In return for your donation, you get to choose from the dessert donations plus karaoke music will be provided by disc jokey Jesse Tiamson.


Finally, after an active July and August, there may be some time in September to finally relax.

An elevator is so much more than a box with shiny numbers

Elevator Talk

On Top of the World's Parkway Elevator Division has been a state-licensed provider of maintenance services to the Clearwater community since 2015.

Parkway's licensed elevator mechanics have more than 30 years of technical experience between them.

In any given month, they may perform preventative maintenance, total equipment replacements, troubleshooting, as well as scheduled and emergency repairs. This ensures that when interruptions do occur, the response time, and often the repair time, are by far more expedient than with outside

Additionally, all elevators receive monthly preventative maintenance which equates to 12 times yearly for each one!

Recently, I had the opportunity to sit down and talk with your Management Company's elevator team. I was curious to know some of the everyday challenges they face with any one of the 83 elevators that service the community.

Now, I must share with you that I am somewhat out of my lane when it comes to these types of technical talks, so I was very interested to better understand the day-today challenges and how they reach a resolution to get the elevator back in service as quickly as possible.

Long story short, elevator diagnostics is not an easy process. Often times it involves equipment manufactured by multiple vendors. If a problem is not obvious, a vendor needs to be contacted for additional support.

The process may require using numerous diagnostic steps to resolve. The elevator's main controller (or "brain") may not always provide a specific fault code related to the problem. When this occurs, it may require extensive troubleshooting and technical support phone calls to multiple vendor manufacturers, which may add a few hours to the process of bringing the elevator back

I, for one, would like to take this opportunity to thank our elevator repair crew for their hard work and continued commitment to the community and for keeping our elevator equipment operating reliably and safely. If you could take a few minutes to thank them, I know they would appreciate it.

Community Service Office Saturday Hours

Are you unable to visit the Community Service Office (CSO) during our regular hours of Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to noon or from 12:30-3 p.m.?

For your convenience, the CSO will be open Saturday, June 17, and Saturday, July 15, from 8 a.m. to noon. You may renew your Activity Card or Access Card (Fitness Center), obtain your initial Activity Card or Access Card, inform us of a service-related issue, or ask us a question about our community.

To renew or obtain an Activity Card or an Access Card, please remember to bring a valid photo ID, a piece of mail delivered to you at your OTOW address, and the appro-



priate fee (if any).

Board Duty

One of the duties of the Board is enforcement of the provisions of the Declaration, By-laws, and Association rules.

Enforcement action may only occur on valid Association matters reinforced by factual information. If you are witness to a violation, I encourage you to write to the Association. If a violation is brought to you by a "well meaning" neighbor, please encourage them to document the facts and send the information to the Association.

The Association does not act based on hearsay or rumors. Matters that require action must be documented and supportable for legal follow-up.

The Association requests that when providing information, you provide specific date, time, location and specific description of what you observed. This is especially important when you write regarding possible rule violations.

Driver Courtesy

One-way traffic signs are used to inform motorists that traffic on a street or parking lot entrance is traveling in one direction only.

The one-way traffic sign is a regulatory sign and drivers encountering a one-way sign must travel in the direction that the sign in-

Drivers must not travel in the opposite direction of a one-way sign due to the risk of a head-on collision.

While a crisis may be avoided, the reality is that the consequences can be very real. Not following directional signs can be a dangerous decision that may not only impact the driver involved, but others as well, and the outcome could be life altering.

So, the next time you encounter a oneway sign, please follow the direction, for yourself, as well as others in the community.

Smoking Areas

The community pools, activity centers, dog park and Pavilion areas are non-smoking areas. Smoking is not permitted within 20 feet of either activity center or swimming

The tennis courts, shuffleboard courts, horseshoe pits and lawn bowl areas are also non-smoking venues.

All building elevators are areas within the community where smoking is not per-

"No Smoking" signs cannot be posted

entrances as they are considered open air and therefore not subject to the Florida Clean Indoor Air Act.

Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office (CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30, Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted.

If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter.

The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled.

Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received.

From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request. It is not necessary to report service requests more than once. If you have any questions regarding your request, and until the Community Service Office reopens, please call the Service Request Line at 727-683-6981.

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is exclusive to the unit and is the owner's responsibility. The Association's responsibility is to the structure and common elements.

