OTOW resident raises more than \$9000 for childhood cancer research while home in Canada

A local man has been riding around North Kildonan this month raising money for sick kids.

Laurie Fischer, the founder of the North Kildonan Community Players, is taking part in the Great Cycle Challenge, a national fundraiser for the Sick Kids Foundation. He is one of over 52,000 taking part nationwide, who had raised a total of over \$8 million (as of summer).

"We're all trying to help the kids and their families," Fischer explained. "With a cause like this, there is no choice for me but to get involved."

In spring of 2018, Laurie was diagnosed with stage four metastasized prostate cancer.

"What I have is not curable, it is controllable," Laurie said. "Things like exercise helps, which is why I took up biking."

An active member of the community, Laurie is not one to let his diagnosis slow him down.

"I'm one of those fighters who will not let the disease control my life," he said. "I love the stage. I love sports. I continue to be involved in everything that I love. I have good days and I have bad days, just like anyone else."

Since Aug. 1, Laurie has been biking between 10 and 20 (12 miles) kilometers a day. He and four other riders — Jordan Phillips, Loren Findley, Jason Spearman and Brook Jones — make up a team called the Winterpeggers, who encourage each other towards their goals.

"North Kildonan is a wonderful area," Fischer said. "What I really like about this area is so many different paths you can take."

Earlier this month, he surpassed his goal of cycling 400 kilometers (250 miles), and had shattered his \$500 fundraising goal, collecting over \$8,500 in pledges with over a week left to ride.

"I'm thrilled to see so many people who want to help," he said. "I have over 100 people who have made donations between \$5 and \$520."

Laurie had the highest fundraising to-

tal of 2,531 participants in Manitoba, and was ranked 15th in the country.

"I'm a 66-year-old man who has lived a full and happy life," Laurie said. "I've done a lot, I've had a great time. But I can't imagine being a 6- or 7-year-old child fighting this disease, or being the parent of a child fighting this disease. Childhood cancer is not a fun thing. It doesn't just affect the child, but their whole family and community."

The Great Cycle Challenge ran until the end of August.

"I encourage anyone to (still) give, even if it's only \$5 or \$10," Laurie said. "Everything adds up."

Covid-19 community update

On Sept. 16, the Florida Department of Health issued a public health advisory and new guidelines that apply to organizers of large events.

The guidelines include considerations for postponing or canceling events based on the levels of community spread for COVID-19.

Long story short, senior communities are still considered to be a higher risk population for Covid-19 transmission.

Accordingly, the Association will continue to restrict the number of people who can attend events to limit exposure and transmission.

Pinellas County continues to have high rates of infection.

Bearing this in mind, your Association does recognize the necessity of moving forward. As a way to achieve this, but still adhere to recommendations from Governor Ron DeSantis, the CDC and local Board of Public Health, the plan is to reduce golf restrictions related to number of players. This will take effect on Monday, Oct. 5, to include foursomes.

You may only have four at the tee box at a time and all must social distance, wear your masks and bring hand sanitizer for use as needed.

Please do not congregate in groups before, during or after your game concludes.

All other restrictions remain in place, including, but not limited to, no guests.

Additionally, restrictions will be reduced for tennis and pickleball to include extended hours of play on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. beginning on Wednesday, Oct. 7.

Again, all other restrictions remain in place. We recommend all players bring hand sanitizer and practice social distancing.

Additionally, please remember to be kind and support the SCA staff especially when they are performing activity card checks.

Did You Know

LIVING ON TOP OF THE WORLD OWNERSHIP TRANSFERS

There are three methods in which ownership of a condo may transfer to another. All three methods require the new owner(s) to submit an Application for Approval of Ownership. Additional requirements are listed in the application packet.



(1) PURCHASE A PROPERTY: The most common method of ownership transfer occurs when a property is sold to another. This is normally handled through a real estate contract between the seller and the buyer.

(2) DEED CHANGE: The second method of ownership transfer is through a deed change. The current owner transfers ownership to another person or they add another person to the deed. The current owner is the Grantor while the person receiving ownership in the property is the Grantee.

(3) INHERITANCE: The last method of transferring ownership is through inheritance. When a condo is inherited, the beneficiary becomes the owner. If the property is to be retained, ownership transfer approval from the Association is required.

The title company/attorney should record the deed, Certificate of Approval

(COA), and Consent (if applicable) with Pinellas County once the transfer process is complete.

The Application for Approval of Ownership may be printed from our Website https://www.otowclearwaterinfo.com/community-information/ or is available from our Community Service Office.

Once the Association grants occupancy approval, owner residents may obtain an Activity Card from the Community Service Office for a nominal fee of \$3.

Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office (CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. The office closes for lunch from noon-12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted.

If your call goes to voice mail, it is because staff is working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter.

The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled. Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received.

From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request. It is not necessary to report service requests more than one time.

If the CSO is closed and you have any questions regarding your request, please call the Service Request Line at the number listed below.

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is exclusive to the unit and is the owner's responsibility. The Association's responsibility is to the structure and common elements.



Please do not leave health-related emergency information on the service request line as this will delay the amount of time it takes us to respond to non-emergency service requests.

The OTOW after-hours phone number is 727-799-1115 for issues such as water intrusion into your unit. For all other inquiries regarding general matters or questions that are not service related, you will need to come in person to the Community Service Office.

October is no time to let your

As I start to write this article, there are several tropical waves and storms approaching Florida and causing us all concerns.

