Press Association celebrates great season

In April of last year, the Press Association celebrated a terrific 2014-15

But as soon as the new season started on May 1, 2015, each writer, photographer, board member, editor and proofreader was asked to make the new season even better.

At the 2015-16 Appreciation Luncheon on April 7, editor Doug Kates broke the good news to an audience of about 40 members.

"Yes, we did even better," he said. "From 2014 to 2015, we published 12 quality newspapers. From 2015-16, we published even better newspapers."

For the prior season, On Top of the World News printed 837 stories. This past season, there were 898 stories, an increase of 61 stories.

Last season the newspaper published 864 pages. This season the press printed 924 pages, an increase of 60 pages.

And last season, advertisers purchased 882 ads. This past season, advertisers bought 956 ads, an increase of 74 ads.

"Over the past year, our club, group and building writers have been able to produce a wide variety of great quality articles," Doug said. "Not only do the residents enjoy these original stories, but the increase in advertising shows local businesses see the quality

This success carried over into the Appreciation Luncheon. The real honorees were those who not only contributed to at least three newspapers, but also attended at least three meetings. Those individuals were treated to lunch.
















Speed limit enforcement begins on June 1

In the next few months, new community-wide street signage will be installed. This project will include new sign posts, street identifiers, speed limit and stop signs.

In an effort to improve safety for all residents, beginning June 1, the Pinellas County Sheriff's Office will begin community-wide traffic enforcement. This includes traffic ticketing for offenders.

Please make sure you adhere to all traffic signs posted while traveling through the community. Advise your friends and visitors as well.

The posted speed limit in the community is 20 miles per hour. Drivers exceeding the speed limit will be ticketed.

Tree Replacement

Due to an infestation of pine bark beetles, the pine trees located at the West Belcher entrance had to

be removed, thus delaying the landscape enhancements in that area.

Pinellas County Habitat requires a 3 to 1 tree replacement after tree removal. New plantings have been ordered and we anticipate tree replacement to commence within the next two months.

Please be aware of equipment and personnel that will be working in close proximity of the West Belcher guard booth, West Belcher entrance, and West Activity Center parking lot.

Additionally, we anticipate updates to the Belcher Road guard booths to commence in late summer.

Bus Service

The OTOW bus service is a well-used amenity for the community. As a reminder, all bus riders (owners/approved tenants) must possess a valid Recreation Card and show it upon request.

To participate in a scheduled bus run, you must call and make a reservation for pick up. The phone number is 727-799-3417 option No. 7. Please leave your name, building number, unit number, phone number and trip request on the recording.

Reservations must be made 24 hours in advance with reservations confirmed on a first come/first serve basis.

The passenger capacity on the bus is 13 passengers. The bus service does not allow walk-ons for outgoing trips. Bus etiquette requires that you remain seated and that you do not cause any distractions or disruptions to this service or the bus driver. Your safety is our first concern and distractions caused by individuals to the bus driver may result in the loss of bus service privileges. Please refer to the OTOW Bus Service schedule and rules in the On Top of the World newspaper.

CHECKLIST OF THINGS TO DO BEFORE LEAVING ON AN EXTENDED TRIP

- Leave your contact number with at least two trusted neighbors or
- Update the Association with emergency contact information.
- Have the interior of the condo checked at least once a week by a trusted neighbor or friend, or arrange for an inspection service.
- · Check in regularly with a trusted neighbor or friend while you are
- · Arrange for a water meter turn off if you are going away for an extended term.
- Turn off the electricity to the hot water heater.
- Make sure the air conditioner is properly serviced by a professional before departing. This includes a drain line flush. Drain line flushing should be done at least twice a year to prevent condensation from flooding your home and anyone unit beneath you. Air filters require monthly attention and can be changed by the owner.
- Leave the thermostat set at between 78 F to 80 F. This helps regulate humidity in the home and prevents the occurrence of mold or
- . If you plan on being gone for several months, you may wish to consult an air conditioning professional about adding a humidistat to ensure optimal humidity levels in the home.
- · Make sure your home owner's insurance policy is current and covers both damage from wind, water and mold. In most cases, this is now an added rider on the policy.

If the air conditioning system is not properly maintained by an owner, mold and mildew may result and become a serious problem for the owner. Improperly vented dryers may also be a source of both heat and moisture in your home. Water leaks in the home may also be a source of moisture.

