I have not determined if the company making the offer is registered with the State of Florida Office of Insurance. Any warranty offer is generally considered to be insurance and must thus be registered with the State. Don't let yourself fall victim to a scam.

As a practical matter, were you to experience water damage from a burst pipe, above or below the slab, it would be an event covered by your homeowner's coverage. So this is another good reason to make sure you have adequate insurance in force!

June is a great month for growing a garden and planting shrubs. That said; please remember that landscape modifications, just like any modification of the structure, must receive prior approval from the Owners' Association.

Take a Dip

Whether cooling down, taking in some exercise or just chatting with a friend, one of the five On Top of the World pools makes the perfect venue.

The indoor Arbor Club pool even sports an electronic roof that can be opened or shuttered depending on the weather, and the pool itself, some 78-feet long, is heated to maintain a relaxing 84 degrees. Adjacent to the indoor pool is an equally large, "walking" pool that is an even 4-feet in depth, allowing for exercise routines of all kinds.

Just about any day of the week, you can join some kind of water aerobics class at one of the pools. For example, there are the Aqua Belles who, every Monday, Wednes-

day and Friday at the Arbor Club pool work out with noodles. And every day, Monday through Friday, there's water walking, lap swimming along with shallow and deep-water fitness classes. Most of these classes start at 9 a.m. or later, however, lap swimming begins at 6 a.m.

At each of the pools, you will find a schedule of activities, and whether a particular activity requires a "fitness pass." Be sure to check the schedules or call ahead.

One of the longest running classes is the aerobics class at the Health & Recreation pool, which has been running consistently for more than 10 years. About five years ago, Jo Swing, whom you probably know from Travel Toppers got involved, and is

now an avid believer in aquatic fitness. Every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday she leads a class of anywhere from 20 to 40 fit, and wannabe fit residents.

Jo says, "It is some of the best exercise ever. There's little or no stress on the joints and ligaments and yet when it's all done, you can really feel and see the benefits. By the way, it's also a great way to meet old friends and make new ones."

If it sounds like the pools, at Arbor Club, Health & Recreation, Candler Hills, and Indigo East, are there just for fitness, that's not the case. If you just want to lay about in a deck chair and take in the sun, or jump in to swim a few laps, there is always room in the pool.

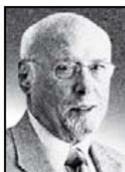

Is It Legal?

Q. I was a secretary for a large corporation for 40 years and then I retired and

moved to Florida. I think I would like to find some part-time work but not in the same line as I worked before. If I spend money traveling to get a job, what can I deduct on my income tax return?

A. I do not handle income tax matters and thus, what I am saying here should not under any circumstance be relied upon as any type of income tax advice. What you really should do is seek the advice of a competent tax advisor.

I can tell you that as a general statement, a person seeking a new job in the same line of work or the same trade or business can deduct reasonable expenses incurred in seeking that job. However, you cannot deduct the costs of trying to get employment in a different type of work or trade even if you get the job.

Q. I went to a seminar on financial planning and asked a question regarding the income taxes due if I purchase an annuity. The speaker said I was protected from having to pay income taxes because of the exclusion ratio. I did not feel comfortable

asking what that was; so, I didn't. Can you explain what he meant?

A. First of all, if you attend a seminar and you don't feel comfortable asking a question, then you've probably gone to the wrong seminar. Well, I wasn't at the seminar so I don't know precisely what was said. Therefore, you need to consider this as a general statement and not a specific answer to your question. (Note: I tend to doubt, though, that the speaker said, or that he or she meant, that you would be protected from paying all income taxes; but if he did say or mean that, he or she was incorrect.)

Generally speaking, the payments you receive from an annuity can be seen as being in two parts, although, of course, you get one check. There's the non-taxable part, which is the return on the investment you've made (premium payments for example) and there's the taxable portion, which is the interest that was earned on the money you paid into the annuity.

The non-taxable portion is figured on what is known as the "exclusion ratio." That

is, what is excluded from being income-taxable. This is determined by dividing your investment in the annuity contract by the return you have been told you can expect to earn (for example: three percent per annum). Then, that ratio number is multiplied by the amount of each payment you receive. There's a lot more to it than that, but that's a very basic way of understanding it—if, in fact, it is ever understandable and I doubt that it is.

Q. I have been thinking of buying some real property and doing it in a corporation. My wife read about limited liability companies and she says that's the way to go. You?

A. Me what? Okay, okay, so I'm just being a wiseacre. I don't have any facts to tell you whether you should have a corporation or a limited liability company (LLC) so I am not commenting on what would work best for you in your circumstances.

I can tell you this about LLCs, they are created according to the laws of a state. They are owned by or managed by members. They can be treated for tax purposes either as a partnership or as a corporation. A single member LLC that does not specifically elect to be treated as a corporation will be treated as not having any entity status, which means it cannot be treated for tax purposes as if it were a partnership.

If a LLC is treated as a partnership for tax purposes, then income will "flow-through" to the individual IRS returns of the members. This "pass-through" is also available to S corporation stockholders but there are restrictions regarding S corporations that do not apply to LLCs.

As a technical matter, a LLC is not a corporation. It's a company and there is a difference as far as the state of Florida is concerned—as well as all other states that authorize LLCs.

Q. Is it a good idea to name my attorney as the personal representative of my estate?

A. I think it is if you don't have any close relatives that you wish to name and if your attorney wants the job and if he or she understands how to probate an estate.

Do You Really Need a New Air Conditioner?

