Come out wearing your favorite sports shirt or hat. There is an extra \$1 charge to Boston fans and \$1 off for Jets fans, if you admit it.



Hurricane season and your personal safety

In mid-August, we were watching as Tropical Storm Erin was starting in the Atlantic Ocean.

Right on time.

Wash, rinse and repeat for 2025 hurricane season. Here we go again.

A reminder: You may want to locate a copy of your current HO-6 policy. In the HO-6 under "Loss Of Use," it's recommended a resident have 12 months of living expenses as a coverage amount as you could be faced with not being able to access your unit for an extended period should damage occur.

Regardless of how the storm season progresses, you can be assured that Parkway Maintenance & Management of Pinellas will be ready. Days before, when it is first noted by NOAA, Parkway starts to move into Storm Watch status.



As the storm rounds the Florida Straits into the Gulf, where it rapidly strengthens, Parkway will go into Storm Ready status.

Personnel and management will review disaster preparation plans, personnel management and recovery plans.

If you are a mobility challenged individual or have complex medical needs, you need to be aware that elevator service is usually terminated 24 hours before a large storm event. This matter has been explained frequently in this newspaper. The Board encourages mobility challenged residents to seek shelter in safe areas with ground level access.

The "good" news is that the Florida Legislature made the tax holiday on hurricane supplies year-round. It is a good idea to take advantage of this holiday and purchase your tropical storm supplies in advance of need.

For residents with special medical needs, the State of Florida opens shelters

for persons with complex medical needs. You will need to make an advance reservation for this accommodation by reaching out to Pinellas County Emergency Management and there are several ways to register for the program:

Audit Season is Here

Because of the size of this community's budget, in excess of \$500,000, State Statutes (118.111(13)(a), F.S.) requires audited financial statements annually. This affords a look at the finances of the Condominium and a determination as to the condition of those financial records by a certified public accounting firm.

Your Board approved the selection and appointment of CS&L CPA's to conduct the audit in the ordinary course of business. All work is conducted to generally accept accounting standards and the final report is done to the standards of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB).

The final audited report is presented to the Board Chair, who must then present it to the rest of the Board members. Once reviewed and accepted by the Board, the audit will be made available to all owners of condominiums in OTOW by posting the audited financial report on the secure AppFolio owner portal. You can access your portal, or request access to the portal, by visiting https://parkway.pinellas.appfolio.com/connect/users/sign_in.

PREPARE TODAY FOR A HURRICANE

Don't wait for a bad storm to be hours away.

Don't think, "It will never hit here."
The photo at left was taken Aug. 4, 2024. It did hit here.

Your Pre-Storm Checklist

- 1. Map out an evacuation route and choose a final, fortified destination well-inland. Tell family and friends where you intend to be during a storm. You should have one post-disaster contact one person who is out of the danger zone, who you can contact and who will share your information with other loved ones. You may be short on power so consider limiting your contacts to one person.
- 2. If you stay behind, keep the following in stock: 1 week supply of bottled water and non-perishable foods, refill prescriptions, bottle opener, flashlight and battery operated radio. Do you know where these items are stored? Don't go searching for them as a storm is closing in. Keep tape and cardboard handy should a leak develop.
- 3. Create an inventory of your home. Use photos and videos in case some day you need to replace your items or determine the value of items lost. Special items should be stored away from your home in a safe place. Store important documents in sealable, water proof containers.
- 4. Bring in porch items and anything outside that could become a projectile.
- 5. Fill vehicle with gas. Don't wait until the mad rush starts.
- 6. Don't assume a storm is over. Stay indoors. Please use a flashlight and not candles. Keep refrigerator closed as much as possible.
- 7. Get cash. Money machines could be out for weeks.
- 8. Review your insurance policy once a year to make sure you are covered for a major storm. If you need to file a claim, do so immediately after a storm. Make a list of damaged items. Keep receipts. Be patient.
- 9. The OTOW activity centers are not storm shelters. They will not be open during a storm. If you live on an upper floor or may need assistance after a storm, plan ahead. There are nearby evacuation shelters.
- 10. OTOW will provide weather updates if possible using RAVE, OTOW-TV 901 and the Box Office (otowboxoffice.com).

