number in the notice. Call the number on the back of your credit card or the number from a previous bank statement that you had verified before.

We grew up in a world where we could leave the doors unlocked. That world is gone. We must adjust to this one

Q. I know I'm an enabler. My son hasn't worked for quite some time. I've been supporting him. Now, he's asked me to support his live-in girlfriend. She claims that legally, I have to support her because she takes care of him. Your thoughts?

A. I don't have any thoughts for you, and even if I did, you would do what you want whether you agreed with me or not.

The most I can tell you is that from a legal perspective, you have no legal obligation to support your son and certainly no legal obligation to support his girlfriend just because she says she

takes care of him.

Q. I've been quite sick lately, but my doctor says he sees good signs of improvement. Yet, who knows what could happen? My daughter suggested that I deed my apartment to her so that when I get better, she will have it for me, but if I don't get better, she won't have to go through probate to get the title. I'm confused.

A. Yeah, well I'm confused, too.

Perhaps you aren't stating precisely what she means. But, if you are stating what she means, my obvious question is why do you need to deed her your apartment now, so she can have it for you, since you already have it.

The second part about her not having to go through probate could make sense, but you can do that by means of a Ladybird Deed, which is where you keep control of the property as long as you live and only when you pass will she get it.

But, since I wonder about your daughter's true motives, I strongly suggest you contact an attorney and have a conference with him/her.

Q. My boyfriend and I are in our 80s. We were on a cruise (far from the U.S., foreign country,) where he bought some (E D medication). A neighbor said it's illegal. My boyfriend doesn't know what he should do. Your thoughts??

A. I'm confused. Are you saying he bought some E D medicine, but he doesn't know what to do with it?

When all else fails, maybe read the directions?

I don't know what the medication

was, but when you came back, the medicine was not hidden and you were not stopped by U.S. Customs, so it probably isn't illegal to have it.

To be clear though, I think it's always risky to purchase drugs in a foreign country, especially when you could just as well ask your doctor for a prescription for what you need and it won't be illegal for sure.



## That chicken you just bought - it may contain more salt than you can pour out of a salt shaker

The answer? Chicken.

The poultry industry commonly injects chicken carcasses with salt water to artifically inflate their weight, yet the sale item can still be labeled "100 percent natural."

Consumer Reports found that some supermarket chickens were pumped so full of salt that they registered a whopping 850 milligrams of sodium per serving. That could mean more than a full day's worth of sodium in just one chicken breast.

It's not easy avoiding sodium on the Standard American Diet (SAD), since three-quarters of salt comes from processed foods rather than a salt shaker.



It is easy to become addicted to hypersweet and hypersalty.

In most countries studied, processed foods provide only about half of people's sodium intake. In the United States, we consume so much sodium from processed foods that even if we completely stopped adding salt in the kitchen and dining room, we'd still only reduce our salt intake by a small fraction.

In many current documented studies, the more meat, eggs and dairy are minimized in favor of plant foods, the lower the risk of premature death.

On the other hand, the consumption of unhealthy processed plant foods were shown to increase the risk of death overall even if animal product consumption remained low.

Tastes great and helps us live longer, fuller lives?

That is what plant-based eating is all about.







## Fujiwara has a new mural and it is peacefully serene

Imagine if you were able to look through a magic window and be able to see Mt. Fuji in Honshu, Japan, and a culturally-famous torii, where spirits travel in and out from the mundane world to a scared world.

Well, you don't have to imagine the scene anymore. Just stop by the Fujiwara building (30) center core and take a few moments to reflect while viewing its new mural.

As one resident said, "It's peaceful serenity."

Rick Slater, former president of the Art Guild, formally calls this creation "The Grand View." He was the mastermind behind a project that started last fall, survived interference from two hurricanes, two minor floods and tested the patience of residents while some sanding noise took place at times.

But now, the painting above is what every resident sees while passing through the core. The residents say, if you stop for a moment and look, "it will bring you down" from your busy, hectic lifestyle.

You can't just walk by without taking a moment to reflect.

Back in 1996, On Top of the World artist Victor Sutcliffe created the original Fujiwara mural for the center core wall. But over the years, time and weather started to not only deteriorate the painting, but the wall itself.