We continue to get reports from residents that unscrupulous air conditioning companies are pulling out all stops to sell them a new air conditioner. They often tell homeowners that their unit is about to die; when in reality it is working fine. We are as concerned about this as you are. That is why in March, we ran an article about how to protect yourself from the air condition-

ing technician/sales person. Master the Possibilities is also offering a monthly class on basic air conditioning maintenance and how to talk to an air conditioning technician. This class has been well attended and enjoyed.

The most important advice we can offer anyone when it comes to making any big financial decision is: "Get a second opinion."

Elder Abuse

We have heard numerous stories lately of residents who have been taken advantage of by contractors. The contractors have not finished the job they were contracted for, taken money and never started the job, or sold residents something they didn't need.

Whatever the case may be this is a form of elder abuse and should be reported not only to the Better Business Bureau but also to the elder abuse hotline at 1-800-96-ABUSE (22873).

After Hours Non-Medical Emergencies

Please call 236-6869 for any after hour non-medical emergencies. Even though Customer Service is closed, we do have an answering service where you will be able to speak with their phone representative, who, based on the reason for the call, will provide direction or dispatch an after hour person. If they do not know the answer, they will have an On Top of the World representative call you back.

If you call an outside contractor to make repairs that the maintenance company would normally be responsible for, you may not receive reimbursement. On Top of the World Central Owners Association members, we ask that you notify us first before contacting an outside contractor for things like roots in water lines, sewer backups, sprinklers damaged by mowers,

etc. To avoid being taken advantage of by an unscrupulous contractor, always check with or call the service department or our after hour answering service at 236-OTOW (6869).

You may reach the Marion County Sheriff's Department at its non-emergency number, 732-9111, to report incidents that don't need an immediate response. If you are unsure whether the problem is your responsibility or not, call the 236-6869 number and they can help advise you. All medical emergencies should call 911.

Plumbing & Water Conservation

Golf Cart Lanes/Roadways

The Community Patrol has asked us

to include a reminder to all this month to please share the golf lanes and roadways, because of what they have observed recently.

Golf cart lanes are multi-purpose lanes for carts, bicycles and pedestrians. We encourage all users to be considerate of others and remind all that the rules of the road apply. The Florida Handbook on who has the right-of-way and safety rules for pedestrians is quoted below:

- Right-of-way: Who has the right-of-way in Florida? The answer is no one! The law only says who must yield (give up) the right-of-way. Every driver, motorcyclist, moped rider, bicyclist and pedestrian must do everything possible to avoid a crash.
- Safety Rules for Pedestrians: While walking along a highway, always walk on the shoulder on the left side, facing traffic. Wear light colored, reflective clothing or use a flashlight to make you more visible to drivers at night.

Repaints in Candler Hills & Indigo East

Reminder for all Candler Hills and Indigo East residents, it may be time for a repaint since some of you are coming up on seven years of occupancy. If you decide it's time to repaint your home, please remember that any changes to the exterior of the home must be approved by the Architectural Review Board (ARB). You will need to submit a modification request to Customer Service and receive approval before you may proceed with the repaint unless you are planning to use the exact same colors.

Lawn Debris

Please do not place bagged lawn debris in the swales; this may cause storm drains to become clogged in heavy rains. We ask that residents place yard debris on curbs the morning of or not earlier than the night before pick-up, and please place away from storm drains. We ask that no household garbage or animal feces be placed in with the yard debris.

Keeping It Green

Believe it or not, we are still seeing the effects of the mild winter we had this year. I have seen plants that are typically cold hardy up into parts of central Georgia showing signs of cold damage or are even dead as a result of the cold weather and now we are seeing populations of insects because the winter was not as hard. Crape Myrtles were hit with the cold, Sweet Viburnum were hit by the cold and if you had perennial plants that were still green, they are probably showing signs of damage and are slowly recovering or are dead. How is that possible with such a warm winter?

My records indicate that we saw low temperature in the high teens on Jan. 4. Okay, we see those kinds of temperatures at least once a year with a cold front in January and the year before we had snow ... but this winter was unusually warm.

A couple of things leading up to the cold:

1. We had 79 degree temperatures on Jan. 1;
2. The humidity was at 95%;
3. We had 12 hours of temperatures at hard freeze conditions (fewer than

29 degrees).
With the previous weather conditions in December, with highs in the 80s and one cold snap with a low in the mid to upper 30s, plants were not dormant or acclimated to the cold blast. These high temperatures had plants flushing out in conditions that would typically render them stagnant and waiting for warmer temperatures.

Disease and insects will probably be our biggest hurdle this summer and into the fall. I believe the warmer than usual temperatures did not have as significant an effect on the insects as they normally have had so insects could be in stronger populations this year. Some insects I have seen earlier than usual are aphids, chinch bugs, bill bugs, mites, various types of scales and others.

What do you need to do to prevent further damage? Regularly inspect your plants and grass for areas of distress. Look at newer growth on the plants and see if they appear to be curling or if there is abnormal growth. This could be a sign of insect damage and/or disease. Plants such as Viburnum have been showing a sign of cracking and splitting bark or cankers on the trunk. This is most likely associated with a fungal pathogen but could possibly be from the cold weather. Crape Myrtles have shown cold damage with dead canes that are cracking and splitting on the trunk. Canes that are not producing new shoots should be removed.

Cold damage in St. Augustine grass will

result in stunted growth or dead patches. Small areas could be expected and will most likely fill in.