Please call this number to submit a service request only for a general building matter in the common areas only. Please do not leave health-related emergency information on the service request line.



General Meeting date set for June 15 -

The On Top of the World General Meeting date has been changed from June 9 to June 15 allowing the Board and Management Company time to understand if any legislative changes would impact the upcoming fiscal year operating budget.

There were numerous changes in Senate Bill 154 (SB 154) – the legislature's "glitch fix" bill, which addressed problems created by last year's Senate Bill 4D (SB 4D) - itself a response to the Surfside condo collapse on June 24, 2021.

Some changes were neutral. Some not so helpful

Is SB 154 any better than the previous SB 4D legislation? That has yet to be seen.

At the June meeting, the Board will be asked to engage an engineering firm to begin the mandatory Milestone Inspections required in the new legislation. Multiple proposals were sought and received. Only one firm gave an acceptable proposal designed to comply with the SB 154 mandate.

The goal of the inspections is to determine if there are any structural deficiencies among our condominium buildings that need to be investigated further (Phase II). If none are found, then the next inspection cycle would be in another 10 years.

After the Milestone Inspection is completed, the Board must engage a qualified firm to perform a Structural Integrity Reserve Study (SIRS). This looks at the useful life of stipulated components and then establishes a dollar amount for reserves. This requirement would primarily affect the Fiscal 2024-25 budget cycle.

The most important matter before On Top of the World condo owners is that unless you vote to waive reserves this fiscal year, \$77 will be added to your monthly community services fee beginning July 1. It's your choice. You will need to vote in this important matter.

The upcoming mailing provides many alternatives on how to cast your vote. One very easy way is in voting electronically through otow.conduu.com. If you have previously voted electronically, please sign in and cast your vote. If you have not opted-in to electronic voting, please visit

Cable and Internet Update

Summit Broadband had made headway on resolving many of the reception problems some residents experienced. As of this writing, Summit Broadband believes the bulk of the reception problem is with the local, "off-air" channels. (It figures it would



affect the most watched channels.)

In our weekly meeting with Summit Broadband, Board representatives have stressed the need for Summit to establish a fiber link to the local providers. This is in the works according to Summit, and the link to the service will be expedited once a final agreement with Summit and the carriers is inked. As of this date, Summit Broadband does not have a specific date for service switch-over to fiber.

The other item was for Summit Broadband to provide signal testing in the same configuration as any owner would have, to measure performance of both internet speeds and video feed signals and uptime. To this end, Summit Broadband has established a test model within both of their two signal hubs.

We also asked Summit Broadband to install the same test set-up to several residents so the Board can be assured that the testing is mirroring actual customer viewing and experience. Otherwise, 4,005 condos have been connected to date. The redundant service connection has been completed and tested.

To state the obvious, the Summit Broadband service interruption that started on May 21 was completely unacceptable.

Several Board representatives were unable to speak directly or get a meaningful email response from Summit Broadband during the interruption to ascertain the cause of the outage, the expected duration, or if any customer data was compromised.

As Summit Broadband wrote in a recent email to customers, it appeared to be a high voltage surge - meaning a direct lightning strike on their primary headend. The outage ranged from the Miami area, up the west coast to Clearwater, and on to Orlando.

While service was mainly restored, there were still significant areas within OTOW affected by the interruption until May 24.

As a reminder, should you have any issues with your Summit Broadband service, please contact them directly, much like you would contact Duke Energy if you experience a power outage.

The frustrating part of that statement is the sense of helplessness felt by your Board and Management Company at not being able to assist more with this type of situation.

Upcoming Projects

Painting/Waterproofing: The paint-

ing contractor will continue working on the east side of property with the rear facade of Building 32 and the front facade of Building 34 being re-coated in June.

As always, please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating in close proximity to parking areas and front/rear porches which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or property. Thank you for your cooperation in advance and keep in mind that inclement weather can affect start and completion dates.

Walkway coating improvement projects have concluded for the fiscal year and will resume again in the fall once Florida's rainy season draws to a close.

Construction, Roofing and Large Scope Projects

The East Activity Center started a reroofing project in late May that will carry over into early June. The building will undergo partial closings as work progresses overhead.

Also, the pool may experience closure during certain work times. This is a matter of safety. Please follow OTOW-TV channel 901 for specific times of closure.