If you suspect a water leak, contact the Community Service Office immediately! A fast response on leaks can prevent further damage and save you unnecessary expense.

Mold growth is secondary to the presence of high humidity levels or saturation by water. Mold is evidenced by the appearance of a black, sooty substance on furniture or walls. If you suspect you have mold, it is best to contact the Community Service Office and arrange for a visual inspection. There is no charge for this service.

Please remember that the proper maintenance or repair of your HVAC unit, water heater and drain pan, and ice maker line (if any) is always the owner's responsibility.

Rarely does mold or mildew present a health problem. Usually the main complaint is an odor and the unsightly nature of the matter. I mention this because the home repair industry is rife with scare tactics and scams, causing homeowners to spend thousands of dollars on matters that are generally easily resolved

I recently heard from a gentleman who believes that placing pans of cat litter around the apartment will absorb moisture (humidity) from the atmosphere. Clay based cat litter is good for absorbing liquids, but that is about it. Silica-based cat litter may have some capacity to absorb humidity to a limited degree, but based on everything I've read, it needs to be changed every two weeks. Your best bet is to still set the AC at 78 F and have the apartment checked weekly during your absence.

The On Top of the World Association annual meeting will be held in the East Activity Center auditorium, 2069 World Parkway Boulevard East, Clearwater, Fl., 33763, beginning at 10 a.m., on Friday, June 10, 2016.

A Board of Administration Meeting of the Association will follow immediately after adjournment of the annual meeting.

It is also the time your Board begins to put together the budget for the coming fiscal year.

The Association fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30.

There are many components to consider: insurance coverage on buildings, including wind storm damage, paving projects, ongoing railing replacement, the code compliance challenge of adding a smoke detector in older buildings (pre-code), and replacing aging water mains.

The point is this: it promises to be an interesting and challenging year as your Board considers long-term capital projects and day-to-day operations.

Awning Replacement

As the calendar moves us closer to storm season, I wish to remind you that the older "clamshell" awnings are not wind-rated and pose a continuing risk in high wind conditions.

Additionally, it is increasingly evident that the "clamshell" awnings have resulted in damage to buildings.

Whether by water intrusion, age, general deterioration of the awning assembly, or by direct damage from the masonry anchors for the awning, we have seen additional instances where the lintel is beginning to split and fracture. This may become a very serious concern for the Association.

Clamshell-style awnings are not able to withstand storm force winds. As such, the Association will not allow them to be replaced with a like product.

There are acceptable alternatives that provide shade and will not damage the building. Inasmuch as these awnings are a limited common element, the cost of any damage to the building structure will be a charge to the unit owner, whether they installed the awning or acquired the unit with the awnings in place.

<u>UPCOMING PROJECTS</u> Painting/Waterproofing

The fronts of Building 90 and 82 are both scheduled for new coatings in



May. Please keep in mind that all start dates are approximate and inclement weather can affect scheduling.

Paving, Construction, Roofing and large scope projects

Paving improvements will continue into the month of May.

As in years past, the vendor may be working in multiple areas on any given day, so it's important that residents keep an eye on their bulletin boards and car windshields for the latest paving updates.

Parking areas will be cordoned off for a minimum of 48 hours after the new asphalt has been applied to allow the product time to cure correctly. This curing time is crucial before it is driven upon.

The time period that the lots are closed will also allow the contractor the opportunity to restripe the lot without obstructions, as well as minimize tire scuffing on the new asphalt.

If your vehicle has an oil leak, please address it with your mechanic before paving! Oil leaks destroy the new asphalt. Please observe the closures and wait until a management company representative has removed all the barricades at their parking lot before venturing onto the new asphalt.

Alternative parking is available on roadways and in visitor spots at surrounding buildings for those residents displaced during the work.

Keep in mind that management company employees will be working in close proximity to the roadways during this work. For safety's sake, we ask that residents slow down, pay close attention to any direction given by flagmen and obey posted speed limits.

The worker's safety depends on your cooperation.

Elevators

The elevators in Buildings 40 and Building 43 are both scheduled for equipment improvements in the month of May.

These improvements will require that the elevator be out of service for an estimated seven days while the equipment replacements take place.

Residents of these buildings should keep an eye on their bulletin boards for exact start dates and progress updates. This will be an active work zone while the improvements take place, and while areas will be cordoned off for everyone's safety, we ask that you please watch your step and be aware of activity in these areas.