Something else to look at with all grass types is yellowing patches that seem to not green up. This is probably a secondary fungal pest that has damaged the roots and is not allowing them to take up vital nutrients for growth. Liquid applications of fertilizer will assist with correcting these deficiencies but applications of fungicide may be necessary to control fungal pathogens.

If areas continue to yellow, laboratory testing may be needed to confirm presence of fungus or possibly applications may be necessary to correct soil pH. Soil pH generally needs to be around 6.0 to 7.0; anything lower or higher will bind nutrients in the soil and will not allow plants to take them up.

The University of Florida has a plant disease clinic and a rapid turf diagnosis department. They will test samples to determine what is causing problems and offer solutions to control the pest. More information can be found for the UF Plant Disease Clinic at <http://plantpath.ifas.ufl.edu/pdc/>. The information for the Rapid Turf Diagnosis department can be found at <http://turf.ufl.edu/rapiddiag.shtml>.

If you search "UF Plant Disease Clinic or Rapid Turf Diagnosis" both will come up first on the Internet search results. There is a charge of \$40 for the plant diagnostic service and \$75 for the rapid turf diagnostic service. Both are well worth their price.

ed assets, and making sure we have an updated recovery plan.

Key personnel are on-call before and after a storm. Water and Wastewater personnel are moved on-site to make sure that essential utility services are protected and the chance of interruption is minimized. Tarps (in limited supply) are kept on hand to secure homes in the event of roof damage.

Despite all of our efforts, much of your own safety and comfort depends entirely on you. To that end, I am reprinting key points to help you prepare for a storm event:

- Designate as a "post-disaster contact," a relative or friend who lives outside the danger zone. Make sure each family member has been given this person's address and phone number, and agrees to contact him or her following the hurricane.
- Keep on hand at least one week's supply of bottled water and non-perishable food items. You should also have available a manual can/bottle opener, a flashlight, and a battery-operated radio or television (with an extra set of batteries for each). Make sure these items are readily accessible, so that you can quickly pack and evacuate.
- Maintain an up-to-date inventory of everything in your home. Taking photos and/or making videotapes of these items may help support the value you place on them. Also, consider storing valuable items at a secure location away from the

house.

- Remove furniture from porches or patio and secure hoses so that these objects do not become dangerous or lethal projectiles during a storm.
- Stock up on items you may need to protect your home or to prevent it from being further damaged after the storm has passed. These items may include, but are not limited to tarps or plastic, hammers, nails and plywood.
- Make sure your family is trained on how to turn off damaged utilities.
- At least once per year, review your insurance coverage to make sure it is adequate and up-to-date.
- Don't forget about your pet. Some evacuation centers do not allow pets. Making arrangements before a storm reduces the anxiety for both you and your pet.

When a hurricane threatens, immediately take these steps:

- Refill prescriptions.
- Make sure your car has a full tank of gas as power outages may force gas stations to remain closed for several days following a hurricane.
- Store important documents and other valuable items in waterproof bags.
- Bring inside, any loose items that can be found around the home. Firmly tie down loose items that cannot be brought indoors.
- Tape, board or shutter windows.
- Have enough cash on hand to last at

least a full week. Banks and ATMs may be closed for several days following the storm.

Here are some suggestions on what to do during a hurricane:

- Stay tuned to a battery-operated radio or television for weather bulletins and important information.
- Follow the orders of local authorities.
- Stay indoors in an interior room without windows (even if you have evacuated, inland locations may still be at risk). If conditions worsen, take shelter in a closet or bathroom and use mattresses to protect yourself.
- Don't assume the hurricane is over when the wind subsides. The calm may be the eye of the storm, and the worst part may still be on the way.

If the electricity goes out:

- Use a flashlight – not a candle or match. You do not want to take the risk of igniting gas from a broken line.
- Open your refrigerator only when absolutely necessary. This will help keep food fresh for as long as possible.

After the hurricane has passed:

- Don't venture outside until local authorities have issued an "all-clear."
- Continue to check the radio or TV for post hurricane updates.
- If you have evacuated, don't return until authorities re-open your area. Remember, you may need proof of residency to return.
- Use a flashlight to look at damage. Allow only those people who have been trained, to turn off damaged utilities (e.g. gas) and disconnect damaged appliances.
- Beware of downed power lines and other debris.
- Wear sturdy shoes and clothing to protect yourself. People are often hurt more frequently after the hurricane than during it.
- Use only bottled water. Unless otherwise advised, assume tap water is contaminated and sewer lines are out of order.
- If electrical power was lost during the hurricane, be extremely careful before consuming food taken from your refrigerator. When in doubt, throw it out.
- Use the phone only for emergencies.

- Conserve water! Do not wash driveways of debris. If the power is out and you still have water pressure, it is only because the water plant is running on auxiliary power.

Proper insurance coverage can help reduce the financial burden you may suffer as a result of a hurricane. Here are some additional tips that will make the claims process easier for you and your claims adjuster.

- Don't alter the condition of the damaged property. Take whatever steps are necessary to protect your property from further damage.
- Contact your insurance agent as soon as possible. Provide your agent or insurance carrier all information pertaining to your claim.
- Make a list of damaged or destroyed property. Your adjuster will be able to work more quickly if he or she has a written list to work from. Photos of damaged property may also be useful.
- Keep records and receipts for all expenses you incur. Supplies purchased to protect damaged property or the costs incurred while staying at a hotel while your home is being repaired, may be recoverable.
- Try to be patient. Once you report your claim, your claims adjuster will respond as quickly as possible. Delays may be likely, as hurricanes often uproot signs and deposit debris on highways, severely impeding traffic.



