Irish Club Parade welcomes back two old friends

Everyone loves a parade, so good news, the Irish Club St. Patrick's Day Parade is coming back for the 20th straight year.

And more good news. Two major acts from the parade's history are returning to World Parkway Boulevard.

After a three-year absence, the Countryside High School marching band will be back. The Cougars will be one of five music groups in this year's edition. Also marching and playing will be the Dunedin High School Scottish Highlander Band and Junior High bands, the St. Andrews Pipe Band and the world famous Baby Boomers Kazoo Band.

"This year's band is already rehearsing and promises to be bigger and better, with added instruments and enhanced routines and effects that are sure to amaze," said last year's director Ron Clement. "Pom poms, additional tootie horns and maybe even cymbals will fill the air with silver melodies."

The New World Celts may even play a tune for us.

Also making a comeback this month will be hot dogs, courtesy of the Good Karma Cafe. For \$2.50, parade watchers will be treated to a dog, chips and soda in the EAC back parking lot.

Mike Cooper said don't be late for the beginning of the parade, which is set to start at 10 a.m., on Saturday, March 7. The event will be led by the Pinellas County Sheriff's Department and on display will be a 1961 Plymouth police cruiser.

The parade will continue with a

variety of On Top of the World clubs, groups and sports teams, including the host Irish Club, Theater Workshop, the Entertainment Committee, Canadian Club, Lawn Bowlers, Snowbirds Club, OTOW Line Dancers, Chorus and Baby Boomers.

The Greyhound Club will again be participating in the parade, with the OTOW dog park group close behind.

Look for the four-legged dog park society, along with the 2014 Pet of the Year - Sasha Anna Bella.

The 9-hole and 18-hole Ladies Golf League Associations will be marching, as will the Men's Golf Association.

The post-parade party will not begin until the last band has reached the back parking lot. When the party does start, there will be free beer, pretzels

and water, provided by the Irish Club. There may also be additional entertainment.

Please remember, World Parkway Boulevard will be closed off on the east side during the one-hour parade. Do not make plans to drive into or out of the community during this time. Do not schedule appointments with repairmen between 10-11 a.m.

The only thing that can spoil this parade is unwanted traffic along the parade route. Please cooperate and wait until the roads are reopened.

Oh, yes, and please wear green!

While folks up north are still shoveling, we will begin early landscape projects and clean-up programs

Compared to our northern neighbors, the State of Florida experienced a mild winter.

This benefit allows the management company to get a jump start on spring landscape projects, roofing projects and general spring cleaning.

This time of year also kicks off pressure washing of sidewalks at the building entrances and the exterior second and third floor walkways. Notices are posted in advance and we ask that you exercise caution in these areas as work is occurring.

Several building walkways and exterior stairwells will also receive paint coatings and texture this spring. Please pay special attention to the bright orange and yellow postings in your building center cores for important information regarding these projects.

Notice is provided two weeks in advance and wet signs are posted as work is conducted. The typical drying time for these coatings is four to five hours, depending on weather conditions

Community Service Office Request for Service

By this time next month the Community Service Office will have a direct phone line to report service matters.

If you receive a recording during your call, please leave a message indicating your first and last name, your complete address or building/unit number as well as the matter of your service request.



A service order will be generated for common areas service issues and distributed to the responsible department. The phone number for the Community Service Office will be posted as soon as it becomes available.

You may continue to generate service requests through the OTOW Clearwater Website at otowclearwaterinfo.com. Click on the Service Department tab, click on "Submit Online Service Request click here."

After-hours emergency calls are still directed to 727-799-1115.

Storage Rooms

This is the time of year that your Board recommends unit owners to conduct a spring cleaning of the storage rooms.

While it certainly isn't a task most people look forward to, especially with the golf courses and beaches beckoning, the results of a little time and effort are worth it.

If you need direction in how to organize your building's storage room,

please visit the Community Service Office at the East Activity Center. The ladies can make you an appointment for Inspection Services to visit your building and provide guidelines.

Emergency References

With the majority of owners in residence this month, I want to take this opportunity to remind you to update your emergency references and contact phone numbers. Emergency references and emergency contact phone numbers are collected at the time of your interview, but for many of you, that information is well over 10 years old.

We urge you to update this information. See page 15.

In the event of an emergency involving your On Top of the World unit or in the event of an emergency situation involving you, the Association needs current emergency contact information.

