February Board Meeting review

Sense of Mission

The mission of your Community Service Office staff is to address legitimate concerns any resident may have, in a timely and efficient manner and to everyone's satisfaction.

While there are perfectly appropriate concerns, reasonable for consideration, the staff seeks to address them whenever possible.

While Management may hate to admit it, sometimes concerns are simply not solvable by either the Community Service Office staff, the Management Company or the Condominium Board.

A common example is disputes between neighbors. Neither the Management Company nor the Board has the authority to mediate disputes that fall outside of Association authority as created by the Declarations and the Rules.

Please know that if you have a concern or a question, the Management Company, under the Board's direction, want to address your concern, resolve the matter, and make living in the Community a wonderful experience.

Board Update

The Board meeting on Feb. 20 considered selecting a contractor qualified to conduct the state-mandated Structural Integrity Reserve Studies (SIRS). The Board received three proposals from qualified firms.

Beryl Engineering was selected because they best understood the requirements of this unique community and the long, successful history of always funding current work.

Some condominium boards tend to defer important capital maintenance work rather than fund it adequately when due. These types of Boards wind up needing to fund reserves to manage their maintenance programs, which ultimately runs up costs for members - pay now or pay later.

The Board considered the matter of suspension of use rights to property owners in arrears of their Community Services Fees for greater than 90 days. This is based on a provision in Florida Statutes, Section 718.303 (3) (4) and (5). This is standard operating procedure. As a practical matter, residents who don't pay don't get to participate in Community life. Seven unit owners had their rights suspended.

Following the Board meeting, a budget workshop was held. The purpose of the recent budget workshop of Feb. 20 was to review a draft budget presented by the Management Company and to have an open discussion on what is required in the budget for essential community operations, the requests of Board members, and what makes sense to cut or reduce to moderate costs in the Budget.

During the workshop, it was pointed out that there are tremendous pressures on the Association budget for fiscal year 2024-25. The biggest matter is property insurance. It is a large number inasmuch as the total insurable value of buildings in OTOW is more than \$560 million.

Many insurance companies have left the



state because of the unreasonable amount of litigation and attendant expense in defending against claims. The legislature attempted a fix last year, but was largely unsuccessful to date.

As a result of lingering effects of Hurricane Ian, as well as other national disasters that influence overall availability of insurance capacity, the Association is left with fewer options.

The next driver is the full cost of Summit Broadband at \$51.61 per month. Many residents previously paid between \$110 to \$150 plus tax per month or more for cable programming and internet. I took internet only and was paying \$76 plus tax per month after my promotional offer expired. There was no one else for whom to get that service.

Now you have a choice between the money saving Summit bulk rate negotiated into the monthly rate, or you can choose Spectrum for additional expense.

Remember, more than 67.7 percent of residents originally voted for bulk video and internet service (31.26 percent wanted no bulk service - a 36.44 percent margin in favor of bulk).

The last survey conducted in October of 2023 found that 63 percent of residents responded "no" when asked if they wanted to switch to a different provider even if there was an additional cost. 29 percent responded "yes," a spread of a 34 percent margin.

The Management Company took guidance from the Board on what they wanted more of or less of in the way of services.

The Management Company will continue to refine budget numbers in anticipation of the June 2024 Board Meeting.

To that end, you will be seeing a short survey from the Management Company on those suggested budget changes from the Board. It is very important that you provide your feedback as that will have influence on the final budget numbers.

It is worth remembering that residents responding to the Sept. 3, 2023, survey reported 88 percent as favorable for living at OTOW; while 87 percent would recommend OTOW to someone moving into the area.

Your Management Company is working to keep resident satisfaction high.

Thinking of Safety, Now is a Good Time for a Check-Up

If you don't have regular maintenance on your air conditioner performed, it is never too late to start. A twice a year check-up is a great first option to keep your air conditioner in top operating condition. Failing that, an annual inspection is a baseline to prevent malfunctions that can leave you hot and sweaty in the summer.