WHEN A STORM HAS PASSED

- A. If you evacuated, do not return home until authorities give you the OK.
- B. Do not go outside. Do not begin cleanup on your own. Let OTOW management personnel remove limbs, wires and all damage.
- C. Do not drive into a flooded road. Turn around don't drown.
- D. Traffic lights may be out. Stop at all intersections where a traffic light is not working. Treat each intersection as a four-way stop.
- E. Do not use sink water until authorities give the OK. Do not eat spoiled food.
- F. Do not wear flipflops outside. Wear sturdy shoes.

Hurricane Season

Should community elevators need to be taken out of service for inclement weather or anticipated major weather events, this is a great opportunity to check with your neighbors to see if they would need any assistance.

When would elevator services be shut down? If wind speeds have exceeded a safe operational threshold of 40 miles per hour, the Management Company suspends elevator services.

County and local municipalities also suspend many essential services, including 911 call response under such conditions.

If there was an entrapment in an elevator during those conditions, it could be hours before the person could be rescued. Given this possibility, and for your safety, the Management Company acts accordingly by suspending services during such storm conditions. You will have ample warning to be able to make plans for other lodging should you choose to evacuate.

If, during a bad weather event, you find yourself in need of assistance, ask a friend or a neighbor, or rely on each other. That's what paying it forward is all about.

Need help? Ask.

If you can provide help, please offer. After all, what a good feeling you'll get just knowing you helped someone who genuinely needed it.

You say you don't know your neighbors well enough to ask or offer? Join a club! After all, you really get to know someone when you play them in a competitive game, such as pickleball!

Painting/Waterproofing

September will see the community's painting contractor continuing to operate on the front façades of structures with buildings 60 and 78 being next on the repainting schedule.

As always, please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating in close proximity to parking areas and front/rear porches, which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or property.

Thank you for your cooperation in advance and keep in mind that inclement weather can affect start and completion dates as well as the listed order of work.

Construction, Roofing and **Large Scope Community Projects**

As with many autumns' past, a state licensed life-safety vendor will be returning to the community to perform the annual inspection of the property's fire hydrants, as well as the fire sprinkler systems located in the Paradise section of property.

These inspections take roughly three days to complete and require that water supply systems be opened up in order to test flow values and equipment reliability.

If you're driving through the community and happen to see a steady stream of water shooting out from a fire hydrant, know that it's more than like-Iv just the vendor confirming that our suppression systems are at the ready should the need ever arise.

The management company will begin its next elevator modernization project on Sept. 8 at Building 90. The scope of work involves replacing operating components to provide decades of future reliability.

The remodeling of the elevator cab interior is also part of the process which provides new, updated laminate surfaces for residents and visitors to the community.

The entire undertaking should be completed in two weeks time, barring any unforeseen conditions.

Residents and visitors of building 90 should be aware of active work zones and exercise caution in and around these areas while the elevator is out of

Recurring Reminders for all **Community Residents**

As a reminder, in 2023 the Management Company recommenced its enforcement compliance efforts by removing all unapproved items placed in building common areas. This includes, but is not limited to, plants (live or artificial), personal items, non-exterior rated furniture, rusted chairs/tables or in disrepair and tchotchkes, etc., as these items are not permitted to occupy common spaces.

As has been referenced in the newspaper, on the community TV channel, and the bulletins posted in all building center core lobbies, these items will be removed and disposed of without further notice.

These ongoing efforts help keep the areas safe for first responders as well as maintain an aesthetically pleasing community for all to reside in.

We ask that residents help keep the community's common areas in compliance by reporting violations of this nature to the Management Company.

We appreciate the community's cooperation and support in reporting any violations of this nature so the Management Company can investigate and correct if necessary.

The Management Company would also like to thank residents who live on the second and third floors for their cooperation in making the On Top of the World community a safer and more aesthetically pleasing place to live by removing their floor mats from the common area.