Experience has shown that any hurricane can still be very disruptive to the Southeastern United States. We can experience not just damage from wind and rain deluge, but also with travel disruption and utility crews exiting Florida to offer needed assistance in other states.

True to form, Parkway Management Company went into storm readiness state as soon as the predictions rated a high likelihood of a storm event. They went to a high state of readiness anticipating the need to respond very rapidly to storm threats.

To make a general point about storm events, or any natural disaster's effect on this community, when it comes to individual service requests, especially after any catastrophic event, each request is evaluated based on severity and risk to life and property.

The damage is then stabilized as needed, and resolved at the soonest possible time, given all else that may be needing special attention.

It is important that each resident of this community show patience and kindness to each other and to the workers who have left family to rally to the needs of the community.

Storms and protracted electrical outages are periods of high stress. To paraphrase Abraham Lincoln, in challenging times we must look to "the better angels of our nature."

It does not take a tropical storm event to setback scheduled ground maintenance. Really, all it takes are large summer storms to disrupt the schedule.

As you no doubt observe, the lawns and shrubs love the wet, warm weather and respond by doubling their growth.

Put the two things together and lawn maintenance crews struggle to keep pace.

As I write this article in late September, work is mostly caught up, however, that is always subject to changes together with the weather.

Entry Gatehouses

Please take note that the gatehouses are staffed with uniformed attendants who provide information and directions to both residential and commercial traffic, and help keep the traffic moving along.

These gatehouses do have video surveillance. All vehicles entering the community have their license tags photographed.

Video surveillance is scheduled for an upgrade to an even higher resolution cameras in mid-2021.

If you see anything that would cause you concern or alarm, notify the Pinellas County Sheriff's Department emergency number immediately. The faster the response, the better opportunity there is to work with the Sheriff's Department in providing critical information that may lead to a resolution of your concern.

Prevent Expensive Losses

October is a great month to check the condition of your water heater. This appliance is usually silently working away... until it starts to leak.

You may not notice the leak until you hear from an angry downstairs neighbor or you flood your own unit.

The Association is responsible for the area between the units. By the time you hear from a neighbor about flooding, you have already flooded the Association's property.

Each individual owner is responsible for the damage to their unit and contents, your neighbor's damage, and damage to Association property.

Water damage can be very expensive to repair primarily because it is rarely contained in one unit, even more so if you've failed to keep your homeowner's insurance in place.

The water heater, like your air conditioner, is the owner's responsibility to maintain, repair or replace.

If your water heater is more than 10 years old, it needs replacement. If you don't know the original install date, then it probably needs replacement.

If your water heater is less than 10 years old, an excellent and very affordable early warning device is the Water Screamer by Gizmode. If you can successfully put batteries in a flashlight, you can operate this small device. It really is that simple to use.

The device has a small sensor that you place under the water heater. If it contacts moisture, the alarm sounds and provides warning. This device is available at cost, through our Community Service Office. Look for the display advertisement in this paper for more detail.

For the more tech savvy, NEST_{TM} makes a dandy digital sensor that will alert you through your phone. Very handy for the traveler.

Upcoming Projects

Buildings 8 and 9 will be the next two structures to see crews from the painting contractor arrive.

The front façade of both of these structures will be repainted along with the center core areas.

As always, please keep in mind that our painting contractor will be operating in close proximity to parking areas and front/rear porches which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or property. Thank you for your cooperation in advance and keep in mind that inclement weather can affect start and completion dates.

As the painting contractor moves throughout the property, management company crews will be installing new life-safety compliant, reflective unit numbers on the common area wall in proximity to unit front doors.

The installation of new unit address numbers will continue once the painting contractor completes the recoating of the front elevation of buildings throughout the community.

Unit numbers currently attached to the common element wall will be removed by the painting contractor, while numbers installed on front unit doors will need to be removed by the unit owner.

If a unit owner wishes, they may contract with the management company for the removal of any old unit numbers for a nominal fee. Please remember that for community standard reasons, all old unit numbers must be removed.

Construction, Roofing and Large Scope Projects

The final phase of a 3-year sanitary sewer restoration project will begin in October.

The vendor will be performing work that will improve the efficiency and extend the useful life of the community's gravity sewer system.

These improvements will affect portions of the east side of property from the Belcher Road entrance through the northern end of the property. These crews will be working in close proximity to streets as well as in the back lawn area of buildings.

As with all projects involving active work zones and heavy equipment, please avoid these areas until the contractor's crews have completed their work. Thanks again for your cooperation.

As of this update, the award of the next cycle of railing improvements is in the works that also involves the engineering and county permitting process.

The Management Company anticipates that the projects at Buildings 63 and 64 will begin sometime in late October. This work will entail the removal of current railings, followed by the installation of code compliant guardrails and stairwell

components by a state licensed contractor. This work involves power tools so please be aware that elevated noise levels are a byproduct of the contractor's efforts.

We ask that residents please pay close attention to cordoned off areas as some may be closed temporarily throughout the day to allow for the safe replacement of railing elements. Thanks in advance for doing your part while this work is underway.

Recurring reminders for all community residents

Building walkway repairs will continue as construction crews perform maintenance to the second and third floor walking surfaces.

Many buildings will see these restoration crews as the Management Company focuses its efforts on these types of repairs. This work requires the use of specialized power tools and may cause a temporary inconvenience in the form of noise and dust. Repair crews will do their best to limit the inconvenience during this necessary work.

