**The World As It Is**

I keep looking around for some positive indication that home values, and the real estate market continue to stabilize. A recent report by the Census Bureau reported the following: "The median sales price of new houses sold in April 2014 was \$275,800; the average sales price was \$320,100. The seasonally adjusted estimate of new houses for sale at the end of April was 192,000." (Source: Census Bureau)

Looking closer to home, realtors report an increase in both home sales and prices in Marion County. Certainly we have noted a solid trend of prices recovering in the original neighborhoods. It appears that the regional and state real estate markets are looking brighter as the opportunity to sell your home increases. The take-away news is this: consider upping your asking price and holding tight in any negotiation. The local market supports that strategy.

According to Freddie Mac, the national average commitment rate for a 30-year, conventional, fixed-rate mortgage was 4.34-percent in April 2014, unchanged from March but up from 3.45-percent in April 2013.

Sale of foreclosed properties is a significantly lower percentage of home sales in Marion County over last year. In other words, the backlog of foreclosed properties is decreasing and overall supply is narrowing (finally). So the takeaway for residents is that if you currently have your home listed for sale, you may want to hold tight on the price and not be so inclined to negotiate away your value.

**Alpaca Magic**

A van of over 40 residents arrived in Homosassa, Fla., to tour Alpaca Magic USA, an alpaca farm. This field trip was sponsored by Master the Possibilities.

An alpaca is a gentle, clean, herd animal smaller than a llama that is native to the Andes Mountains in South America where they are raised for their fleece and meat. The alpaca is classified as a camelid, which is the same family as llamas and camels. Out of the camelid species, the alpaca is the most valuable as a fiber-bearing animal and is too small to be used as a pack animal.

Alpaca Magic USA is home to approximately 100 suri and huacaya alpacas. In 1996, Jean Riley started the farm with just two pregnant females and it has since grown into the second largest alpaca farm in Florida. Today, the farm is a family-run business including Jean's son and daughter-in-law.

The group of residents was split in two with Jean taking half the group while the others went with Larry Startzel, who gave the second group a first-hand close up of some of the herd including pregnant girls. The females are referred to as girls and the males as boys.

Jean showed her group how fine and strong the alpaca fleece is. She demonstrated with a spinning wheel, taking raw or dyed fleece and spinning it into yarn.

It was also explained that there are two types of alpacas – the huacaya and suri. Jean stated that over 90-percent of alpacas in the country are huacaya.

Mainly the fleece distinguishes the two varieties from each other. The huacaya fleece is very woolly like sheep, but the suri fleece drapes the animal's body in pencil-like dreadlocks and is much more valuable. Jean stated that the suris are so rare that they hold their value longer. Out

of almost 100 alpacas on the farm, only 10 are huacaya and they are kept segregated from the suris.

After the spinning demonstration, the first group went into the gift shop where all kinds of clothing articles were made from alpaca fleece.

In the meantime, the second group went out and about into the corrals feeding some of the pregnant suris and some youngsters that were less than one year old.

Both Jean and Larry explained the fleece from baby alpacas is like cashmere and brings top dollar on the market. Then the groups switched.

The farm tries to keep the herd at around 100. They sell off around 20 to 30 per year and that is about the same number of annual births. Each alpaca can produce approximately 10 pounds of fleece per year and the animal weighs an average of 145 pounds. Alpacas are prized for their

luxurious fiber. The gestation period is 11 months. The farm only shears the animals in the spring so they are not toting a huge coat around in the summer months.

Three weeks after a girl gives birth she is placed in a pen with a young boy. Larry stated, "When a girl is pregnant, she wants nothing to do with the boys. Each girl is watched and if the girl spits at the male three weeks in a row, then we know she is pregnant and moved to a pen with other pregnant girls." The farm tries to make sure births happen in the spring.

The alpacas are extremely gentle and clean. They have selected areas where they drop their waste. Jane stated, "Alpacas make wonderful pets."

Alpaca Magic USA is open daily but visitors must call ahead to make appointments. "After all," Jean stated, "this is a working farm." If anyone would like to visit the farm or shop for items made from alpaca fleece, please call 352-628-0156 and make an appointment.

ing something in my column called "Scam Alert." This is included with the hope that you can avoid being a victim. I'll include it from time to time and I do hope you will keep track of the ones listed and keep them in mind.

**SCAM ALERT:** You get a phone call from someone who already has your credit card number. They claim to be doing some checking and at some point in the discussion you are asked to give the caller

your security code number. That's a scam. Just hang up the phone.

**Q.** There was an election for a congressperson recently. How come you did not give us your thoughts on who you would support?

**A.** I want everyone to read and to enjoy my column without any concern that I have some hidden agenda. I don't have a hidden agenda at all. Well, that's not quite correct. I do have one and it's that I want everyone to read and to enjoy my column - or did I already say that? Now, look, there certainly are folks in government positions who I feel are doing good things for the type of clients I represent and I don't mind mentioning them from time to

time in my column. In fact, I like to do that and I think that I should. However, I think that is entirely different from supporting or endorsing someone for elective office.

**Q.** Is it always necessary to have a MAI appraisal done for real property in a decedent's estate?

**A.** Not necessarily. A MAI appraisal refers to an appraisal that is prepared by a Member of the Appraisal Institute, which is a professional organization consisting of men and women who perform appraisals that are detailed in scope. However, keep in mind that the tax appraiser has an appraisal that is called the "just value." Sometimes this is sufficient to provide a value. Other times, a real estate broker or agent can give you one and that works fine also. Of course, depending on the size of the estate, it may, indeed, be advisable to get a MAI appraisal and the time to know that is when the estate is opened.

