**Sustaining Our Environment**

"Before we started a section of Candler Hills, we spent a week identifying and then removing and relocating nearly 100 gopher tortoises." – Boe Stepp.

The task of identifying environmentally sensitive species, whether it be a tree, a tortoise, or indigo snake, is the responsibility of Boe Stepp, land development manager for On Top of the World. Boe told us the story of relocating gopher tortoises that will dig down to 15 feet and then go horizontally another 10 or 20 feet. It took a week of digging with backhoe, spade shovels and with bare hands to extricate and then relocate them to one of

four conservation areas – over 400 acres, set aside for just that purpose. But the job isn't finished there as Boe regularly works with a local biologist who will check the health of every single species before it is relocated.

Preserving the environment is a culture steeped in the history of On Top of the World Communities. It has always been the practice, ever since the Norris Ranch was transitioned into On Top of the World to develop property, residential and commercial, with "environment first" in mind.

Before the first shovel hits the dirt, Boe

Stepp has the responsibility to ensure that all environmental issues are discovered and addressed. He works with the Marion County Zoning and Planning Boards to ensure that the go-ahead plan meets all county environmental requirements. He has also worked with county boards for more than three years in retooling the previously existing Marion County Development Codes. They are currently far more restrictive than the older guidelines.

In past issues of the World News, we have read about sustainable issues that are regularly addressed here in our community, whether it be water conservation, solar-powered buildings, or the planting of environmentally friendly shrubbery. With the coalescence of all of these efforts and as the newer communities mature, there is a return of habitat that welcomes back nature's critters that now want to call On Top of the World home, proof positive that all the efforts are paying environmental dividends.

She was executive director for corporate and continuing education, and had oversight for the Webber Center Gallery, Brick City Center of the Arts, and the Klein Conference Center. She speaks proudly of her work designing and initiating "Pathways to Living, Learning and Serving." The Center for 55-plus participants provided lifelong learning classes, volunteer recruitment and placement services, and life-planning coaching. On Top of the World was involved in the initiation

of this program, which under Ms. Spontak's guidance received national recognition from The New York Times and The Wall Street Journal, among others.

Master the Possibilities is fortunate to have captured all this talent and to have Margaret Spontak at the reins of our ever growing and expanding learning center. In her words, "It's exciting to be able to build on the great programs at Master the Possibilities. I am looking forward to expand-

ing and diversifying our course design, faculty and program offerings. To help make this happen, I need input from our residents and other knowledgeable leaders throughout the community and across the nation."

**Is It Legal?**

**Q.** I appreciate the scam alerts you put in your column but I have a question. How do we seniors always know what to trust and what not to trust? Also, a friend of mine got a phone call that she missed jury duty and was going to be arrested unless she paid a fine immediately. The caller

began to yell at her and she was so frightened she gave out her credit card numbers. Your suggestions would be appreciated.

**A.** I love the word no! It's simple and easy to pronounce. However, I am aware that it is not always easy to use it. From time to time when I am meeting with a client, who's under pressure to do something - frequently from the children, of course - I will write out the word no, in very large letters. Then I suggest it be placed on the refrigerator or by the phone. Most important, use it!

With regard to telephone calls from the FBI or from a local or federal court, they never call and ask for money. So that's an immediate fraud alert. Just this morning,

I got an e-mail supposedly from Google. It said (in broken English) that I wasn't getting enough e-mails so my account had been routed to another e-mail address and I should click on the new link. Right-O. I'll rush to do that! Nope! Not now! Not ever!

We have to learn that in this day and age, we cannot just click on a link - even if we believe we know who sent it. Here's my suggestion(s). Learn to say no! Never click on a link. Investigate precisely who sent you an attachment before you open it. Oh, and by the way, the next time your grandchild calls and says he's stranded in Bora Bora and could you send money: tell him to contact his parents. Better yet, just say "no" and shut off the conversation.

