

We were rather busy at the East Activity Center in October. Several HVAC systems were replaced, including one unit in the Clearwater Room and one unit in the Largo Room, along with three more units scheduled for repair.

You will notice a difference in the comfort level in these spaces.

A majority of repair work following Hurricane Milton was completed within

This past July, shade covers for Lawn Bowls were damaged from a another weather event - a wind storm. The damaged shades were removed in October. Installation of new, replacement awnings will be happening soon.

The Golf Building steel siding was recently replaced. Finding an exact match of color was not possible from the chosen vendor, so we went with a neutral off-white steel siding. I'm confident we will get another 50 years out of this material. It's nice to have that buttoned up.

New pool furniture is anticipated to be delivered in early November. No big color change here. We just need a durable material to stand up to body oils and applied sunscreen. Who'd have thought?

You also will be noticing some sidewalk replacement work happening at the East Activity Center. The sidewalk at the western parking lot is being replaced. Everything has a useful life, it turns out.

Later in November, the sidewalk adjacent to the east side of the building will be demolished and replaced as well.



Some thoughts on our community structure

For more than 50 years, OTOW-Clearwater has provided a very high quality of life to residents. The operational design of the community was intentional and is straight forward.

The Board is responsible for all legal and financial matters of the Association. Rather than manage the community directly on a day-to-day basis, it hires a management company. The financial matters consist of ensuring the assets of the community are adequately insured (an increasingly costly and difficult proposition); adopt rules of the Association from time to time; ensure the safe and fiscally responsible operation of the Condominium Association and allow the Management Company to carry out its mandated contractual responsibility.

This is the best service residents can receive from any Board.

Your Board contracts and delegates authority to a Management Company (Parkway Maintenance & Management Pinellas, LLC) to operate the communi- informed, willing Board is essential in ty on a day-to-day basis. The Management Company, as agent for the Board of Administration, is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the community, including the things that you, as a resident, experience every day such as building cleaning, lawn mowing and landscape care, but also larger and deeper matters such as roofing integrity; exterior waterproofing, sidewalk and street maintenance, elevator operational maintenance; managing third-party contractors (such as major elevator repairs); fire alarm and signal equipment maintenance; solid waste removal and much, much more.

The residents have had the ability to elect the community leaders of their choice to the Board since 1984. Residents have had complete control over the Board since then.

Until recently, residents overwhelmingly preferred Management Company personnel to serve on the Board of Administration.

Wisely, residents have understood the importance of a Board capable of having a focus on the welfare of their neighbors and of the community as a whole. This type of Board requires welltrained professionals to lead the community.

For residents, it is, and has always been, about quality of life and affordability. That is probably why you bought

Elections here should never be about "taking over" anything.

I've said this before, and I'll repeat it again as I truly believe that the majority of residents want to live in a stable and predictable community. A well-

working closely with the Management Company.

You only need to look back to the Surfside Condominium collapse to see the deadly result of a mismanaged condominium.

In the interest of keeping costs affordable, the resident-controlled board voted to defer costly maintenance year after year, until many residents paid with their lives.

This comparison to our community reveals where our current operational structure excels: The Board makes sure the Management Company is fulfilling its contractual obligations to this community by ensuring that buildings and common elements are properly maintained and kept in very good condition, both structurally and aesthetically.

Necessary maintenance is never deferred. On the contrary it is scheduled and funded through the budget.

As a final note, as you prepare to vote for members to your Board, please remember the purpose of the Board is to selflessly serve the community, setting aside their own biases, in favor of the greater good for the community.

True service requires a commitment of time and a willingness to learn and understand community operations in all its complexities. It requires working through the established Board structure to ensure the financial integrity of the community.

Avoid favoritism toward residents or constituencies.

Don't do for one person what couldn't be done for everyone in the community. Pursue fairness and consistency

Your Pre-Storm Checklist

- 1. Map out an evacuation route and choose a final, fortified destination well-inland. Tell family and friends where you intend to be during a storm. You should have one post-disaster contact - one person who is out of the danger zone, who you can contact and who will share your information with other loved ones. You may be short on power so consider limiting your contacts to one person.
- 2. If you stay behind, keep the following in stock: 1 week supply of bottled water and non-perishable foods, refill prescriptions, bottle opener, flashlight and battery operated radio. Do you know where these items are stored? Don't go searching for them as a storm is closing in. Keep tape and cardboard handy should a leak develop.
- 3. Create an inventory of your home. Use photos and videos in case some day you need to replace your items or determine the value of items lost. Special items should be stored away from your home in a safe place. Store important documents in sealable, water proof containers.
- Bring in porch items and anything outside that could become a projectile.
- 5. Fill vehicle with gas. Don't wait until the mad rush starts.
- 6. Don't assume a storm is over. Stay indoors. Please use a flashlight and not candles. Keep refrigerator closed as much as possible.
- Get cash. Money machines could be out for weeks.
- 8. Review your insurance policy once a year to make sure you are covered for a major storm. If you need to file a claim, do so immediately after a storm. Make a list of damaged items. Keep receipts. Be patient.
- 9. The OTOW activity centers are not storm shelters. They will not be open during a storm. If you live on an upper floor or may need assistance after a storm, plan ahead. There are nearby evacuation shelters.
- OTOW will provide weather updates if possible using RAVE, OTOW-TV 901 and the Box Office (otowboxoffice.com).

