Staying ahead of the curve

Beginning in late 2012, your Board instituted a notice procedure to all residents identifying the problems with improperly installed washer/dryer units.

These unauthorized installations were not made in accordance with any plumbing or electrical code. If you live on the east side of Belcher Road, and you have a washer/dryer, it was installed without approval or guidance from the Condominium Association. More to the point, it would have been installed without the benefit of using a licensed plumber or electrician.

Since that time, residents have been stepping up and doing their part in having inspections performed. Most inspections, but not all inspections, are performed prior to listing the property to resale. Simply put, failing to disclose the existence of a washer/dryer to a perspective purchaser may constitute a fraudulent act on the part of the seller.

I'm both pleased and horrified to report that (1) inspections are getting done, but (2) some of the errors we are finding are very scary in their potential for serious risk to life and property.

Aside from the faulty electrical installation issues, we are also learning the full extent to which residents have failed to properly maintain their dryers: Specifically, the risk from accumulation of lint within the dryer itself.


Lint poses its own set of hazards for a flash fire, being light and highly combustible.

My point in mentioning this is to remind you that regardless of when or how your dryer was installed, it needs periodic inspection and maintenance by a licensed appliance specialist.

Insurance Update

My February article addressed insurance coverage that each owner should have in place on their individual condominium. I noted that insurance coverage is inexpensive and there is no good excuse to have your personal contents insured for less than \$25,000. Remember, the Association only insures the structure. Contents are your responsibility.

Since last month, we have been in contact with a company out of Orlando (Florida Insurance Specialists, LLC) which has developed a special condominium insurance. The company hosts a Website, www.Challenge-MyRate.com where you can compare your rate with other quotes. It is free,



anonymous and without obligation.

While it is not your Board's function to promote any individual or company over any other agency, I believe you may be pleasantly surprised if you visit this Website and get a quote. Certainly, it gives you negotiating leverage with your current insurance agent.

Being without coverage is not a risk anyone would want to assume. Damage within the interior area of your home can become quite costly, especially if a leaking air conditioner or water heater causes damage in adjoining units and the Association's property between the units.

The cost of repair for your unit, the Association's property and the adjoining unit can be large. It is the owner's obligation to maintain or replace these components, and the owner's liability when they don't. Proper insurance coverage will help save you large out-of-pocket expenses as a result of a leaky air conditioner or water heater.

The HO6 rider covers the insured owner for a portion of the deductible the Association maintains. Currently, your association maintains a deductible of \$10,000 per occurrence to property damage from any peril other than wind (such as fire). Speak with your insurance agent to make sure you have adequate coverage in place.

Community Updates

Painting/Waterproofing: Building 39, back elevation starts March 1. Building 29, back elevation starts March 15. Building 45 back elevation starts March 28. Please remember that painting and waterproofing services are very weather dependent on temperature, humidity and precipitation. The right mix of factors can result in delay so inevitably some buildings may slip back in the cycle and need to be rescheduled to a later date.

Hard-Wired Smoke Detector Installation will continue through December 2013. Currently, Buildings 7, 8, and 9 are scheduled for February and March. The exact dates will be posted in your lobby and by doorhanger notices. Please remember, we need your complete cooperation in providing access to your condo. So far, the work has progressed very smoothly with only a few glitches with access.

Roofing: Building 36 is scheduled for March 4 (anticipated start date). Building 94 re-roof is now scheduled for May 2013. Again, roofing work is very weather dependent, so start dates and time to complete may vary.

Floor replacement in Buildings 48 (third floor) and Building 49 (second and third floor) will be starting. The installation may progress slower than expected based upon condition of existing floor and air temperatures. Regular stripping and finishing will be ongoing. Please exercise extreme caution while traversing around or near any work area. The workers take every precaution to ensure your safety, but your attention and cooperation are a must!

Leaf Collection

Spring is around the corner and the oak trees will be dropping their leaves making ready for a new flush of green. The grounds crews will be busy with leaf collection for the majority of the month. Tree removal and stump grinding was completed for the 2012-2013 project cycle.