These small repair areas will also be coated as a future preventative.

As always, we ask that residents please limit any foot traffic in and around any work area they may encounter.

Walkway coating improvements will continue across property. These improvements involve preparation of the surface (and occasionally sub-surface) concrete, the addition of acrylic fortified materials to stairwell surfaces, and then the application of a quality slip-resistant barrier coating

The end result is intended to provide longevity to the balcony walking surfaces as well as returning the look to its original conveyed color scheme.

The Management Company will post notices on affected building's bulletin boards concerning the dates crews are expected to commence the work. Please be aware of Caution and Wet Paint signs in and around these work areas.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle.

This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hangar brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future.

The Management Company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the Community Service Office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard East.

Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt, water softeners are permissible in the community. Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the management company. Thanks for your advance cooperation.

Inspection services representatives will be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproofing coatings during the 2020/2021 improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied. If for some reason you were not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit by the coatings vendor. We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a success across the community.

Many first floor unit owners will be receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department over the coming months as the Management Company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike. The

Management Company asks that if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stones at the earliest convenience.

With the cooperation of residents, the number of clamsell awnings is down to less than 100 remaining. If you remember, we started this with more than 2,200 such awnings.

The Inspection Services Division continues to find awnings with compromised connection points to the common element. In response, they have been reaching out to affected unit owners to have the awnings removed and limit any further damage to the common elements of the building.

As noted in prior articles, "clamshell" awnings do not meet building code for wind resistance. Fortunately there are new products that do. If you have an awning, please arrange for its inspection through the Community Service Office at the East Activity Center.

Clutter enforcement has always been one of the most frequent recurring compliance issues within the On Top of the World condominium community. These efforts make for an overall safer community in which to live.

If you receive notification that an item is out of compliance, please correct the issue immediately. If you have a question and were not able to speak with a compliance representative at the time of the notification, please stop by the Community Service Office and request an appointment. Someone will be glad to contact you.

Please remember that items tagged in common areas may be removed and disposed of without further notice.

Please help make your community safer by complying if you receive a violation tag/door hanger. Your continued cooperation is appreciated.



All registered voters should be allowed to vote

It has been the policy of the News to steer clear of partisan politics. The number of No Party Affiliation (NPA) registered voters in the community has been on a steady rise. With the author's permission to reprint, this is offered to afford you, the reader, another perspective. The News neither favors nor opposes Amendment 3. Our sole purpose is to inform. Please read in the spirit in which it is intended and remember Get Out And Vote!

Should every registered voter be allowed to vote?

Allowing qualified voters to vote seems like a simple premise.

Unfortunately, that is not how we conduct elections in Florida. For those who wish to vote for their next State House or Senate member or for Governor or Cabinet members, as stunning as it sounds, the truth is that most voters are excluded from voting in the taxpayer-funded elections that most often determine the winner.

All Voters Vote is a proposed constitutional amendment that holds to the simple premise that every qualified registered voter in Florida should be allowed to cast a ballot in all public elections. For too long, too many voters – and to be clear, we are talking about those who are already registered to vote – have been legally prohibited from voting for the person who will represent them in Tallahassee.

How can this be?

Florida is one of only nine states in America that has a restrictive process where candidates for office are elected by a tiny sliver of the electorate in closed partisan primaries. And as though to rub salt in the wounds of those excluded voters, their tax dollars are used to hold these closed elections.

The All Voters Vote initiative, Amendment No. 3, will eliminate Florida's closed partisan primary system and will end chronic gridlock and hyper-partisanship by forcing politicians to answer to every voter they represent and not just that tiny sliver from either the extreme left or the extreme right.

Consider this: Today more than 3.8 million Florida voters have been effectively disenfranchised by this system because they choose to belong to neither of the major political parties. By selecting, for example, "No Party Affiliation" (NPA) those registered voters are legally forbidden from voting in the primary elections that

Hurricane Preparation

Know where to go ahead of time if you are ordered to evacuate. Know your local hurricane evacuation route(s) and have a plan where to stay. Let family and friends know where you are going. Put together a disaster supply kit, including a flashlight, batteries, cash, first aid supplies and copies of your critical information. If you are not in an area that is advised to evacuate, and you decide to stay in your home, plan for adequate supplies in case you lose power and water for several days. Get prescriptions filled days in advance. Fill up gas tanks well in advance. Make sure you have cash on hand. Many communities have text or email alert systems for emergency notifications. To find out what alerts are available in your area, search the Internet for Pinellas County alerts.

Let's learn about the different grades of beef, pork, lamb and chicken



Beef

There are five quality grades of beef. The grades are based on two main criteria: the degree of marbling (intramuscular fat) in the beef and the maturity (estimated age of the animal at slaughter).

- 1. U.S. Prime Highest in quality and marbling, limited supply. Currently about 2.9 percent of carcasses are graded as prime.
- 2. U.S. Choice High quality, widely available in the food service industry and retail markets. Choice carcasses are 53.7 percent of the total. The difference between choice and prime is largely due to the fat content in the beef. Prime typically has a higher fat content (more and well distributed marbling) than choice.
- 3. U.S. Select (formerly Good) Lowest grade, commonly sold at retail, acceptable quality, but is less juicy due to lean-
- 4. U.S. Standard Lower quality, yet economical, lacking leanness.
- 5. U.S. Commercial Low quality, lacking tenderness, produced from older animals.