The community's response for compliance was astounding, as has been the feedback regarding these efforts.

Once again, thank you for your support in this undertaking.

Now that the notification and compliance piece has been completed, the Management Company will continue the ongoing compliance enforcement of these common areas where the mats were once located, as well as repainting areas that could not be cleaned to community standards.

As a reminder to all residents, and in keeping with condominium rules governing common areas, any floor mats placed on second or third floor balcony walkways or center core areas will be removed without any further notification.

Please assist us in keeping these walkway areas clear while making your community a safer and more beautiful place to live.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services Team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle.

This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hanger brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Residents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future.

Inspection Services representatives also will be reaching out to residents of buildings who are scheduled for new paint and waterproof coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you are not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit from the coating vendor.

We appreciate your cooperation in

making this project a success across the community.

First floor unit owners will continue receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department as the Management Company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community.

The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike.

The Management Company asks if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stones at the earliest convenience.

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing.

The Management Company is asking that all residents comply and not replant in the areas. Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations.

Many times, decorative rocks or landscaping are installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you install.

Inspection efforts continue to focus on the tagging and removal of portable barbeque grills, including propane. charcoal, or electric, which are not permitted in any buildings common areas as they pose a fire risk to the structure and residents.

Only grills meeting the approved Clearwater Fire Department standard are permitted on the patio of first floor units. If you're a first-floor unit owner and not sure if your grill complies, please stop by the Community Service Office to request a visit from our friendly Inspections Services staff.

The Management Company would like to remind residents that all water softening equipment installations require advance association approval via a modification permit. A permit application package may be obtained by visiting the Community Service Office in the East Activity Center at 2069 World Parkway Boulevard.

Residents are also reminded that only resin-style, not ion exchange or salt, water softeners are permissible in the community.

Please make sure you apply for a permit and receive approval prior to contracting with a service to avoid a compliance visit by the Management Company. Thanks for your advanced cooperation.

The Community Service Office

(CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted.

If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter.

The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made

and work scheduled.

Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received.

From time to time it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request. It is not necessary to report service requests more than once.

If you have any questions regarding your request, and until the Community Service Office reopens, please call the Service Request Line at 727-683-6981.

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is exclusive to the condo and is the owner's responsibility. The Association's responsibility is to the structure and common elements.

Storm Shelters - Get Informed Before A Hurricane Arrives

Pinellas County has 3 storm shelters available to people who are dependent on electricity or need assistance with medications. But the time to get informed about these shelters is not when a hurricane is here. The time is now. You must be pre-registered to be accepted at a county shelter.



Please note, during inclement weather, you may experience loss of elevator service or loss of power. Please plan ahead.

The shelters are available through the Pinellas County Special Needs Evacuation Program. Transportation to shelters is available. No pets are allowed. If you cannot find someone to take care of your pet, Pinellas County Animal Services may be able to help. If you choose to stay at a shelter, you must bring your own medical equipment, medications, blankets, pillows, change of clothing, batteries, special dietery items, sources of activities, personal hygiene products, radios, ear plugs, important papers and a list of emergency contacts.

OTOW-TV channel 901 is working perfect - ask Summit for help if you cannot watch board meetings

Four years ago, On Top of the World community TV broadcasted its first live board meeting.

It has been a learning experience ever since.

Residents wanted the video camera up higher so the board could be viewed without getting blocked by the audience. OTOW-TV purchased a custom-designed portable platform from the Fixers Club in order to achieve this goal.

Residents wanted replays of live board meetings and wanted meetings stored in a way any resident could go back and watch a past meeting on their own time. This also has been achieved with "Past Meetings" on the Box Office website (otowboxoffice.com).

Then residents asked for better sound. OTOW-TV consulted Mike Wood from the Entertainment Committee, who suggested a battery-operated transmitter system where sound is sent wirelessly into the video camera. Then Tony Esposito from ESPO Productions came in and voluntarily taught us how to use those transmitters so voices from nine different microphones would go directly into the video camera - all without wires.