High heat and humidity can become a serious threat to life, especially at an advanced age.

This month, I want to focus on the importance of doing a safety check-up in your condo. Let's begin with a simple question: What do I do if ...?

Ask yourself, do I enjoy walking or biking in the community in the evening or early morning hours?

If the answer is "yes," do you wear reflective clothing, carry a flashlight for signaling oncoming traffic, or have proper flashing red lights on your bicycle?

I enjoy walking in the community in the cooler weather and I'm the first to admit that sometimes I forget to take precautions. Note to self: practice what I preach!

Another lifesaving question to ask is: If I were to have a kitchen fire, do I have a fire extinguisher handy and could I use it?

If the answer is "no," hustle off to your favorite hardware store and buy a small fire extinguisher to install in your pantry or another easy-to-reach location.

If I had a water leak into my unit, would I know what to do or who to call?

Customer Service maintains an afterhour emergency contact number, 727-799-1115. Post it on your refrigerator.

During business hours, please report an active leak to the Community Service Line at 727-683-6981.

If I'm getting out of the tub or shower, is my bath mat absorbent and non-skid?

Do I have a grab rail that is properly installed in my tub or shower?

Simple measures can prevent slips and

Have I overloaded any extension cord

with too many plug-in items?

This is much more common than you realize! This is also a very common cause of home fires.

If I have a washer and dryer, did a licensed professional properly install them?

If you cannot answer "yes" to that question, you need to call a licensed and insured electrician to make sure the dryer is not overloading the electrical panel. Sadly, this is much more common than most people appreciate and has resulted in a very devastating fire

Is the washer draining into at least a 3

If not, you may flood out yourself and several neighbors. Have a licensed and insured plumber check the drain connection.

Condominiums with dryer vent connections are the owner's obligation to have

serviced. Regardless if you have an originally built-in dryer vent or if it was added in later.

Is it free of lint accumulation?

When did you have it last serviced by a professional?

Lint accumulation presents a very real fire hazard. Call an appliance specialist to arrange a cleaning. Whether you have a vented or a ventless dryer, you must still clean the internal lint trap regularly.

Do you have a first aid kit in the home? How old is it?

Do you maintain an up-to-date emergency contact list?

Do you remember where it is and is it up to date with the latest contact information? When was the list last updated?

The best recommendation is to keep a clearly legible list of current emergency contacts, your primary physician and any medications you may take in a clearly identified vial in the refrigerator.

You'll also want to post a reminder on the refrigerator door that vital information is stored there. This can be a life or death difference to you should emergency responders be needed.

The Good Neighbors Association offers Files of Life for free and they can be picked up at their information table in the East Activity Center on Mondays and Thursdays 8:30-10:30 am.

Recurring Reminders for all Community Residents

A reminder that renewal fees are due in March for all residents who utilize the boat/kayak stands on the shore of Lake Arbor.

The fee for the 2024 registration period is \$50.

If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours. Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter.

The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or nonemergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work

Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are

From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request.

It is not necessary to report service requests more than once. If you have any questions regarding your request, and until the Community Service Office reopens, please call the Service Request Line at 727-683-6981. As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is exclusive to the condo and is the owner's responsibility. The Association's responsibility is to the structure and common elements.

Upcoming Projects Painting/Waterproofing

The cold weather and precipitation over the preceding winter months has hampered the progress of the painting contractor, however, we're hoping that March's outlook will allow them to catch up.

Work will continue on the west side of the property with the renewal of rear waterproofing coating at Building 77 and Building 88 before shifting back to the east side.

Once again, please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating on the front and rear façade of these buildings and their activities may require residents to temporary relocate vehicles and personal property on patios to perform their work safely.

As always, start dates are approximate and inclement weather can affect scheduling.