If you are a part-time resident, please notify the Association and the Community Service Office with contact information for the key holder of your unit.

An emergency situation may not originate in your unit, but an emergency situation may impact your unit. You will find the necessary emergency contact form in this month's newspaper as well as the Community Service Office at the East Activity Center.

Landscape services

Our mild, wet winter sets the stage

for a challenging landscape season.

Please keep in mind all proposed plantings in the common areas must be approved by the Association.

Landscape crews are currently addressing landscape material in excess of four feet tall, plantings on water meters and water lines, and invasive or incompatible landscape.

Tree removal this spring will include many trees along the roadways and in highly visible locations. Unfortunately, many of these beautiful trees have reached the end of their productive years and are now creating potential hazards as they decline.

We ask that you please exercise extra caution when driving around the work crews in the OTOW community.

Stump removal will follow the tree removal and replants as determined by Pinellas County will follow in late fall of 2015.

Enforcement Matters

The Association is working diligently on enforcement matters in regards to underage residents and tenants, and we are starting to see the results of our efforts. The On Top of the World Condominium Community is designated as an age restricted 55-and-older community. The Association rules do not allow persons under the age of 17 to reside in the community.

If you are aware of any units in violation of this age restriction, please notify the Association in writing.

Project improvements are a step

Each year Duke Energy opens up a cooperative funding initiative for cost sharing for solar panel installations. This year, On Top of the World Condominiums was one of a few successful applicants.

The Association anticipates the installation of up to 100Kw of solar panels on the roof of the West Activity Center. While this size installation is not sufficient to replace the entire power needs of that location, it will make a significant dent in the overall electric costs of operation, and by extension, savings to the community.

Stay tuned for more information as the installation progresses.

Lawn Bowl Courts

Improvements on the Lawn Bowling court finished up last month. Improvements included new fencing, new shade structures and the removal of hodge-podge collection of storage sheds.

This project is in keeping with the overall community drive for a more orderly and consistent appearance.

The shed, formerly used to store their supplies, has been relocated to a more neutral location under the east stairwell at the East Activity Center. The base material is stored off-site and delivered on an as-needed basis. I'd like to thank the members of the Lawn Bowls Club for their assistance in this program.

Fitness Center Equipment

In all the hustle and bustle of ongoing community improvements, I have been remiss in not mentioning anything about replacing the fitness equipment at the West Activity Center. It is a good thing that the existing equipment is so well used. That said, even the best machinery wears out regardless of the maintenance applied.

We are at that point.

In early March, the Board hopes to award a contract to the successful bidder for replacement of treadmills, elliptical trainers, stationary weight machine, and several miscellaneous pieces as well. Once awarded, we anticipate six weeks before delivery begins.

New Signs

Another upcoming improvement will be the installation of way-finder signs around the community. These signs will be positioned at high visibility locations to highlight the lifestyle offerings of the community.



Community Updates

Painting/Waterproofing: Building 85 is scheduled to have a new water-proofing membrane applied to the rear of the building in mid- to late-March. Please keep in mind that all start dates are approximate and inclement weather can affect scheduling.

Flooring Projects: Building 75 is scheduled to have its first floor replaced in March. Please remember that this work is performed in the overnight hours to minimize any inconvenience to the community. Please exercise caution if you find yourself in proximity to these posted work areas.

Railing Improvement Projects: Building 9 is the next structure slated for improvements and work should begin sometime in mid-March, pending permitting from Pinellas County.

A licensed contractor will be replacing or adding aluminum components to the walkway guardrails and stairwell handrails, so please exercise caution in the areas where these improvements are being made.

The improvements are estimated to be complete in 5-7 weeks, depending on the scope and the size of the structure. Notices will be posted in advance of the work so residents of Building 9 should keep an eye on their bulletin boards for updates.

Additional buildings are currently in the bidding process and are slated to be improved in the spring and early summer.

Construction, Roofing, and large scope projects: Building 47 is the next structure scheduled for roofing system improvements, with the project beginning in early March.

Materials for this improvement are estimated to start arriving at the building by the second week, with work starting shortly thereafter. The arrival of these roofing materials, as well as equipment, will require the temporary relocation of resident's vehicles as the

project progresses from each side of the building.

Notices will be posted on bulletin boards to keep the occupants of the building abreast of the project's progress. The completion estimate for these improvements are roughly 4-5 weeks, weather permitting.