WHEN A STORM HAS PASSED

- A. If you evacuated, do not return home until authorities give you the OK.
- B. Do not go outside. Do not begin cleanup on your own. Let OTOW management personnel remove limbs, wires and all damage.
- C. Do not drive into a flooded road. Turn around don't drown.
- D. Traffic lights may be out. Stop at all intersections where a traffic light is not working. Treat each intersection as a four-way stop.
- E. Do not use sink water until authorities give the OK. Do not eat spoiled food.
- F. Do not wear flipflops outside. Wear sturdy shoes.

Time to start thinking decorations - but

Well now, here we are.

November is once again upon us and the holidays are closing in quickly.

With that comes quality time with family and friends, lots of decking the halls, cooking and eating, and all of the love and laughter that the season brings.

A reminder, when decking the halls, your Management Company has some safety tips and Association rule reminders:

- All outdoor lighting should only be plugged into GFCI receptacles.
- Each building is permitted one common area Christmas tree. Each tree may contain up to 300 miniature lights or 600 reduced wattage LED lights. Please limit power supply cords to one, 50-foot, UL approved cord.
- Extension cords should not cross any walkway in or around any building (to prevent trips and falls). We encourage you to tape them down with painter's tape (for easy removal).
- If you are putting up a holiday signup sheet in your building core, please leave off the date of the event and don't list condo apartment or phone numbers for people attending. Let's avoid telling local burglars who will not be home!
- Please be considerate when using holiday decorations which make sounds singing, talking or sound effects. Please turn them off at reasonable hours and please limit the amount of time they are playing.
- Please do not hang or wrap decorations or extension cords from building lights. This includes emergency lights, exit lights, center core lights, walkway lights, end stairwell lights and pole lights on all floors.
- Please do not hang or wrap decorations or cords from any building railing or pipe work. This includes all stairways and walkway railings, and emergency system pipe work. All wrapped decorations or cords in violation of this guideline will be removed by Parkway without notice as they present a safety hazard.
- Do not hang lighting or decorations on or within any landscaping. This will limit the landscaping department's ability to complete their work and could



present a safety hazard.

- Do not use any screw-in receptacle extenders with plugs in any building lights or tap into the building power at any controller or light. These are a serious hazard!
- Do not create penetrations into the common structure for the purpose of hanging holiday lighting. Self-adhering, temporary wall hooks are available at most home improvement and department stores.
- Do not wrap garland or decorations around the light poles at the end stairwells on any building. This affects the proper operation of the light.
- Never cover your condo unit numbers with holiday decorations. Your unit number must always be visible to emergency personnel. Don't make it difficult to find your location or a unit near you.
- All electrical rooms, elevator rooms, telephone rooms and alarm rooms are restricted access. These areas are not accessible to residents or the building maintenance worker only by Management. Please help make this a safe and happy holiday season! Thank you from the Parkway Maintenance and Management team. We hope you have a safe and wonderful Thanksgiving!

Did You Know Thank You, But No Tipping/Gifting

With the return of residents, and the holidays fast approaching, I want to remind you that the Management Company and your Association do not support (nor encourage) tipping or gifting

to individual employees.

We do understand that many of you like to show your appreciation and thanks in some manner. If you are so inclined, we recommend that you donate a gift or a check to the On Top of the World Clearwater Employee Gift Fund, as opposed to giving a worker a tip directly.

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The Management Company will then combine its annual thank you gift distribution with this Employee Gift Fund to make overall distributions to employees during its annual appreciation luncheon.

The OTOW emergency after-hours phone number is 727-799-1115. Please call this number, after hours, in the event of an emergency, such as a water intrusion into your condo. For all other inquiries regarding general issues or questions that are not service-related, you will need to come in person to the Community Service Office.

OTOW RAVE Alerts

Signing up for OTOW-ALERTS (powered by RAVE) is incredibly easy. Simply go to www.otowclearwaterinfo. com and from the home page scroll down to the bottom of the page and the "Sign Up Now" box will be located to the left of the screen. Click to enroll.

You can also sign up from the "Stay Informed" tab located at the top of the home page.

Alternatively, you may visit the Community Service Office to apply.

This is without obligation or cost to you. Your email and cell phone numbers are secure, never shared, and never solicited.

OTOW-ALERTS provides advance warning of severe weather events as well as other matters of critical concern to the residents of OTOW Clearwater Condominium Community. It is not hyperbole to say an advanced warning may save lives!

As a reminder, when signing up for community and emergency alerts, be sure to enter your building number. You can select to receive notifications via text, telephone call, and/or email. You can select one, two, or all three notification options.

Should you wish to change your notification options you can do that by visiting the Community Service Office, calling 727-683-6981, or email at clear-waterinfo@otowfl.net.

What To Do When

Do you know what to do if you find yourself in a situation where you feel threatened?

If the situation is an emergency, you should contact 911. If the situation is not an emergency, you can contact the non-emergency number for the Pinellas County Sheriff's Office at 727-582-6200.

When speaking with the responding deputy, be prepared to provide them with specific details of statements made and make them aware that you fear for your personal safety.