Finally, inspection services will continue with landscape enforcement, and clutter enforcement on front and rear porch condominium areas (very dangerous in a high wind situation). The tagging and removal of excessive furniture and clutter in the center core areas will be ongoing. Awning inspections (all buildings) are ongoing. Parking lot stall number re-stenciling has been completed for the entire property. Water meter box number re-stenciling is ongoing.

The structural inspection and correction program will continue as necessary from March through June with an emphasis on header/window sill repairs. The purpose of this program is to make property-wide condition inspections and determine repairs on headers, tower elements, walkways, sidewalks, parapets, columns, railings, center core doors, etc.

Repairs of spalling have been ongoing. Spalling occurs over time when infiltration of water has caused the reinforcing bars to begin to oxidize and expand. There is no way to predict

this rare occurrence, but timely and thorough inspections afford the opportunity to identify and address any affected areas before it becomes a serious problem.

Typically, a structural engineer evaluates the extent and directs a repair solution. Generally, this involves exposing and cleaning the steel of any scale, treating it with a retardant, and then closing the area with a two part epoxy that is stronger than the concrete encasing the steel.

The potable water delivery improvement project wrapped up. The next phase of this water line project is to replace the individual supply lines to each condominium building within the replacement area. This is a very complex process that is anticipated to take several years to fully implement. We will be addressing this on a building by building basis beginning in the next fiscal year.

SCAM ALERT AT TAX TIME

Yes, it is that time of year again. The Florida Attorney General sent the following bulletin, "To avoid being scammed by a non-legitimate tax preparer, consumers should get the credentials of the tax preparer and ask if he or she belongs to a state board or bar association, which requires continuing education."

The Attorney General's Office also recommends that consumers shop around for quotes and ask tax preparers if they will represent consumers who are audited or pay any audit-related fees. Only attorneys, certified public accountants and enrolled agents can represent taxpayers before the IRS in any matter including audits, collections and appeals.

One of the more common scams associated with tax season is "phishing," which occurs when individuals pose as Internal Revenue Service (IRS) or other government or banking representatives and send consumers e-mails seeking personal information allegedly for the purpose of processing refunds.

The emails are usually created to look official and may include subject lines that read "Refund Notice" or similarly misleading phrases. However, the IRS does not send e-mails asking for personal information to process refunds.

Consumers can visit the agency's Website at http://www.IRS.gov and click on "Where's My Refund" to check on the status of their refunds."



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




3-inch diameter, 3-inches tall

As stated in numerous articles, I cannot stress enough the importance of hiring licensed and insured contractors, especially when work within your unit involves electricity or plumbing.

You may pay a slightly higher cost to contract the services of licensed and insured professionals, but typically, that cost is well worth it.

When you are dealing with life safety code and the potential for property damage losses, the pennies saved using an unlicensed contractor will add up to nothing in the event of a loss due to improper/incorrect work performed.

In order to assist you in making vendor choices, the Association has compiled a vendors list. This list does not, in any way, guarantee the products used, or the performance of the vendor. It does provide you with a list of licensed and insured vendors who have complied with the On Top of the World community standards and approval process. These vendors have also demonstrated to be in compliance with Pinellas County codes and permitting.

While an emergency situation may not originate in your unit, an emergency situation may impact your unit. Please keep in mind, all proposed plantings in the common areas must be approved by the Association. Landscape crews are currently addressing landscape material in excess of 4 feet tall, plantings on water meters and water lines and invasive or incompatible landscape.

Stump removal is continuing throughout the community, as well as thinning of overgrown landscape areas.

Landscape areas not actively maintained by respective unit owners are also being addressed.

Enforcement Matters

The Association is working diligently on enforcement matters in regards to underage residents and tenants, and we are starting to see the results of our efforts.

The On Top of the World Condominium Community is designated as an age restricted 55-and-older community. The Association rules do not allow persons under the age of 17 (seventeen) to reside in the community. If you are aware of any units in violation of this age restriction, please notify

the Association in writing. Safety

During the month of January, the community experienced bicycle thefts from center core storage rooms and back patios of units. The Pinellas County Sheriff's Office, working with the management company, successfully identified suspected perpetrators involved in the recent series of bicycle thefts. As suspected, this was not an "outside" job, rather the perpetrator was a resident.