Construction, Roofing and Large scope projects

A state licensed roofing vendor will begin their next contracted project as crews arrive at Building 40 in the first weeks of March. This project is anticipated to span 2-3 weeks total.

As a reminder, the vendor uses low Volatile Organic Compound (VOC) adhesives to reduce the odor during the installation of these roofing systems, but residents may still experience elevated moments of chemical odors dependent on relative humidity levels.

Opening windows, along with the use of household fans, will help to alleviate this temporary condition.

Building bulletin boards are posted in advance advising residents of the project's details which may require your attention or cooperation. As with each year's improvements, the staged closure of the building's parking lots, either partially or in their entirety to allow for the safe and efficient operation by the contractor is necessary at all roofing project sites.

As a friendly reminder, we ask that all residents near these or any projects observe all cordoned-off areas for safety reasons and to keep an eye out for heavy equipment operation and supplies deliveries. Please help us ensure the safety of all in the community by abiding by the safety notifiers in place.

A mechanical vendor, under contract to the On Top of the World Condominium Association, Inc., will begin the next aluminum railing improvement project this spring with work crews moving to Building 94 sometime during the month of March.

This state licensed contractor will be replacing or adding aluminum components to the walkway guardrails and stairwell handrails which involves power tools and elevated noise levels periodically. The improvements are typically completed in 4-6 weeks, depending on the scope and the size of the structure.

Notices will be posted in advance of work so residents should keep an eye on their bulletin boards for updates.

The Management Company and your association ask that residents be aware of workers in the building and do their best to avoid active work areas when at all possible. Thanks for your assistance.

Building walkway repairs will continue through winter and into spring as construction crews perform maintenance to second and third floor walk-

ing surfaces. These small-scale repairs require the use of specialized power tools and may cause a temporary inconvenience in the form of noise and dust.

Repair crews will do their best to limit the inconvenience during this necessary work. These small repair areas will also be coated as a future preventative. As always, we ask that residents please limit any foot traffic in and around any work areas they may encounter for their safety.

Walkway coating improvements will continue across the property in the winter and spring. These improvements involve preparation of the surface (and occasionally sub-surface) concrete and then an application of a quality, slipresistant barrier coating. The end result is to provide longevity to the balcony walking surfaces as well as returning the look to its original conveyed color scheme.

The Management Company will post notices on the affected building's bulletin boards noting the dates work is anticipated to commence. Please be aware of "Caution" and "Wet Paint" signs in and around these work areas and exercise care when near these improvement locations.

Recurring Reminders For All Community Residents **Inspection Services Division**

The Inspection Services Division, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle. This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hanger brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future. Thank you for your cooperation.

Inspection services representatives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproofing coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit

owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you are not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit by the coating's vendor. We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a success across the community.

First floor unit owners will continue receiving notifications from the Inspection Services Department as the Management Company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike. The Management Company asks that if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stones at the earliest convenience.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The Management Company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas. Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Often decorative rocks or landscaping are installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you install.

Inspection efforts continue to be focused on the tagging and removal of portable barbeque grills, be it propane, charcoal, or electric, defined as violating life-safety and fire codes in any building common areas or kindled in proximity to the structure as they pose a fire risk to the building and residents. Only grills meeting the approved Clearwater Fire Department standard are permitted on the patios of first floor units. If you're a first-floor unit owner and not sure if your grill complies, please stop by the Community Service Office to request a visit from our friendly Inspections Services staff. We're always happy to educate or assist the community as much as

The Management Company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the community service office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard.

Due to original conveyance, not all units are able to add a softening system. Please check with the Management Company's Inspection Services division for more information.

Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt, water softeners are permissible in the community. Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the Management Company. Thanks for your advance cooperation.



- ½ tsp fresh cracked pepper

- Add tomatoes, cheese and basil to a medium-size bowl, set aside.
- In a small bowl or mason jar, mix olive oil and balsamic vinegar. Pour over salad and gently toss. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and toss to mix. Serve immediately.