If you are dissatisfied with how the deputy handles your concerns, you can contact the non-emergency number provided above and request a supervisor to speak with for further clarification. They can do their due diligence and find out why the call was handled in a particular manner.

Remember, there are factors that go into deciding to arrest someone. Each situation is unique and whether a threat is considered credible depends on various factors. A vague or ambiguous statement might not necessarily be considered a credible threat unless it can be backed by actions or other evidence to suggest that there is real intent to do harm.






Water heaters traditionally last 10-15 years.

If your water heater fails, it could not only flood your unit, but units below you. You may be financially responsible if it causes damage to your neighbors' units.

Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office (CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted.

If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter.

The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled.

Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received.

From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request. It is not necessary to report service requests more than once.

If you have any questions regarding your request, and until the Community Service Office reopens, please call the Service Request Line at 727-683-6981.

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is exclusive to the condo and is the owner's responsibility. The Association's responsibility is to the structure and common elements.

Paint/Waterproofing

The fronts of Building 85 and Building 87 will be the next two structures to see crews from the community's painting contractor arriving in November.

The recoating of the specialty element along the roofline of Building 22, that was substantially damaged by Hurricane Milton last year, is another painting project anticipated to take place in November. The project will require the use of aerial lift equipment and will take roughly two weeks to complete.

As always, please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating closely to parking areas and front/

rear porches which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or property. Thank you for your cooperation in advance and keep in mind that inclement weather can affect start and completion dates.

Construction, Roofing and Large Scope Projects

As of this Novembers update, there are no large-scale construction projects scheduled for November.

Recurring Reminders for All Community Residents

As a reminder, in 2023 the Management Company recommenced its enforcement efforts by removing all unapproved items placed in building common areas. This includes, but is not limited to, plants (live or artificial), personal items, non-exterior rated furniture, rusted chairs/tables or in disrepair, tchotchkes, etc., etc, as these items are not permitted to occupy common spaces.

As has been referenced in the newspaper, on the community TV channel, and the bulletins posted in all building center core lobbies, these items will be removed and disposed of without further notice.

These ongoing efforts help keep the areas safe for first responders as well as maintain an aesthetically pleasing community for all to reside in. We ask that residents help keep the community's common areas in compliance by reporting violations of this nature to the Management Company. We appreciate the community's cooperation and support in reporting any violations of this nature so the Management Company can investigate and correct if neces-

The Management Company would also like to thank the residents who live on the second and third floors for their cooperation in making the On Top of the World community a safer and more aesthetically pleasing place to live by removing their floor mats from the common area.

The community's response for compliance was astounding, as has been the feedback regarding these efforts.

Once again, thank you for your sup-

port in this undertaking. Now that the notification and compliance piece has been completed, the Management Company will continue the ongoing compliance enforcement of these common areas where the mats were once located, as well as repainting areas that could not be cleaned up to community standards.

As a reminder to all residents and in keeping with condominium rules governing common areas, any floor mats placed in the second or third floor balcony walkways or center core areas will be removed without any further notification. Please assist us in keeping these walkway areas clear while making your community a safer and more beautiful place to live.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle.

This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hanger brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future.

Inspection Services representatives also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproof coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you are not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service from the coating vendor. We appreciate

your cooperation in making this project a success across the community.

First floor unit owners will continue receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department as the Management Company works toward the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community.

The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike.

To keep all residents in the community aware of this compliance issue, the notice will be published in upcoming editions of the OTOW newspaper. The Management Company asks if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stones at the earliest convenience.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The Management Company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas. Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Many times, decorative rocks or landscaping are installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you start a project.

The Management Company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the Community Service Office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard East.

Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt, water softeners are permissible in the community.

Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the Management Office and schedule a follow-up visit Company. Thanks for your advanced cooperation.

Storm Shelters - Get Informed Before A Hurricane Arrives

Pinellas County has 3 storm shelters available to people who are dependent on electricity or need assistance with medications. But the time to get informed about these shelters is not when a hurricane is here. The time is now. You must be pre-registered to be accepted at a county shelter.



Please note, during inclement weather, you may experience loss of elevator service or loss of power. Please plan ahead.

The shelters are available through the Pinellas County Special Needs Evacuation Program. Transportation to shelters is available. No pets are allowed. If you cannot find someone to take care of your pet, Pinellas County Animal Services may be able to help. If you choose to stay at a shelter, you must bring your own medical equipment, medications, blankets, pillows, change of clothing, batteries, special dietery items, sources of activities, personal hygiene products, radios, ear plugs, important papers and a list of emergency contacts.

Below are some of the key topics discussed.

Parking in Fire Lanes


Florida Statute 316.1945 and Pinellas County Codes prohibit parking or standing in fire lanes or any area marked "No Parking." Our community's fire lanes are properly marked and vehicles parked there may be reported to the Community Service Office at 727-683-6981. Reported vehicles will be tagged and may be towed.

Visitor Parking

Visitor spaces marked with a "V" are for short-term guests only and not for resident use. Residents with multiple vehicles should use their assigned space or street parking in areas without "No Parking" signs. Please do not park in bike lanes, fire lanes, cul-de-sacs, or at the end of streets marked as fire lanes.

Multiple Vehicles

Each condominium unit is assigned at least one parking space. If you notice vehicles being parked improperly or in violation of these guidelines, please contact the Inspection Services Department located in the Community Service Office.