Our home TV audience has raved about our new sound system.

In four years, your community TV station has listened to residents and made great improvements.

Now we are asking you to listen.

Every single condo at On Top of the World gets OTOW-TV channel 901 through Summit Broadband. The channel is working. People at home are able to watch live board meetings. In most living rooms, the system is working flawlessly.

But there are still a small number of residents who cannot watch 901 for a variety of reasons. For example, black screens, unending "pinwheels of death," picture hiccups, echoes, audio but no video, and video but no audio.

Some people are getting 901 on one TV, but not another TV in the same

You might not be able to watch 901,



without any problems.

You get the point. This has been very frustrating.

We can, in all good confidence, say that Channel 901 is not the problem. We are broadcasting three-, four-, fivehour live board meetings for your benefit. The fact that many residents are watching is proof the channel is working on our end.

So what's causing all the other reception problems?

Why are some people in a building getting the channel perfectly and others are not?

That's a very good question.

OTOW-TV has been working with Summit Broadband to find the problems and correct them. But even after four years from initial installation, there are still unsolved issues.

For starters, if you are unable to watch OTOW-TV 901, specifically live board meetings, you must call Summit Broadband at (877) 678-6648. You may also go to SummitBroadbandFL on Facebook and chat with a representative. If you don't contact Summit, they will not know that you have a specific reception problem in your condo for community channel 901.

In cases where you call Summit, leave a message, but no one calls you back, please email your Association Board at ClearwaterInfo@otowfl.net and explain what happened. Make sure to leave your name and contact information.

If you call Summit, are put on hold but your neighbor next door is getting it and never get to speak to a live person,

email your board.

If you are not getting service after contacting Summit, email your board.

Summit Broadband is investigating a variety of reported problems and has one theory. There may be a problem with one of the original routers distributed to residents four years ago. Unfortunately, Summit has no record who received these specific routers, so Summit cannot go door-to-door and hand residents a replacement router. If you call and request service, then a technician can determine if your router needs to be replaced.

This is the only way a replacement router will be issued. You first have to make a service request.

Also, there is social media talk about mirrors causing problems with Summit will be able to enjoy 901. service. This actually can be true, ac-

cording to Summit techies. Glass in a mirror is not the issue, but the metal base behind the glass mirror can disrupt your TV signal. If you have multiple mirrors with metal bases, the problem could be worse.

There are solutions to this problem. But again, you have to contact Summit Broadband and ask for help.

Don't be that person who says "I hate Summit. I'm not calling them." Call and talk to a technician.

By helping to get a reception issue fixed, you at least know you can watch a live board meeting from your couch if you cannot attend a meeting in person.





When a caller asks you for personal information - time to hang up the phone

Scam Alert

Everyone already knows, if you receive a phone call and don't know the caller, you shouldn't answer the call. Let the caller (scammer?) leave a message.

Of course, there are exceptions.

Maybe you're waiting for a specific call from someone or some company, so you answer the call, only to hear a foreign voice who wants to discuss something he/she claims you did, or you requested, you owed, or you said.

Maybe it's hard to hear or understand or both.

Here's a good rule to follow: If the caller tells you that you said something or did something or ordered something, or owe something or he/she needs any personal information and you don't know why - hang up immediately.

If there is a call back, don't answer it. Let the caller leave a message. Then you can decide what you want to do.

Folks, there are huge call centers, frequently in foreign countries, where folks who can speak English are forced into virtual slavery to make scam calls.

Don't believe me?


Google "Myanmar scam centers." Or Google "NPR scam centers."

Callers from these scam centers use sophisticated methods to trap folks into revealing personal information.

Best Defense: do not answer a call if you don't know for sure who's calling. Or if you do answer and you cannot understand or you can't hear the caller, just hang up.

Don't blame your hearing or your hearing aids. Just hang up.

Scam Alert: All of us are targets for scams. All of us can have our identity



stolen. We are not smarter than the scammers. They are smarter than us.