Building 15 and Building 25 will also see roofing contractors making improvements in March, most notably to the shingle mansards on the façade of the structure. Both of these projects are estimated to take 2-3 weeks to accomplish and notices will be posted on bulletin boards as the work nears.

These improvements will also require the relocation of residents' vehicles while the work is underway, so please adhere to any requests from the management company. Thank you for your cooperation.

Residents of Building 66 should note that the restoration work scheduled for February has been delayed until the begining of March. Construction teams will be working on stripping, prepping, and applying new coatings to the wood surfaces on the building. Please be aware that areas of the parking lot will need to be cordoned off to allow for high-reach equipment to operate. Notices will be posted to bulletin boards and door hangars will be left on units whose parking spaces will be affected.

Thank you for your cooperation and please exercise caution in and around marked work areas.

Part of the task of the management company is to inspect walkways. As deficiencies are identified, those building walkway repairs will be scheduled. For those already identified, work will continue as construction crews perform maintenance to the secondand third-floor walking surfaces.

Many buildings will see these restoration crews over the spring as the management company focuses its efforts on these types of repairs. This work requires the use of specialized power tools and may cause a temporary inconvenience in the form of noise and dust. Repair crews will do their best to limit the inconvenience during this necessary work. These small repair areas will also be coated as a future preventative.

As always, we ask that residents please limit any foot traffic in and around any work area they may encounter.

Walkway coating improvements

will continue across property in the spring. These improvements involve preparation of the surface (and occasionally sub-surface) concrete, the addition of acrylic fortified materials to stairwell surfaces, and then the application of a quality slip-resistant barrier coating.

The end result is intended to provide longevity to the balcony walking surfaces as well as returning the look to its original conveyed color scheme.

The management company will post notices on affected building's bulletin boards concerning the dates crews are expected to commence the work. Please be aware of "Caution" and "Wet Paint" signs in and around these work areas.

The patching and painting of all building common areas due to unapproved wall penetrations is continuing across property.

A large majority of this work is being performed in advance of contracted painting crews. Notices regarding this necessary work are being posted in the affected buildings in advance of the work.

All in all, the response has been overwhelmingly positive, but the management company is asking for all residents' cooperation in not drilling into or attaching any un-approved fastener to the structure in the future without modification approval by the On Top Of the World association.

If residents are not sure about what items (like wall mountings) require a modification permit, please stop by the Community Service Office at the East Activity Center and a representative will be glad to assist you.

Inspection Services Division

Compliance inspections of storage rooms is continuing across property.

Many times these new items are randomly placed in other residents allotted space, or the items are of a nature that they are not permissible for storage.

To assist in keeping these areas compliant and orderly, the Inspection Services Division of the management company started performing preliminary storage room inspections and tagging non-compliant items.

Residents who would like to request an inspection, or have general

storage room questions should visit the Community Service Office. A representative will be glad to contact them regarding the matter.

Parking and vehicle registration enforcement efforts are continuing to be heavily enforced.

The community's Snowbirds are here and with it comes higher traffic volume. In some areas, parking may be at a premium.

To ensure that all residents have ample parking, vehicles must be up to date on their registrations and should be operational and not in disrepair.

Please also remember that recreational vehicles or commercial vehicles are not permitted to be parked overnight within the community without advance association approval.

PODS or storage containers also require the advance written approval of the association and may be tagged and removed in found to be in violation of community rules.

Residents are encouraged to report any vehicle concerns to the Community Service Office for investigation and action if warranted.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The management

company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas.

Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Many times decorative rocks or landscaping are installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator.

Please, always apply for approval before you install.

A recent inspection by the Clearwater Fire Marshall's office confirmed the management company's commitment to the On Top of the World community. In particular, the focused efforts in the tagging and removal of personal furnishings and belongings placed in outside stairwells of buildings that present a fire concern, block egress, or are of a nature that they do not comply with written community standards.

The management company would like to reiterate to residents that barbeque grills are not permitted on any balcony areas, be it propane, charcoal, or electric, as they pose a fire risk to the structure and residents.

While clutter enforcement has always been one of the most recurring compliance issues at On Top of the World, these efforts make for an overall safer community in which to live.

If you receive notification that an item is out of compliance, please correct the issue immediately.

If you have a question and were not able to speak with a compliance representative at the time of the notification, please stop by the Community Service Office and request an appointment. Someone will be glad to contact you.