As you read this column, the asphalt maintenance projects for the current fiscal year should be close to wrapping up. This year's improvement work encompassed the sealcoating and restriping of 20 building parking areas, which will increase the longevity of the asphalt and provide a renewed surface for parking.

The pedestrian lanes in the community were also refreshed with a thermoplastic application, which will yield better visibility for drivers and walkers alike. We appreciate the community's cooperation in making these projects a success by relocating their vehicles and allowing ample time for the contractor to finish their work safely and unimpeded.

Buildings 77 and 78 are on the schedule to be the next structures to have their railing systems improved. The dates for this work have not been determined at this time as the projects are still in the engineering phase with county permitting to immediately follow.

As with other railing projects, a licensed contractor will effect the removal and replacement of the aluminum components in the walkways, center core and end stairwells as applicable.

The improvements are estimated to be completed in 2-3 weeks from the start of the project.

Notices will be posted in advance of the start date, so residents should keep an eye on their bulletin boards for updates. As with all other improvements, please exercise caution in the areas where this work is taking place.

The spring tree removal and replant cycle also began in mid-May as the permit was pleasantly issued ahead of expectations by Pinellas County.

As with many years past, On Top of the World's vision of a healthy green-space, in which residents can live and enjoy, met with Pinellas County's requirement for replacing

all of the elder-trees that had to be removed.

Many of the stately oaks being removed had provided shade, habitat, and scenic charm for the community for many decades, but rest assured, new saplings will do the same for future generations of On Top of the World residents.

Recurring Reminders For All Community Residents

Let me start by thanking all the residents who responded to my article on "Zombie condos" and their potential negative consequences to the community.

We had more than 20 units reported and the Management Company is following up on inspections of those units. We anticipate additional reports coming in.

On March 1, 2023, the Management Company recommenced its enforcement efforts by removing all unapproved items placed in building common areas.

This includes, but is not limited to, plants (live or artificial), personal items, non-exterior rated furniture, rusted chairs/tables or in disrepair, tchotchkes, etc., as these items are not permitted to occupy common spaces.

As has been referenced in the newspaper, on the community TV channel, and the bulletins posted in all building center core lobbies, these items will be removed and disposed of without further notice.

These ongoing efforts help keep areas safe for first responders, as well as maintain an aesthetically pleasing community for all to reside in.

We ask that residents help keep the community's common areas in compliance by reporting violations of this nature to the Management Company.

We appreciate the community's cooperation and support in reporting any violations of this nature so the Management Company can investigate and correct if necessary.

The Management Company would also like to thank the residents who live on the second and third floors for their cooperation in making the On Top of the World community a safer and more-aesthetically pleasing place to live by removing their floor mats from these common area.

The community's response for compliance was astounding, as has been the feedback regarding these efforts.

Now that the notification and compliance piece has been completed, the Management Company will continue the ongoing compliance enforcement of these common areas where the mats were once located, as well as re-painting areas that could not be cleaned to community standards.

As a reminder to all residents, and in keeping with condominium rules governing common areas, any floor mats placed in the second or third floor balcony walkways or center core areas will be removed without any further notification.

Please assist us in keeping these walkway areas clear while making your community a safer and more beautiful place to live.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services team, in conjunction with the Parkway construction department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle.

This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hangar brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the com

Inspection services representatives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproofing coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association

rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you are not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit by the coatings vendor.

We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a success across the commu-

First floor unit owners will continue receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department as the Management Company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike.

The Management Company asks that if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stones at the earliest convenience.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing.

The Management Company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the

Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Many times decorative rocks or landscaping are installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator.

Please, always apply for approval before you install.

Inspection efforts continue to be focused on the tagging and removal of portable barbeque grills, be it propane, charcoal, or electric, which are not permitted in any building common areas as they pose a fire risk to the structure and residents.

Only grills meeting the approved Clearwater Fire Department standard are permitted on the patios of first floor units.

If you're a first floor unit owner and not sure if your grill is in compliance, please stop by the Community Service Office to request a visit from our friendly Inspections Services

The Management Company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the Community Service Office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard East.

Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt, water softeners are permissible in the community.

Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the Management Company.

- Make sure important documents are safely stored.
- 12. Don't forget rain gear, blankets and home entertainment.