We can easily divulge personal information, or we can have it disclosed because someone or some company with whom we've done business was hacked.

Also, our children or grandchildren, who use Facebook or Twitter (now X) or Tik Tok, can be hacked without knowing it and then expose personal information just by forwarding something they saw or read.

Best defense: Don't click on just any link. Also, use two-factor identification as much as possible. If you don't know how to do it, someone you know will, so ask that person for help.

Two factor identification is a royal pain, but it's much better than losing your life's savings.

Q. I have two children from two different relationships. I want to leave my IRA to their children, who are my grand-children. They aren't minors. Which is

wiser for me? Leaving the IRAs directly to my grandchildren or creating a trust and leaving the IRAs to the Trust which can then control how each grandchild receives his/her share?

A. I do not have anywhere near sufficient facts to answer this question, so I won't even try. You need to sit down with your estate planning attorney to discuss these issues, which by the way, and depending what you do, can have potential and significant tax consequences.

So, why am I addressing any part of it now? Answer: Because without addressing any of the issues in the question, there is an important point I wish to discuss. Trusts, if drafted properly, are complex documents. This is true, even if someone thinks they have a "simple estate," and all that is wanted is to avoid probate when the future arrives. And if you add to the trust, sophisticated matters, such as the trust is to be the beneficiary of an IRA (a 401-k or other pension plan), the trust document becomes even more complex.

It's one thing to have a spouse and a couple of kids or close relatives who you want to get everything. But if that's what you need, you can consider using beneficiary designations on your accounts and avoid the expense of a trust altogether.

Q. I'm pretty sure this will be a "new one" for you. It's exotic.



Guidelines for Riding the Shuttle Bus

- 1. You MUST have a valid Activity Card and present it to the driver upon entering the bus. The SCA bus service is exclusively for use by Association-approved residents and tenants only. If you do not have a valid Activity Card, you may not ride the shuttle bus
- 2. Reservations are REQUIRED please call 727-799-3417 Option 7 no later than 10 a.m. the day prior to your planned trip. Monday's trip deadline is 10 a.m. Friday. Please be present in the core of your building at your scheduled pick up time.
- 3. Shopping time is one hour for grocery stores and one hour for Walmart. Shopping time begins when you are dropped off at your destination.
- Although appreciated, the driver is prohibited from accepting gifts and tips. 5. The driver may not assist you with enterting or exiting the bus, or with your packages.
- Please do not ask the driver to do so. The start time listed is when the shuttle bus departs the Community Service Office. The pick-up schedule will rotate wekly between low and high buildings, meaning one week pick-up will start with lower-numbered buildings and the following week it will start with the higher-numbered buildings.
- 7. Seats are not assigned. They are first-come, first-served.
- 8. Seatbelts must be fastened during bus movement and must remain fastened until the bus comes to a complete stop.
- 9. Eating, drinking, smoking, vaping, fighting, distracting the driver, or any other unacceptable actions at the discretion of the driver are strictly prohibited on the bus. Violation of the above guidelines may result in your bus privileges being revoked.

10. All route changes are at the discretion of management.

Jack and Juanita became residents of On Top of the World as Snowbirds during the 1970s.


After several years they made the decision to sell their family business and relocate to OTOW on a permanent basis.

Your body needs water - drink for your health

Are you staying hydrated in the summer heat?

The best beverage in the world, bar none, is water.

We cannot live very long without it and it is necessary for almost every metabolic process.

The World Health Organization (WHO) established these guidelines for how much water we should drink on a daily basis: 68-100 ounces a day for women and 85-135 ounces a day for

This guideline includes liquids from all sources, including caffeinated beverages, with the exception of wine and

If following a plant-based diet, 30 ounces can be consumed from plants and whole grains we eat. Coffee, tea

and beer can leave us with more water than we started with, but wine actually dehydrates us.

We need water for every metabolic process. It also carries away metabolic waste as it flushes fat and toxins through the liver and kidneys.