Rick approached Parkway Management and asked for permission to refurbish the mural. He was awarded the proper permits, put together a team of helpers, and everyone began working on the new mural.

Rick highly respected the work Victor did nearly 30 years ago. Victor was the Art Guild president when he painted his mural. Rick was the Art Guild president last year when he started his mural. There was a mutual respect when the refurbishment started and Rick wanted a piece of Victor's mural to live on in the new mural. This would be the torii. The torii Victor painted in 1996 was preserved in the new version.

"I wanted to seal it in," Rick said. "It was only kind of fitting."

The rest of Rick's inspiration came from a quilt that resident Karen

Tatge made. Rick saw the quilt and said that's our mural.

At first, some residents were not sure that they wanted their mural changed. As work began though, more than \$350 in donations came in. Next came the sanding to fix the damaged wall. Residents were very patient as the noisy sanders did their work.

Next came the hurricanes. At one point there was 5 inches of water on the floor after Helene and then 8 inches of water after Milton. The mural was high enough to avoid water damage, but painting was delayed as it took time for the core to dry.

Rick, who resides in the building, was the primary painter, but many others also added brush strokes.

Over time, people stopped by and chatted with Rick. The project not only was an art challenge, but it also became a social project. Rick said he met many residents from the building he had never met before. And then there were other non-residents who passed by and were friendly.

Finally, "The Grand View" was finished. And while you may not know exactly where building 30 is located, it might be worth your time to find it and stop by for a glimpse.

How many different colors are in the painting? Twenty? Thirty? Too many to count.

Karen, Napolean Grantsaris, Kathy Raubenstine and Julie Awot all helped with the painting. John Fier, Rosemarie Lugg and Michael Hopkins all provided guidance. More than a dozen more people made donations, bought brushes, bought paint and provided advice.

"I am deeply appeciative for their support," Rick said. "They really stepped up. It took some time and some out-of-pocket money to push this through, but we did it."

Asked if he would consider painting a mural for another building, Rick paused to think. He said "one, maybe two" but it would all depend on the culture behind a particular building and the support from residents.

As for now, the sun will always rise in the Fujiwara center core and anyone can stop by to image passing through a torii. Building 30 is on the east side. Look for the unique towers when you are driving by.


#### Recalling days of playing LSU football

Now for golf class.

Getting out of bunkers can be challenging, but with the right techniques, you can do it effectively.

Here are some tips from the United States Golf Association for hitting better bunker shots:

- 1. Club Selection: Choose a lofted club, such as a sand wedge or lob wedge.
- 2. Ball Position: Position the ball slightly forward, closer to your front foot.
- 3. Swing: Hit 1 to 2 inches behind the ball, allowing the sand to do the work. This will create a splash that launches the ball out of the bunker.



In the rare instance you may end up in a sand bunker, this story contains some tips on how to get out with success.

- 4. Footwork: Dig your feet into the sand for a stable base and place more weight on your front foot.
- 5. Open the clubface: Open the clubface slightly to help propel the ball.
  - 6. Backswing: Lengthen your back-

swing to generate more power.

Practice these steps and you'll find yourself getting out of bunkers more easily. Oh, don't forget to rake.







With her varied talents in acting, writing and music, she has participated in numerous projects, including Stevie Wonder's last album.




She is a published author and her music is available on iTunes and ReverbNation.com.

## July 2000

#### World News

July 10 – King Hafez al-Assad ruled Syria from 1970 to 2000. Upon his death, Bashar al-Assad, his son, is confirmed as Syria's leader. Bashar al-Assad made significant political transitions in the Middle Eastern nation deviating from his father's long-standing rule. On Dec. 8, 2024, al-Assad fled to Russia, having lost support from Iran and Russia. Ahmed al-Sharaa, a former Islamist militant with ties to al Qaeda, was leader of the revolt against Assad and subsequently became the interim President of Syria.

#### U.S. Events

The national July 4, 2000, celebration of Independence Day was honored with the gathering of the largest assemblage ever of tall ships and naval vessels. It involved 150 wind-driven tall ships from 50 countries, 40 modern warships and up to 70,000 pleasure craft. Four million spectators watched the stirring event, which ended after dark with a display of some 60,000 fireworks.