**Q.** Where do you get the questions for your column?

**A.** I get them in different ways. Most often, but not quite always, my questions, in one way or another, come strictly from the folks who read my column (or possibly from their children or relatives). Some folks e-mail me questions at jerry@gcolen.com.

Other times, folks ask me questions in person and I think my readers would like to see the questions and my answers to them. So I will either post a question from those listservs or I'll just make up a question that relates to something important and I will publish that. Of course, I have a substantial real estate practice and a substantial wills, trusts and probate practice and I draw many questions from my law practice, too.

My question is how much of a problem is it for my daughter to get all the title to her condo?

# Courthouse

A historic gem sits among jewels of commerce in the small town of Phillipsburg, St. Maarten, in the eastern Caribbean. An antique-looking building sits in front of a small square on the town's famous Front Street. Tourists visiting this port of call find the town very easy to navigate, as there are only two main streets: Front Street borders Great Bay Beach, and Back Street borders the Great Salt Pond.

There are many small streets and alleys connecting both streets. Front Street has all the high-end shops, most of which are jewelry, perfume, and liquor along with casinos. Back Street is much the same but with more affordable shopping and many more tourist souvenir shops.

The antique building in question is the island's courthouse. The two-plus story building is constructed out of wood. The building was once used as a jail, a firehouse, post office and private residence. If the walls of the courthouse could talk there would be many hair-raising tales of piracy.

The courthouse has been renovated many times over the years. The bell tower or cupola houses a 25-bell carillon, and the huge pineapple on the building's roof is an international symbol of welcome. The courthouse has since adorned a clock and the island's coats of arms. It has been stated that the courthouse is the most photographed building on the Caribbean island of St. Maarten.

Captain John Phillips, a Scottish sea captain in the Dutch Navy, constructed the structure in 1763. Captain Phillips is credited with establishing a colony on this island for the Dutch. France had ideas for a port on this island also.

Both the Netherlands and France wanted this island as part of their trade

routes for ships to replenish supplies. Later in years, both governments agreed to split the island and today St. Maarten is the smallest island governed by two European nations.

Total land area of the island is just shy of 34 square miles, the French claiming around 20 square miles while the Dutch side consists of 13 square miles. The Dutch side is the most populated and has facilities for cruise ships and the island's only large airport. Tourism is the main economy for both sections of the island.

### View From The Library

Several years ago, Dorothy Wickenden came across her grandmother's letters from 1916-1917 and used them to recreate that year in the lives of two society women, best friends, who, after their grand tour of Europe, headed west. Raised in luxury in Auburn, N.Y., schooled at Smith College, courted by society bachelors, they chose to spend a year teaching the children of homesteaders in Colorado. This decision changed their lives. And it improved the lives of the children they taught.

Dorothy Woodruff and Rosamund Underwood travelled to a remote mountain range in the Rockies to teach school in a settlement called Elkhead, where the population was effectively cut off from modern life by both poverty and the mountains. The two women were fortunate to have enough family funds to each buy a horse to get them to school and appropriate warm clothing to wear during the freezing winter, and also to pay a local farmer and his wife to house and feed them during the school year.

They were made welcome by carefully mannered cowboys, half-wild but eager children in ragged clothes, hardworking parents struggling through a day-to-day existence, and the man who convinced them to make the journey, a Harvard-educated lawyer and rancher. This was the young America of the west meeting the established America of the east.

The school was a single room, 30 by 50 feet, atop a series of hills, with a folding wooden door to separate the two classrooms. Dorothy taught 10 boys between grades one and five and one girl, age six. Rosamund taught two boys and six girls, five of them in the ninth grade.

These two women, who had never cooked a meal, cleaned a house, or washed their own clothes, cheerfully adapted, and quickly learned to ride their horses on an invisible trail in high snowdrifts, sometimes stopping to put on snowshoes in the middle of the night to walk part of the way home.

They hadn't been trained as teachers, but what they didn't know about teaching methods they made up for in zeal. When the school year ended, the young women said tearful goodbyes and returned home.

Their temporary presence in Elkhead had a long-term effect on the community. Four of Rosamund's eight students went to college and others went to professional schools.

In her later years, Rosamund would remember the Colorado adventure that she and Dorothy shared as the best year of her life.

The book is "Nothing Daunted" by Dorothy Wickenden. You'll find it in the biography section. It really is a true story.

## Home Safety Tips

### Home Security

- Install deadbolt locks on all exterior doors, and keep doors, garage doors and windows locked at all times, even when you are at home.
- Do not open the door without question at the sound of a knock. Question who is there; confirm identity by looking out of a window or install peepholes in your doors.
- If you are not expecting a package, delivery or service call, do not answer the door. Insist upon verbal verification of employer and call company to confirm delivery is legitimate. Your front door should remain closed and locked.
- Never rely on a chain-latch as barrier to partially open the door; a home invader will kick in the door.
- Never leave a spare key hidden outside.
- Keep a flashlight, charged cellphone and your vehicle key fob within easy access. If needed you can hit the panic button on your key fob and call for help on your cell phone.
- Be aware of unusual activity around your neighborhood; report suspicious behavior.
- You may want to let your neighbor know that you are planning a trip and ask them to keep an eye on your house. Consider giving them a contact number for emergencies.

### Fire Safety

- Make a home escape plan.
- Know at least two ways out of every room.
- Practice your home fire drill.
- Replace batteries in your smoke detectors every six months.
- If the smoke alarm sounds, get out and stay out.
- Call 911.
- Never go back inside a burning home.
- Always have a fire extinguisher that is accessible and suitable for your home.
- Cook with caution.
- Stay in the kitchen while cooking otherwise turn off the stove.
- Keep anything that can catch on fire – oven mitts, towels, curtains, utensils – away from your stovetop.
- If a pan or pot with grease or oil catches fire don't panic. Cover it with a lid or use a wet a dish cloth, wring it out and then carefully place over the pot or pan.