Don't panic, but you may not have internet service for days.



Swimming pools will require new Access Card by July 10

With a focus on safety and enjoyment at two of the new Access Card. the most popular amenities offered at On Top of the World, a new electronic Access Card will be required to enter the Fitness Center and the East and West Activity Center swimming pools beginning July 10.

Entry to the Fitness Center has already required an access card for several years, but due to technology changes, the new scanning system will not be compatible with the current card.

The renewal of activity cards for the 2023-2024 fiscal year will begin Monday, June 5, for owners and residents. This is also the first day the new Access Card will be issued.

To renew your activity card, obtain a new activity card, and to receive the new Access Card, please visit the Community Service Office (starting June 5) Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. (closed from noon to 12:30 p.m. for lunch).

The Community Service Office also will be open on Saturday, June 17, from 8 a.m. to noon, if you are unable to visit during regular business hours.

If you already have an access card for the Fitness Center, you will receive the new Access Card (at no cost to you) when you renew your activity card.

You will continue to use your current access card to gain entry to the Fitness Center until the new scan reader is installed on July 10.

If you do not have the current Fitness Center access card, you may still obtain the new Access Card beginning June 5. There will be a one-time fee of \$7. You must still have a valid activity card in place to get

Please note, your current Fitness Center access card will not work at the Fitness Center or at either swimming pool after the new scan readers are initiated on July 10.

The new Access Card will look very similar to the current access card, but there will be an identifier added to the new card to distinguish the difference.

For Association approved tenants, your activity card is valid for your approved lease term so renewal may not be required during the month of June.

To renew or acquire an activity card, or obtain an access card, you must bring a valid, government issued photo ID, a recent piece of mail showing your name and OTOW address, and your most recently issued activity card (if applicable) to the Community Service Office.

There is no fee for renewals, however, if your activity card has expired (all fiscal years have been punched at the bottom), a new activity card is required and the fee is \$3.

If your issued activity card is lost, damaged, or stolen, there is a \$25 charge for a replacement.

To expedite the process, you may complete the Waiver of Liability Form located on the official On Top of the World website: otowclearwaterinfo. com. Select "Community Services" then "Waiver Form." Please fill out the form prior to visiting the Community Service Office. This form will be required for activity card renewals or access cards.

If preferred, you may obtain a copy of the form from the Community Service Office.




PSTA transportation seminar

EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN

On Top of the World

In case of FIRE or other BUILDING EMERGENCIES,

Parkway Maintenance and Management, and your On Top of the World Condominium Association, would like you to know that every OTOW resident should have their own plan.

- 1. Have an evacuation plan. This is the most important piece in case of an emergency event.
- 2. Make note of the fire alarm pull-stations and emergency exits closest to your unit in case of fire and evacuation.
 - Exits are easily identified and illuminated by signs at the ceiling.

 Bull stations and first suitant are assistant as a set to exist a set of an easily identified.
 - Pull-stations and fire extinguishers are located on each building's walkways and in the center core areas.
 - Only use a fire extinguisher if the fire can be extinguished easily.
- 3. Have a secondary plan to exit the structure if your primary exit point is blocked or unsafe.
- 4. Never attempt to use an elevator during an emergency as it may be available for firefighters use only. Use stairs.
- Residents should immediately proceed to a parking lot area safely away from the building. Do not block the entrances to the parking area. Fire response personnel need clear access for trucks and equipment.
- 6. Calmly and plainly, call 911 and state the nature of the emergency and give your address.
- 7. Follow instructions given by emergency response personnel.
- 8. Do not re-enter a building until emergency response officials have deemed it safe to do so.
- 9. Planning in advance saves lives. Don't delay, plan today.

Pastel artists Brenda Mattson and Karen Baker demonstrated their techniques.


Both artists have gallery space at the Stirling Art Studios & Gallery on Broadway in Dunedin.

Scammers are now using text messages more than emails for attempting to trick people

Scam Alert: I got a phone call from my grandson. He was in terrible trouble. I asked him his name. He didn't hang up as I would have expected a scammer to do. Instead, he said his name was Michael.

I don't have a grandson named Michael.

Look, by now we should all know the "grandchild-is-in-trouble" scam, so why am I bringing it up?

Well, frequently, these folks will use a name or two and almost assuredly, it will be a fairly common name. They're hoping they "hit it" with you.