Railings

New walkway railing improvements are currently in the bidding phase for a late May/early June start date.

The exact location of these projects is being determined as this article goes to print. Please keep an eye on your building's bulletin boards as the management company will post updates as they become available.

Water softeners

Reoccurring reminders for all community residents: The management company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit.

A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the community service office in the East Activity Center. Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt, water softeners are permissible in the community.

Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the management company. Thanks for your advance cooperation.

Inspections Services Division

The Inspection Services team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle.

This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hangar brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules,

these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future.

Inspection services representatives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproofing coatings during the next improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If, for some reason, you were not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit by the coatings vendor. We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a success across the community.

Many first floor unit owners will be receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department over the coming months as the management company works toward the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community.

The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but has the propensity to damage association and personal property alike.

To keep all residents in the community aware of this compliance issue, the notice will be published in upcoming editions of the OTOW newspaper. The management company asks that if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stones at the earliest convenience.

Building Walkway Repairs

Building walkway repairs will continue as construction crews perform maintenance to the second and third floor walking surfaces.

Many buildings will see these restoration crews as the management company focuses its efforts on these types of repairs.

This work requires the use of specialized power tools and may cause a temporary inconvenience in the form of noise and dust. Repair crews will do their best to limit the inconvenience during this necessary work.

Repair crews will do their best to limit the inconvenience during this necessary work. These small repair areas will also be coated as a future preventative.

As always, we ask that residents please limit any foot traffic in and around any work area they may encounter.

Walkway coating improvements involve preparation of the surface (and occasionally sub-surface) concrete, the addition of acrylic fortified materials to stairwell surfaces, and then the application of a quality slip-resistant barrier coating. The end result is intended to provide longevity to the balcony walking surfaces as well as returning the look to its original conveyed color scheme.

The management company will post notices on affected building's bulletin boards concerning the dates crews are expected to commence the work. Please be aware of "Caution" and "Wet Paint" signs in and around these work areas.

General Notices

Over the years, some owners have added plantings around water meters and HVAC condensate drains.

These modifications were done without proper review or modification authorization by your Association and the plantings are now a source of problems.

As a result, the removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The management company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas.

Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters, as well as the Association's ability to keep the condensate lines draining properly.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any land-scape alterations. Decorative rocks or landscaping, if installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items, becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you install.

Inspection efforts continue to be focused on the tagging and removal of personal furnishings and belongings placed in outside walkways and stairwells of buildings. These obstructions present a hazard to the ability to exit the building in an emergency. They are not allowed by order of the Fire Marshall and it falls to your Association to enforce this. The management company would like to reiterate to residents that barbeque grills, be it propane, charcoal, or electric, are not

permitted on any balcony areas, as they pose a fire risk to the structure and residents.

Clutter enforcement has always been one of the most reoccurring compliance issues at On Top of the World. These efforts make for an overall safer community in which to live.

If you receive notification that an item is out of compliance, please correct the issue immediately.

If you have a question and were not able to speak with a compliance representative at the time of the notification, please stop by the Community Service Office and request an appointment. Someone will be glad to contact you.

Please remember that items tagged in common areas may be removed and disposed of without further notice.

Please help make your community safer by complying if you receive a violation tag/door hanger. Your continued cooperation is appreciated.

Prevent Unwanted Surprises

Improperly maintained air conditioning systems are a source of mold and mildew within your home.

Improperly vented dryers may also be a source of both heat and moisture.

Water leaks in the home may also be a source of moisture. Leak sources may be an improperly maintained air handler unit, old water heater, or leaky drain line under the sink.

If you suspect a water leak, contact the Community Service Office immediately! A fast response on leaks can prevent further damage and save you unnecessary expense.

Installing a water sensing alarm in these high risk areas is a very cost affordable option. Said warning devices are available through the Community Service Office at cost.

Mold growth is secondary to the presence of high humidity levels or saturation by water and is evidenced by the appearance of a black, sooty substance on furniture or walls.

If you suspect you have mold, it is best to contact the Community Service Office and arrange for a visual inspection. There is no charge for this service. Please remember that the proper maintenance or repair of your HVAC unit, water heater and drain pan, and ice maker line (if any) is always the owner's responsibility.