Pedestrian Safety When Walking

Florida law requires pedestrians to walk facing oncoming traffic. All bicycle traffic must follow the rules of the road which are the same as motor vehicles follow. Bicyclists and all non- motorized vehicles, for example scooters or skateboards, must also yield to pedes-

A suggestion was made to add pedestrian symbols to existing bike lanes and the board is reviewing the potential cost. Until then, for your safety, please continue to walk facing traffic for safety.

Tennis Court Access and Lighting

A suggestion was made to add a sidewalk from Columbia Avenue to the back tennis court gate for emergency

The Clearwater assistant fire marshal confirmed that emergency personunlock the gate when needed. For your safety, entry to the tennis courts will remain through the gate by the Pavilion.

Tennis court lights are on timers and stay lit until 10 p.m. Players can press the button to extend lighting for about two hours per use. Suggestions for lighting changes are being shared with the SCA for review.





Computer Club members learn about Google Voice and Password Check

Everyone knows the value of using Google Search to find information. But did you know that Google also offers dozens of other free and useful apps?

On Top of the World Computer Club members Rowland Hetrick and Joe Wisinski recently led a session about some of those apps, including Google Voice and Google Password Checkup.

Both Google Voice and Password Checkup require a free Google account. You can create an account on google.com.

Google Voice

Google Voice provides users with a free phone number. Just like the number that comes with your phone. You can get calls, texts and voicemails on Voice.

Rowland suggested that we get a free Voice number to use as a "junk" phone number. For example, when a website requires a phone number, but we don't want anyone from that site to call or text us, we can give them our Google Voice number.

We can then set the Voice number to



"do not disturb." All incoming calls will then be sent to voicemail. You won't see text notifications either.

To set up your free Google Voice number, go to voice.google.com.

Alternatively, you can install the Google Voice app from the Google Play Store (for Android phones) or the App Store (for iPhones).

Password Checkup

If you've saved passwords in your browser, you can use Google's free Password Checkup service to check the security of those passwords. Here's how:

1. Type "passwords.google.com" into your computer browser (for example, Chrome or Edge).

2. Click on "Go to Password Checkup." This is what you'll read: "Check the security of passwords you've saved to your Google Account. Learn if they were compromised, see how strong they are and if you've used any more than once."

3. Click on "Check Passwords." You'll be asked to sign into your Google

4.Click on "Next" and you'll see a password checkup report, along with suggestions for improving your password security.

For more help with these topics, come to a Computer Club help session. We are available every Wednesday morning from 8:30 to 10 in the Learning Lab, which is in the West Activity Center. Please arrive before 9:30 a.m. so we have enough time to help you.

Let state sizing guidelines help you make the correct A/C purchase

Editor's Note: The following column is written by On Top of the World resident Larry Harkins, state licensed in Heating and Air Conditioning Installations and now retired from owning his own business. Larry submitted a guest column to share his professional insights with other residents for when the time comes to purchase a new air conditioning unit.

As a newly retired heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) professional, and recent resident of On Top of the World-Clearwater, I've spent more than 40 years in the heating and air conditioning trade. I have been certified in both Florida and Texas.

After settling into my own condo, I noticed a persistent musty odor and visible mold growth in the bathroom grout. These are all signs pointed to excessive indoor humidity and prompted me to investigate further.

The Problem: Humidity and Mold

Despite having upgraded doublepane, shatter resistant windows, my condo's air conditioning system remained the same size as before a Guest Columnist

renovation. This mismatch raised a red flag. I consulted a professional in a newer HVAC category recognized by the State of Florida – an Air Man, who conducted a thorough assessment of my system. By doing it this way, you can shop all the different HVAC companies with this knowledge.

The results were eye-opening.

My existing 2.5 ton unit was oversized for the condo's current insulation and window efficiency. The correct size was determined to be 1.5 tons – a significant reduction that made a noticeable difference in comfort and air quality, as well as reducing the initial cost and monthly utility expense.

Why A/C Sizing is Critical in Florida

In Florida, a state certified air conditioning contractor is responsible for ensuring that any installed system is properly sized. This isn't just a best practice – it's a legal requirement under the Florida Building Code.

Key Requirements

- Mandatory Sizing Calculations: HVAC systems must be sized using established methods like ACCA manual J (Air Conditioning Contractors of America) or equivalent procedures.
- Permit Applications: For full system replacements, contractors or licensed Florida professional engineers (PEs) must submit nationally recognized sizing calculations to the code official.

Consequences of Improper Sizing

• Oversized units: These cool the space too quickly, leading to a short cycle. The system doesn't run long enough to dehumidify the air, resulting

• Undersized units: These units struggle to maintain desired temperatures, running constantly and driving up energy costs.

What Goes Into Proper Sizing?

Accurate A/C sizing involves evaluating multiple factors, including square footage of the home, insulation levels, window type and quality, orientation and sun exposure, ceiling height and internal heat sources (appliances and number of occupants).

The Bottom Line

Following Florida's HVAC sizing guidelines not only ensures compliance, but also improves comfort, reduces mold risk and lowers utility bills. If you're experiencing similar issues, I strongly recommend consulting a certified professional to assess your system.