Now, many of us cannot hear well enough to tell the difference between our true grandchild's voice and a scammer. However, there are a couple of things we can always do to protect against the grandchild scam, or any scam.

(1). Have caller ID and check it before answering a call. If you don't recognize the caller or phone number, don't answer it. Your real grandchild will leave a message that you can then verify.

(2). If you are asked for money during a conversation, say something akin to "buzzoff" and hang up. Better yet, say nothing and just hang up.


Scam Alert: Text scams are abundant and growing, and are designed to look very official and very real.

Scammers are sophisticated and using text messages more than email.

Frequently, a scammer can spoof a real company or real person. You can't be sure

So, with this in mind:

(1). Your bank will never text you about your account. If you receive a suspicious text from a bank, delete the text, don't respond,



and never call the number in the text.

(2). Amazon will never text you about your account and ask you to verify personal information. Do not call the number in the text. Delete the text.

(3) Paypal, Venmo, or other similar payment companies will never text you for any reason about your account. Delete the text and do not call any number in the text.

(4). The I.R.S., the police, the F.B.I., any company, no matter how official the text seems, will not text you and ask that you call a number in the text. Delete the text and do not call the number in the text.

Our lawyer is a good friend and lives in (a midwestern state), but is licensed to practice law in Florida.

He said we don't need to worry about

because in Florida, a homestead is not a probate asset. We were at one of your lectures, and my wife's impression was that you don't agree. So, is our home a probate asset or not?

A. There's a lot to unpack here.

Yes, your home (I assume it is your Florida homestead), is not a probate asset. It is what is referred to as an exempt asset for probate purposes.

However, it does have to be listed as an exempt asset, in an inventory of probate assets filed with the court, if there's a probate estate. Then, at the same time, a second petition should be filed requesting the court, to designate the homestead as "Protected Homestead." That way, it descends to your heirs (if they are of blood or adopted), and creditors' claims cannot be exercised against that exempt asset.

It is critical to obtain that Order of Protected Homestead.

Where do you get it?

You get it in the probate court.

So, your out of state attorney, who is licensed to practice law in Florida, but lives elsewhere, is correct, but hasn't told you everything you need to know.

He/she needs to brush up on what Florida law really and truly provides. This is why I believe that if you are a resident of Florida, or of any other state, you should, at least, have your will, durable power of attorney and advance directive drafted by an attorney, who not only is licensed to practice law in that state, but also resides in it and has her or his office in that state.

Q. This may be complicated.



The Travel Club information table will be in the Auditorium on Thursdays only starting in June, from 8:30-10 a.m.. Please come and sign up for our events.





This is the progressive side of our party typified by Senator Bernie Sanders.


Alec explained to us that his group was not a political party, but an organization that concentrated on the welfare of working people.

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Plant-Based Living Club holds their first dinner event at the Pavilion

The Plant-Based Living Club had its first potluck dinner at the Pavilion.

We feasted on roasted veggies and a mixed-greens salad without dressing. There was a pasta dish, an Italian-type bean salad, brown rice/cauliflower meatballs, quinoa salad, banana oat bars, vegan potato salad, soy nuggets, and a whole food, plant-based peach cobbler.

Also, good camaradarie.

At our April 5 meeting, we opened with a discussion about "Blue Zones."

These are areas around the world that have above average high numbers of centenarians as well as better overall health for all.

Some of the locations include Loma Linda, Calif., Sardinia in the Mediterranean Sea, Icaria in Greece, Okinawa in Japan and the Nicoya Peninsula in Costa Rica.

We noted that plant-based diets, and minimizing or avoiding animal products, are probably the main reason for these Blue Zone designations.

In Loma Linda, most of the Seventh Day Adventists are vegetarians. They have community and worship, along with lifestyle regimens like getting outside, exercising, eating plant-based meals, and managing stress.

As a result, Loma Linda's residents live up to 10 years longer than the average American

We are learning that micro-plastics are being found everywhere in the world in land, water and living creatures.

We discussed "dead zones" in the ocean where nothing can live for miles due to pes-

ticide, fertilizer and other river runoff pol-

The two largest U.S. dead zones are around the Mississippi river and Hudson

After all of this talk, we agreed to another potluck dinner in late May.