#### Florida News

In the largest damage award in U.S. history, a jury in Miami-Dade County ordered the tobacco industry in July 2000 to pay \$144.8 billion in punitive damages to 500,000 sick Florida smokers. It was the largest tort judgment in the history of law. Many predicted it would be the end of Big Tobacco. In May 2003, the Third District Court of Appeals in Florida issued a decision that wiped that judgment off the face of the Earth. It brought to an end one of the most important episodes of American law - the use of huge lawsuits to change a politically powerful industry.

#### Sports

July 8: Venus Williams wins her first career Wimbledon Grand Slam singles title by beating fellow American Lindsay Davenport 6-3, 7-6. Two years later she would go on to achieve the world's No. 1 ranking in singles, holding the top spot for 11 weeks. Williams won seven Grand Slam titles. She is considered one of the greatest tennis players in the history of the sport.

#### Music Contribution

The No. 1 song in the U.S. in July 2000 is "We Will Rock You" by Queen. Brian May, guitarist, had a motivation for "We Will Rock You" when he wrote it in 1977. He wanted to encourage audience participation and, ultimately, have the crowd lead the band. "The 'We Will Rock You' audience participation thing was astonishingly new at the time. Many are now familiar with its stomp, stomp, clap rhythm. The song is a still a popular rallying cry common at opening of football games.

#### OTOW News

The July issue of the OTOW News contained an ad for a new 2000 Malibu V-6, starting from \$14,495. Doesn't that price sound nice? First launched in 1969, the popular family sedan was named for the quiet, affluent California town of the same name. As of 2025, its production will cease as Chevrolet's last sedan in their lineup. Chevrolet is shifting its resources to making more electrical vehicles.


## Emerald Isle has ice cream social to beat the heat





# Can I make a suggestion for the Fourth of July?

Barbecue is a traditional, quintessential part of American culture, especially in the south.

The concept to cook meats in a pit over fire was first introduced to Christopher Columbus by the Taino (indigenous people in the Caribbean islands), and later by the Spanish during the colonization of North America.

Cooking over a fire pit adds a distinctive smoky taste to meat.

Over the years, American barbecues became centered around conventional backyard grills, as well as at restaurants.

Barbecues started to become really popular during the 1950s when grills became inexpensive and commonplace in backyards.

Today, barbecues can be found across the United States and regional cooking styles can be found across the country.

Barbecues are often held on weekends, and also special holiday celebrations, such as Memorial Day and Independence Day.

The popularity of barbecuing began to rise during the 20th century, fueled by advancements in technology and the growing popularity of outdoor cooking. The invention of charcoal grills in the 1950s, popularized by brands like Weber, made backyard barbecues a staple of suburban life. Barbecue became synonymous with leisure and family gatherings.

In addition to its role in the American domestic life, barbecue gained prominence in the restaurant industry. "Barbecue joints" emerged across the country, ranging from small roadside stands to iconic establishments revered for their mastery of the craft.

Competitive barbecue also became a phenomenon with contests like the World Championship in Memphis, which attracts enthusiasts from around the world every year.

Today, barbecue continues to evolve, blending tradition with innovation.

Pit masters experiment with new techniques, flavors and equipment, such as pellet smokers and sous-vide methods.

Chefs also incorporate global flavors like harissa, gochujang and chimichurri into their barbecue.

Moreover, barbecue has become a platform for celebrating diversity and exploring history. Events like Juneteenth cookouts highlights the role of barbecue in African American culture.

There are four major barbecue styles commonly known, Carolina and Memphis, which rely on pork and represent the oldest styles, and Kansas City and Texas, which use beef as well as pork, and represent the latest evolution.

#### Carolina Style

Throughout the Carolinas, barbecue is exclusively pork, which can be either prepared as the entire animal (whole hog) or prepared by the individual cut, typically the shoulder.

Meat is served pulled, shredded, chopped and occasionally sliced. It is cooked with hardwood and or charcoal. It is served with a vinegar-based sauce.

#### Kansas City

Barbecue was introduced to Kansas City by Memphian Henry Perry. Despite these origins, the Kansas City style is characterized by a wide variety in meat, including beef, pork and lamb, a strong emphasis on the sauce.