SCAM ALERT: The Certified Copy of Deed scam is alive and well.

AGAIN!

In this scam, after you have purchased a home, a condominium or homeowners' association property, your deed is recorded. Then you often receive a very "official-looking" letter. This is the scam.

This letter appears to come from local county government or a deed-record office. I mean, it really looks official.

In one way or another, this letter informs you about the necessity of having a certified copy of your deed. Some of these scam letters just refer to the necessity of having a copy, without mentioning whether it's a certified

Then, of course, you are told what it costs. I've seen letters that say the cost is \$250.


Please believe me: You DO NOT need a certified copy of your deed. For that matter, should you ever need one, you can get it for around \$10 from the clerk of courts.

You don't even need a copy of your deed, because you will have the original recorded one since your closing agent, or title insurance company, sends it to you.

SCAM ALERT: Folks, it is not possible to alert you about all the scams that are out there. You already know that.

What I try to do is go to FBI, IRS and Federal Trade Commission websites and see what scams they are warning us about.

And it goes without saying, but I am saying it anyway, that if you receive a text mes-



sage, email or phone call about a credit card issue, rather than respond, call the credit card company, using the phone number on the back of your credit card. Tell them you are calling about a scam and you will be given someone to speak with about the matter.

Q. I live at On Top of the World, which is an over-55 community. I am (considerably older than 55) and my spouse is (considerably younger than 55). My realtor said that if I pass away, because my spouse is not yet 55, she will have to leave our home. How can this be?

A. Your realtor is incorrect about OTOW. In an over-55 community, 80 percent of the residences must be occupied by at least one person who is 55 or older. That means that 20 percent can be younger than 55.

At either OTOW in Clearwater or OTOW in Ocala, when the over 55 person passes on and the younger one inherits the residence, the younger person can continue to occupy the

Q. My disabled child lives with me. She is under age 55. She can take care of herself but when I pass away, I want her to have a home. Will she have to leave my residence at On Top of the World, because of her age?

A. Your child will not have to leave OTOW, either in Clearwater or in Ocala. See my answer above.

Q. I am a veteran having been in the Vietnam War. I have no spouse and I am disaffected from my son. I do not need financial help now, but don't know about the future. More to my point is, I have no idea what I need to do to plan for my demise. Suggestions from you, Mr. Attorney?

A. Of course, the Veterans Administration will be very helpful. Also, I am aware that there are veterans' organizations who are always available, if you reach out to them. I don't know the name of one in Pinellas County, but in Ocala, the On Top of the World Veterans Group, is eager to help all

Q. Where do you get the questions, you use in your newspaper column?

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State law says you cannot drive into a crosswalk

Do you know the Florida laws pertaining to pedestrians and drivers at stop signs and crosswalks?

Here's a refresher:

According to 2023 Florida Statute 316.123, every driver of a vehicle approaching an intersection with a stop sign shall stop at a clearly marked stop line, but if none, must stop before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection. If there is no crosswalk, then stop at the point nearest the intersecting roadway where the driver has a view of approaching traffic on the intersecting roadway.

After having stopped, the driver shall yield the right-of-way to any vehicle which has entered the intersection from another highway or which is approaching so closely on said highway as to constitute an immediate hazard during the time when the driver is moving across or within the intersection.

What is a full stop? Drivers often slow down at stop signs before continuing. But according to laws, you must come to a complete stop with no forward momentum at a a stop sign.

2023 Florida Statute 316.130 says that a pedestrian shall obey the instructions of any official traffic control device specifically ap-

plicable to the pedestrian unless otherwise directed by a police officer.

Pedestrians shall be subject to traffic control signals at intersections.

If a sidewalk is provided, no pedestrian shall, unless required by other circumstances, walk along and upon the portion of a roadway paved for vehicular traffic.

If a sidewalk is not provided, any pedestrian walking along and upon a highway shall, when practicable, walk only on the shoulder facing traffic which may approach from the opposite direction.