Our next meeting will be on Friday, June 2 at 3 p.m. in the West Activity Center Learning Lab. We will have a video on the environmental destruction of animal agriculture or "factory farms," the result of a meat-based diet

But before I get to the fun part, I have been asked to update everyone as to what goes on with On Top of the World Men's Golf Association.

We have a website that answers most questions regarding our league and its opera-

Our website is www.otowmensgolf.com. The website covers contacts, play details, documents and event pictures.

Once logged onto the website, you will see tabs covering topics.

The "Contacts" tab covers names of various members and officers.

The "Play Details" tab offers current scores and previous scores, weekly hole assignments and monthly handicaps, as well as club championship results.

The "Documents" tab is a complete list of annual calendar, by-laws and rules. We encourage all players to become familiar with

The "Event Pictures" tab has photos from past events stored and activities calendar of events.

We encourage players to send in photos of interest for all of us to share. The web is your link to all happening in our league.

OK. That is enough of procedures. Now two questions that require answers.

First: Can a player change balls during play?

It is a rule that in tournament play should a ball be damaged, lost or in the water, a player must use the identical manufacturer or suffer a two stroke penalty.

Example: If you play Titleist Pro V, you must use the same make. You cannot substitute a Callaway ball. However, this only applies to tournament play and does not apply to our average play.

What a relief as hole six is my nemesis. Second: What marker can be used on the

This is an interesting one as some players take exception to what others use in play. Ironically, there is no standard rule for a ball marker as long as it is an artificial object.

It was reported that the legendary Brian Barnes, known for his eccentric wardrobe (plaid shorts, socks,) was in a tournament and lost his ball marker.

He saw a concession stand locally, bought a beer, and played the final five holes using his beer can as a ball marker. And it qualified as equipment since he carried it from hole to hole.

The point is, a ball marker can consist of any artificial object, such as a shiny coin, Krugerrand, poker chip, plastic chip, etc., if it does not interfere with opponent's putt.

Trust me, I do not make these things up and you can find many interesting questions answered in Golf Digest.

We play every Friday, weather permitting. Summer and fall golf continue May through October.






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Nine-Hole Ladies Golf League luncheon





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

Tagine North African Cuisine



North African cuisine is a combination of many different influences and cultures and has its roots in ancient civilizations which invaded, traded and visited the shores of the region known as the Maghreb - Algeria, Morocco, Libya and

Tagine, also spelled "Tajine," is historically a Berber dish, named after the special pot in which

It is a stew made of meats and vegetables, traditionally slow-cooked in a vessel made of heavy clay or terracotta, which is sometimes painted or glazed.

The design consists of two different parts a wide round, shallow, base in which the food is cooked and a unique conical shaped lid designed to lock in moisture and flavors.

The lid's shape was not created for artistic purpose, but for functionality. The lid sits high above the base and heat, so that it stays cooler.

As steam rises and makes contact with the cool lid, it condenses and drips back down to the stew, cooking the food gently in a small amount of liquid.

In the Maghreb region, tagines are traditionally cooked over a clay stove, or brazier, which is stoked with charcoal to maintain constant heat.

Heat sources that are suitable for use with the Tagine are gas, electric, radiant or solid plates, including ceramic, halogen and induction. You may also try a range fired by gas, oil, coal or wood.

On glass stovetops, always lift the base on and off, or over the glass, never drag it across the surface. The base can be used, on its own, in the oven or under the grill. This may be useful for cooking dishes other than Tagine.

The authentic Tagine method of cooking will only be achieved on the stovetop.

While the complete Tagine can be placed in the oven (and used as a regular casserole dish), the all-round heat will make the lid very hot, and steam will not condense into the food in the same way it does on the stovetop.

Do not use the cast iron base on high heat at any time. Low and medium heat settings will provide the best results for pre-browning of in-

When cooking and preparation of ingredients begin, always match the base diameter of the Tagine to a similar size heat zone on the stovetop. Leave it cooking at a very low heat setting.

If a gentle simmer is difficult to achieve, move the Tagine to the smallest heat zone on the stovetop and continue at a very low, setting.

The essence of Tagine cooking is that it is slow and gentle, usually over many hours. If the contents simmer very rapidly, they will cook more quickly. As a result, more steam and liquid will be produced in the base. No harm will come to the recipe, but this may result in some seepage of liquid between the base and lid.