#### Memphis

Memphis barbecue is primarily ribs, which comes "wet" or dry" and barbecue sandwiches. Wet ribs are brushed with sauce before and after cooking, and dry ribs are seasoned with a dry rub. Barbecue sandwiches in Memphis are typically pulled pork (that is shredded by hand and not chopped with a blade) served on a simple bun and topped with barbecue sauce and coleslaw.

#### Texas

Texas barbecue is unique because it covers different styles that differ region-to-region within the state.

Central, south, west and east Texas all have different approaches to meat prep and cooking. However, when a food is listed as "Texas Style" it usually means that it has been prepared in line with Central Style barbecue.

Central Texas Style is large cuts of meat, like brisket, seasoned with just salt and black pepper, and then cooked low and slow over indirect heat. Hickory and post oak are popular smoking woods.

Brisket is the star of the show. While the cooking style does enjoy pork ribs, beef ribs and pulled pork, these are often served as a platter around the beef centerpiece.

No Texas combo plate is complete without brisket and so it follows that any pit master worth their salt needs to be able to serve up a plate of the meat.





#### Ingredients

- 1 pork loin (4 to 6 pounds)
- 1 can (6 ounces) frozen apple juice
- 1/3 cup apple jelly 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 3 tablespoon apple cider vinegar
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
- 2 tablespoons dried rosemary1 teaspoon sage, crumbled
- 1 teaspoon sage, crumbl 2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper

#### Directions

Set the pork loin in a shallow pan.

Combine all the ingredients in a blender and blend until creamy. Pour the marinade over the pork loin, coating thoroughly. Marinate, covered and chilled for 24 hours.

Discard the marinade. Place the pork loin on indirect grill heat and grill for about four hours or until the internal temperature measures 150 degrees. Or place in a 350 degree oven and bake until internal temperature is 150 degrees. Let it rest for 10 minutes before carving.

#### **Barbecue Pork Loin**

Tom's Homemade Barbecue Sauce Ingredients

- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1 cup white vinegar
- ½ cup water
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 tablespoon molasses
- 1 ½ teaspoons pectin (such as Sure-Jell) 2 teaspoons prepared yellow mustard
- 1 teaspoons prepared yellow
- 1 ½ teaspoons ground black pepper 1 12 teaspoons red pepper flakes
- ½ teaspoon paprika

#### Directions

Blend all the ingredients together in a medium saucepan over medium-low heat. Slowly bring to a boil, stirring continually. Remove from the heat, cool and transfer to airtight containers. Store in the refrigerator.





#### A Fourth of July southern classic - baked penne mac 'n cheese

Calling all foodies.

Cottage cheese is being featured on social media in a variety of creative dishes. Cottage cheese is being celebrated for its high protein, low calorie and creamy mouthfeel. It's easy to consume and affordable while offering enough health benefits to warrant space on your dinner table.

Baked Penne Mac 'n Cheese is a southern classic, timely for summer picnics. It elevates basic mac 'n cheese. Homemade definitely surpasses the uninspired tastes and poor nutritional value of the highly-processed boxed version.

Penne pasta, with its tubular shape and ridges, is a popular alternative to traditional elbow pasta for mac 'n cheese. Penne is a ridged, straight, tube-shaped pasta whereas elbow is a smooth, curved pasta.

The ridges on penne pasta help sauce stick to the surface of the pasta whereas elbow pasta tends to interlock when cooked so the sauce clings to blocks of noodles.

Both penne and elbow pasta are great for saucy dishes.

#### The Science

Evaporated and half-and-half milks are highly concentrated sources of milk



protein micelles — bundles of proteins that can act as powerful emulsifying agents, which help to keep the sauce creamy and smooth.

This is what makes mac 'n cheese southern, whereas a flour roux is more commonly used elsewhere. Plus, a southern version typically includes eggs to help bind. The result is a custard-like base for the pasta.

Cottage cheese has the same function, but it also helps to create a lighter, more nutritious version of mac 'n cheese.

Whole milk cottage cheese generally has more protein and less fat than many other types of cheese, especially harder cheeses like cheddar or parmesan. While cottage cheese contains fat (around 4 percent), it's still significantly lower in saturated fat.