### "Candle with Care"

- Blow out candles when you go to bed or leave the room.
- Avoid use of candles in bedrooms where you may fall asleep, and keep them at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn.

### Home Heating Safety

- Remember to turn portable space heaters off before bedtime or leaving a room.
- Keep anything flammable at least 3 feet away from heating equipment.
- Never use an oven to heat your home.

### Smoking Safety

- If you smoke, smoke outdoors only.
- If you smoke indoors, stay alert, especially if drowsy or taking prescription medications.
- Never smoke in bed.

### Electrical Safety

- Only plug one heat producing appliance (coffee maker, toaster, space heater) into a receptacle outlet at time.
- Make sure that the electrical outlet that you are using is a "GFCI" (ground fault circuit interrupter) if you are using an electrical appliance near a sink or water (i.e. hand held hair dryer).
- Check electrical cords to make sure they are in good working condition, are not across doorways or under carpets.
- Check electrical cords to make sure that they have a ground. Use light bulbs that match the recommended wattage on lamps and fixtures.

### Master the Possibilities

July continues the strong summer season for our Master the Possibilities Life-long Learning enterprise. There are 70 programs that are set to start this month. This curriculum is designed to have a variety of topics that have wide appeal to the 5,000-plus student body who takes advantage of our program. Just as we try to incorporate physical activity into our daily routines, why not include a brain workout as well? The combination can be life changing. Take another look at the July class schedule. There's room for you to join neighbors and friends.

### Insurance Update

Every year, your Association obtains a Wind Risk Study to determine an acceptable level of risk based on the probability of damage from a 250-year storm event. These predictive computer models are always being updated. We have generally fared rather well, being so far inland. This fiscal year, the Board is purchasing named storm coverage limits of \$130 million, a limit in excess of the level indicated by the Wind Risk Study, RMS-13 of \$24.1 million. The board purchased higher limits for all types of wind-related storms in excess of the named storm limit.

When your insured value is over \$300 million, coverage capacity in the market can be hard to bind with a single carrier. As such, the policy is structured into layers and spread among multiple qualified companies. Florida's catastrophic loss fund continues in a terrible mess. Accordingly, your board is staying well away from Citizen's Insurance and leans more to traditional carriers.

The 2014 deductible for "named storms" amounts to three-percent (reduced from five-percent) of the building value, with a minimum deductible of \$250,000, per occurrence for wind and hail. On a "non-named storm" event, the deductible is \$10,000 retained by the Association. Once the deductible is met, the insurance coverage takes effect. As a practical matter, a loss of \$250,000 would

require an assessment to all owners. This would amount to approximately \$70 per household to make up the loss. So far as I can tell, that level of possible assessment is not worth losing sleep over! By retaining more of the risk, the Association is able to realize a savings in the cost of coverage.

For all other property losses (fire, lightning, vandalism, etc.), the deductible is \$10,000 per occurrence. This last point really underscores why each owner must keep current on their property coverage, including loss assessment coverage of at least \$2,000.

### Water Conservation

All of Marion County is under the St. Johns Water Management District guidelines on watering lawns currently set at two days per week for the Bay Laurel Center CDD service area and On Top of the World. The CDD adopted the current watering schedule and frequency restriction (two days per week) as part of a rule making process.

With as much rain as we have been getting, the moisture sensor on your irrigation system should be interrupting any irrigation. If it is not, it is time to consult with a qualified irrigation contractor and have your system serviced. We don't know what the rest of the rainy season will bring, so regardless of how many days watering may be allowed, the timing restrictions must remain in place for a number of reasons.

The most important is that using a staggered watering schedule levels out the flow-related hydraulic peaks and valleys in the distribution system. Water conservation has become a way of life in Florida, no doubt about it. Be mindful and apply only half to three-quarter inch per application, as that is all the lawn requires. To apply more water wastes the resource and results in a needlessly higher water bill.





**Landscape Tips**

In June, the Crape Myrtles started blooming. For those residents who don't know, if you trim off the old, spent blooms, these trees will keep blooming. This is a tip that is pretty common for most plants ... so keep them blooming.

July is a great month to fertilize if you missed your application in June. Make sure you follow the Marion County Fertilizer Ordinance and Florida Green Industries Best Management Practices. Nitrogen applications should not exceed one pound of slow release nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft and not more than .7 pounds of readily available nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft.

Following up your spring application, use a fertilizer that is higher in iron and

potassium and lower in nitrogen. The iron will give you that deep green you want but without the growth. Potassium has been considered a multi-vitamin and will aid in the root production of the lawn while also helping out with drought stress in the summer months and cold stress in the winter months to come. It is better to start getting the lawn ready now than later in the year. The fertilizer I like to use during this time of the year is the Lesco 9-0-24. This product is a slow release fertilizer with the iron content you will need.

The use of too much nitrogen during the summer months will create issues in your lawn. First, mowing will be tougher because the grass will be growing faster than you can maintain it. Second, chinch bugs are not only attracted to drought stressed grass but succulent grass too. Apply too much nitrogen and the grass will be growing at a faster rate, creating the succulent grass.