Proper sizing is more than a technical detail – it's essential to healthy, efficient living in Florida's climate.

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The final 'Inside Showbiz' column on our friend who created 'Inside Showbiz'

Did you know On Top of the World News had an Emmy winner on its news staff?

Yes. You did.

For 13 years Walter Balderson wrote the "Inside Showbiz" column for this newspaper. From 2009 - 2022, he wrote approximately 160 columns on showbiz celebrities - their lifestyles, their treasured moments and their troubled times.

Walter wrote his columns based on first-hand knowledge and internet research. His first three celebrity columns were about Jimmy Durante, Dinah Shore and Dean Martin. His final three celebrity columns were about James Dean. Lucille Ball and Don Rickles.

Sadly, we recently lost Walter. He got promoted, left us with no fanfare and that's just stant replay, Walter was there. not right.

Everyone here has read at least some of Walter's columns over 13 years. But OTOW News never ran an "Inside Showbiz" column about Walter.

Until now.

This story is well overdue.

This is not an obituary. This is a tribute to a celebrity who made sure people who read OTOW News were entertained each month.

This story is written as Walter would have written his own Inside Showbiz column. Please enjoy:

Inside Showbiz Nov 2025

Walter Balderson was born in 1926 in Virginia. He studied at the Central Technical Institute in Kansas Citv. He was a World War II veteran serving aboard the US Navy destroyer George K MacKenzie.

He would become a pioneer in the TV journalism field from 1949-1984, working 35 years for NBC.

Walter not only did broad-



casting, he changed broad-

When TV began the monumental transition from black and white to color, Walter was one of the lead engineers.

When Bob Hope did his first TV special in color, Walter was the engineer.

When sports began using in-

He was also a key figure in the development and refinement of early videotape editing.

Walter was there for Lyndon B Johnson's inauguration. He was the lone TV rep when Harry S. Truman handed over the gavel. Walter was responsible for "feeding" media updates to all three major TV networks during the inauguration.

Walter called that moment the greatest memory of his ca-

Walter later flew with President Johnson to Vietnam.

Walter covered every Democratic and Republican Convention from 1951-1984.

He was nominated for three Emmy Awards and won one in 1977 for outstanding achievement in broadcast engineering.

In 1984 Walter retired from NBC. He eventually found his way to Florida and moved into On Top of the World-Clearwa-

In April 2009, OTOW News Building Reporter Marge Mayer wrote a story about Walter. The headline asked the guestion, "Did you know OTOW has an Emmy Award winner?"

We certainly found out.

Seven months after that article was published, Walter volunteered to write a monthly column for this newspaper. Most of the "Inside Showbiz" people he wrote about were people whom he met, filmed, worked with or socialized with. What he didn't know, he researched on the internet to fill in the blanks.


Walter may have been a pioneer in turning black and white TV into color TV, but he was old-fashioned when it came to submitting his newspaper stories. Every article was written by hand or typed on a typewriter. A third person, usually his editor, had to retype each report on a computer for news print.

Walter attended annual Press Association Writers Workshops. He attended endof-the-season Appreciation Dinners. When the Press Association had functions involving wine, I asked Walter to be the guest bartender. It only seemed appropriate to me to have our Emmy winner pouring and passing out the wine.

Walter gladly did so.

Finally, in December 2021, there was a note attached to one of Walter's columns. At age 95, he admitted he was slowing down and was submitting his final column. He wrote about the Showboat Dinner Theatre in Clearwater and talked about how, in the old days, people loved to eat and get entertained at the same time. It is a scenario still around today, but not nearly as popular as during Walter's glory years.

Walter's final column ran in the January 2022 edition of OTOW News. In that same column, he said we live in the

greatest country in the world. first section. He reminded everyone to hug each grandchild at Christmas time. He told people not to take anything for granted.

He thanked everyone in this community for their support as he went from world famous TV engineer to On Top of the World column writer.

Walter then quietly got promoted at age 96.





'Over-55' is federal legislation that allows 'older' people to live together

Hello folks. I want to take a moment to discuss "over-55" communities and how they apply to condominium and homeowner associations, regardless of where they exist in the United States.

First, the concept of an "over-55" community stems from a Federal legislation called, "Housing for Older Persons Act of 1995 (HOPA)."

Before HOPA was passed by Congress, condominium and HOA Associations could exclude occupancy of its units to persons below a certain age, usually to prevent minors or other folks, perhaps too young or pregnant, to reside in the community.

There are other types of older persons housing, but I am only going to discuss "over-55" communities.

Basically, in that type of community, HOPA provides that in order to maintain an over 55 status, at least 80 percent of the units must be occupied by at least one person who is 55 years of age or older.

Notice that I've emphasized "occupied," not owned.


If the over 55 status is lost, then Federal Law prohibits discrimination in housing, based on age, race, sex, etc.

So, keeping that status is critical for Associations who have older persons who want to live in an adult environment.

What does this all mean for folks who live in AND who occupy a dwelling in either of the On Top of the World communities over-55 sections in Ocala or in Clearwater?

Example: A 60-year-old person occupies a unit with his/her 50-year-old spouse. This complies with HOPA.