Sheriff's K-9 Unit

Lieutenant Jon Turner, Unit Commander of the K-9 teams, explained in detail how the K-9 Unit in Marion County operates.

With flashing teeth and lightning speed, a police dog attacked a would-be assailant in front of a crowd of spectators who were attending a class on K-9 police dogs held at Master the Possibilities.

The class was conducted by the Marion County Sheriff's Department with most of the attention on a muscular German Shepherd that is a member of the Sheriff's K-9 Unit.

There are eight K-9 teams in Marion County.

Lieutenant Jon Turner, Unit Commander of the K-9 teams, explained in detail how the K-9 Unit in Marion County has evolved since 1987 with only two K-9 teams to eight teams today.

Accompanying Lieutenant Turner was Undersheriff Dan Kuhn who explained a little about the Unit and the responsibilities of the Sheriff's Department towards having a K-9 Unit. Sergeant Louis Pulford from the SR200 Sheriff's substation was the would-be assailant demonstrating the speed and aggressiveness of the police dog named Bolt.

Lieutenant Turner explained and demonstrated Bolt attacking an assailant by having him attack Sergeant Pulford who was at the rear of the hall wearing protective arm padding. Bolt actually bolted down the aisle attacking Pulford until Turner called him off.

Lieutenant Turner explained that most of the K-9 dogs are purchased at a price between \$6,000 and \$7,000. Turner stated that the funds for Bolt came from a donation by John Travolta. Since Travolta did the voiceover of a dog named Bolt in an animated movie, Turner decided that would be the name for his K-9.

The Marion County Sheriff's Office has only German Shepherds in their K-9 Unit. The deputy handler and dog attend school for 480 hours (four months) before having their final evaluation being allowed to become a member of the Unit. Both the dog and handler are evaluated at prescribed intervals.

The Unit assists during all kinds of situations from sniffing out drugs and explo-

sives to assisting in the apprehension of offenders, as well as search and rescue. The dog's training and responsibilities are constantly expanding.

The Lieutenant explained that each K-9 handler performs two verbal warnings to any suspect before the dog is released stating if they don't cease in fleeing or whatever the situation may be, the handler will announce beforehand that he is releasing the dog.

Undersheriff Kuhn explained that the federal standards for a dog biting a suspect are around 30% and in Marion County the K-9 Unit likes to keep their bite ratio below 20%. The Lieutenant added that it is actually down around 10%. This percentage is based on when the dog is released and bites the suspect. Normally, when the suspect hears the dog's bark or growl, they generally surrender without a bite ever taking place. It is very apparent that criminals are more afraid of being bitten by a dog than being chased and caught by the deputy.

The K-9 Unit meets or exceeds all the minimum certification which is mandated by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement. The K-9 Unit receives certification through the United States Police Canine Association.

Besides their regular duties, the K-9 Unit supports the apprehension of criminals, building and area searches, warrant searches, article and rescue searches, illegal drugs and bomb searches, cadaver searches and assisting deputies when needed and requested.

The K-9 dogs train and are with their Sheriff Deputy handler while on and off duty. When the teams are not on duty, there is at least one team on duty at all times, the teams visit schools, churches, and other institutions providing demonstrations of their dog's abilities as well as informing the public.

There will be other classes on the K-9 Unit as well as other categories provided by the Marion County Sheriff's Department scheduled in the future at the Master the Possibilities. Check out the class schedule online at www.masterthepossibilities.com.

Army Airborne Museum

Are you a history buff or are you just a novice when it comes to military history and displays?

On a recent motor coach trip to Boston, our itinerary had the adventurous group stopping at Fayetteville, N.C. to tour and visit the Army's Airborne & Special Operations Museum, which is located in this small community that is home to Fort Bragg.

The outside of the museum was awesome but after entering this structure it be-

came extremely evident that this museum was a place worth visiting. After watching a film entitled, "Descending from the Clouds," which was narrated by Benjamin Franklin, the museum tells the story of the Army's airborne and special operations units from the first parachute jump made during World War II years to the present.

Walking through the museum's front doors one is hit immediately with a World War II soldier descending from the ceiling in that era's parachute, and walking further

into the main lobby a soldier utilizing a modern day chute.

The museum opened its doors on Aug. 16, 2000, the exact date of the Army's first test parachute jump at Fort Benning, Ga., 60 years earlier. The museum emphasizes military history, especially the Army's airborne and special operations with many artifacts including a C-47 "Skytrain" airplane hanging from the ceiling with a paratrooper in the plane's doorway getting ready to jump. There is a restored CG-4A glider displayed unloading a jeep. I could go on and on describing all the displays that are life-like in this museum.

The museum is located not far off Interstate 95 in downtown Fayetteville, N.C. It is a very worthwhile place to visit; besides the price of admission is free. As I stated before, this museum is not only interesting for the military historian but also the complete novice person who just likes to view some of our country's military history. I will admit I was very impressed with the museum, even if it is that of the U.S. Army as I was a U.S. Navy man myself.



Larry's Fit Tips

What is a Calorie and How Many Do I Need?

Calorie has become a common term, although exactly what a calorie is and does is a mystery to many. Ask 100 people what a calorie is and most will tell you it is "the thing in food that makes me fat." Calories have gotten a bad reputation and are considered by many to be the enemy. Few peo-

ple truly understand what a calorie is and why it is so important to their bodies.

By definition, a calorie is the energy it takes to raise the temperature of one gram of water, one degree Celsius. The important word to take away from this definition is energy. Calories are energy that fuels our bodies; much like gasoline fuels our cars. Without sufficient calories our heart would not beat, our lungs would not function, and our brain would not work.