Don't forget to fertilize your plants too. Common blends of fertilizer found at local stores are a good start, but if you are looking for the optimum blend, find something for acidic soil loving plants such as azaleas-blueberry or camellia blends. These fertilizers have higher

amounts of sulfur in them, lowering the pH of the soil and making nutrients more available to the plant and not locked up in the soil. Seminole Feed Stores carries an azalea-blueberry mix that works well; Lesco also carries a 12-2-14 landscape blend that works well too. Application of fertilizers for landscape beds is 10 to 20 pounds of actual product per thousand square feet of bed area. A 50-pound bag should easily last you two applications.

Make sure that after all applications of fertilizer, you clean the driveways, sidewalks and roads with a broom or blower; do not wash these products off with a garden hose. Also, watering in the fertilizers on your lawn and landscape is a must. If you don't apply the water to the products as instructed, they often times do not work as intended.

Check your irrigation systems monthly for coverage, breaks, clogged heads ... you know the drill. I have seen quite a few residents doing this more often in the communities, and this is great to see. You can save yourself a lot of headaches and high water bills by doing these routine checks.







## Traveling to French Guiana

French Guiana is located on the northern coast of South America; nestled between Surinam on the west and Brazil on the south and east. In colonial times, there actually used to be five Guianas in the area, distinguished only by the name of the colonizing country. There was Spanish Guiana (now the Guayana Region in Venezuela), British Guiana (now Guyana), Dutch Guiana (now Surinam), French Guiana, and Portuguese Guiana (now Amapa, a state in northern Brazil).

The Spanish first explored this area of South America in 1496. The French moved to what is now French Guiana in 1763, but governance of the land was disputed and fought over by the French, Brit-

ish, Dutch, and Portuguese until French Guiana finally was confirmed as French in 1817. It enjoyed some prosperity when gold was discovered in the 1850s, but the economy was never very strong.

Although French Guiana often is mistaken for an independent country, it actually became what is known as an overseas department of France in 1946, politically making it similar to that of a state in the United States (think of Hawaii). Consequently, it is not your typical Spanish-speaking South American country. The primary language of the locals is French, and, being part of France, it is part of the European Union. They even use the euro as their currency.

Following the French withdrawal from Vietnam in the 1950s, France helped resettle Hmong refugees from Laos to French Guiana. In 1964, French President Charles de Gaulle established a Guiana Space Center near the town of Kourou to replace the base the French had lost in Algeria. The Space Center has been a very successful venture, and a boon to the local economy.

The country perhaps is best known for the penal colonies France maintained there from 1852 until 1953. The worst of these was called Devil's Island, which was made famous by the book and movie "Papillon." Since its closure, tours to Devil's Island have become a popular tourist attraction.

Tropical rain forests, coastal mangroves, savannahs, wetlands, and old-growth forests cover much of French Guiana. With this mix, the land supports an extremely high level of biodiversity in terms of both flora and fauna. There are over 5,000 plant species, 700 species of birds, 177 species

of mammals, and over 500 species of fish. The French are working hard to preserve this rich environment, but modernization always has its costs.

For the adventuresome, there are many things to see and do in French Guiana. Outdoor adventures are particularly enticing and include trekking in the forests, canoeing the rapids of several rivers, bird watching tours, and fishing in the lakes, rivers, or the Atlantic Ocean. Swimming, snorkeling, beach bumming, and enjoying the many wonderful fish dishes also are popular pastimes. The beaches near Cayenne, the capital, are famous as one of the best sites in the world for Leatherback Turtles to lay their eggs, which they do from April to July. You also can get a sense of the old versus the new by visiting the old at the penal colonies and the new at the Space Center.

In general, this region makes for a pretty cheap, unique vacation that can be enjoyed by all.

## Native Florida Anise

No, it's neither a red spider nor some coral reef critter living off the coast of Florida. It's a flower!

Yes, this nifty number is the Florida anise, *Illicium floridanum*. The leaves of this evergreen shrub or small tree (up to 10 feet) are leathery, smooth and shiny. When crushed, they emit an anise-like odor (obnoxious to some, but pleasant to others).

The two-inch wide flowers tend to be overlooked, due in part to their habit of "looking" down into the shiny, lush foliage.

Florida anise, sometimes called purple anise, stink-bush, or star anise, is protected in Florida as a threatened species. Nevertheless, it is available from several native nurseries that have a permit to sell listed species.

This anise is not a substitute for the culinary spice and flavorings obtained from *Illicium verum* (an import from China and Vietnam). Florida anise is instead rather toxic not for human consumption.

If you have a spot in your garden that's

shady or partially so, and possibly open to being a hedge, *Illicium floridanum* would be a nifty choice.

The Native Plant Group continues to maintain the natives in the SW 94th Street traffic circle the fourth Wednesday of every month. The second Wednesday of each month we keep the Longleaf Pine Trail carefully conserved for your pleasure. In fact, we invite you to join us as we enjoy our fellowship, learn a lot and keep the areas safe and looking good from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. at each location.

In keeping our community green, beautiful and healthy, our group now maintains the newly planted native garden in back of the Belleview Library. Just take SR 484 east to the fork where 441 and 301 go to the right and Belleview is to the left. Fifty feet on the left choice is a quick right turn and you're there.

### Genealogical Society

June Lachler, one of our members, gave a presentation on Monday, May 19 on "How to Use the Heritage Quest Genealogy Website." The site is subscription based; however, if you have a Marion County library card, you can access Heritage Quest for free at <http://library.marioncountyfl.org>. Once in the Marion County Library website, click on Search the Library Databases by Subject in the right column. Scroll down the list and click on Genealogy. Scroll down the next list to Heritage Quest and click on Home Use. Type in your Library Card number in the box titled Barcode and click on connect.