If a slightly faster rate of cooking is unavoidable on your stovetop, stir the contents from time to time and reduce the liquid for the recipe.

Use a heat-resistant silicone, plastic, nylon or wood spoon to stir your food.

Do not use knives, electric hand-held beaters or mixers in the pan - permanent damage to the enamel may occur.

The Tagine will become hot during stovetop as well as oven use.

Use a dry, thick cloth or an oven mitt for handling the base and lid at all times. When lifting the lid from the base, I recommend that both the top of the lid and the rim are supported.

Always stand the hot cast iron base on a silicone surface protector, trivet or board, never on an unprotected surface.

Do not place the lid down on any direct heat, or a very hot surface.

Always cool the Tagine for a short time before soaking or washing in hot soapy water. DO NOT PLUNGE the Tagine into cold water while it is hot as thermal shock may cause damage to the enamel.



Chicken Tagine

Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil, 4 chicken quarters 3/4 cup chicken stock

2 cups baby carrots

1 medium onion, 1 teaspoon turmeric salt/ground pepper 1/2 cup whole black pitted olives

2 garlic cloves (crushed) 2 tablespoon chopped cilantro 2 cups of cherry tomatoes

Directions

- 1. Heat the oil in the Tagine base on a medium setting. Fry the onion and garlic gently for 3 to 4 minutes without coloring. 2. Cut the chicken quarter into two pieces. Add these to the Tagine and brown evenly, turning the piece frequently. Lower the heat if necessary.
- 3. Add the turmeric, 1 tablespoon of cilantro, tomatoes, carrots, olives and the stock with some salt and pepper and bring to a
- 4. Cover and let simmer for 2.5 hours. Remove the lid and, if necessary, boil the liquid rapidly for a few minutes to thicken the consistency. Garnish with the remaining chopped cilantro before serving.

Beef Tagine with Green Olives

Ingredients

- 1 1/2 pounds braising beef
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon 4 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 large potato cut into cubes
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- 2 large carrots cut into cubes
- 1/2 cup green olives pitted
- 1 teaspoon cayenne
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 4 shallots, quartered
- 1 15 ounce can chopped tomatoes

Directions

- 1. Mix together the paprika, cayenne, cinnamon, ginger, 2 tablespoons of olive oil and the tomato paste.
- 2. Add the beef and turn in the mixture. Cover and leave in the refrigerator overnight.
- 3. Heat the remaining oil in the Tagine on a medium heat. Fry the shallots, potatoes and carrots until they are beginning to brown. Remove and set on a plate.
 - 4. Add the marinated beef and fry until browned.
 - 5. Add the ingredients from step 3, any remaining marinade, the tomatoes, parsley.
 - 6. Cover and cook over a low heat for 3 to 4 hours.
 - 7. Stir the olives into the dish, remove, allow 15 minutes to heat through.

Are you wondering what to do with vegetables so they are not boring?

The broccoli cauliflower bake casserole at right is a different way to bring vegetables into your meal. It is a great recipe for those who like low carbohydrate meals.

This casserole is somewhat like a frittata. Both are egg dishes where vegetables slowly pre-cooked on stovetop and then finished in the oven.

My dear chefs, you can experiment by adding leftover salmon or tuna, or any cooked meat if you want. You can mix it up with other veggies like mushrooms, kale and small diced sweet potato.

If you like, change seasonings. Make it Mexican with cumin, chili powder and oregano, or Italian with basil, oregano and rose-

With this dish, you get a rich crust on the bottom, while keeping the interior custard-like. It is delicious at just about any temperature ... from fresh-out-of-the-oven hot ... to room temperature ... or even cold.


For lunch or dinner, you complete the meal with a side of lightly dressed greens. For breakfast, add fruit.

The Science

Fresh vegetables are best cooked by steaming to obtain maximum nutritional value, texture and flavor.

Bring water to a boil before placing vegetables in the steamer. This minimizes over-

An ice bath helps keep bitterness out



and ensures broccoli remains bright green. The ice bath also prevents over-cooking. This way the broccoli and cauliflower taste fresh and crisp.

Flour gives the desired firmness to the sauce so that the number of eggs can be reduced. With flour, six eggs are used.