Many of us have no idea how many calories our body needs just to exist. In general, an adult body needs at least 1,000 to 1,400 calories to have enough energy to fuel key organs like the brain, heart, and lungs.

This minimum number of calories is called your resting metabolic rate (RMR) and it varies greatly depending on age, sex, weight, and muscle mass. In order to have

enough energy to live your day and be active, you need more energy than what's required from your RMR. This extra energy typically amounts to about 400 to 600 additional calories per day, which is the energy you need to move versus just lying still all day.

If you exceed the number of calories your body requires each day, you will eventually gain weight. It takes an excess of 3,500 calories to gain one pound of fat. For example, if your body needs 2,000 calories a day to maintain its current weight and every day you consume 500 over that amount (one 20 ounce mocha swirl latte could add 500 calories!), in one week you would gain one pound. One day of over-indulging does not cause instant weight gain.

To lose weight you need to use/burn more calories than you consume. Example: If you eat 2,000 calories a day, and are maintaining your weight, you would need to burn 250 calories (30 minutes of continuous aerobic activities, for a 150 pound person) per day to lose a half a pound in one week. If, in addition, you decreased your caloric intake by 250 calories a day (a 20-ounce soda), a 500-calorie a day total deficit, you could then lose one pound per week.

It's important to remember that although drastically reducing your calories in a short period of time may initially re-

sult in dramatic weight loss, the body can rarely continue along this restrictive path, especially if the person is consuming below their resting metabolic rate. Eating later to make up for those missing calories usually results in gaining back the weight lost, and in many cases gaining even more weight. If you force your body to restrict calories for a prolonged amount of time, your metabolism will slow down to compensate—effectively stopping weight loss.

As with most things in life, moderation is the key. Moderate caloric intake combined with moderate exercise will help you achieve and maintain your natural, healthy weight, and stay there. So remember: calories are our friends! They are what give us the energy to play with our grandchildren, finish those last nine holes of golf, and live life to the fullest. You can't live without them but choose healthy foods to make sure your calories are packed with disease-fighting nutrients to keep you feeling healthy and vibrant!

FIT TIP #1: Keeping a food log is a good tool to monitor your intake of calories.

FIT TIP #2: Take the time to read food labels; there is important information about the nutrient value of the food along with the amount of calories per serving.

FIT TIP #3: Your basal metabolic rate accounts for about 60 to 75 percent of the calories you burn every day.

Back at The Ranch

Q: I want to burn more fat during my cardiovascular exercise session. What is the proper exercise intensity to burn more fat?

A: The answer to this question is sometimes confusing. At times, the percentage of fat burned gets confused with the overall fat calories burned.

Many programs, articles, videos, etc. may purport to maximize fat burning through low-intensity aerobic exercise program (cardiovascular-treadmill, bike, elliptical, group exercise, etc.). The programs are basing their theory on the idea that low-intensity aerobic exercise burns a higher percentage of calories from fat than high-intensity exercise.

This theory is absolutely true in that you will burn a higher percentage of fat while performing low vs. high intensity aerobic exercise. However, high-intensity aerobic exercise will burn more calories than a low-intensity program and when calculating the numbers: high-intensity aerobic exercise burns more fat calories in a given period of time than low-intensity aerobic exercise.

Consider this generic example. A 30

minute low-intensity (50% maximal heart rate) aerobic exercise session results in approximately 200 calories burned and 90% of those calories being burned come from fat. On the other hand, a high intensity (75% maximal heart rate) aerobic exercise session results in approximately 400 calories burned and 60% of those calories being burned come from fat.

The percentage of calories burned is higher in the low-intensity example. However, the total number of calories burned is greater with the high-intensity program, which is a key component in this example. The low-intensity program burns 200 calories of which 90% are from fat resulting in 180 (200 x .90) fat calories burned, while the high-intensity aerobic exercise program burns 400 calories of which 60% are from fat resulting in 240 (400 x .60) fat calories burned.

The high-intensity exercise session not only burns more calories, but it also burns more fat calories. Although a low-intensity exercise session could be extended by 10 minutes to burn the same number of fat calories, the additional 10 minutes would still fall short in total calories by 120.

One must consider the variables prior to increasing your exercising intensity: exercise tolerance, conditioning, nutrition and disease state. Please seek the advice of a physician and/or personal trainer prior to changing exercise intensity. Seek the advice of physician prior to starting an exercise program.

Birders' Beat

By Anne Merrick

I love boat trips on the rivers around here and our last Birders outing for this season was spectacular.

We picked up our ride with Captain Vince at the Moss Bluff Lock and Dam on the Ocklawaha River and headed south, which was upstream in this case. The sun was shining but we were protected by the canopy and could see everything from blooming vegetation to alligators and 22 species of birds.

Several of us are also part of the Native Plant Group so we always are interested in the plants.

We had some terrific spotters who seemed to be able to see and identify birds that needed to be pointed out to me, which they did with grace and patience. What a marvelous group! It was an education as well as a pleasure to drift down the sparkling water with the breeze in my face and so many sights of nature to see.

The intent of the trip was to visit the Blue Heron Rookery, which is off to the side of the river. We had not noticed it on the way up the Ocklawaha River but Captain Vince had a plan for us and, on the way back, moved quietly into the swampy side of the river. There, before our eyes, nests with parents and offspring became apparent in the trees.