Tips On Grilling A Steak

Remove steak from the refrigerator about 30 minutes before grilling so that it comes to room temperature. This helps it cook more evenly from edges to center.

For juicier, tastier results, let the steak rest for a few minutes before slicing.

Avoid tough, chewy meat by slicing your steak against the grain. Look for the direction that the muscle fibers run, then cut in the opposite direction.



A variety of ingredients go into making the perfect chicken broth.

For thicker cuts, a meat thermometer can mean the difference between overcooked and sheer perfection.

Rare cooking temperature is 120 degrees, medium rare is 125, medium well is 150 and well done is 160.

I found the best selection of Prime Beef is at Fresh Market here in Clearwa-

Pork

Like beef, the grading of pork is voluntary. However, both meats are rarely sold without grading and inspection is required by the USDA.

Unlike beef, pork is sold only to consumers directly in "Acceptable" grade.

"Utility" grade is used in processed products and is not sold directly to the av-

Pork is sometimes called the other white meat. When buying pork, take a look at the marbling and color. Pork should be gray-pink in color, firm to the touch and include a bit of marbling for flavor.

Pork is surprisingly versatile, and the full shoulders.

cuts seem endless.

Pork shoulder is perfect for barbecued pulled pork sandwiches and pork chops are an American classic.

Let's don't forget the smoked ham for Easter and, of course, barbecue baby back ribs are a summertime treat.

Utility pork is used in the making of hot dogs, breakfast sausage and different lunch meats.

With so many options to choose from, you just need to decide what you are in the mood to cook and then enjoy.

Cooking temperature is 150-165 de-

<u>Lamb</u>

There are two grades.

1. Prime - Lamb carcasses having minimum conformation qualification for prime grade tend to be thickly muscled throughout, are moderately wide and thick in relation to their length, and have moderately plump and full legs, moderately wide thick backs, and moderately thick

2. Choice - Lamb carcasses having minimum qualifications for the good grade are slightly thin muscled throughout, are moderately narrow in relation to their length and have slightly thin, tapering legs, and slightly narrow and thick backs and shoulders.

Young lamb, ideally from 5 to 7 months old, is the kind you buy today at the super market.

Mutton is a term for lamb between 12 months and 2 years old.

Imported lamb from Australia and New Zealand are raised from a small breed of animals and always comes to us

The cooking temperature for lamb is the same as beef.

I buy my lamb from Acropolis Meat Market in Tarpon Springs on East Tarpon

Their lamb shanks are to die for.

Chicken

There are three grades.

Grade A is the highest quality and the only grade that is likely to be sold at the supermarket. This grade indicates that the chicken is virtually free from defects such as bruises, discolorations and feathers.

Grades B and C chicken are usually used in further processed products where the chicken meat is cut up or ground.

What is the best part of the chicken to make stock? Chicken feet. That's right, I said chicken feet.

2 pounds chicken feet

2 large carrots cut in half

1 onion cut into wedges

1 bunch of fresh thyme

2 celery ribs cut in half

1 large stock pot

Cover the ingredients with cold water. Simmer for two hours. Occasionally skim any foam that may come to the surface. Strain the stock though a fine mesh

Why should the right to vote be reserved only for those who belong to a political party? And why should those vot-

sent them in Tallahassee. This is patently from having a say in the outcome just because they are not in the majority party in their district?

Our system makes no sense and denying registered voters the right to cast a meaningful ballot has had profoundly negative effects on our democracy.

The All Voters Vote amendment simply says that in taxpayer funded public elections, all voters are allowed to vote. Candidates appear on a common ballot and the top-two vote getters appear on the General Election ballot where voters, once again, get the chance to choose the state's capitol.

The top two system is nothing new – it is already in place in Florida for over 400 municipalities and counties, and for judicial and special district races. In fact, more people are already elected in Florida using a top two vote getter system than for our legislative races. It is common and well-accepted by voters. More importantly, it is a proven success because those candidates cannot hide in partisan silos and must answer to every voter they represent. As a result, they are not only more responsive to their voters, they are

the interest of everyone above the narrow partisan interests of the extreme fringes of either party.

That is why we ask voters to learn as much as they can about the All Voters Vote initiative and vote Yes on Amendment #3 to ensure that they, and every other voter, will not be excluded from taxpayer funded elections. To learn more please visit www. AllVotersVote.org.

Instructions

DAY ONE

- 1. Place 1 tablespoon of broccoli seeds in a quart jar and cover with a few inches of water.
- 2. Cover seeds with water.
- 3. Cover the top of jar with a fine mesh cloth. Use an open lid.
- 4. Place jar in a warm, dark spot for one day.

DAYS TWO AND THREE

- 5. Drain thoroughly, using a fine-mesh tea strainer.
- 6. Rinse seeds with water twice each day, draining each time.
- 7. Return to warm, dark place, tilting jar so excess water can continue to drain.

DAYS FOUR, FIVE, SIX

8. Repeat, except place on windowsill for sunny exposure.

Sprouts will show small, bright green leaves.

Transfer sprouts to a storage container and refrigerate. This should supply two people with enough sprouts for the coming week.


Health Value of Broccoli Sprouts

Broccoli sprouts have sulforaphane, a cancer-fighting antioxidant.

Recent research has shown that some organs respond better than others to broccoli's anticancer properties, but the fact that any of them respond at all is pretty remarkable. (ii)

Sulforaphane is found almost exclusively in broccoli, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, cabbage and bok choy. Broccoli sprouts have the highest identified concentration. (iii)

Be aware that direct heat destroys sulforaphane. Thus, its health benefit is lost when cooking the mature broccoli.