The driver of a vehicle at an intersection with a traffic control signal must stop before

entering the crosswalk and remain stopped to allow a pedestrian to cross a roadway when the pedestrian is in the crosswalk or steps into the crosswalk.

When traffic control signals are not in place, or in operation, and there is no signage indicating otherwise, the driver of a vehicle must yield the right-of-way, slowing down or stopping if need be to yield to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a crosswalk.

Any pedestrian crossing a roadway at a point where a pedestrian tunnel or overhead pedestrian crossing has been provided shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles upon the roadway.



Five reach final table

Poker terminology lesson

The first Texas Card Game Club tournament of 2024 drew 28 players. There were four tables of seven players each.

The blind structure was condensed to accommodate the four-hour time limit to complete the tournament. Eventually the final five players decided to split the prize pool.

There are many poker terms which are called out as the tournament is conducted. Before each hand is dealt, a small blind and a big blind are posted. The big blind is always two-times the small blind. Every 15 minutes, the blinds increase.

After the first break in an hour, the big blind will also add an ante. The ante is the same amount as the big blind.

After the first two cards are dealt to each player face down, players will say check, bet, call or raise. Check means no bet. Bet means chips are placed in front of the player. Call means a player will bet the same amount as

the initial players bet. Raise means the player will bet more than the initials players bet.

On any bet or call or raise, a player also has the option to fold his/her cards.

The next three cards are dealt in the middle of the table face up. This is called the "flop." Players will either check, bet, call, raise or fold their cards.

The next card dealt face up is called the "turn." Players will either check, bet, call,

raise or fold their cards.

The final card that is dealt face up is called the "river." Players will either check, bet, call, raise or fold their cards.

At any time, a player might say "all in" which means all his/her chips are placed as a bet.

At any time, a player might say "fold" which means he/she will not play the hand anymore.

Finally, after all the betting is completed, players turn over their initial two cards to see who has the highest poker hand. This player wins all the chips in the middle of the table.

The next tournament will be on Friday, March 29, at 6 p.m. in the East Activity Center Kitchen/Clearwater Room.




This was all followed by rehearsals, making costumes, finding music, making scenery

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Keeping your gut healthy might extend your life

Prior to the Plant-Based Living Club meeting in February, we read an article by US News that pointed out how much of our health is influenced by our gut.

From there, we discussed the inner world of our digestive system, noting that there are always good and bad bacteria. It is necessary for the good bacteria to dominate or we suffer illness.

We spoke about the food sources of good bacteria like fermented vegetables in Kimchi and some sauerkrauts.

We noted that there are supplements that contain billions of bacteria and dozens of strains that can be taken.

We talked about how the good bacteria must be fed with prebiotics. Soluble and insoluble fiber are prebiotics. The main sources of these fibers are legumes, (including peas, beans and lentils), fruits and vegetables. We agreed that our plant-based and vegan diets are very healthy for this as meat and dairy products have no fiber.

The Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics recommends that women aim for 25 grams of fiber per day, while men should aim for 38 grams per day. The overwhelming majority of Americans don't get that much.

We agreed we should do what we can to educate others of these facts.



Sheila Charette led a discussion on Dr. Greger's new book, "How Not To Age" and showed us her autographed copy. She pointed out that Dr. Greger wrote how wheat germ can help a lot with dementia. A substance called spermidine within it shows considerable promise.

We discussed pressure cookers or quick cooks and how they shorten cooking time. This is significant for foods like beans that can require over an hour of cooking in a conventional pot while a pressure cooker can reduce that to a third, 20-25 minutes.

I pointed out how they save energy by reducing cooking time and electric use pro-

duces less heat in an apartment that an air com conditioner has to cool.








The winning team has their names added to the Best Ball Tournament plaque that is on display in the little green house on the first tee.



Prime Rib you can make at home, but you might want to start 14 days early

Let's talk beef.