Once we started looking, more came into focus. Now the binoculars and cameras were glued to our faces as we oohed and aahed over the cute, fluffy babies. We were lucky enough to be there for a shift change and one bird got quite a talking to as though he was late and "where had he been anyway."

Although clumsy on perches, the Aninga is a graceful flyer able to soar to great heights. It is also called the snakebird, because of its long thin neck and small narrow head, which appears serpentine when swimming with its body submerged to the neck. It also swims underwater spearing fish with its sharp, pointed bill and is most commonly seen perched on a snag with its wings and tail spread wide to dry. As well as fish, this bird eats frogs, snakes and leeches.

The nest is a large, untidy collection of dead twigs and small branches in the crook of a tree. Anhingas are monogamous and colonial while breeding, incubating eggs for 25 or so days. The white, fluffy young are cared for by both parents. The male is black with significant white stripes on the wings and back, a yellowish beak, long tail and red eyes. The female is similar but with a buff-colored chest.

What a way to end the season! We will have a meeting to discuss next season's itinerary sometime in September. Have a great summer. For more information, you may call Anne Merrick at 352-732-0706



Shuffleboard Player Publishes Book

"Shuffleboard, Why Not?" written by one of our own shuffleboard players, John Mataya, is now in print. The book is intended for both the beginning and experienced players, and it is written with detailed explanations and numerous illustrations.

For the beginning shuffleboard player, John explains the basic details of the court and equipment needed to play the game. He instructs how to hold the cue stick, how to stand, and how to deliver.

Comparing shuffleboard to a game of "hide and seek," Mataya tells where to place the disk to create a hiding place in order that the opponent will not be able to knock your disc off the playing area. This is accomplished by a number of different plays, and John points out the correct placement of the disc in order to create these blocks. He then continues with his explanations on how to win the game, through different strategies, to be able to score points.

For both beginning and experienced players, John gives instructions how to play six shuffleboard games which will help them gain more accuracy in kitchen shots and scoring.

John Mataya also devotes some of his chapters to those who may be interested in tournaments. He states the general rules, tells about the Ormond Senior Games, and gives instructions on how to play in tournaments. He also lists the rules and regulations of the Florida Shuffleboard Association.

If you have been looking for an instructional shuffleboard book, you may find this one helpful whether you want to learn how to play, to improve your skills, or to play in a tournament.

The regular shuffleboard season (Sep-

tember through April) is over and with it came the leaving of the snowbirds. But those of you who will be here at On Top of the World for all or part of the summer, come join us for shuffleboard whether you are an experienced or a beginning player.



ing their tennis game could be the best decision of their life.

3. Some may want to play, but due to injury or illness, have been sidelined for extended time periods; we need to help these people understand that there are many ways to resolve bone or joint problems.

I felt that teaching professionals in conjunction with physicians in our communities use tennis lessons to help people become more mobile and active, depending on the extent of their health and fitness concerns.

This can also be a challenge, because many in this age group have "lost the fire" and have a tendency to withdraw in general, not wishing to be challenged beyond their abilities, which is exactly what they need to seek more and more challenges to keep their body, brain, mind and spirit alive and growing.

Why should tennis be a primary activity for this age group? Interestingly, experts noted the "fun" aspect of tennis when answering this question.

They stated, "Tennis is a tremendous lifetime activity with numerous health benefits for both the mind and the body. Adults who regularly participate in tennis will predictably find improved levels of cardiovascular conditioning, strength, flexibility, mobility, balance, hand-eye coordination and so much more. These are physical characteristics that typically decline rapidly after the age of 50. So, a fun activity that both maintains and enhances these elements is one that we should encourage."

Also, in addition to feeling better and remaining sharper, having an improved feeling of well being, and socializing regularly, there are many mental and emotional benefits to tennis. Dr. John Ratey says, "I recommend seniors work out five or six days a week. A heart-thumping game of tennis can keep the older brain in top shape."

Pin Placement

In the golf operations department, we have been hearing a lot of comments lately regarding the pin placement; "The pin is too close to the edge; it's not legal." or "How far should the pin position be?"

Is it legal or not legal?

Guess what? It's legal. The rules of golf appear to govern every inch of the game and the course. After all, there are rules and decisions dealing with everything from hitting into a pile of coyote manure to whacking your playing partner in the melon with your drive. But some areas are open to interpretation, and that includes course setup.

There is no rule that governs how far from the edge of a green a hole may be placed, only that it must rest on the green itself. Most greens keepers, like Andy Jorgensen and his crew, try to keep the cup at least nine feet from the edge of the green. Unless some sort of maintenance requires it, any greens keeper will avoid a "sucker pin," or one that is less than five feet from the edge of the green.

We know how important it is to get

checked in and tee it up. In other words grip it and rip it. So, to help the Golf Shop staff expedite your check in process, remember your member number, which is located on your membership picture card (it's not your GHIN or local number). You'll be surprised at how quickly you'll get checked in.



One of the movies picked was a Spencer Tracy movie called "Bad Day at Black Rock." Tracy played a one-armed veteran who comes to the town of Black Rock to deliver a medal to the man who saved his life during the war. In Black Rock, he meets bad guy, Robert Ryan, and his henchmen, Lee Marvin and Ernest Borgnine. What made the choice odd is that the only trains that you see in the movie is the one that drops Tracy off at the beginning of the movie, and the one he gets on at the end.

Twenty years after that movie, Lee Marvin and Ernest Borgnine starred in another train movie, "Emperor of the North." In it, Marvin plays a hobo who is trying to sneak a ride on a freight train, and Borgnine plays the sadistic conductor who proclaims that, "No one rides on my train." The battle they have on the moving train is a classic.