Suppose the 60-year-old passes on. Can the 50-year-old remain in occu-



pancy with all the privileges of anyone in occupancy. Yes. Why? Remember that 20 percent part? Well, at OTOW that 20 percent part is available for persons who survive the one who is 55 or

Now, what about someone who inherits a dwelling at OTOW? Can a child, who inherits a condo, move in and occupy?

I think the child has to be over 14, but other than that type of issue, yes, the beneficiary can occupy.

Why?

Same reason.

At OTOW, that 20 percent figure is kept available for just these purposes. Ownership?

Well, remember what I said about occupancy? It's occupancy that matters, not ownership. So, people under 55 can own regardless of whether they also occupy.

OK. So what about the over 55 person who lives with his/her 10-year-old grandchild? If the over-55 passes, can the 10-year-old continue to occupy?

Thank heavens it hasn't happened,

but if it did, the answer is no.

There are some age restrictions that can be legally maintained. It might be 14 or younger, but I am not sure on that

Can someone "get away" with violating the over-55 rules?

I suppose so.

There's many other types of examples, but I've just outlined the basics.

Q. How do you see artificial intelligence affecting the practice of law?

The Florida Bar Association is already doing that with seminars designed to help lawvers adapt to the changing landscape of the legal profession.

As for clients, if they haven't already done so, soon enough they'll adopt Al as a method of educating themselves on the legal issues that concern them. That means lawyers are going to meet with clients who've already educated themselves on their legal concerns.

Clients are going to have smart questions for their lawyers. For me, personally, I love that. The more my clients know about the issue they are facing, the wiser they are about what

needs to be done to accomplish their

That's great for good lawyers who care about their clients. The lazy ones will just have to set aside their printed forms and look and listen to what the clients have to say.

Nothing better than looking and listening, if you ask me.

Bottom line on AI, and the practice of law, some good things. Some bad things. Some things we'll have to waitand see. I suspect I will have more AI questions and I'll print some if I can.

Who is allowed to use a bicycle lane?

Do you know how to use bike lanes? with a friend. Bike lanes are for the exclusive use of pedestrians, bicyclists and tricyclists, and motorized wheelchairs or scooters.

When can you park in a bike lane?

No parking in the bike lanes, even if you have to make a longer trek to your

No loading/unloading moving vans in a bike lane, even if your mover says it will cost you more to find another spot.

No running errands in the bike lane, even if it's going to be less than five No stopping in a bike lane to chat passengers:

Florida Law

Parking Prohibited in Specified Places

(1) Except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic, or in compliance with law or the directions of a police officer or official traffic control device, no person shall:

(b) Stand or park a vehicle, whether occupied or not, except momentarily to pick up or discharge a passenger or

6. On an exclusive bicycle lane.

Clearly, the intent of the law is to give s. 316.1945 - Stopping, Standing, or preferential use to bicyclists and not allow parking or standing for more than a very short time, and then only to embark or discharge passengers.

The SCA bus service is exclusively for use by Association-approved residents and tenants only. If you do not have a valid Activity Card, you may not ride the shuttle bus. 2. Reservations are REQUIRED - please call 727-799-3417 Option 7 no later than 10 a.m. the day prior to your planned trip. Monday's trip deadline is 10 a.m. Friday.

1. You MUST have a valid Activity Card and present it to the driver upon entering the bus.

Please be present in the core of your building at your scheduled pick up time. 3. Shopping time is one hour for grocery stores and one hour for Walmart. Shopping time

begins when you are dropped off at your destination. Although appreciated, the driver is prohibited from accepting gifts and tips.

5. The driver may not assist you with enterting or exiting the bus, or with your packages. Please do not ask the driver to do so.

6. The start time listed is when the shuttle bus departs the Community Service Office. The pick-up schedule will rotate wekly between low and high buildings, meaning one week pick-up will start with lower-numbered buildings and the following week it will start with the

higher-numbered buildings. 7. Seats are not assigned. They are first-come, first-served.

8. Seatbelts must be fastened during bus movement and must remain fastened until the bus

comes to a complete stop.

9. Eating, drinking, smoking, vaping, fighting, distracting the driver, or any other unacceptable actions at the discretion of the driver are strictly prohibited on the bus. Violation of the above guidelines may result in your bus privileges being revoked.

10. All route changes are at the discretion of management.



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

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Herbs are one of natures best preventative foods and there are a variety of ways to use them

At the October meeting of the Plant-Based Living Club, we discussed the benefits of incorporating a variety of herbs into our daily diets.

Intense colors (such as tumeric and red onions) and intense flavors (such as garlic and ginger) can be signs of intense healthy benefits.

A medicinal herb is defined as any plant that can be used in healing. But more important than "curing," plants play a beneficial role in preventing illnesses.

Rich in nutrients, herbs are the supreme preventive medicine, bolstering our body's ability to fight off pathogens that cause illness. Many common herb plants are still our best and most popular remedies for common ailments.

If there is anything that enhances the flavor of food more, or improves health better than garlic, it's yet to be discovered. Add garlic freely to soups, casseroles, pastas and other recipes.

For complete medicinal benefits, eat it raw

At the Plant-Based Living Club's October meeting, we learned a great way to eat garlic raw.

Pickled garlic is quite delicious, with a sweet, hot, pungent flavor. This is a great way to eat raw garlic with all of its virtues intact, without fear of stomach distress that raw garlic is known to sometimes cause.