For a large 12-inch baking dish, the recipe typically needs a dozen eggs if flour was

So, this dish is good for your budget, too. As of February 2023, a dozen eggs averaged \$4.21 across the U.S. versus \$2.05 year before. (Source; Bureau of Labor Statistics)

Concurrently, total red meat and poultry production in 2023 is forecast to decrease for the first time in nearly a decade (Source: U.S. Dept. of Agriculture).

Vegetables are more important for our diet than ever.

Heavy cream has a high fat content (36 percent) so it does not curdle when added to hot items such as sauces or soups. It also contributes to a thicker sauce.

Creams with lower fat content are better used in beverages or for pouring over des-

Cheddar cheese and turmeric help give a golden-brown appearance without risking overcooking to achieve this look. Bake only long enough that the dish sets.

The Nutritional Value

Sulforaphane is a sulfur-rich, natural plant compound found in many cruciferous vegetables like broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, Brussel sprouts and kale. It has been associated with various health benefits and may help prevent cancer, heart disease, diabetes, and indigestion.

More high-quality research is needed to understand the extent of these effects on humans. That said, population studies have linked a higher dietary intake of cruciferous vegetables with a significantly reduced risk

One way to activate sulforaphane is to cut, chop, or chew the vegetable. You could simply chop the vegetables in the morning, several hours prior to making the dish.

Steaming vegetables for one to three minutes is the best way to maximize sulforaphane levels when cooking.

In the oven, it is optimum to keep food temperatures below 284 degrees. Avoid boiling or microwaving cruciferous vegetables.

To further boost sulforaphane after cooking, add one-half teaspoon of mustard seeds or mustard powder to your meals. Use a tea strainer to evenly spread the spice. This works best for single vegetables ... not so well with a casserole dish like today's recipe.

If you are not a broccoli lover, there is still good news to share. You can increase your consumption of sulforaphane, and other nutrients, by daily eating raw broccoli sprouts. Sulforaphane levels are highest in

According to Johns Hopkins University, broccoli sprouts contain as much as 50 times the amount of some of the health-boosting phytonutrients of mature broccoli.

Broccoli sprouts do not have the taste of broccoli, nor do they require cooking. They add a pleasant crunchy texture to food. They can be used as a topping on salads or vegetables or scrambled eggs.

You can buy broccoli seeds for sprouting at a local health food store, such as Nature's Food Patch, or online. They are made from broccoli seeds easily sprouted in your kitchen in the matter of 3-4 days.

Broccoli-Cauliflower Bake

2 cups fresh broccoli

2 cups fresh cauliflower Cut broccoli into bite-size florets.

Bring to a boil in a steamer and steam broccoli for two minutes.

Place broccoli in a bowl with cold water in it, plus several ice cubes to blanche. Drain and place in 12 inch by 8 inch baking dish.

Repeat with cauliflower.

Step 2

½ cup finely chopped carrots

½ cup finely chopped red peppers

1 onion, chopped

Sauté carrots for three minutes. Add pepper and onion and continue sautéing for two minutes. Gently stir into veggies in baking dish.

½ cup halved cherry tomatoes

Stir into veggie dish.

½ cup flour

1 cup heavy cream

6 large eggs

1 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon dried parsley

½ teaspoon dill weed ½ teaspoon turmeric

1 teaspoon minced garlic

Beat eggs. Stir into eggs, then mix in spices. In a separate bowl, slowly stir a little cream into a small amount flour and mix until no lumps. Repeat until all cream and egg mixture are blended into flour.

Pour over veggies and gently stir.

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Sprinkle over veggies. Bake in preheated oven at 300 degrees for 40 minutes. Makes eight servings.

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

Singapore is noticeably cleaner than any other city in the world!


Singapore harbor is gorgeous at night with spectacular lighting and the Merlion

The entertainment and amenities were


Marilyn and Joe were "enhancement crew," meaning they actually worked on the cruise. This was their 12th international cruise teaching the game of bridge.





It's always nice to break bread with neighbors and friends.




Our grillmasters, Phil Roth and Dennis Hemmling, did a smokin' job and kept those burgers and dogs coming just the way you like them.

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


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

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

Granadian donates his 100th gallon of blood


Our very own Granadian, Don Lamborn, has reached an impressive milestone that many people have yet to achieve – all while saving lives in the process.