Place seeds in a bowl or container and watch them grow right on your window sill.

You do not need a garden to grow your own broccoli sprouts, scallions and more

In 1917, as the United States fought a war in Europe, food shortages led to small victory gardens springing up across the United States.

Now, more than a century later, victory gardens are once again in fashion amid fears of food shortages during the Corona Virus pandemic.

Seed companies are seeing a surge in demand.

But for many people without access to outdoor space, their version of victory gardens look more like scallions growing in glasses of water on the windowsill.

"Victory sills" have emerged as one of the pandemic's at-

home micro-trends. (i)

My dear chefs, you will find broccoli sprouts easy to grow on your own windowsill. They are very nutritious with a quick turn-around time between start and finish. You can buy broccoli sprouts in the grocery stores for a high price, but they are also fun to grow yourself.

Make the process a continuous cycle where you eat the current crop this week and then grow the next crop the following week.

Use sprouts daily in a salad or as a topping for a sandwich or eggs.

The Science Behind The Seeds

Tap water can inhibit sprouting due to chemicals and minerals in the water. Distilled or filtered water is a better choice. The water is best at room temperature.

Using a tablespoon, spread the seeds out on the walls of the jar so that air flow can better easily reach individual seeds.

Normal garden seeds are not suitable for sprouting broccoli. Sprouting seeds can be purchased at some health food stores or online. Online sources offer a larger volume at a lower cost.

The best quality seeds for sprouting are non-genetically modified with a high germination rate.

The Big Window (or the big picture)

Most of us tend to throw away a lot of vegetable waste. There is potential for a garden there. Windowsill gardeners desire to be thrifty, plus more efficient with food purchasing and consumption. You get the satisfaction of doing the ultimate recycling – growing food from food scraps.

Here is a list of a few of the vegetables easy to sprout right on your windowsill: romaine lettuce, green onion scallions, onions, garlic and celery.

To sprout, place the core end or root base in some water in a

small container on a sunny windowsill. Change water daily.

Use fresh scraps. After they sprout small leaves and roots, replant with soil in individual pots or a container garden.

In South Florida, the best times for a vegetable garden are October through April. So now is the time to get ready with your green thumb.

There's plenty of research to prove that gardening increases well-being and longevity. (iv)

SHINE (Serving Health Insurance Needs of Elders) is a free program offered by the Florida Department of Elder Affairs in partnership with the Area Agency on Aging of Pasco and Pinellas counties.

Specially trained volunteers can assist you with your Medicare, Medicaid and Health insurance questions by providing free, unbiased, one-on-one insurance counseling and information on Medicare options and prescription drug assistance for elders, their families and caregivers.

Beneficiaries are encouraged to act quickly to assure a smooth transition into the 2021 benefit year.

During the open enrollment period, which runs Oct. 15 through Dec. 7, Medicare beneficiaries can make changes to their Medicare Prescription Drug or Medicare Advantage plans.

SHINE encourages beneficiaries to review their benefits each year for a variety of reasons. Individuals often experience subtle changes in their health over the course of the year and these changes may alter the kind of care they need. This could directly affect their need for more or less health insurance, the types of prescription drugs they require or their access to particular doctors or phar-

Health changes can also increase costs, which can be particularly critical for Medicare beneficiaries on fixed incomes.

Even though the agency's counseling sites are closed until further notice, those needing help can speak with a trained SHINE volunteer over the phone or virtually by using Zoom, Face Time, or some other platform.

Hand-written wills not valid in Florida

SCAM ALERT: In an earlier column this year, I discussed income tax filing as being April 15, which it was at the time I wrote that column.

Of course, the IRS changed the date to July 15. So, for us, what that means is that the IRS will probably be calling and demanding some sort of payment because you messed up and didn't file your return or because you "shorted" the government by several bucks.

Everyone reading this column already knows that the IRS is NOT going to call you—NEVER has, NEVER will (unless, I suppose, if it's a return from a call you

So, if you get that call, you all know to hang up.

Well, yes, you know. But there may be friends or relatives who do not know or who might be fooled by some new way the scammer uses to intimidate the person to whom they've called.

So, please, spread the word.


The IRS does NOT call you to demand money. Thus, no matter how legitimate a caller may sound, it's a scam.

Do this: in your computer, go to https://www.irs.gov. Then, in the "search" window, type in "scams." It's very helpful. NOTE: In that https:// that "s" is critically important. Always look for that "s".

Q. I understand that a holographic will is one that I write in my own handwriting. It would seem to me that folks could save a lot of money by just writing out their wills and wouldn't need an attor-

A. Yeah. Well. You are correct that a holographic will is one written in your own handwriting. The thing is, they are NOT VALID in Florida. Period.

Q. What if I wrote a holographic will



in another state?

A. Again. A holographic will may be valid in another state, but is not valid in

Q. What if someone makes handwritten changes to his or her already signed valid will? You know, the will you signed some time ago and now you've changed your mind, so you just want to make some handwritten changes to it.

A. That is NOT VALID in Florida either. More than likely, if you make handwritten changes right on your previously validly executed will, when you pass, and your will is filed in court, those changes will be ignored as if you never made them.

And for that matter, depending on what specific handwritten statements were made, it might invalidate the entire will.