America's national dish might as well be hamburger. We eat it an estimated 50 million times per year.

In 2022, the average American consumed 57.7 pounds of beef sourced from more than 32 million cattle.

Clearly, we like red meat, yet many of us know so little about the beef we eat other than what temperature we like our burgers and steaks cooked.

Beef's nutrition benefits

Beef is an excellent source of protein and supplies 10 essential nutrients, including B-vitamins, zinc and iron that support an active and healthy lifestyle.

The nutrients in beef provide our bodies with the strength to thrive throughout all stages of life.

The three most common grades of beef you will find in the supermarket are prime, choice and select. I buy almost all my prime beef at Fresh Market.

The major difference between each grade of beef is the marbling (fat content).

Prime beef has abundant marbling with 8-13 percent fat and is from a young, wellfed cow. Only about 2-5 percent of beef sold receives this grading.


Choice beef is one of the most common USDA grades with approximately 50-55 percent of cattle receiving this rating. At the choice grading level, the meat features around 4-10 percent fat marbling.

Angus beef is the most well-known example of choice-grade quality meat.

Select beef is a popular option in supermarkets for its uniformity and lower price tag. This leaner grading only has approximately 2-4 percent fat marbling - meaning it will lack natural juiciness and tenderness.

Do you know what wagyu means? Wagyu beef is not a breed of cow. It's

a Japanese cow. Wa means "Japan" and



also "the spirits of peace and harmony that reign there" and gyu means "cow." Japanese wagyu beef can cost up to \$128 per pound.


Basically, creating a wagyu outside of Japan is like making Normandy camembert (cheese) in the U.S., champagne in Australia, or Parma ham in Germany. It looks similar, but it's not the real thing.

Dry aging versus wet aging

Dry aging refers to beef that has been hung or placed on a rack to dry, whereas wet aging refers to beef that is aged in a vacuumsealed bag (which helps it retain moisture).

When I want to prepare a prime standing ribroast, I take it out of the wrapping and place it on a plate with a paper towel on it. I then put it on the lowest shelf in the refergator and let it sit there anywhere for 14 to 30 days, changing the paper towel about every three days.

The liquid you see in those packages or when you grill a steak to medium-rare or rare isn't blood at all. It is actually a combination of water and a protein called myoglobin, which is found in red meat that transports oxygen in the cells. As a piece of meat ages, the muscle tissue breaks down, causing the liquid and myoglobin to leak out.

Prime Rib

Ingredients

5 pound prime rib

Sea salt 2 teaspoons freshly ground black pepper

2 teaspoons fresh rosemary

1 teaspoon fresh thyme 8 cloves of garlic, minced

1/4 cup olive oil

Directions

- 1. Remove prime rib from the refrigerator one to two hours before cooking. Season it on all sides with salt and cover it loosely with plastic wrap as it comes to room temperature. Prime rib will cook better and more evenly when it's at room temperature.
- 2. When you are ready to cook the prime rib, adjust the oven rack so the meat will cook in the center of the oven. Preheat oven to 500 degrees.
- 3. In the meantime, mix together 1 1/2 teaspoons of salt, pepper, rosemary, thyme, garlic and olive oil.
- 4. Pat the roast with paper towels, spoon seasoning over it, rubbing it onto all sides. Place bone-in roast with the bones down, inside a roasting pan. Place a boneless roast on a rack inside the pan.
- 5. Bake prime rib at 500 degrees for 15 minutes, then reduce the oven to 325 degrees and continue baking until desired level of doneness. Use a meat thermometer to check the temperature of the meat. Rare is 120 degrees. Medium rare is 130 degrees. Medium is 140 degrees. Medium well is 150 degrees.

Important Note: The meat will continue to cook as it rests out of the oven and will

rise 5-10 degrees before it reaches your optimal temperature.

Soda Bread can be an Irish treat

While soda bread was actually first created by Native Americans, it is most famously attributed to Ireland.