Rarely does mold or mildew present a health problem. Usually the main complaint is an odor and the unsightly nature of the matter. 

New lift chair will give residents easier access to East Activity Center swimming pool

In early April, a new chair lift was installed at the East Activity Center to help residents get in and out of the pool.

The lift is electronic and can be operated by an individual or assistant.

The seat height on deck is adjustable for a simple entry. A control device will allow individuals to position themselves over the water and slowly lower themselves into the pool where the depth is 3-4 feet.

A strap around the waist is recommended for safety.

The lift is available to residents, their guests and approved tenants with a valid recreation card. The lift is to be used by people who have a need for it. There is a 300 pound maximum weight limit.

The lift is not recommended for general recreation use, as it is designed to provide assistance to those individuals with a disability and/or are in need of the assistance.


It is absolutely not a toy for anyone to play on.

The controlling device is attached to the chair and is waterproof. Laminated directions are attached to the chair. Should anyone need help, read the directions or ask an SCA employee for directions.

The chair goes up and down, left and right. It does not lie flat on the bottom of the pool, but does slowly reach a depth for convenient exiting.

Swimmers will use the chair at their own risk and should remain at the shallow end of the pool.

All swimmers should use caution when the lift is in the water or if someone is attempting to enter the pool or exit the pool using the lift.

In case inclement weather is approaching, everyone who needed to use the device to get into the pool

should plan ahead so everyone can get out prior to bad weather arriving.

The chair is available for use dur-

ing normal pool hours. At this time, only the EAC pool is equipped with such device.



Broiled Salmon with Dijon Mustard

Ingredients

2 (6 to 8-ounce, up to 3/4 inches thick) salmon fillets

2 tablespoons Dijon mustard

Nonstick cooking spray

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

1 Handful of potato chips crumbled (for each fillet)

6 Lemon wedges

Directions

Preheat the broiler. Line a heavy rimmed baking sheet with foil. Spray the foil with nonstick spray. Arrange the salmon fillets on the baking sheet and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Broil for 2 minutes. Spoon the Dijon mustard over the fillets. Continue broiling until the fillets are just cooked through and golden brown, about 8-10 minutes. Pull out of the broiler and sprinkle the potato chips on each fillet, return to the broiler for 10 to 15 seconds. Transfer the fillets to plates and serve with lemon wedges.





61 Twenty-Five Years Ago

Looking for a non-family beneficiary? Consider a worthwhile charity

Q. I am an 84-year-old widow. I live alone and have one child, a son, who I have not seen nor heard from in more than six years. I do not even know if he is alive.

I have no other close family, other than a brother-in-law who lives about 1,000 miles from me, and some cousins that I haven't had contact with in more years than I can remember.

I don't really want to leave anything to my brother-in-law because he will just leave it to his children and they don't bother with me.

I do not know who to name as a beneficiary of my Will. I do not know who can take care of me if I become ill and need a nursing home.

What do you suggest for me?

A. I cannot help you with naming any beneficiaries. You have to think that through.

But there are many worthwhile charities that need assistance. Please do some research on charities, at least to find out if they are reputable and if the funds you give them will actually be used for charitable purposes rather than for salaries and fancy homes for its officers.

As for naming a Personal Representative of your Will and someone to take care of you, I would urge you to sit down with an estate planning and elder law attorney who understands care-giving and who handles such matters as you have described.

You certainly do have options for



whom to name as the Personal Representative of your Will and agent under your durable power of attorney. Consider your attorney, if you feel that he or she does that kind of work.

You should also speak with your local bank or with your brokerage firm about your finances.

I can tell you that you are not alone in this matter. Many folks have a similar problem, but there are solutions that should put your mind at ease.

SCAM ALERT: A client of mine recently informed me that she received a phone call from the F.B.I. She said she immediately hung up without saying anything to the caller.

"PERFECT."

That's what she should have done and that's what you should do if you get a call from the F.B.I., IRS or anyone claiming you missed jury duty.

If anyone demands you give them a credit card or debit card number, don't talk. Just hang up. SCAM ALERT: A client told me she received a phone call from someone claiming to be her grandson and he needed her to send money right away. My client laughed and told the caller to call his parents. My client said she knew it was a scam and she hung up the phone. She did the right thing.

Q. We moved here from (a Northern State). Our wills were prepared in that state by our long-time attorney, who we fully and completely trust.