Pickled Garlic

Fill a widemouth glass jar with whole peeled garlic cloves. Add enough unpasteurized apple cider vinegar to completely cover the garlic. Cap and place the jar in a warm spot (near a sunny window is fine) and let it sit for



3-4 weeks.

Strain off the liquid. Set half of the liquid aside to be used in salad dressings and marinades.

Place the rest of the liquid in a saucepan and add an equal amount of honey. Warm over very low heat, stirring, until the honey is thoroughly mixed into the vinegar. Pour this sauce back over the garlic, recap and let it sit another 3-4 weeks.

The garlic should be stored in a cool, dark location, where it will keep for a year or longer - though it never lasts that long.

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


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Fixers Club members will listen to your project ideas at Fall Festival


The Fixers, Fiddlers and Fumblers Club is back in full schedule from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday.



Philosophy Club focuses on TV speakers




Jerry McDonald steps down after two years as full-time moderator of Philosophy Club.



Easy-to-access French classes in your own community

During this past summer, the French Language and Culture Society missed some of our summer residents.

We are now two and a half years old as a recognized On Top of the World club where you can join to learn about French culture and language.

But that's not all.

We also learn about French


wines and French food.

In order not to interfere with your plans for the weekend, our sessions are right in the middle of the week before

Iunchtime.
The location of our sessions is downstairs in the East Activity Center Dunedin Room every Wednesday at 11 am.

You can now take a course in French without paying the lofty fees as you would at a university. In fact, some of you can walk to class since the East Activity Building is in the heart of the community.

We start off each class by telling jokes, then we watch a 10 minute excerpt from a French-speaking film (with English subtitles, of course). This is followed by exercises in pronunciation and vocabulary that we can use for daily life in case we need to go to a



French restaurant or visit Montreal, Paris, or even Martinique in the future.

Just a note about our past French patrimony in Florida. Many people now speak French in Florida, but few know that Florida was once French territory due to an expedition that began in 1562. A few years later, the French were defeated by the Spaniards who held Florida until the English occupied the territory in 1763.

If it were not for the English and the Spaniards, we would be speaking French in Florida today.

Nevertheless, we still have a good number of French and Franco-Americans who live in various regions of our beloved state. French culture still survived in Florida in some areas. In Pinellas County, we are fortunate to have a number of French restaurants and courses. But why spend money on gas and hundreds of dollars on tuition when you can learn French for free here?

Once one gets across the pronunciation barrier of the French language, then we learn to communicate with each other using very familiar expressions like ça va (OK)? And the indispensable "Bonjour."

We also hope to bring back Madame Galante, who will show us how to bake a good quiche Lorraine.

The text book that we use in our sessions is called French Made Simple (2006 edition) by Pamela Rose Haze (Broadway Books). The book can be purchased for about \$5 to \$10 online through Thrift Books. If you wish, the cost of printing for the outline for each session is only a donation \$5 a month for printing. It is not obligatory. Sessions are always free with no obligation to pay.

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
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Whether salsa dancing or drinking Grog Punch, Lambda parties are a care-free evening





Among our trainers are a former coach for USA Bowls and several national and international champions!





World News

European union defense ministers pledged troops and equipment to create a 50,000 force by 2003. The move was intended to manage a wide range of crises without reliance on the U.S. However, Europe significantly delayed and downsized the initiative and was not fully successful in reducing their reliance on U.S. military power.

U.S. News

Hillary Clinton became the first-ever First Lady elected to the U.S. Senate by the state of New York. She was re-elected by a wide margin in 2006, showing broad support from her constituents and recognition of her effectiveness. But, in 2007, she shifted her focus towards a failed run in the 2008 Presidential election.

Business World

Iraq's State Oil Marketing Organization required firms purchasing Iraqi crude to pay a 50 cent per barrel surcharge directly to its government starting Dec. 1— rather than directing funds through the United Nationsadministered "oil for food" program. The move raised serious concerns about possible sanctions violations and disruptions to the oil supply. The surcharge was sustained for about two years, generating much illicit revenue, before intensified international oversight and pricing reforms curtailed the practice.

Technology News

While its technology had been invented earlier, the first camera phones became commercially available in November 2000 ushering in the era of mobile photography. Major camera companies, like Kodak and Polaroid, famously rejected the concept, believing that phone communication would remain separate from photography. But, in a short time, supporting infrastructure developed and users found new and unforeseen applications for it, such as snapping a picture of an item to compare competitive prices or investigating health value of a food while shopping.

Medical World

Major companies pulled products after U.S. regulators issued a 2000 warning advisory against phenylpropanolamine (PPA) use in over-thecounter and prescription drug products linked to stroke in young women. Advances in medical and pharmaceutical technology enabled greater proactive concern for public health technology.

Sports World

After 15 years at the top of the chess rankings, Garry Kasparov is vanquished by 25-year-old Russian, Vladimir Kramnik, who had been his protégé. At this intense level of competition, chess is indeed a physical, as well as mental sport. Garry continued competing until retiring in 2005 after winning the prestigious Linares Tournament for the ninth time. He cited a lack of personal goals in the chess world and a desire to focus on politics and writing as his reason for retirement.