This drives home several points: (1) Your security is your responsibility. Lock your bike and any valuables you may have in the storage room. (2) If you are aware of any under-age residents leasing a unit, please advise the Association. The Association does follow-up and will enforce age restrictions as spelled out in your Condominium Declaration.

In order to do that, we need your involvement in helping identify occupants not in compliance. The Association urges you to secure your property by locking windows and doors when you are absent in your unit. Secure your vehicles and remove valuable personal items in your vehicle. Do not provide a "crime of opportunity" for people who may be desperate during these difficult economic times.

Do your part - stay off World Parkway the morning of March 9!

The Irish Club is hosting its traditional parade on Saturday, March 9, starting at 10 a.m.

Please do your part to make sure the parade runs smoothly and safely, and everyone gets to enjoy the floats and music.

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Wills don't automatically update it is your responsibility to make changes

Q. I have three children, but I want to have a Will that does not leave anything to one of my children. I haven't heard from him in over fivevears and we were estranged long before that. I have been told that I must at least leave him \$10. Is that true?

A. It is not true. Florida does not have what is known as "forced heirship." That is, a person (or persons) are not required to leave anything to anyone except as follows:

• In the absence of a pre-nuptial agreement or a valid post-nuptial agreement, one spouse cannot completely cut out the other, and that is true even if the couple do not live together or have not lived together for quite some time.

Further, minor children cannot be cut out by means of a Will or Trust. This is a complex area of Florida law and the best thing to do is consult with an estate-planning attorney who has experience in this area.

Q. My husband and I were married for 22 years before he passed on in 2012. He had been previously married. While he was working for (a large national and international company), he had a pension plan. He forgot to name me as the beneficiary of that plan. I have been denied the proceeds of that plan and my husband's employer said that since his previous spouse is still alive, she will get the pension benefits. Please mention this in your newspaper column.

A. This points out a very important and complicated problem. In those circumstances, where there is a second or subsequent marriage, if a spouse wants his/her new spouse to



receive pension benefits, it is absolutely necessary to change the name of the plan's beneficiary.

If the name is not changed, then whoever IS named will receive the pension benefits, and this includes IRA or 401K or 401B benefits.

Further, if the named beneficiary is deceased, it does not follow that the new spouse will receive the pension benefits. Instead, they will probably pass to the closest blood relative of whoever was named the beneficiary of the pension plan.

As with the question above, it is wisest to seek the advice of an estateplanning attorney who has experience in this particular area.

Q. My boyfriend is 75 and I am the same age. We are taking a Caribbean cruise and he will be purchasing an ED medication in one of the ports we are visiting.

Since I doubt he will use all of it, can he safely bring back a certain amount of it to the U.S. without violating any federal or state of Florida

> A. Um....uh....well... I am not going to discuss how

back when you and he return.

I am not aware of any prohibition against bringing back erectile drugs that have been purchased out of the country. However, I am assuming that he would only bring back medications for his continued personal use.

If he were actually attempting to bring in a medication he intends to sell or distribute to others, then I very strongly urge him not to do that.

As an aside, I have sometimes seen reports of pseudo ED drugs being sold in foreign countries. So it seems to me that perhaps a better practice would be to get a doctor's prescription from a physician who practices medicine here in the U.S.

Q. In light of what has been happening lately around the U.S., can you tell us what laws are on the books here in Florida that are concerned with gun control?

A. I am not getting into the conflict, except to say that Florida is not a gun-control state. Whether it should or should not be, is a matter for the citizens of this State to discuss with its legislators.

Q. What are your favorite estate planning documents?

A. I don't have a particular favorite estate-planning document because I believe that estate planning, be it for simple or for complex estates, is a matter to be determined on an individual basis.

Some folks may be best off with a Will, durable power of attorney, and advance directive.

Other folks may need some kind

much of it will be left to be brought of revocable trust, along with a Will, durable power of attorney and advance directive.


> Still, others may need more sophisticated planning documents, including irrevocable trusts, qualified income trusts for Medicaid purposes, Elective Share trusts and even more complex documents.