He thinks we do not need to redo our Wills, but we went to a seminar where the speaker said anyone who moves here from out of state should have a trust and should also have a Will, both of which should be drawn up by Florida attorneys.

Do you agree?

A. First and foremost, please keep in mind that your long-time attorney, who you trust, knows more about your personal situation than I do.

Having said that, I must add, however, that to my way of thinking, it makes sense to have a Will, durable power of attorney and advance directive with health surrogate powers drawn in the state where you are a resident and by an attorney who actively practices law in that State.

I'm not much of a fan of trusts and I don't know if the same view would apply to a living trust — you might be fine with a trust prepared by an attorney in a state other than Florida, although you ought to have it reviewed by a Florida attorney.

I have a "sense" about me that a Will and the other documents I've mentioned should be drawn in Florida, by an attorney who is licensed to practice law in this state.

Q. Can I cut my husband out of ny Will?

A. Yeah, but if you really feel that way, then it might be wise to cut him out of your life. Um....I mean by divorce.


Martha Raye was comedienne, actress and beloved supporter of all our American armed forces

Known as "the Big Mouth," Martha Raye was considered the female equivalent to Bob Hope.

She was a comedienne, actress and singer who wowed the troops during World War II.

During the war, Martha took a break from acting to focus on entertaining service men and women by performing at military bases around the world. She soon became famous for her dedication to America, it's val-

Martha received many awards, but the one she really cherished the most was when the Marine Corps bestowed upon her the name, "Colonel Maggie"



and made her one of their own.

Martha was born Margy Reed in Butte, Montana. Her parents were

vaudeville performers and she began from poor circulation. performing with them at the age of 10. Before joining the USO, she appeared in films with Bing Crosby, W.C. Fields, Jimmy Durante, Bob Hope and Joe E. Brown.

On Nov. 2, 1993, Martha was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Bill Clinton for her service to her country. The inscription read, "The American people honor Martha Raye, a woman who tirelessly used her gifts to benefit the at the age of 78. lives of her fellow Americans."

Her final years were plagued by ill health. She suffered from Alzheimer's disease and had lost both legs in 1993

Special consideration was given to her to be buried in the Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Va., but, on her request, she was buried in a military cemetery at Fort Bragg, N.C., with full honors.

Martha is the only civilian buried at Fort Bragg and receives recognition every Veterans Day, along with the other soldiers.

Martha Ray died on Oct. 19, 1994

She has two stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame - one for her motion pictures and another for tv.







Saying goodbye to Snowbirds is just another reason to have a party



Press Association

The annual Press Association Writers Workshop is still seven months away, but please take note of this important date.

The workshop will be Thursday, Nov. 3 in the East Activity Center Veranda Room at an evening time to be announced later.

The workshop is the only time each year when people who write for this newspaper get to learn the basics of journalism-style writing.

Writers learn what correct grammar - as if they were back in third grade.

Writers learn the difference between journalism-style and novel-writing style.

Writers are made aware of their bad habits and writing errors.

And most of all, writers learn

about this newspaper's policies - what we do and what we don't do.

This may sound simple, but there are many buildings, clubs, groups and sports, whose writer does not attend this meeting.

At this time, the Press Association would like your group to make sure your writer is present. So much basic information is shared, it is worth attending to make your newspaper stories better for the upcoming season.

This year's meeting will be mandatory. If your group wants a story in the December newspaper, your writer will have to get credit for the workshop.

Writers will have two options: Attend the meeting and get credit, or take the simple online course corresponding to this meeting, and get credit.

The online version will be available on the Press Association Website in November.

If your group is keeping the same writer from last season, then simply ask that writer to attend the workshop as a refresher.

If your group will have a new reporter for next season, please encourage the new writer to attend and learn our ways.

If your group has never had a writer, but plan on adding one, then the best place to start is with this workshop.

Journalism is a special style of writing. Journalists use short sentences, small paragraphs and stick with factual information, not opinions or guesses.

Journalists follow basic Englishwriting guidelines, the same guidelines we were all taught in elementary school.

To learn more, please make sure your writer is represented at the workshop in November. We are telling you now, so you have plenty of time to make arrangements.

And if you are curious, we keep our stories to 300 words in the winter season and 400 words during the summer. This story is exactly 400 words long.