Additionally, cottage cheese introduces a pleasant, slightly tangy flavor.

#### **Nutritional Value**

Mac 'n cheese is a source of protein, but is also high in carbohydrates, calories and fat.

Homemade variations of the dish can lessen the negative health aspects.

For example, this recipe adds spinach to cottage cheese to lower fat values and to add color.

Beginning in the 1970s, Americans were told fat consumption was the primary cause of obesity. In fact, it is now accepted that reasonable fat intake is good for general health and specifically brain health.

#### **Tips**

- · Flexibility: You can prepare baked penne mac 'n cheese the day before. Cover the baking pan and refrigerate. Set on kitchen counter 30 minutes prior to baking to bring to room temperature.
- If you need to reheat, add about eight tablespoons of water over the top, cover and heat for 15-25 minutes.
- Pasta: Make sure to cook it al dente.Fully-cooked pasta won't soak

in milk and cheese properly, leading to excess liquid after baking. Drain (but don't wash) the pasta really well to avoid adding extra moisture.

- · Resting Time: Allow the pasta to rest for at least 15 minutes after baking. This gives it time to thicken up. The cheesy milk mixture is "wet" and as it cooks and rests, it will settle and firm
- · Type of Cheese: Different brands and types of cheese can have varying melting properties. For optimal results, it is crucial to use a high-quality cheese that melts well. Also, some pre-shredded cheese often contains anti-caking agents that might affect the melting process, thus, block cheeses are a better choice although you then have to
- Cheese Incorporation: Ensure that the cheese is evenly distributed in the mixture. Sometimes, if the cheese is not well-mixed or evenly layered, certain parts of the dish may not melt as expected.

# Southern Style Baked Penne Mac 'n Cheese

All ingredients should be at room temperature before starting.

- 1 pound penne macaroni (uncooked)
- 2 large eggs
- 1 (12-ounce) can evaporated milk
- 1½ cup half and half (or whole milk)
- ½ cup chopped peppers, stir-fried 2 cups of fresh spinach, steamed
- 1 (8-ounce) block Monterey Jack cheese shredded
- 1 (8-ounce) block sharp cheddar cheese shredded
- ½ cup cottage cheese, large curd, 4 percent fat
- 1 teaspoons salt
- ½ teaspoon mustard powder
- ½ teaspoon ground black pepper
- ½ teaspoon ground basil
- ½ teaspoon turmeric

1. Preheat oven to 350°F.

Servings: 4-6.

- 2. Bring a large pot of water to a boil. Cook macaroni for 2 two minutes less than package instructions. Drain well and set aside. Let cool.
- 3. Whip eggs in a large bowl until frothy. Add evaporated milk and stir. Pour in half and half and keep stirring until blended well.
- 4. Add shredded cheese and cottage cheese to the mixture, but reserve ½ cup of sharp cheddar and ½ cup of Monterey Jack cheese for later. Then stir in cooked peppers and spinach.
- 5. Gently fold in cooked pasta into the cheesy milk mixture. Season with salt and black pepper, and additional seasonings. Stir until well-coated.
- 6. Spray baking dish with non-stick cooking spray then transfer mac-n-cheese to greased dish. Use a standard size 9 inch by 13 inch baking dish.
- 7. Sprinkle reserved shredded sharp cheddar and Monterey Jack cheese on top of 8. Bake at 350°F uncovered for about 20-30 minutes or until it is golden and bubbly.
- Watch that the surface does not burn. 9. Allow it to sit for 10-15 minutes before serving so that it can settle and thicken.

This past June, the one on the east side bloomed in all of its glory. But as soon as the sun appears, the flower closes and droops.


Healthy plants may produce multiple blooms over several weeks, but only opening for one night.

There was, of course, plenty of super fattening desserts and liquid heaven.


Army Veteran Ed Cichon and his wife, Mary Lou, joined us at the table.

My husband, Howard, and I are coming up on our 50th wedding anniversary this October. We are the proud parents of four adult children and three grandchildren.



# Anonymous flag decorator strikes again at Siboney


Things here at Siboney have been very quiet. We are all busy planning our summer and making sure our air conditioning units are functioning correctly.


The first paragraph in the story stated,