Heritage Quest has a complete set of U.S. Federal Census images from 1790 to 1940, taken every 10 years. From 1790 to 1840, it lists only names of the head of household. The other people are categorized only as male or female, broken down into age groups. From 1850 to 1940, it lists everyone by name, age, occupation and birthplace. The 1870 census states whether the parents were foreign born. The 1880 census lists the relationship to the head of household and the place of birth of the person's parents. This is helpful if the father-in-law or mother-in-law are living with the family in finding out the wife's maiden name.

One of the advantages of Heritage Quest is that you can search for an ancestor using his/her name by state and

county. The disadvantage is that Heritage Quest does not use Soundex for names like ancestry.com and familysearch.org does. If you search for your ancestor by Fred Young but he is listed in the census as Frederick or Frederich, you will not find him. However, if you have an unusual first name and can't find him under his last name, search by his first name listing his approximate age, country of birth, county and state in which they lived. Look for various spellings of the last name because last names were notoriously misspelled by census enumerators. You have to be a detective at this point. If the county is near the border of another county, search in that county. If the county is near the border of another state, search in the adjoining county and state. Also, search for the person's spouse or children. You may well find your ancestor.

### Stamp Club

The General Francis Marion Stamp Club's first June meeting featured a most interesting talk on four very historic U.S. zeppelin stamps by club member and resident, Jeffrey Howard.

After telling us a brief history of Germany's development of what might be called the "zeppelin industry," Jeff arrived at the Graf Zeppelin, which many call the most famous of all zeppelins.

The Graf Zeppelin flew across the Atlantic in 1928, round-the-world flight in 1929, the polar flight in 1931 and the 1933 Chicago World's Fair flight.

Jeff noted, "The zeppelins carried a lot of mail on each flight and generated a large income from what might be called 'zeppelin mail.'"

When the Graf Zeppelin was asked by the United States to fly to the Chicago World's Fair, the head of the company, Dr. Hugo Eckener, agreed upon condition that the U.S. issue special commemoratives and share the postal revenue with the Zeppelin Company.

The U.S. Post Office and President Franklin D. Roosevelt rejected the proposal at first, but later agreed.

We ended up by issuing three commemorative zeppelin stamps in April 1930 with face values of 65-cents, \$1.30, and \$2.60.

The Great Depression caused only seven percent of these high-value airmails to be sold. And on June 30, 1930 the U.S. Post Office destroyed three million of the unsold zeppelin stamps.

In October 1933, the U.S. Post Office issued another zeppelin stamp with a 50-cent face value and it was sold at the Chicago World's Fair.

As a sort of postscript to Jeff's talk, we will add that if you had purchased the three high-value airmails for their \$4.50 original face value, you could sell them today for around \$1,000 and it's pretty easy to sell that 50-cent baby zeppelin for \$50.

Thanks Jeffrey for a really interesting talk.

If you are interested in any aspect of stamp collecting or postal history, our club meets on the first Wednesday of the month at 1 p.m. It also meets at noon on the third Wednesday.

**Model Railroaders**

Model railroaders have several choices when it comes to scale of the model. Scale refers to the size of the model relative to the actual railroad equipment or scenery elements, such as houses and cars.

We at the Model Railroaders Club have concentrated on the HO scale, which is 1/87 (one actual foot equals 87 scale feet) the size of the real thing (don't ask how the number was decided on - that, as they say, is that). Other scales used in model railroading include O-Gauge (commonly 1/48), N-Scale (1/160), Z-Scale (1/220) and Garden- or G-Scale (typically 1/29). Lionel trains are not actually made to scale, but they run on O-gauge track.

As the ratio gets smaller, so does the equipment. HO scale affords our club with the opportunity to fit as much railroading into the space available as possible, allowing for our eyes (and glasses). Most of the smaller layouts are built inside and away from the elements, but the G-Scale equipment is made (mostly) for use outdoors, hence the name, Garden-Scale.

The author recently had the opportunity to visit a beautiful G-Scale layout in the Botanical Garden in City Park, New Orleans, La. Not only are there many trains and streetcars running, but it is landscaped with real foliage, and the buildings are made of natural materials (wood, bark,

and leaves). The real foliage adds a maintenance dimension we at the local club do not have - after a storm, the operators have to go around and clean leaves and twigs from the rails so the trains do not derail. Also, the outside environment requires the volunteers to clean the track before each operating session - a one-hour operation. The buildings are semi-scale models of various famous buildings in the New Orleans area - St. Louis Cathedral, the French quarter, mausoleums in the historic cemeteries, to name a few.

The outdoor 14,000 square-foot, E-shaped layout contains 1,500 feet of rail with dozens of steam and diesel engines and several streetcars, all belonging to the Botanical Garden. Sometimes the staff brings their personal train equipment to run and add to the variety. For example, one time the author was there a member brought his own Amtrak train set (engine and three passenger cars).

A layout this large and complex needs quite a bit of support and maintenance. There are currently four part-time Botanical Garden employees, and 11 volunteers qualified to work at the layout. The two men the author has spoken with were very friendly and anxious to share modeling techniques and railroading stories with him.

The display is open Saturdays and Sundays from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Admission is \$6 for adults, \$3 for children ages five to 12 and free for children under five. The layout is located in the Botanical Garden in City Park, at the northeast terminus of the Canal Street streetcar line.



Playing Ten Pin has captured the enthusiasm of a number of our shuffleboard players. Looking back through the history of our Shuffleboard Club, it looks like Ten Pin has been played here since about the year 2000. However, no record could be found of any Ten Pin tournaments that took place here. Thus, Peter Van Arsdale may have started the trend of having Ten Pin tournaments at On Top of the World.

One of the reasons that Ten Pin is becoming more popular with our Shuffleboard Club is that we now have players who played standard shuffleboard for a number of years, and they are currently looking for a diversion and more of a challenge than standard shuffling offers.