Water absorption begins rapidly taking only 5 minutes to travel from the mouth to the bloodstream, peaking around 20 minutes - cold water about 20 percent faster than body temperadehydration assessment tool:

Empty your bladder and chug down about three cups of water. See how much you pee an hour later. The researchers determined that if you drink three cups of water and urinate less than one cup within that hour, there's a good chance you were dehydrated.


Cornhole Club offers games, cheering, laughing and socializing



Some of Madeleine's beautiful paintings are on their walls, too.


I am so blessed to be the recipient of one of their joint pieces as a Christmas gift last year.

September 2000

World News

The 2000 Summer Olympics was the first Olympics held in the New Millennium. The event received great praise and ran from Sept. 15 to Oct. 1, 2000, in Sydney, Australia. This Olympics added trampolining gymnastics events, plus the triathlon and taekwondo as new sports. Taekwondo is a dynamic Korean martial art highlighting its focus on both kicking and punching skills. Around the same time, a series of protests against meetings of the World Economic Forum occured in September 2000 in Melbourne, Australia. Approximately 10,000 people of many ages, and a wide cross section of the community, got involved. The protest is a loose alliance of critics of corporate-led globalization. While this protest is significant for Australia, it is not the first instance of World Economic Forum protests.

U.S. News

Sept. 14 – Under President Clinton, the U.S. moved to revive Mideast peace talks at informal New York meetings, but Secretary of State Madeleine Albright was doubtful of the progress. Indeed, the peace talks failed, which were a contributing factor to the start of the Second Intifada. Albright believes religion is instrumental in shaping ideas and policies. It's an essential part of everyday life in a whole host of countries. In her 2006 book, "The Mighty and the Almighty," she states "religion plays a role in how these countries behave, so we need to know what that influence is."

Business World

In September 2000, the trade deficit widened sharply to a record \$34.3 billion. This increase was driven by a rise in imports and a decline in exports, leading to concerns about the pace of the US economic slowdown and the robustness of the US dollar. In that same month, discussions were underway regarding China's potential entry into the World Trade Organization, a process that would ultimately grant China permanent normal trade relations status with the US. This would significantly impact tariffs on goods imported from China and potentially have greater future negative effect on the US trade deficit.

Technology News

The internet boom of the late 1990s reaches its peak in March 2000 only to burst by September 2000. Numerous failures of internet companies occur. Even established companies like Amazon and Cisco Systems experience significant losses in market capitalization.

Sept. 27 - The United States baseball team, managed by Tommy Lasorda, wins the Olympic gold medal in Sydney, Australia. Lasorda is a former American professional baseball pitcher and manager. He managed the Los Angeles Dodgers from 1976 through 1996 and becames their longest-running, very popular manager. He was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame as a manager in 1997. Tommy Lasorda is a favorite as well in Pennsylvania, being born in Norristown, Pa..

The Theater World





Mushrooms may not be the prettiest fruit in the ground, but they can be a delicacy



A mushroom (also called a toadstool) is part of the fungi family and is comparable to the fruit of a plant.

Unlike plants, mushrooms do not need sunlight to generate energy for themselves.

Some mushrooms are edible and are used for cooking in many countries, such as China, Korea, Europe and, of course, the United States.

Other mushrooms, however, are poisonous and can cause severe illness or death if eaten.

People who search for edible mushrooms are called mycaphagists, meaning "mushroom eater," while the act itself is called mushrooming.

Mushrooms produce seeds. The mushroom fungus releases millions of microscopic spores that form under the mushroom cap. They can grow above ground, on top of the soil, or on the surface of a food source.

Mushrooms are also known for their amazing health benefits. Packed with a ton of essential vitamins and minerals, mushrooms make an excellent addition to your diet, adding a great taste to many different recipes.

Mushrooms have been known to support bone health and to regulate blood sugar in diabetics. They are avail-



able in different colors and shapes.

There are more than a million estimated species of fungi. Edible mushrooms make up only a small fraction.

Cremini mushrooms are one of the most widely used mushroom varieties, popular in kitchens around the world.