Please remember that items tagged in common areas may be removed and disposed of without further notice. Please help make your community safer by complying if you receive a violation tag/door hanger. Your continued cooperation is appreciated.

Awning inspections continue to take place by the Inspection Services Division of the management company. The Clearwater area has seen an increase in storms and rainfall the last few years, and as a result, many of the awning attachment points have been weakened to the point where the "clamshell" style awning must be re-

moved to halt any further damage to the structure.

The management company continues to contact owners regarding their compromised older style awnings in disrepair or with weak attachment points. As noted in prior articles, the "clamshell" awnings do not meet building code for wind resistance. Fortunately there are new products that do.

If you have an awning, please arrange for its inspection through the Community Service Office.

Landscaping Projects: Leaf removal and disposal, the simplification or elimination of overgrown or unmaintained plantings, and roadside maintenance (the cleaning and clearing of curbs and parking lot entrance/exits) will continue through March until mowing season kicks-off in April.

For safety's sake, we ask that residents slow down, obey posted speed limits, and be aware of crews working in close proximity to roadway traffic. Their safety depends on your cooperation.

Landscape teams will also be performing their normally scheduled shrub trimming activities over the winter months and into spring.


Remember, hardbound books are always 50 cents each, paperbacks 25 cents each.


the best in recent years."

Should Snowbirds have a power of attorney in Florida?

SCAM ALERT: Three of my clients recently received a letter telling them they should have a certified copy of their deed and send money to get it.


This is an old scam and a multistate scam at that.

NO ONE EVER NEEDS A CERTIFIED COPY OF THEIR DEED.

Please pass that on to folks you know so that at the least we can eliminate some folks from being victimized.

Q. We are Snowbirds. Should we consider having a Florida Power of Attorney when we are here in Florida? Also, what about someone from another country who has a Power of Attorney from that country?

A. These are terrific questions!



The October 2011 Florida Power of Attorney Statute provides that a power of attorney from another state — if properly executed in that state — is valid in Florida.

HOWEVER, banks, credit unions and other financial institutions seem to be beginning to refuse to accept pow"Florida language."

Because of that, I typically advise my clients that notwithstanding what the statute says about out-of-Florida powers of attorney being valid, it is best to have a new one drawn in Flor-

For that matter, even if someone is a Florida resident, I say pretty much the same thing about powers of attorney executed before the October 2011 statute became effective.

What you might want to do before you have another power of attorney drawn up, is take the one you have to your bank or to wherever else, in Florida where you have assets and ask someone to find out if your document will be accepted if at some time in the future your agent has to use it.

Of course, I guess we all have to keep in mind that the bank you do business with today may be gone sometime in the future as may also be the particular person who gives you an

The same advice applies to a power of attorney from another country, except that if the document is not in English, then it will not be accepted without an official translation. An official translation is not where someone who speaks English writes a letter to say what the document means. An official translation has to be signed and notarized by someone from the foreign country who has authority to transcribe the document in English and who is someone similar to a notary public.

Q. My (a blood relative who lives in Florida) was injured in a motorcycle accident about a year and a half ago. The matter is still not finished and my (the relative) needs money because of being out of work. Does personal injury cases take such a long time to complete?

A. There are many times when, before a case is ready for trial or even ready for settlement, it is necessary to gather quite a few facts and take depositions and also to obtain expert witnesses who can testify, in court, to the facts and to the amount of damages.

So this takes time and sometimes it means that a case is dragging when it really isn't.

It's just that before a case can be put in settlement mode or trial mode, the plaintiff must have all of the facts.

My associate, Jennifer Cooley, handles personal injury matters and she

ers of attorney unless they have the understands that it can be frustrating for someone who, through no fault of his/her own, can't work. It's just that in order to make sure to get as good a settlement or as good a result from a trial as is possible, these cases can certainly take a lot of time.

The first of five planned line dancing videos will air on your Brighthouse Network community channels.



The last of our great Broadway composers

Many of you, who are not theater goers, may not know Andrew Lloyd Webber.

However, he gave us some of the most memorable music of the twentieth century.

Webber was born in England and is the last of the most famous Broadway composers, after Cole Porter, Irving Berlin, and Rogers and Hammerstein.

His first show to come to Broadway was, "Jesus Christ Superstar" which was most controversial, por-

traying Christ in a slightly different manner.

Also, it was the first rock music to hit Broadway.

It didn't play very well with many Christians since Christ befriended Mary of Magdalene, who was portrayed as a woman of the street. The controversy around the musical made it even more popular.