Florida News

The Miami Book Fair International occurred in Miami during November 2000. It is one of the largest and most prestigious literary festivals in the U.S., bringing together authors, publishers and readers. In 2024 the fair celebrated its 40th anniversary, highlighting its growth from a local to a global event.

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Cooking for two - very simple



Last month I gave you tips on grocery shopping. This month I am going to give you tips on cooking for one or two people after returning from the grocery store.

Cooking for one or two people is not difficult, but presents unique challenges related to portion control, food waste and finding motivation for small-

The main difficulties include scaling down recipes when buying smaller portions and the risk of food spoilage.

However, these can be overcome by planning meals, making larger batches to freeze as "planned-overs," buying smaller packages or sharing bulk items, and using flexible recipes and one-pot meals.

Quick, versatile and budget-friendly meals for one or two people often utilize pantry staples and can be scaled

When cooking for one or two people, focus on meal planning or scaling down recipes. Ideas include making personal pizzas, using the air fryer for individual portions, and incorporating planned leftovers into future meals, such as using leftover roast for sandwiches or stew.

To cook for one or two people, choose smaller cooking vessels, and repurpose ingredients to minimize waste.

You can also halve standard recipes and cook components in stages or with tools like a toaster oven.

Here are some other ideals about cooking for one or two people.

Quick and easy meals, like stir-fries, are versatile and quick. You can use any protein and vegetable you have on hand. Stir fries are sheet pan meals with minimal cleanup and customizable with various proteins and veggies.

Sheet pan meals are fast, easy and require a single sheet pan for cooking the entire meal so cleanup is a breeze.



Chicken, Cranberry, Pear and Spinach Salad.

Sheet-Pan Roasted Red Onion Chicken

Ingredients

- 2 medium red onions sliced into 3/4 thick wedges
- 2 cloves garlic, peeled
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh sage
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh thyme, plus more for serving
- 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil

Kosher salt

Freshly ground black pepper One 3 ½ pound whole chicken

2 teaspoons paprika

1 tablespoon unsalted butter Pinch of crushed red pepper flakes

Directions

- 1. Arrange a rack in center of oven (with no rack above it); preheat to 450 degrees. Place a baking sheet on rack to preheat.
 - 2. In a large bowl, combine onions, garlic, sage, thyme

and oil; season with salt and black pepper. Toss until coated, separating some, but not all of the onion layers.

- 3. Pat chicken dry, season all over with paprika, 4 teaspoon salt and pepper. Arrange chicken breast side up. Tie legs together with kitchen twine (optional) and tuck wings tips underneath.
- 4. Remove baking sheet from oven. Carefully transfer onion mixture to sheet and arrange in an even layer. Place chicken on top of onions in center of sheet pan.
- 5. Roast chicken and onions, rotating pan halfway through, until an instant-read thermometer inserted into a thigh registers 165 degrees, 60 to 70 minutes.
- 6. Transfer chicken to a cutting board. Transfer half of the onions and all all of the garlic to a blender. Add butter, vinegar, red pepper flakes, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 2 tablespoons water. Blend until smooth.
- 7. Break chicken down into eight pieces. Transfer remaining onions to a platter. Place chicken pieces on top. Spoon onion sauce over chicken. Top with thyme.

One-Pot Lemon Garlic Shrimp Pasta **Ingredients**

- 4 ounces linguine
- 2 tablespoon salt
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 2 cloves garlic
- 1 teaspoon red pepper flakes 3/4 pound large shrimp peeled, divined
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 2 cups baby spinach
- 1/4 cup parmesan cheese, grated
- 2 tablespoons fresh parsley, chopped
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Directions

- 1. In a large pot, boil water and add pasta Cook (stirring frequently) until al dente.
 - 2. Drain and set pasta aside.
- 3. In the same pot, heat olive oil and 2 tablespoons of butter. Add garlic and red pepper flakes, cook until fragrant.
- 4. Toss in shrimp, salt and pepper to taste, and stir until shrimp start to turn pink, but are not fully cooked.
 - 5. Add oregano and spinach, cook until wilted.
- 6. Return cooked pasta to the pot, add remaining butter, parmesan, and parsley. Stir until well mixed and the butter is melt-
- 7. When the shrimp are cooked, add lemon juice, mix once more, then serve while hot.

Chicken, Cranberry, And Pear Spinach Salad **Ingredients**

- Apple Cider Vinaigrette
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons apple cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon honey
 - Salad
- 1 boneless, skinless chicken breast, sliced into ½ inch pieces
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 pear, sliced
- 2 cups baby spinach 1 tablespoon dried cranberries
- 2 tablespoons toasted unsalted walnuts, chopped

Directions

- 1. Add the olive oil, apple cider vinegar, honey, Dijon mustard, salt, and pepper together in a small bowl. Set aside.
 - 2. On a cutting board, season the chicken with salt, pepper, and paprika.
- 3. Heat olive oil in a pan over medium heat. Once the oil begins to shimmer, add the chicken and cook until browned on all sides, around 4 minutes.
- 4. In a large bowl, add the sliced pear, spinach, cranberries, walnuts, and cooked chicken, and dress with the vinaigrette.

Maybe it's hanging in somebody's condo or on a tree in a homeless camp. I only hope it found a good home where it will be cared for.


Which brings us to an annual reminder. Don't forget to change the batteries in your clock at least once a year.