Upon her return home, every day was like Christmas for about a week. There was a steady stream of delivery vehicles traveling to and from her home. Gerber Baby Foods spared Barbara the agony of dispersing 50 cases of baby food and handed her a check for their value instead. Barbara rented a freezer to keep the veal cutlets frozen until they could consume it or give it away.

Of course, Uncle Sam was there at the front of the line with his hand out. Barbara was forced to sell one of the new cars to pay New York State and federal taxes. Jack drove the other sports car into the ground.







For the second consecutive year, the league had an outing to Quantum Leap Farm in Odessa to support its mission and to enjoy touring the farm, hearing about its work and eating delicious barbeque.

Founded by Dr. Edie Dopking in 2000, the farm has grown to 20 acres with a staff of 19 and more than 600 volunteers, while serving well over 1500 clients.

To quote its mission statement, "Quantum Leap Farm exists to help people of all ages and abilities to achieve therapeutic goals and overcome challenges through equine assisted therapies."

In other words, the trained staff of therapists use horses to help disabled children, veterans, wives of veterans and others to overcome the physical, emotional and mental problems they face.

It turns out that a horse's gait closely approximates that of humans, so riding exercises the same muscles that walking does.

There is also a strong emotional presence when interacting with horses, whether simply helping to groom them or sitting astride one that frees a person from a constricting wheelchair and allows them to see others by looking down rather than always having to look up.

The staff's dedication was obvious as they described children improving their attention span, a program to assist wives of disabled veterans learning to cope with such an unexpected challenge and other inspiring success stories, all linked to interaction with

horses.

The Farm operates entirely from private donations and relies upon numerous volunteers, such as OTOW softball player Bob Fields, who does much of the carpentry and maintenance







On Top of the World resident Blanche Mahrle, and 30 other women, were recently treated to a day of honors and events in Washington, D.C.

They were an original group of Rosie the Riveters.

Between 1940 and 1945, because of World War II and the lack of men in the workforce, the female percentage of U.S. female workers increased from 27 percent to nearly 37 percent, and by 1945 nearly one out of every four married women worked outside their home. Many worked in munition factories.

Thus came the name, "Rosie the Riveter."

Blanche, and her original group of Rosies, flew from Detroit to Washington, then traveled with their guardians in four buses. Led by a police escort, the group went on a scheduled tour of the nation's capital during peak Cherry Blossom season.

The Rosies and their entourage stopped at the Capitol, Library of Congress, WWII Memorial, Women in Military Service Memorial (at the entrance to Arlington Memorial Cemetery), and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

From their bus, they saw the Pentagon, Lincoln Memorial, White House, Washington Memorial and Jefferson Memorial.

At the Library of Congress, the Rosies enjoyed a luncheon with politicians and dignitaries, including U.S. Representatives from Michigan Debbie Dingell and Candice Miller, who helped arranged the flight, luncheon and sight-seeing.

"Today we are not Republican or Democrat," Candice Miller said to Blanche, "We are Americans"

Talons Out Honor Flight partnered with the Ford Motor Company and the Yankee Air Museum to provide air transportation to the Rosies and their guardians for the day. Blanche's daughter Mary McGrath accompanied her on the trip.

Jim Vella, President of the Ford Motor Company Fund, wrote "You played a large part in changing perceptions and expanding opportunities for women in the workforce, and inspired generations to come with your 'We Can Do It attitude."



Easter dinner proved the worth of our helpful volunteers


Our Easter Sunday dinner, held in the Sunrise Room, was a huge success, with 26 attending.

Spring appears to be a season conducive to happy get-togethers.



Microwave chocolate and butter until butter is melted. Stir in sugar. Mix eggs, milk and vanilla, then add to chocolate, butter, sugar mixture. When well-blended, add flour, mix well. Stir in nuts.

Pour into prepared pan.

Bake 30-35 min. or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and enjoy!

The weather is fantastic and the sun wants to shine all the time. The parking lots are starting to empty since the Snowbirds are heading north where the weather is getting nicer.


The traffic in Pinellas County will start to lighten up but not so much that you can notice. This is one county in the state that is crowded throughout the year and the beach is beautiful all through the year.





In March we had our building pizza party hosted by Tom and Linda Monson and what a great time it was.



Adventurous Malaguena residents visit Iguazu Falls

Many of us look forward to traveling when we retire, but few of us are as adventurous as George and Katie Zeller.