In order to first play Ten Pin, a bowling pin is placed on the center line between the two eights and in front of the line that separates the 10 from the two eights. Having the bowling pin, now called the "ten pin," in this strategic position is the challenge.

First of all, a player can play "hide and seek" by hiding the disc behind the ten pin. It will take skill and accuracy for a player to place it there, as likewise, it will take skill and accuracy to hit the disc out,

without knocking down the ten pin.

Next, in order to win the game, after reaching a score of 65 points, and in the subsequent frame, the player needs to score the disc in the 10's place and not get knocked out by his/her opponent.

By using different strategies and with practice, a player will learn to score the disc, and likewise, an opponent will learn to knock out the disc, without causing the ten pin to fall down. These are some of the challenges of Ten Pin, and why it is becoming a popular game with the shuffleboard players.

On Thursday evening, June 5, nine

shuffleboard players came to play: Charlie Lentz, Jerome Griffin, Jim Smith, Henry Erikson, Armann Rohde, Joe Zalmanoff, Mario Migliaccio, John Basch and Phil Weiner. It must have been "men's night out," since no ladies came to play Ten Pin this particular night. However, the men were all set to compete with one another, and at the same time to spend an enjoyable evening together.

In the three games that were played, Jerome Griffin and Armann Rohde each won all three games. Jim Smith and Phil Weiner each won two of the games. Henry Erikson made the 30 Club, where at least

30 points had to be scored in one frame. Henry scored 32 points.

3. Being able to perform in match play, under pressure (especially on big points). It takes tremendous mental toughness.
4. Your heart and soul must be dedicated to the goal of reaching the

5. Setbacks and unexpected circumstances occur in sport and life, and your response to them will dictate your progress in tennis and in all areas of your life. Learning appropriate responses is critical to improvement in mental toughness and happiness in general.
6. Making mistakes is a part of learning. Your goal should be to minimize mistakes and the chances of making the same ones over and over again. Knowing where your vulnerabilities are, working to improve them and finding ways to compensate for them so they are minimized during competition, are all key to improvement.
7. There's more than one-way to "skin a cat." If you choose to live only with your favorite style of play, that's your prerogative, but your success will be limited to only certain types of players. Having versatility in your game, and using it

- with purpose and confidence, will give you a better chance to overcome players with different styles of play.
8. Egos sometimes complicate matters. If your goal is to win matches, it doesn't matter how many times you get to your "ad" if you don't have the composure, skill, concentration and wisdom to win most of the points. This just tells you that you are close, but not there yet as a player. It's a step in the right direction, but learning to convert "the next point" is what other competitors have over you.
  9. It is important to understand that when you come to play doubles, you should be looking forward to getting the next ball. If you hope that the next ball goes to your partner, then you are just not helping your partner and you really didn't come "to play." Be alert, ready and try your best, every time.


very young players to compete with their peers. The tournament runs from July 14 through July 26 and is held indoors on pits constructed specifically for this competition.

**Golf Tip of the Month**

You've hit a wayward tee shot and your ball ends up in a lie you have never faced. Pros make these escapes look easy while you compound them into double or triple bogeys. If this sounds familiar then I want you to try this routine.

Any time you find yourself in an unusual lie like pine straw, heavy rough, concrete or leaves you must test the conditions first. Take several practice swings to feel how your club reacts to the surface. If you're hitting off a cart path the club may bounce, if you're in the thick rough your club will slow down and twist. Now step up to the shot and swing away and be confident in your approach. After you have hit the ball make a mental note of how the ball reacted for future similar situations.

**The Importance of Water**

How often do you stop to consider how much water you have consumed? How much water do you need to stay properly hydrated? This column will answer these questions and highlight interesting facts about water's role in the human body. Read on to see if you are consuming enough water during this hot time of year.

Your body is estimated to be about 65 to 75 percent water. Blood is 83% water, muscles are 75% water, the brain is 74%, and bones are 22% water. Your body needs water to regulate body temperature and to provide the means for nutrients to travel to all your organs. Water also transports oxygen to your cells, removes waste, and protects your joints and organs.

Water helps to energize muscles; cells that don't maintain their balance of fluids and electrolytes shrivel which can result in muscle fatigue. When muscle cells don't have adequate fluids, they don't work as well and performance can suffer. Drinking enough fluids is important when exercising. Recommended guidelines for fluid

intake is 16 ounces of water two hours before exercise. During exercise, it is recommended people start drinking fluids early, and drinks them at regular intervals to replace fluids lost by sweating.

A good estimate of how much water you need is to take your weight in pounds and divide that number in half. That gives you the number of ounces of water per day that you need to drink. For example, if you weigh 160 pounds, you should drink at least 80 ounces of water per day. If you exercise, you should drink another eight ounce glass of water for every 20 minutes you are active. If you drink alcohol, you should drink at least an equal amount of water. When you are traveling on an airplane, it is good to drink eight ounces of water for every hour you are on board the plane. As you can see, the daily need for water can add up quickly.

At least 20 percent of the water you need will come from the foods you eat. The rest will come from the beverages you drink. Water is probably the best choice: sweetened soft drinks and sodas have added sugar, which can dramatically increase your calorie intake. Sports drinks contain electrolytes and may be beneficial ... just look out for added sugar and calories that you may not want. Fruit and vegetable juice are good because they have vitamins and nutrients, just be mindful that fruit juices can have a lot of added sugar, be sure to read the nutrition label.