Q. What about an oral will - one you just speak?

A. Florida Statute 732.502 is clear that a will MUST be in writing.

Q. OK. So, can I, myself, make a completely valid will in Florida that is not written by a lawyer or attorney?

A. Sure. All you have to do is make sure the will fully complies with that statute. The way you do that is you must sign the will at the end and have it signed in the presence of at least two witnesses. Both must say they saw you sign it and both must say it was your will.

And while I am discussing witnesses, it is very wise NOT to have one of the witnesses also be a beneficiary of that will.

Actually, beneficiaries for a will should not even be in the room when the will is being signed.

Q. Does a will need to be notarized? A. No, it does not. But, if it is not notarized, then it is not "self-proving" and that means that when the Testator passes, the witnesses will need to be located and sign an affidavit to the effect that they saw you sign the will.

Q. How much money can I give away without having to pay any gift tax?

A. I assume what you mean is how much can you give away to folks without having to file a gift tax return.

If so, in year 2020 it is \$15,000 per

If, however, you were discussing how much you can give away without having to pay out money to the I.R.S., as a gift tax, then that is a much different number. In 2020, it's \$11.58 million per person.

If you need much more income and estate tax information, you need to speak with an attorney who handles estate and gift tax matters.

Q. My 58-year-old son has never been married. Recently, while walking in his neighborhood, he met a woman who has been married three times and has four children. She invited my son to her home for a glass of wine and, as he told

me, to "interview me about my work, why I never married, what my family was like and would I like to have dinner with her some time." I don't know for sure how long this has been going on, but my son now wants to marry her. I am asking you about this because I suspect there are legal issues here.

A. "Legal issues here?"

Hmmm. I don't think masks are required inside someone's residence. Nor is social distancing required inside someone's home, should either of those be your concern.

The original Tonight Show host

The Tonight Show, the longest running show on TV, premiered on NBC in 1954.

Most people who can remember back that far, probably would say Jack Paar was the original host. However, it was not Jack. It was Steve Allen.

Steve created the show and was host from 1954 to 1957.

Steve was born in Chicago. His parents were a comedy team that appeared around the country on the Vaudeville circuit. Milton Berle once said that Steve's mother was the funniest woman in show business.

Being a multi-talented performer, NBC gave Steve the Sunday night time slot opposite the Ed Sullivan Show on CBS. It was a ratings battle for a number of years.


In the realm of the theatre, Steve wrote the music and lyrics for the Broadway musical "Sophie" which was based on the among the hundreds of artists whose material was destroyed at a early career of the woman billed as "The Last of the Red-Hot Mamas," Sophie Tucker.

The show got panned on the road. It opened at the Winter Garden Theatre on Broadway on April 15, 1963, and to poor reviews, closed after five performances.

Steve was a comedy writer and author of more than 50 books, including his autobiography. He also wrote children's books and a series of mystery novels. Twenty of his books were concerned with his views about religion.

Steve married Jayne Meadows, sister of actress Audrey Meadows, on July 31, 1954, and remained married until his death in 2000. Steve died on Oct. 30 at the age of 78 due to a ruptured blood vessel caused by a chest injury he suffered during a car accident the same day. He was laid to rest at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in the Hollywood Hills.

The New York Times Magazine in 2019 listed Steve Allen Universal Studio fire in 2008.




The Ronald Reagan Republican Club of On Top of the World held its first meeting since February 2020.

The Art Guild hopes that all our friends and art lovers at On Top of the World are having a productive and creative


My mind always turns to crafts and creating at this time of the year.

Democratic Club prepares for Election Day

October may be bringing us cooler temperatures, but election fever is keeping everyone hot.

The schedule for mailing out Pinellas County ballots was Sept 29. If you do not receive yours soon after that date, you had better check your mail ballot status on VotePinellas.com. The U.S. Post Office is advising everyone to vote early.

Pinellas County is the Florida star of handling mail ballots. They have been doing it very successfully for years and are very efficient, setting the gold standard for the rest of the state.

Mail ballots that are signed and received on time will be safely counted on Election Day. "On time" means by 7 p.m. on Nov. 3 in the Supervisor of Elections office.

Unsigned ballots account for the largest number of rejections. Make sure you sign your name and complete the contact information on the sealed envelope, so they can contact you if there is a problem.

You can track your ballot at VotePinellas.com. A "received" status means your ballot is valid as submitted. The status will change to "counted" after Election Day.

At the On Top of the World Democratic Club meeting in September, we discussed all the ways that you can return your mail ballot. You can return it through the U.S. Mail as soon as you receive it. You can take it in person to any of the three

Supervisor of Election offices any time after receiving it.

From Oct. 19 through Nov. 1, you can put it in the official election drop boxes at locations listed in your ballot packet. The SOE office in the Starkey Lakes Corporate Center at 13001 Starkey Road, Largo, is the one that has a drive-thru service from Oct. 19 - Nov. 2.

If you would like someone from our club to take your signed, sealed ballot to the Supervisor of Elections office, call Donna Lukas at 727-460-4123 or bring it to our next club meeting on Thursday, Oct. 8 at 12:30 p.m. at the East Activity Center Pavilion.

At our September meeting, we also discussed the candidates, six state constitutional amendments and a county referendum that will appear on our Nov. 3 ballots.

Members voted to give financial assistance to the following candidates on





Advice for Snowbirds not flying home this winter

The Covid-19 Pandemic has been a tragic event in our world and has changed "normal" life for people throughout the globe.