> As a general statement, it seems to me that at the minimum someone should have a Will, durable power of attorney and advance directive. However, whatever one has, needs to be specific to that person's needs.

One person can be credited with TV sales rush in late '40s

Something happened on April 13, 1949, that had far reaching consequences and changed the way Americans entertained themselves.

On that date, the Texaco Star Theatre, featuring Milton Berle, hit the airwaves on NBC-TV. For five years, Tuesday nights belonged to Texaco and Milton Berle.

People rushed to buy TV sets.

After his show began, TV set sales more than doubled, reaching 2 million people in 1948.

If you didn't have your own TV, you visited someone who did.

Night life around the country was hit hard. Movie houses were empty and many restaurants were closed on Tuesday nights.

"Uncle Miltie" as he liked to call himself, did his show live and was the first to bring in Hollywood celebrity guests, who were petrified. The celebrities could always do as many takes as necessary on film, but now it was live and if they muffed a line, it was out there for millions to see.

I remember twice where an actress was too scared to go on.

Milton's mother was a "not-easy-to-get-along-with" stage mother and very domineering. She came as a plant in the audience at every show and led the audience in laughter. Milton once said his mother was responsible for every one of his failed marriages. She would also find a way to break them up after he had dated a girl three times.

In late 1965, Milton's ratings began to tumble. Texaco pulled out of the show and Buick came in until the end. CBS had scheduled Sergeant Bilko with Phil Silvers opposite Milton, and the Dupont Network was having a huge success with Bishop Fulton Sheen. The end of the Milton Berle Show was in sight.

After the show failed, Milton

made several movies and frequently appeared in Las Vegas. He formed the Friars Club all-male celebrity roast, the forerunner to the very popular Dean Martin Roasts.

Milton was very loose with fourletter words in his personal life, but never used one in his act. He often criticized Lenny Bruce and George Carlin for using X-rated material.

Born Milton Berliknger, he changed his name to Berle at age 15. After his success, his mother changed her name to Sarah Berle.

Before his death, Milton found solace in Christan Science. He called himself a Jew and a Christian Scientist. He died on March 27, 2002, in Los Angeles, from colon cancer.



Snowbirds "Summerize" Checklist

- Update your contact information with the Association and include the name and phone number of the emergency key holder you designated for your unit. If you are leaving your vehicle in your assigned space, please leave a note in the dashboard or with the Association as to an emergency key holder in the event the vehicle must be moved for resurfacing or an emergency.
- Complete a mail forward request and submit to the Association as well as your local postal service.
- Have your HVAC professionally serviced before you depart. Set your air conditioning thermostat at 80 degrees. (Remember, your HVAC unit's main function in your absence is to remove moisture from the air). If you have a humidistat set at 55. Change AC filter.
- Turn off inside water valves: under sinks, behind toilets, washing machine and hot water heater. Drain water from pipes (open spigots). Schedule for water turn off by calling 727-799-3417 option 6, visiting the Community Service Office in the East Activity Center or submitting an email through the Service Department tab at www.otowclearwateninfo.com
- Wrap toilet bowls with Cling Wrap to help keep water from evaporating in toilet bowl. A dry toilet bowl encourages pests.
- Empty refrigerator, turn off ice maker and ice maker valve, turn off refrigerator and prop open doors.
- Unplug appliances including washing machine.
- Remove food to discourage pests, or store staples in glass, metal or thick plastic containers
- Lock windows.
- Turn off breaker to hot water heater.
- Have someone check your unit every one to two weeks. (Remember unchecked items can cost you thousands of dollars).
- Secure and store patio items. Patio furniture that can become airborne during a storm should be stored inside your unit.
- Hurricane shutters and awnings should be lowered and secured.

Boneless leg of lamb - one of my favorites



It's spring time and for my family that means boneless leg of lamb and fresh asparagus.

Every year we have an extended family dinner at the end of March. I cannot begin to tell you the endless amount of food that is prepared, and boneless leg of lamb is one of my favorites.

I chose this recipe because I think the serving size will be just right for many of you.