Health benefits of drinking water include maintenance of pH balance, body temperature, metabolism and breathing. The maintenance of body temperature is especially important during this time of year. Heat illness is a serious condition and heat stroke can be life threatening. It

also helps with the prevention of constipation, heartburn, migraine, gastritis, ulcers, kidney stones, cardiovascular disorders, rheumatoid arthritis, backache and osteoporosis. Water is the most abundant compound present on this earth. All living forms in some way or another require water for their metabolic activities.

**FIT TIP #1:** Be sure to bring plenty of water with you during exercise or outdoor summer activities.

**FIT TIP #2:** Sports drinks are a good choice when you will be exercising or outdoors sweating for extended periods of time (90 minutes or longer). Look for low sugar options.

**FIT TIP #3:** Do not rely on soda or caffeinated beverages for hydration! The sugar in soda can slow the absorption and hydration process and caffeine has a diuretic effect causing the body to lose fluids.

**Pelvic Floor First**

Pelvic Floor First is a program designed to educate and assist people in keeping their pelvic floor muscles strong and capable. The pelvic floor muscles make up the base of what we commonly call "the core." Often times "the core" is thought of as the abdominal muscles; this is a misconception.

The core is actually very three-dimensional and is like a cylinder with a front, back, sides, top and bottom. The pelvic floor is the bottom of this cylinder. When pelvic floor muscles weaken problems ensue that interfere with the quality of life. Many people, both men and women, suffer silently from continence problems. Pelvic Floor First was designed to empower people to gain control over this issue.

Pelvic floor problems arise when these muscles are stretched, weakened or too tight and can occur for many reasons. There are certain life stages such as pregnancy, childbirth and menopause that can weaken the muscles and put women at a greater risk; however, this does not mean that men are in the clear. Pelvic floor health is important to everyone regardless of gender and can be affected by the following:

- Not keeping pelvic floor muscles active or over working them.
- Being pregnant and having babies.
- A history of back pain
- Ongoing constipation and straining to empty the bowels.
- Being overweight, obese or having a body mass index (BMI) over 25.
- Heavy lifting (e.g. at work or the gym).
- A chronic cough or sneeze, including those linked to asthma, smoking or hay fever.
- Previous injury to the pelvic region (e.g. a fall, surgery or pelvic radiotherapy), and growing older.

**Line Dancing**

Friday and Saturday night dancing at The Town Square has new CD music. The play list is a mix of old songs we know and new music for some of the dances we learned this year. We have a combination of straight rhythm, two-step, cha cha, rumba, tango and even a nightclub two-step. There is music and dance for all levels, so come out and dance.

When there is a live band and they are not playing “our song” how do we know what to dance and where to start in the music? First, we dance to music because it has rhythm (a beat, the thump, thump of the drum or the bass). The drum sets the tempo and speed of the music and keeps the band together. It is the same for the dancers. Is it a straight rhythm (1, 2, 3, 4), cha cha (1, 2, 3 and 4), waltz (1, 2, 3) or a rumba or something else?

Second, we hear the music phrase (the melody line). We start singing in the same

place every time we sing a song. Try singing “Twinkle Twinkle Little Star” any place but at the start of the melody line. Same with a dance, we start at the beginning of the musical phrase. Then we try and match a dance we know with the pattern we hear. If we stumble around trying several dances until we find one that fits, it’s okay; it’s just a dance.

In addition to dancing at the Friday night Happy Hour at the Arbor Club Ballroom, The Town Square and our second Wednesday of the month line dance in the Arbor Club Ballroom, we have a new place to dance in town. Cowboys Saloon on Pine Avenue in the old Midnight Rodeo building is open. Marilyn McNeal, our dance instructor, is the house instructor and leads the dancing Thursday and Friday nights. You know she will be playing music for lots of dances we know.

Stepping in a set pattern to the beat of the music in a line with your friends is fun. Come dance with us.

Hundreds upon hundreds of country music fans stood in line seeking autographed pictures and CDs along with having their picture taken with a multi-award winning singer and songwriter – Lee Greenwood. Lee Greenwood was a featured entertainer at the Circle Square Cultural Center in May blaring out some of his most famous recordings over his many decades of writing and singing country music songs.

Greenwood's musical career started back in 1962. He has since recorded and released more than 20 major label albums and charted more than 35 singles, including seven number one songs on the Billboard country music charts. His first single, "It Turns Me Inside Out" made it to the top 20 in the country music charts in 1981. Since then, he is still touring and

recording music. Greenwood is best known for writing and recording, "God Bless the USA" in the early 1980s. This patriotic song gained popularity again during Operation Desert Storm in 1991 and again 10 years later during the aftermath following the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001.

He has many industry awards including numerous "Male Vocalist of the Year" and a Grammy for "Top Male Vocal Performance" in 1985 for "I.O.U."

The standing audience, swaying side-by-side with arms in the air and veterans placing their right hand over their heart as Greenwood sang "...and I'm proud to be an American where at least I know I'm free."

# The Waving Girl

Does the name Florence Martus ring a bell? Probably not, but this lady is a very famous individual who made history to sailors and her legend continues today.

Florence was born at a fort protecting Savannah, Ga. located on an island along the Savannah River where her father was an ordinance sergeant. When she became a teenager, she moved in with her brother who was a lighthouse keeper on the river close to Savannah.

This lady has had many tales written and theorized about her, she even had a movie about her escapade, a ship named after her and a large statue constructed of her along the river bank in Savannah.

Let's look at this lady a little closer. She is known as Savannah's Waving Girl. The statue is of her waving a handkerchief with her collie (nameless) along her side.

What made this lady so famous? She was known throughout the world, becoming a maritime legend. There was not a ship that entered the river heading for Savannah that Florence did not wave a handkerchief or tablecloth to. When ships entered this seaport at night, she would wave a lantern.