People are finding ways to entertain, educate and socialize safely while our governments and scientists try to find ways to keep us safe and bring us out of the pandemic.

On Sunday, August 23, the Pickle-ball Club hosted their second pizza social event of the year.


It was a Dominos Pizza party where everyone brought their own drinks and the pizza was paid by the club dues.

For now, let me take you for a walk down memory lane.



OTOW resident among 12 worldwide finalists who have ideas on how to make our planet a better place

On Top of the World resident Carl Hebinck looks out his front window every day and sees beautifully constructed buildings providing housing for a wide variety of people.

But he also knows there are millions of people worldwide who are homeless -150 million according to wikipedia.

Carl is one of many people across the globe who entered a competition to share ideas for improving our environment from a construction viewpoint.

In August he was notified he was voted one of 12 finalists.

And in case you can't tell - Carl is the "silver-haired" gentleman among the group of "young people" in the photo at right.

The other finalists came from the United Kingdom, Australia, Uganda, New Zealand, South Africa, Indonesia and India. Some were already professionals. Others were students with bright ideas.

"I love our Earth," Carl told OTOW News. "We need to take care of her.

"The world needs to adopt a better technology to save our planet."

Most recently, Carl was the president and chief executive officer of AMHOME USA, Inc., which builds energy efficient homes based in Wesley Chapel. He has also been a training coordinator for various other businesses.

In 2011, Carl went to Haiti as a volunteer home builder. The first house he built was for a 15-year-old lady who sacrificed her body to save her younger brother during an earthquake.

The boy escaped the earthquake unharmed. His sister broke her back and will be confined to a wheelchair the rest of her life.

If the same earthquake had taken place in an average neighborhood in the United States, probably no one would have suffered a life-changing injury. But because of the poor quality houses in Haiti, the houses were no match for the earthquake.

Carl wanted to change this conclusion, With help from the Santa Clara University School of Engineering, a structurally insulated steel panel house was built

for the sister and brother in Haiti (SIP

Carl then went on the offensive to try to raise money so that more SIP Homes could be built the same way in Haiti and give the country the means of constructing their own SIP materials.

Unfortunately, the project did not gain enough investors and Carl was very disappointed for the people in Haiti. There was not enough financial support to continue the project.

Years later, Carl discovered a similar problem exists right here in Pinellas County.

Carl came across the Community Service Foundation of Clearwater, which has a goal to build safe, affordable, economical housing for everyone who needs it in our own backyard.

According to the Florida Dream Center, there are 55,000 homeless people in the state of Florida, including 7,000 in Pinellas County - and those stats were before the Covid-19 crisis.

The Community Service Foundation is currently planning to begin a small demonstration cluster of these homes in St. Petersburg and it plans to follow up building smaller "backyard homes" on more than 100,000 lots in Pinellas County which

would provide an abundance of Affordable Homes for low-income people and extra rental income for home owners of those single family home lots where the houses will be built.

Carl vows, if he wins this contest, winnings will go toward this project.

"People all over the world need affordable housing," Carl said. "What we are proposing is building affordable homes for low income persons beginning in Pinellas County with ambitions to scale it globally."

The competition is organized by Construction Industry Solutions Ltd based in England.

Some of the other ideas among the finalists included better infrastructure management; using mine waste to create proprietary polymers (chemicals for such products as plastic bottles); cost efficient packaging materials; recycled wall framing materials; more cost effective cement materials; 3-D "antbots" for remote construction; nanofluid for more energy efficient cooling systems and reduced power consumption; and the creation of smart buildings through tech energy management.

Carl is the veteran finalist of the

group, but he is very proud to see our young people thinking of creative ways to help the planet.

"It provides pride and hope for our future generations," Carl said. "So much is going on and grabs the news about fighting ourselves. It's refreshing to see people, younger and older, shaking off the negativism and dedicating themselves to making this world better for all of us."

It might sound over-obvious, but everything built on our planet since the first sunlight was built using materials provided by our planet.

Could those materials some day run out?

"Nothing we have here is from outer space," Carl said. "It all comes from our Mother (Earth). Her resources are limited though. She just has so much to give."

So maybe a contest and a \$150,000 first prize will stir some new ideas.

A final decision on selecting a winner took place on Sept. 24 - the same day this newspaper went to press. If you would like to see which idea won, you might be able to see results at coins-grandchallenge.com.



Granadans look to a welcome season change



Siboney history includes first building reporter columns



Welcome to our building's 35th anniversary. Most of our residents, including myself, have heard many interesting stories of what our building was like in 1985.

We asked our long-time original resident Cele Radeloff to give us some history of life at our building 35

"It was October 1985, the Siboney building was just completed and the residents were moving in. It was a funloving group of retirees and nothing was too much for us.

We established the Siboney Club and elected four officers with a monthly meeting on the fourth Wednesday of each month in the Sunrise Room (now the Belleair Room).

We voted to hire an artist to paint a Spanish-type motif on the wall in the core. It cost \$1,000. Next, we bought a wallpaper type of mural and put it on the second floor wall.

A committee was formed to get carpets installed in the walkways and in all four staircases. A letter was sent to all second and third floor owners, who shared the cost.

Rita Tombari and a decorating committee placed pictures, posters and planters on the wall. A completed jigsaw puzzle glued on heavy cardboard was hung on the walls in our laundry room. We were told we had the nicest laundry room in OTOW! We bought a large table and a much-needed fan.