The Irish cooked it in iron pots over a hot fire which created a hard crust and dense texture for which it is noted.

The ingredients of traditional Irish soda bread are limited to these four basic ingredients: flour, baking soda, salt and buttermilk. This produces a hard, dry and flavorless bread.

When the Irish began making soda bread in the early 1800s, the lifestyle of common man was tough and people made use of simple foods that were available.

Ireland still protects the authenticity of this basic recipe to remember sacrifices and challenges of their ancestors.

But, in America, the modern version of soda bread is richer and more flavorful than the traditional version. The Americanized recipe in this column has an appealing, savory taste, which is a good match for this humble bread.

Savory is a term that describes a food dish full of flavor ... not sweet or salty. The cheese, fresh garlic and spices in this recipe give it this flavor. It is a beautiful, craggytextured bread ... far from "dry and uninteresting."

The Science

Soda bread is a quick bread in which yeast is not used as a leavening agent. Thus, it can be prepared quickly and reliably without requiring time-consuming labor and the temperature control for traditional yeast breads. In fact, the less you handle the dough, the better.

Many quick-bread recipes, including



this one, use both baking powder and baking soda. Baking powder reacts to moisture to release tiny bubbles of carbon dioxide. Baking soda has a similar effect with acid ingredients. The milk in the dough contains lactic acid the baking soda needs. If you have buttermilk, this gives the bread an appealing, slightly sour tang and texture.

My dear chefs, be sure to test the freshness of baking soda and baking powder. This can be lost during storage and sometimes even in the store. If not fresh, it cannot function properly. Test a teaspoon of baking soda in a saucer with a drop of vinegar. Test baking powder by exposing a teaspoon to a splash of water. Both of these tests should produce lots of bubbles immediately.

The Nutritional Value

Garlic is used in many types of foods,

including breads. Have you heard of the popular garlic knots? Garlic is used across the spectrum of dishes, including salads, vegetables, meats and even desserts. It is a healthy goal to everyday incorporate fresh garlic while cooking.

Medical research links garlic to a number of health benefits.(1) It is good for heart health. It helps protect the heart after a heart attack, may reduce odds of blood clotting, and thins the blood. The latter is a reason to not eat garlic if you are taking warfarin or having surgery.

Some studies have associated garlic with reduced risk of certain cancers. Garlic is widely recognized for its ability to fight bacteria, viruses, fungi and even parasites.

Homemade soda bread is a treat, but it doesn't keep nearly as well as yeast-risen breads. It's best eaten within two days. However, you can freeze soda bread if you want to save extend its life by two to three months without compromising taste or texture.

1. Cool completely to avoid trapping any excess moisture inside the packaging.

2. Then, slice, wrap and freeze each slice individually to create an airtight barrier to prevent freezer burn and keep the bread

3. After frozen, place wrapped slices in a resealable freezer bag or airtight containers specifically designed for freezing.

4. To thaw, let it defrost naturally at room temperature for several hours. Avoid using a microwave or oven. They heat unevenly and make the bread dry and hard.

- 4 cups all-purpose flour • 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- a few cracks of freshly ground black pepper

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees.
- 2. Mince the garlic.
- 3. In a large bowl, combine dry ingredients (flour, baking soda and powder, salt, pepper and sugar). Stir in cheddar cheese, herbs and garlic.
- hands, mix until it's fully combined.
 - 5. Stir in milk to form a dough.
- 6. Shape dough into a rough circular loaf. (This may be temperature for 1-2 days. more easily finished when loaf is placed in the skillet. Leave

room around the edges of the skillet for expansion.)

7. Spray 12-inch cast iron skillet with non-stick cooking spray or line with parchment paper. Add the dough directly to skillet. Cut a deep cross in the middle with a sharp knife. Brush lightly with milk.

8. Bake for 30-35 minutes or until a toothpick is inserted 4. Add slices of cold butter and, using pastry cutter or and comes out clean. Cool for 15 minutes before you remove it from the skillet and slice.