World Traveler

Gibraltar is a British overseas territory located on the southern end of the Iberian Peninsula. Data suggests that the Neanderthals first populated the area about 120,000 years ago. Since then, it has been occupied by the Phoenicians, Carthaginians, Romans, Vandals, Visigoths, Moors (for 700 years), and the Spanish.

In 1704, a combined Anglo-Dutch force captured the town of Gibraltar during the War of Spanish Succession. Under the terms of the 1713 Treaty of Utrecht, Gibraltar was ceded to Britain in perpetuity, a fact that has grated on the Spanish ever since – they would like to have it back.

The Strait of Gibraltar, a narrow body of water connecting the Atlantic Ocean to the Mediterranean Sea, separates Gibraltar and Spain in Europe from Morocco in Africa. In the ancient world, the strait was known as the "Pillars of Hercules." This places Gibraltar in a very strategic location. Because the strait is only 8.9 miles wide and guns have been able to fire projectiles far more than nine miles for well over 100 years, the British in Gibraltar have been able to control the entrance and exit to the Mediterranean Sea for a long time.

This dominance of the sea became even more important after the Suez Canal opened in 1869 because it significantly increased commercial sea traffic through the Mediterranean Sea. With such a powerful incentive, Spain has never been too happy with Gibraltar being a British territory, and has failed several times trying to reclaim sovereignty through military intervention.

More recently, the British have agreed to abide by the wishes of the citizens of Gibraltar. The vote in a 1967 referendum was to remain under British sovereignty, and in yet another referendum in 2002, the vote was an amazing 99% in favor of remaining a British territory.

Gibraltar extends over an area of only 2.6 square miles. Since most of the land is taken up by the huge Rock of Gibraltar, the population of about 30,000 people is packed into a very small space, making it one of the most densely populated areas in

the world.

Outside of the strategic political interest, Gibraltar also is an interesting place to visit, and is a popular stop on the cruise circuit. Many people love the tax-free shopping available, while others enjoy the readily available gambling.

Historical sites are omnipresent, as the land has been occupied by many different cultures over the centuries. Interesting sites would include: Moorish castles, 30 miles of siege tunnels running inside the rock, Barbary Macaques (the famous Gibraltar monkeys), whale watching, a small village at Catalan Bay, a glass factory, the Ibrahim al Ibrahim Mosque, the Convent of the Franciscans, dating to about 1530, and many other things.





Mary Callahan, president of the Marion County Sheriff's Office Foundation, along with two board members, Richard Andrews and Angie DeNoia attended the April meeting to talk about the Foundation.

Each year, over 1,500 Marion County citizens volunteer their time and energies for an average total of 128,000 hours service. Citizen Observer Patrol (COPS) and Crime Watch (Patrol) units log nearly 500,000 miles yearly, patrolling county neighborhoods and businesses. During hurricane season, volunteers are available to be called upon to assist the County's Emergency Management services.

These volunteer hours represent a tax

saving of nearly \$3 million annually to the community. In 2008 when the Sheriff's Office budget was cut, the Marion County Sheriff's Office Foundation was established to raise money needed to help fund the volunteer programs through various fundraising events, such as, car shows, dinner dances and ice cream socials as well as donations by the public.

Another goal of the Foundation is a Volunteer Recognition Program in which volunteers who have contributed five or 10 years of service to the Sheriff's Office are recognized by a certificate of appreciation. Ms. Callahan presented many certificates, at this meeting, to the patrol members who have achieved these years.



This month's tip is adapted from "Top 100 Simplified Tip & Tricks - Digital Photography" on the advantages of using a special graph called the histogram which is available on most digital cameras.

The histogram shows the brightness levels of an image ranging from pure black on the left to pure white on the right. It can give you excellent information that helps you to better adjust your exposure.

There is no such thing as a perfect shape to a histogram. It can reflect only the real-world brightness levels of your scene. The key to reading a histogram is to watch the right side. If the histogram slams up against the right side so that its slope is abruptly chopped off, it is said to be clipped. This represents an image with lost or blown-out highlight detail.

Citizens Emergency Response Team

At our May meeting, members reviewed the light search and rescue drill that they had on Sunday, April 29. Twenty-six members (seven of which were ham radio operators) participated in this event.

The group was divided into five, four-member teams, which included a radio operator. The scenario they were given was that the community experienced an F2 category (113-157 mph winds) tornado with five to 10 inches of rain. The teams were assigned to specific areas in the community and were asked to assess the damage, injuries and report back to the command center.

These drills are so important for the members to experience and learn how to work as a team, utilize a ham radio operator, communicate and record their findings in a useful and detailed manner. The more practice the members have, the more likely they will be prepared for a real disaster. The group looked at the areas that were successful in the drill and the areas that still need to be worked on.

In follow-up of this drill, the members watched a CERT training video on "Safety in the After-Disaster Environment." Some of the important information that was learned from this video included: the importance of safety, particularly among the team members, so they do not become victims themselves. The CERT teams are encouraged to always assess the situation for safety before proceeding. They are also directed not to go off alone but to stay with their team members. Wearing appropriate and protective clothing, that are provided, is another way, for the CERT member, to stay safe.

The next regular CERT meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, June 12.

CERT meets every second Tuesday of the month, at 9 a.m., in Suites E, F, and G of the Arbor Conference Center. Persons interested in learning more about CERT are welcome to attend these meetings or contact Pat at 854-8718.