With her notoriety, sailors would man the rails and wave back. The ship's captains would blow the ship's whistle or horn generally three times recognizing this lady.

Now, why did she do this from 1886 until 1931, almost 45 years? There have been many theories such as she was lonely or had a lover aboard a ship who was coming back to marry her.

One rumor which could shine a little light on why Florence waved to every ship is that she met a young naval officer when she was 18 who was touring Fort Pulaski on an island near the river's mouth and fell in love with him while he was on shore leave from his naval ship. He said he would come back for her and marry her. Being innocent, she more than likely did not know that many sailors had conquests in every port.

Anyway, with the love she had for this sailor after a whirlwind courtship she wanted him to see her upon his return to Savannah, hence, the waving of the handkerchief.

It has been estimated that Florence waved her handkerchief or other garment to at least 50,000 ships entering Savannah.




As you learn digital photography and acquire skills and techniques, they need to be regularly practiced in order for them to become entrenched in your mind. They should become second nature to you. The creative photographer doesn't only concentrate on getting the techniques right but also on the creative side of image taking.

Get out of your home and into the outdoors. You'll have more subjects and there is more variety to the images you can create. The outdoors makes you feel good. Set yourself a goal as to what you want to achieve and then work toward it. You'll get good exercise and great images.

This may seem difficult, but once you start, it gets easier. Find something that you like or that appeals to you, and then attempt to take 50 photos of it from different angles and in different ways (I've only achieved 30 but I'm working on it!). This really pushes you to the limits but it gets you thinking outside the box and trying new things. I can promise you that you will come up with some great images.

One of the biggest hindrances for new photographers is deciding what to shoot. If you are not taking photos, you aren't practicing. And practice makes perfect.

Master the Possibilities recently sponsored a trip to tour this facility. Ocala's Battalion Chief Shane Alexander, who is

also the chief at the college, explained in depth the school's purpose and curriculum. This college was established in 1989 at its present location. Before, it was located in downtown Ocala.

Chief Alexander stated that with new students starting a career as firemen it takes 15 weeks of training. The students are boarded at the school's campus. The college holds three classes per year and it costs each student around \$5,000. Each starting class comprises 36 students. The chief stated that on average, 28 out of the 36 will graduate.

The school has about a 72% placement ratio for those graduating from training. Chief Alexander stated, "There are more job openings at present than graduates." Not all students at the college are just beginning a career as a firefighter or emergency medical technician. Many come back to the facility for additional or advanced training.

The facility also has foreign students applying as well as career-minded students from all over the United States. There is a large contingent of military, both national guard and active military personnel, who train and learn at the college. Military and civilian airport firefighters train and practice fighting aircraft fires at Ocala International Airport.

"Florida State Fire College is rated number one in the Southeastern United States," according to Chief Alexander.

The facility can handle around 200 students at any given time. The average age

for new students is 27. Anyone can apply between the ages of 18 and 45. There is a rigorous physical exam required, all of which is job related such as climbing 70 stairs with a 70 pound pack on the student's back or lugging fire hoses, just to mention a few of the requirements.

About 60% of a firefighter's career training at the college is devoted to fighting fires and saving lives. The remaining percentage is building character such as helping folks in their communities with various projects such as giving and installing fire alarms and detectors along with public safety projects.

Chief Alexander explained and answered countless questions from our residents. He stated that all the instructors at the college are active-duty firefighters and emergency medical technicians.

They teach at the college on their off-duty hours. Active instructors can teach the latest techniques and provide firsthand knowledge. The instructors come from all of the neighboring communities and counties. Many of the current students have job offers even before they graduate.

Graduates from the college are trained to be firefighters, emergency medical technicians, and paramedics. They are trained to respond with equipment to combat fires, treat injuries and illnesses, and take care of arson investigations and incidents involving hazardous materials.

There are numerous fire stations around our area including the one just outside our SW 90th Street gate. This firehouse is equipped to fight fires and provide emergency medical treatment and transportation to the nearest medical facility.

## Cathedral of San Juan

Cathedral of San Juan Bautista is the Roman Catholic Church of the Archdiocese of San Juan de Puerto Rico. It is one of the oldest structures in San Juan, Puerto Rico located in the oldest part of the city and is the second oldest cathedral in the Americas.

The cathedral located in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic is the oldest

having been consecrated in 1504 by Pope Julius II. The cathedral of Santa Maria la Menor is the oldest cathedral in the Americas having at one time been the only Archdiocese to hold the title Primate of the Americas. Construction began in 1512 and completed in 1540.

The San Juan cathedral had many names during its history but was originally constructed out of wood in 1521. The first cathedral was destroyed in a hurricane and the current cathedral was built in 1540 and has been reshaped many times since, the last time being in 1917.

Today, the cathedral is the second largest tourist attraction in Old San Juan right behind San Felipe del Morro Fort, a fort guarding the entrance to today's San Juan harbor and the main defense against all enemies since its establishment in 1540. The fort today is known as El Morro.

The fort is part of that National Park System and the cathedral contains the tomb of the Spanish explorer and settlement founder Juan Ponce de Leon.

The cathedral is also the shrine of the first Puerto Rican Blessed Carlos Manuel Rodriguez Santiago. He is the first layperson in the history of the United States to be beatified.

Recently my wife, Bev, and I visited the cathedral before our cruise ship sailed from Old San Juan Harbor for other Caribbean destinations. The cathedral has gorgeous stained glass windows and is a picture takers delight. The old structure is a thing of beauty as well as its historical presence. It's not just the windows or the building but the tomb and memorial of Juan Ponce de Leon that makes this cathedral a worthwhile destination to visit.