Here is a list of other edible mushrooms: Portobello, Porcini, Shitake, Oyster, Chanterelle, Enoki, Morel and Lion Head. The list is endless.

Truffles are also a type of fungus and are generally considered to be a mush-room. However, they differ from other mushrooms in how they look and grow.

Truffles don't have stems, like other mushrooms, and are brown with a bumpy texture. Also, they grow underground attached to the root of trees.

Truffles have a stronger taste and smell and only grow a few months during the year. Most other mushrooms grow year-round.

Truffles are one of the most decadent foods in the world, but before tasting them, one must find them.

Truffle hunting is more complicated than you might imagine. Even if a truffle gives off a strong armoma, it is almost impossible for humans to detect.

The Dog Method: Men need to rely on a dog's natural olfactory talent to find truffles. The dog explores the surface of the ground with its nose. When the truffle is ripe, it releases a gas. This specific gas attracts a dog, which will mark the area with its paw. The truffle hunter cautiously digs the truffle out of the ground with a little hoe. The dog is rewarded with a special treat.

Truffles are one of the most expensive mushrooms on the market. White truffles can range from \$3,000 to \$5,000 per pound. Black truffles can range from \$300 to \$800 per pound.

Sausage Stuffed Mushrooms

Sausage Stuffed Mushrooms Ingredients

10 extra-large white mushrooms

5 tablespoons olive oil, divided

2 ½ tablespooms Marsala wine or medium sherry

³/₄ pound sweet Italian sausage, removed from the casing 6 scallions, white and green parts, minced

2 garlic cloves, minced

2/3 cup panko crumbs

5 ounces mascarpone cheese, preferably Italian

1/3 cup fresh grated Parmesan cheese

2 ½ tablespoons minced fresh parsley leaves Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 325 degrees farenheit.
- 2. Remove the stems from the mushrooms and chop them finely. Set aside. Place the mushroom caps in a shallow bowl and toss with 3 tablespoons of olive oil and Marsala wine.
- 3. Heat the remaining 2 tablespoons of olive oil in a medium skillet over medium heat. Add the sausage and crumble it with the back of a wooden spoon. Cook the sausage for 8 to 10 minutes, stirring frequently, until it's completely brown. Add the chopped mushroom stems and cook three minutes. Stir in the scallions and garlic and cook for another 2-3 minutes,

stirring occasionally. Add the panko crumbs, stirring to combine evenly with all the other ingredients. Finally, swirl in the mascarpone and continue cooking until the mascarpone has melted and made the sausage mixture creamy. Turn off the heat, stir in the Parmesan cheese, parsley and season with salt and pepper to taste. Cool slightly.

4. Fill each mushroom generously with the sausage mixture. Arrange the mushrooms in a baking dish large enough to hold all the mushrooms in a snug single layer. Bake for 50 minutes until the stuffing is browned and crusty.

Mushroom Soup

Mushroom Soup Ingredients

- 1 pound firm white mushrooms, cleaned
- 1 medium lemon
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter
- 2 tablespoons minced shallots
- 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme
- ½ bay leaf
- 1 teaspoon salt

 ½ teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 2 cups heavy cream
- 1 ½ cups chicken stock
- 1 teaspoon cornstarch, dissolved in 1 tablespoon of water
- 1 tablespoon minced parsley

Directions

- 1. Sprinkle the mushrooms with lemon juice. In a food processor, coarsely chop them.
- 2. Melt the butter in a heavy saucepan and lightly sauté the shallots. Add the mushrooms, thyme and

bay leaf, and sauté over moderate heat for 10 minutes or until the liquid disappears. Add the salt, pepper, cream and chicken stock, and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer for 20 minutes.

- 3. Add the cornstarch to the soup and continue to simmer for 10 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Add seasoning to taste.
- 4. Serve in warm bowls. Sprinkle with chopped parsley.

It is with great honor she has been invited to attend Honor Flight to Washington, DC, with so many other heroes who have served our country.


Wanda's position was the most critical in leadership to ensure the airmen were prepared to meet the challenges of combat operations.