View From The Library

I just finished one of the most amusing and touching novels I have been fortunate enough to read. The title will give you some sense of the atmosphere and persons who people the book: "The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society" written by Mary Ann Shaffer and Annie Barrows.

Guernsey is one of the Channel Islands owned by Great Britain. But in 1940, the Germans occupied the island until the war was over in 1945. And those years are the setting for the story.

The heroine of the book is Juliet Ashton, a London resident who wrote a regular newspaper column during the war designed to lighten life for the British people. But when the war was over, her column was discontinued and she found herself in search of a topic for a book.

Just at that time, she received a letter from Dawsey Adams on Guernsey Island who had just stumbled over her name in a secondhand book. And so the ties among Juliet and Dawsey and London and Guernsey were established. The event and the characters in the novel all will come from a series of letters from people on Guernsey telling about their experiences during the German occupation.

The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society came into being during the German occupation when a group of islanders were caught going home together from one person's house. Such meetings were outlawed by the occupation. When they were stopped, Elizabeth McKenna, thinking quickly, stepped forward and said they had been at a meeting of The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society, and just lost track of time. The Germans accepted the story and now some of the islanders had an excuse to meet.

After the war was over, Dawsey Adams' letter was followed by several others from other Guernsey residents. Juliet thought that there just might be a story in the years of the occupation. The problem was how to tell it. There was no clear cut plot; the period was really a time of individual experiences, and then Juliet realized that letters from various residents would be a unique way to tell the story along with Juliet's contacts when she went to the island to meet the residents. So we understand why this story of Guernsey Island during World War II was written the way it was. And it turns out to be a very effective method.

I must also mention that the quality of the prose in the novel is of very high quality, which simply adds to the pleasure of reading this really light hearted book—"The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society" (I guess you'll have to read the book to discover how potato peel pie got in there ...).

Please note that this book in our library is a large print edition.



Genealogical Society

Why research your genealogy? One reason is to understand the life and times of your grandparents, your great-grandparents and their ancestors before them.

To start your genealogical search of your family's ancestors, you begin with the records that are available to you from family relatives and then from federal, state, municipal and county archives. Other good sources are the many online services such as ancestry.com, familysearch.org, fold3.com and archives.com. An all-encompassing source is cyndislist.com, which will lead you to hundreds of other internet sources that are available.

An excellent source of genealogical information is right here in our own backyard at the On Top of the World Genealogical Society, which holds a business meeting at 10 a.m. the second Monday of every month in Meeting Room 3 of the Craft Building next to the Health & Recreation Building.

At the business meeting, we discuss upcoming genealogy programs, new books added to the Society's extensive genealogical library and methods of researching your family's roots and more.

We also have an educational presentation at 10 a.m. on the third Monday of the

month, from September to May, in Suites B and C of the Arbor Conference Center. In conjunction with Master the Possibilities, the Genealogical Society also presents many educational seminars that will assist you in your family search. Check the Master the Possibilities catalog in the fall for the list of courses that will be presented next season during the fall and winter.

On Sunday, April 1, the U.S. government released the 1940 U.S. Federal Census. It contains millions of names recorded on the original census forms written by the census enumerators. These names are in the process of being digitized and indexed by tens of thousands of volunteers. For those who cannot wait until this process is completed, one of the Genealogical Society's very knowledgeable members, Julia Hendricks, gave a very informative presentation at the meeting on Monday, April 16, on how to find these original images and how to interpret them in your quest to find your ancestor. Using online sources, such as stevemorse.org/census, one can view the 1940 original images and track down parents, grandparents or other relatives with some time and effort.

For those of us who are not as diligent and are willing to wait until probably late October or November, the 1940 U.S. Census should then be available online in an indexed form at one of the above mentioned genealogical services.

If you want to begin a family tree or have already started one but would like more information on how to proceed, come to one of our meetings and we can help you find out how rewarding it can be to trace your family history and connect with your ancestors and their rich heritage.



Stamp Club

The General Francis Marion Stamp Club meetings are always interesting and informative, but the Wednesday, May 2 meeting was especially so!

Our scheduled speaker couldn't make it, so our club's president, Don Parsells gave an unscheduled talk about something that I had never heard of – "Encased Postage Stamps."

Well, thanks to Don, I now know that early in 1862, a few months after our Civil War started, people started hoarding silver and gold coins and suddenly coins were worth more than paper money. Reacting to this shortage of coins, on July 17, 1862, the U.S. Congress passed a law stating that postage stamps could be used to pay debts

of less than \$5. Response?

Don noted that less than a month later, John Gault used button-making equipment to create a metallic round mini stamp case. The encased stamps – mostly one to 10 cent value stamps of the 1861 series of U.S. stamps – were covered by a transparent piece of mica held in place by an outer metallic frame and brass backing.

Gault sold over 750,000 encased postage stamps in spite of the fact that the U.S. government issued fractional paper currency in 1863. Gault also sold ad space for stamping on the brass backing of the "stamp coins." Lord & Taylor in New York City was the only one of Gault's 30-plus advertisers that I happened to recognize.

It's estimated that only 3,500 to 7,000 of these encased postage stamps have survived for today's collectors.

It was also reported that about 250 Girl Scouts attended their Monday, April 9 event at which the Girl Scouts saw our club's stamp displays and received packets of stamps and beginner stamp albums. There was a drawing for the First Ladies of the U.S. album donated by our club. The winner, Alicia Perez, received her prize at a brief ceremony on Wednesday, May 9 at our evening meeting at the Queen of Peace Church library.