Soon afterward, the hit shows began to come.

Webber followed Superstar with "Joseph and his Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat."

Then "Cats" which ran on Broadway from 1981 to 2002.

Several more shows followed, including Sunset Boulevard, which opened in New York to the largest advance ticket sales in history. It ran for three years, but because of its heavy production cost, it never recouped its

investment.

Then came his greatest show of all, "Phantom of the Opera." He was so nervous about Phantom that he didn't attend the opening.

Andrew wrote most of his shows with his long-time friend and lyricist, Tim Rice.

We probably have seen the end of the big Broadway musicals, but Weber certainly gave us some wonderful moments in the theater.

In 2009, the London Times estimated his worth at 1.9 billion dollars.

His shows were translated into many languages and played around the world.

Today, he is 66 years old and resides in London.





The debit card scanner was the first item to go and a new cash register was brought in. Now, residents canpay in cash, in addition to debit or credit.



So, DAR finally conceded, however reluctantly, that our mystery man was really named Nathaniel, even though all his official documents called him Philander.

Edie became a card-carrying Daughter of the American Revolution in August 2014!



Lawn Bowling

With so much red and white on the greens, you just had to feel the love in the air.

A number of non-players have stopped by to observe the play and try to understand the game of lawn bowling. For those familiar with bocci or curling, there are major similarities but also significant differences. Scoring is similar in that all bowls belonging to the team closest to the target (small white ball called the jack) has all of four players and there are even singles the bowls closer than the nearest opponent count for one point each. It is legal, and in fact desirable, to hit or move the target or any bowl if it is to the advantage of your team.

Strategy may dictate that bowls be put in place to stop opponents from moving bowls or getting closer to the target if your team is closest to the jack.

The main difference between the other sports is that lawn bowls have a built in bias, that is they will always curl. Each set of bowls has a unique size, weight and amount of bias so players get used to their own set of bowls.

Teams are usually made up of three players, but may also be two or on the greens!

games. The number of bowls that each member delivers depends on the number of members playing.

Two bowls each if singles or quads. Three bowls each if there are three players and four bowls each if two players.


Democratic Club wants to answer your questions

It's the ultimate grandfather/ grandchild relationship in which we give unconditional love and receive endless pleasure.


When I became a grandfather, it was truly a wonderful and humbling experience. One minute I was just a father, the next, I'm all-wise and prehistoric.

It's nearly spring at last!





If you get a call that a family member needs money, ask questions and double-check the information. Try to check on the whereabouts of the child in question yourself. If it sounds suspicious and you think it may be a scam, call the police.




As we consider March and the days ahead, we consult the longheld authority, "The Farmers'

A railing replacement project started here on the first of February.


Two men worked every day except weekends, and they worked through the wind-driven rains and cold weather. Maybe they used to work for the Postal Service? Many thanks!

I just turned 75 and am going to give myself more time to not have commitments here and in New York that fill up my calendar.


Karen has always scheduled our ventures around my community activities — it might be fun to just go and do things when we please.

Ready for the annual St. Pat's Day parade


Get ready for the big St. Patrick's Day parade, to be held this year on Saturday, March 7 at 10 a.m. — wear green!


Bob Mayer. We need a captain for the north Swedish wing.






Popular building fish fry event is coming up soon

- The bus driver picks up passengers with reservations only.
- You must be able to transfer on your own to ride the bus.
- Medical devices may be restricted due to passenger load.
- Eating and drinking on the bus is prohibited.
- Shopping bag limits and size restrictions are at the driver's discretion.
- If space allows, residents with current recreation cards may catch a one-way ride home on the bus.
- If you create a safety hazard or cause unsafe distractions to the

- driver, you will not be permitted on the bus.
- Shopping time is 90 minutes and begins at the first drop off.
- Due to limited seating, we cannot accept multi-day reservations.
- Reservations are first come, first served, and may only be made 24 hours in advance.
- The reservation phone number is for seat reservations only. Please leave your name, trip request, building and unit number, and phone number.
- If you live on the second floor of a two-story building, or if your building's elevator is out of service, the driver will carry your bags to your front door. The driver is strictly prohibited from entering your unit.
- The SCA staff takes their directions from SCA management. Please refer all questions and concerns to the Community Service Office.

Resident celebrates 90th birthday by taking flight


Happy St. Patrick's Day!