Then we bought Christmas decorations, lights, candles, reindeers and Santas. Siboney was lit up like Luna Park. We won first prize in 1988 in the lights contest and was one of the topthree winners every year thereafter. Tour buses would come to OTOW to view our Christmas decorations.

Several years later, Rita Tombari, Al Tannuzzo and Nevin Frisch built the NOEL signs and placed one on each side of the building, all lit up.

We were an active building and very h involved. The men played golf and shot pool every Monday while the ladies went golfing or went to line dancing O'Keefe's and took the Jolly Trolley to the reporter for 25 years."



Emerald Isle officers still able to plan an outing each month


As the old saying goes, you can't keep a good man down. Or in this case, you can't keep a good building down.







Here's how to display our flag properly and proudly

By Milton Bronson

I am a new owner/resident of On Top of the World.

I am also a retired Air Force veteran of 20 years, whose duties at Air Force bases around the world included displaying and caring for OUR flag. I have also been a military honor guard member.

Our flag deserves the honor of being displayed and cared for in an honorable way.

In order to do this, we should abide by the rules outlined in Title 4, United States Code, Chapter 1.

You can access the complete code by Googling: Care and Display of the American Flag.

I would like to point out a few thing that I would like to see changed to abide by the rules:



It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on flag staffs in the open.

However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.

days when the weather is inclement, except when an all weather flag is flown.

There are specific rules for when the flag should be flown at half-staff.

For instance, on Memorial Day the flag is flown at half-staff until noon and then raised to the top of the pole.

Note: When flying the flag at halfstaff, it must first be raised to the top of the pole and then lowered to half-staff. When lowering the flag at the end of the same day, it is again raised to the top of the pole prior to lowering for the day.

In this regard, I only saw two flags on poles around the community that were displayed at half-staff on Sept. 11. This should be a community-wide action.

When a flag is raised in the morning or lowered at dusk, it should be done by

The flag should not be displayed on two people. The reason is because the flag must be correctly folded and not allowed to touch the ground.

If you need directions on how to properly fold a flag, please seek help on Google.

Some of the no-nos include wearing a flag. Do not wear anything with a flag on it that would touch the ground.

The flag should not be draped over the hood, top or sides of a vehicle, and never on a railroad train or boat.

When the flag is displayed on a motorcar, the staff shall be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the right front fender.

There are several more rules that, for the most part, do not pertain to us at On Top of the World, but as previously stated can be Googled.

Discovering rugged Ecuador, sitting on the Earth's equator

The word Ecuador means "equator" and the equator's location here was first measured in the 1700s.

Subsequent measurements with very sophisticated gauges found that this initial measurement was only off by 250 feet. Of course there is a bustling tourist trade here at the equator, 00.00.00 degrees latitude, where you can stand with one foot in the northern hemisphere and the other in the southern.

In the year 2000, Ecuador adopted the American dollar as its currency but they do have some native coins still floating around. They have a habit of giving these as change, but be careful as they cannot be turned in at the end of your stay.

Another revelation is that Panama hats are made in Ecuador. The tighter the weave the more expensive is the hat. We were told that they would be cheaper the next day at the famous market in Otavalo. They were, and I now own one I've never worn.

What makes Ecuador so special is its extraordinary scenery. From the Andean forest up and down mountains into a cloud forest we went in our large bus. How the driver managed the sharp curves without catapulting us into the unmatched beauty of the many gorges remains a mystery.

Our next adventure began at a Swiss lodge on the Napo River, a tributary of the Amazon River which arises in Ecuador's highlands. My expensive German hiking shoes were no match for the mud we had to slog through on many of our outings, so

the lodge furnished us with smelly rubber boots. There were not only for the mud but also to protect our feet from ants.

After lunch we set out upstream in longboats to a small Quechua settlement where we had their particular brand of "chicha," the native beer.

Departing in the pouring rain, we journeyed to a hacienda at 6,500 feet with another spectacular view including several snow-capped volcanoes. The next morning we were treated to the sight of Tungurahua Volcano erupting at 18,000 feet. Actually all it was producing was thick black smoke.

A visit to a local school to be entertained by the native kids resulted in us taking up a collection for a new toilet.

Our \$127 allowed the principal to purchase a toilet, a sink, and all connections at a local hardware store. Since we had \$25 left we also purchased three gallons of paint, five paint brushes and two brooms.

Next, we visited the "casa," or private home, of a noted artist, Aida Lopez, and her late husband. The large, rambling adobe house had artistic touches in every room, nook, and cranny. A special staff created our lunch in the huge kitchen. Its many courses included a crepe with cheese and yucca on a tamale leaf; a salad of celery root, raisins, cucumber and avocado; cubed chicken in a tasty sauce, splendid mashed

potatoes, all accompanied by a tasty beer. Homemade ice-cream was our dessert.

I found it necessary to forego our next hike at 12,000 feet due to the fact that I was having real trouble breathing at this altitude and was quite dizzy.

For our last dinner in Quito, we went to a highly recommended local restaurant called The Magic Bean. Alas, it was very American so my final meal in Ecuador was a delicious cheeseburger panini.

The Strong forgive, the Weak remember is a great Ecuadorian proverb. I'd love to return to Ecuador, a hidden gem of beauty and graciousness.

Lately I have been hearing saws and hammering from a couple of other places in the building. Home improvements are taking over!



Here are a couple of Oktoberfest suggestions


Happy October — whew! That was one hot, steamy September!