9. Store leftovers in a tightly sealed container at room

Serves 16. Excellent with soups, chili, or stews.

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

As he developed his own style and reputation, Joe eventually found himself a part of the world-renowned Lester Lanin Orchestra. Lester was a major star of the dance music world. He was hired worldwide to play for



kings and queens, and had a recurring invitation to play at the White House inaugural balls from the Eisenhower to Carter admin-

Joe told me he always either had a band or was in a band. And importantly, he always had money in his pocket.

Joe continually adapted his music style to the changes in music styles.

He explained to me that there are two types of music: what you play for your audience and what you play for yourself. And as long as you continue to play for yourself, you can manage to play for others.

Once Joe moved to Clearwater in the 1960s, he found the beach scene was dominated by tiki bars. Music was eclectic and mellifluous. Joe adapted easily. Wouldn't you?

For a number of years Joe and his lovely, late wife, Erlin, enjoyed their own disco DJ business. If you did not know how to have a fun time before meeting this duo, you sure did know him afterwards.

World Event

March 24 - NATO commenced air bombardment against Yugoslavia during the Kosovo War, marking the first time NATO has attacked a sovereign country. The Kosovo conflict (1998-99) concerned ethnic Albanians who opposed ethnic Serbs and the government of Yugoslavia. The conflict gained widespread international attention and was resolved with the intervention of NATO. However, the conflict has never been resolved for many Kosovo Albanians and Serbs. A physical clash occurred even as lately as September 2023.

Financial News

March 17 – The Roth IRA became law.

March 29 - For the first time, the Dow Jones Industrial Average closed above the 10,000 mark, at 10,006.78.

Sports News

March 28 - Wrestlemania XV: 'Stone Cold' Steve Austin and The Rock competed in a no disqualification match for the WWF Heavyweight title. Austin became the first man ever to win the WWE Championship at consecutive WrestleMania events. The two competitors shared and continue to share a great friendship outside the ring. The Rock is Dwayne Douglas Johnson who became a successful American actor after he retired from wrestling.

Movie News

The year 1999 was the cusp of a new millennium. Movies prognosticated what was to come in our culture. Many influential movies came out in 1999, including The Matrix. It opened in theaters in the United States on March 31, 1999, to widespread acclaim from critics. This film created "bullet time" and other special effects, influenced later films, and also rebooted existential sci-fi action films. It was the top revenue grossing films in 1999. What was only a concept in the film, Matrix, is starting to become a reality. Elon Musk is currently seeking participants for his new technology, Neuralink, to test the safety and feasibility of a brain implant to help patients with paralysis control a keyboard or computer cursor with their minds.

Working Seniors

March 1999 - Among people 65 and over, only 12.5 percent were in the civilian labor force. In recent years, this has risen to 19 percent. This is particularly driven by an increase of employed female seniors to 40 percent from 10 percent 25 years ago. Plus, seniors' earning power has grown in recent decades. In 2022, the typical worker age 65 or older earned \$22 per hour and may be receiving health and retirement benefits too. In many cases, seniors recognize employers' need for stable workers in today's culture and seniors are seeking financial security.

Florida News

March 6 - A Florida manatee study recorded manatee population at 2,353 statewide. Every year manatee population is estimated and, over time, there is a pattern of slow but variable population growth. Manatees have been on the endangered species list since 1973. Today, there are estimated to be over 6,300 individuals. Florida's growing manatee population is a "dramatic turnaround" from the 1970s. The federal government officially removed the aquatic creatures from the endangered list to a threatened list in 2017. Red tide and cold weather are the main threat to manatee populations currently. Tampa Electric's award-winning Manatee Viewing Center has set an amazing new record, hosting 1,100 manatees at one time consistently throughout the chilly days of this cold 2024 winter. This dwarfs the previous record of 850, set last winter.