Their bucket list quests have taken them to London, Paris, Berlin, Singapore, Bangkok, Rome and many other places during the 20 years of their retirement. The trip they took in February might be the most exotic and daring of all.

As George says, "After three failed tries because of various issues, we were finally able to complete our one remaining trip on our bucket list: Iguazu Falls.

The couple's 11-day trip started when they arrived in Brazil on Feb. 17. They visited Cataratas do Iguacu, Brazil and Puerto Iguazu, Argentina to see both sides of the famous Iguazu Falls in each country.

George recommends that if a person "...is in good walking shape, can walk a mile...has an optimistic attitude



does their homework they will have a good time. The research is the key; you must know what you are going to do before you get there..."

You can enter the Falls area from either the Brazil side or the Argentina side, which is where the falls are actually located. At the Argentina side, they walked three-quarters of a mile above the river on metal grates to get right next to Devil's Throat.

Iguazu Falls consists of 275

waterfalls or cataracts, and span an area 2.7 kilometers wide. They are nearly twice as tall as Niagara Falls and rivaled only by Zambia and Zimbabwe's Victoria Falls.

The size and magnificence of the Falls are a shock to the system. By any measure, Iguazu Falls is a monster. The tallest of these waterfalls, called the Devil's Throat, drops by more than 80 meters into a milky abyss that creates a permanent cloud of mist. The river that the water flows into, as well as the waterfalls, are both named Iguazu, which means "big water" in native Guarani Indian language.

The Zellers do their own research and book their own reservations, air, accommodations, cruises, and tours. It takes time to do the research, but it will save a lot of money. George relies on Tripadvisor.com for information on what to see, accommodations, and currency and travel requirements. All that is needed is a computer and a

connection to the Internet.

George and Katie spent three wonderful days at the Falls, and five days in Buenos Aires, which is often considered to be the "Paris of South America."

Featured resident reminisces of early W. Virginia life

Emerald Isle's first annual post-New Year's and pre-summer solstice event took place at Johnny's Restaurant where approximately 25 residents enjoyed the delicious Italian cuisine.

In attendance were several members of our non-official bowling league: Joyce Donnelly, Cathy Faulkner, Glenda Marshall, and Liz Buckley, as well as this month's honoree, Jane Mayfield (see photo at far right), who turned 90 in March.

On March 19, several Emerald Isle residents including Judy Hetrick, Marie Heestand and myself were invited to Jane's natal day celebration at Bascom's Chop House with members of Jane's immediate family, including her two daughters.

A subsequent interview with Jane evoked memories of a by-gone era in West Virginia. Her mother was only 13 when she and her 20-year-old husband were married. Jane was the seventh of nine children, all of whom labored in the fields of their farm. Almost all the crops were used just to feed the family but the tomato crop was so bountiful that they sold much of it to a



local canning factory.

In addition to picking tomatoes, everyone was expected to hoe and dig potatoes and cut wheat, which often meant grabbing an armful of snake lurking in the cut wheat as you scooped it up. Jane related that her mother was once bitten on the big toe by a copperhead. While her father went for a doctor, Jane's older brothers treated the bite by dipping her foot in turpentine. It worked!

One of Jane's fondest memories of that era in West Virginia is her tiny grandmother smoking her corncob

pipe, very reminiscent of Elly May Clampett. She adds, "Life was tough back then but we were always fed and loved."

On her first day of high school, Jane's father took her on horseback to the summit of Mt. Berkley, where she dismounted and went the rest of the way on foot. On nice days, they all had a six-mile round trip walk to

and from school. On snowy days, her father appeared on horseback for her. On many days the children were too busy on the farm or tending to younger siblings to go to school. As a result, Jane finished her GED certificate in Valley Spring, N.Y., where she had gone to live with a married sister.

Jane later returned to West Virginia, married, had two daughters, and then, some years later, returned to New York where she continued her education in the medical profession. She worked first as a nurses' aide, then an operating room technician, and, upon finishing college, a respiratory technician. She also worked to support her children as a single mother.

Jane has five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren, many of whom live in the Clearwater area. Jane has lived in Florida for over 30 years and is happy with her life in On Top of the World. Her neighbors keep tabs on her by looking out their windows at 10 a.m. to make sure Jane's door is open, a signal that all is well.