2 lbs. boneless leg of lamb olive oil

- 1 cup fresh parsley, chopped
- 1 teaspoon fresh rosemary, chopped

Generously rub leg of lamb with olive oil.

Place leg of lamb on a rack in a roasting pan.







Family History Group members find seminar full of facts, figures and opinions

Four Family History Group members attended the premier genealogy seminar in this area, that of the Pinellas Genealogy Society, held every February at the Largo Public Library.

The society brings in a nationally known figure in the field, and this year featured Sharon DeBartolo Carmack as primary speaker.

Sharon gave four talks, each about an hour long, and there was also a break-out session in the early afternoon where we could choose one of three different topics.

The day began at 8 a.m. with a continental breakfast, continued with a box lunch at noon, and broke up about 4 p.m. It was a very full and satisfying day in all respects!

At our FHG meeting on the Monday following the seminar, we recalled what we had heard, thus reinforcing our learning and educating our fellow members.

Sharon is the author of 16 books

and teaches nonfiction writing classes, so it was no surprise that her first talk was called "Flesh on the Bones," which emphasized using historical perspective when writing your family histories. She did not advocate writing from a strict chronological timeline, but rather employing social history, such as food or dress, into your narrative, in order to make it more interesting to the reader.

Sharon said that all our stories needed to be told, as each of us is unique and has a point of view that only we know and can tell.

Sharon next tackled the problem of "The Silent Woman," with some tips on how to research female relatives, since many times only the man's name appears in public records.

She gave us some surprising facts: Women were often institutionalized in past centuries for being crazy during the period we now recognize as menopause, and that abortion was common, and without stigma, as recently as the 19th century, before the advent of birth control.

After lunch we went to separate sessions.

One was about "Learning More about Genealogy," a review of genealogy societies, classes, TV, Webinars and even cruises.

Another was on "E-Books for Genealogists," the best Internet sites and how all your smart devices and PC can be interconnected to digital books online.

The third was about "Those Other Census Documents," for finding lists of slaves, agriculture and manufacturing, veterans, Native Americans, defectives or prisoners.

Sharon's two afternoon sessions were about "Love Letters, Diaries and Autobiographies" where she read an excerpt from one man's diary that told of his exploits, especially those he called his "flourishes." His diary entries would most certainly liven up any family history!

The last talk of the day was called "Cryptic Clues," and it was about cemeteries, the kinds of gravestones and ornamentation used on them, as well as funeral and burial customs.

For instance, did you know why widows wear black?

Sharon says it makes them invisible to the spirit world, so their husbands can't come back and pester them!








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Past presidents honored for service



with certainty that a good time washad by all.


We also played a "three clubs and a putter" tournament in February. course.

New resident brings a wealth of talent to OTOW





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
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Resident steps up to become Monaco building reporter


Flea Market is called a success

Here's a safety idea for OTOW nighttime walkers

Once the business was concluded we relaxed over donuts and beverages.


Dana was happy to relate that she had a family visitor during the month. Her daughter and her 15-yearold grandson flew in from Ohio for a long weekend.

'Scotty' drummed his way around the world

What do you call a Scotsman? Well, here at Mandalay, we call ours "Scotty."

Born Samuel Fullerton in 1927, Scotty drummed his way from the "slums of East Glasgow" to the stages of many American Cities. Largely self-taught, he took lessons for a few months in his teens and became a professional drummer at age 18.

He began by playing ballrooms on the west coast of Scotland, and then spent three years aboard the *Mauritania* cruise ship. By the time he was 23, he had been around the world six times.

In the 1950s he played in London's night clubs. Then in 1960 he returned for the final cruise of the *Mauritania*. It was there that he was discovered by Jack French, musical director for large productions in the States.

Recruited by Mr. French, Scotty arrived in New York on Halloween Day in 1961, and traveled south from there. He began his U.S. career at the Casino Royale in D. C.

Next came "three years of joy" at the Bayou Club in D.C., where he reveled in Dixieland jazz.

In 1968, just coming off a tour, he pulled his convertible up to the curb in front of a restaurant. He saw a very attractive young woman sitting at a table in front of the window. He winked at her.

She saw a tall, dark-haired man wearing a blue tuxedo. She winked back. Encouraged, he beckoned to her to come out. Intrigued, she did so.



Ever the man to know his own mind, Scotty skipped all the small talk and came straight to the point: "Will you marry me?" he asked?

"Yes, I will" she replied.

"We were soul mates, and we both knew it from the moment we met," Scotty recalled. "We were married for 36 wonderful, happy years."

They moved to Los Angeles in 1971. In addition to playing with bands and orchestras, he acted as an extra in over 100 movies. He also played one of the leads in a stage presentation of "Brigadoon," adding singing and dancing to his repertoire.

His wife, Shirley, a medical technician, learned to play drums also and appeared on stage as a drummer.

They relocated to Las Vegas in 1990 and remained there until Shirley's death 14 years later. It was then that Scotty semi-retired and moved to Clearwater where his sister already lived at OTOW. He brings with him fascinating memories from his years as

a professional musician, having known so many stars of stage and screen.

Now, he is the drummer with St. Andrews Bagpipe Band. Among their recent gigs they played at the Highland Games in Sarasota, the Scottish Clan in Dunedin, and for a "Kirkin," a celebration of the clans.


Gloria suggested that we should try to have a coordinator per month to set up the events. There will be three areas to consider: a coffee/donut hour, women's lunch, and dinner for men

All day Tuesdays at Cobb Theater, there is \$6 movie tickets for seniors. If you request a (free) reward card, you can popcorn etc.



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

Welcome to the month of daylight savings, St. Patrick and spring. We also have Good Friday, Easter and Passover. All in all it is a good time to get ready for summer.





- Shopping time is 90 minutes and begins at the first drop off.
- If space allows, residents with current Activity cards may catch a one-way ride home on the bus.

- If you create a safety hazard or cause unsafe distractions to the driver, you will not be permitted on the bus.
- Due to limited seating, we cannot accept multi-day reservations.
- Reservations are first come, first served, and may only be made 24 hours in advance.
- The reservation phone number is for seat reservations only. Please leave your name, trip request, building and unit number, and phone number.
- If you live on the second floor of a two-story building, or if your building's elevator is out of service, the driver will carry your bags to your front door. The driver is strictly prohibited from entering your unit.

Bob and Emily will be busy helping their dear friends, Heinz and Ute, move Bob's train friend, Al, from into the Brittany Farmhouse building.



An amazing woman at OTOW - Frances Cichanski

A call came with a lead for a story. When I followed up the reference, an amazing life story resulted.

Frances Cichanski is a resident of Paradise Reserve, and her life story is one full of living and doing just what she has wanted to do. We recently sat down and a couple of hours later this reporter was impressed and encouraged by her life and living.

Her life began as the youngest of nine children. She recalls her punishment for being naughty was to knit argyle socks for her brothers. Later in life she came to appreciate this punishment as it gave her a skill which she finds of interest today.

For over 26 years she and her husband Leo lived and worked in the Detroit, Mich., area. He was a detective with the police department and she an anesthesiologist for an oral surgeon. They shared 37 years together until he passed away Sept. 11, 2004.

A love of the water lured Frances and Leo to boating on Lake Huron in Michigan. The Ballerina was their boat for a few years before retiring. When it was time for them to retire, Frances wanted to move to Florida.

Upon arriving in Florida she "wanted to learn how to swim." She was 60 years old. Frances did just that and went to the St. Petersburg YMCA and took swimming lessons.

Later she approached the St. Petersburg Masters Club to join the swim team and being denied a place on the team proceeded to spend the next four years swimming with a synchronized swimming group.

At the age of 64 she became a member of the St. Petersburg Masters Swim Team. She competed until she joined the swim club, the Florida Mavericks. There were many trophies, ribbons, certificates of recognition and awards earned over the next 25 years.

In a one-hour competition swim meet, Fran set a world record by swimming 1,700 yards; she was 90 years of age. She has since retired from swimming competitions, but still has a love for swimming.

She looks out her condo windows and sees the pond near her home. Her love for water still brings her comfort.

As we talked, Frances shared many memories of growing up and the variety of things she has done in her lifetime.