**Q.** My granddaughter is being investigated by (an enforcement arm of a State of Florida regulatory agency). She was hired as an accountant by an insurance company and after only a few weeks her super-

visor demanded that she do something that would "fudge" the company's bottom line. She refused. Now the company is being investigated and she's been called as a witness. How does an employee deal with something like that? She's a single mom and needed a job.

**A.** I understand your question to be "how does someone in a position of trust deal with a supervisor who requests something unethical or downright illegal?" Interestingly, my associate, Attorney Rachel Wagoner (see our website at [www.gcolen.com](http://www.gcolen.com)) is handling a complex case involving just such a question. In that case, a controller for a company was directed to complete a written report that was not in accordance with certain significant ethical standards. Our client refused. The company is now being investigated and the client subpoenaed. He will be fined because the record is clear in his favor. He acted appropriately and in accordance with the law.

Now to answer your question: these are decisions of conscience and anyone who is requested to make an unethical choice needs to assess what he/she knows in his or her heart to be the right thing to do. It may cost one his or her job, but in the long run, the result will be safety, and security in the knowledge that nothing illegal was done.

**Q.** Is it better to name a bank as my personal representative rather than my children?

**A.** It is better to name the person or entity that you feel will handle your estate with competence.

**Q.** The lady at my bank said I can name the bank as the agent in my durable power of attorney. Is that true?

**A.** It may be. You must check with the bank, though. I suggest that you should discuss doing that at great length with someone in higher authority at your bank. Of course, you should also discuss that with your attorney. The bank with whom you deal today may not be around in a few years and the person with whom you deal at the bank may also be gone. I realize that sometimes there do not seem to be truly good choices for a durable power of attorney. Yet, in my opinion, it is so important to have a durable power of attorney that you must explore whatever good options you feel might work for you.

**Q.** My daughter's husband is 22 years older than she is. Recently, I have come to believe he is making passes at me. How should I handle him, legally?

**A.** Don't handle him at all. Tell him to buzz off.

# Auto Museum

Think back to one of America's famous car manufacturers of luxury vehicles. This company was well known with the rich and famous. The president and general manager of the manufacturing conglomerate was responsible for the iconic slogan, "Ask the Man Who Owns One." Remember the Packard car?

The Fort Lauderdale Antique Car Museum in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., is filled with all kinds of Packards and other associated memorabilia of the time when Packards were a famous automobile. The museum has an impressive collection of pre-war Packards including many parts such as gearshift knobs, hood ornaments and spark plugs. The vehicles range from the 1900s to the 1940s including the 1909

are touring cars, roadsters, convertibles, pick up trucks, and even a 1930 Model

640 Fire Engine.

There is also a gallery in the museum with memorabilia dedicated to the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The first car produced by Packard was in 1899 and the last vehicle rolled off the assembly line in Detroit was in 1958. Now the Packard assembly plant in Detroit is the largest abandoned manufacturing building in the world, encompassing some 40 acres with a 3,500,000 square foot floor space. It is in a state of disrepair but the reinforced concrete portion of the building's original construction is still in great useable shape.

Packard cars were classified as highly competitive among high-priced luxury American automobiles. The Packards were referred to as being one of the big three, which included the Pierce-Arrow and the Peerless. Other big competitors were Cadillac and Lincoln.

The Fort Lauderdale Antique Car Museum is a great place to stop for a spell while traveling through the city. The museum is located on Packard Avenue.

In Candler Hills, the pace of work is focused mainly on landscaping activities and golf course maintenance. Indigo East is the beneficiary of a new golf cart path connection to the north of SW 80th Street. This link now connects up to the newly completed (finally!) cart path along SW 80th Avenue, as well as Circle Square Commons.

For Candler Hills and Indigo East, October and November are the months your board begins to consider budgeting for the coming fiscal cycles. Once again, your board is considering operational costs for the coming year. Last year, costs were held to a very minimal increase. At this juncture, I cannot say how the budgets will be impacted, but we are usually challenged with higher costs. We are considering all opportunities for savings that can be reasonably made without jeopardizing delivery of services.

Among the other matters to be discussed at each annual meeting will be matters of general interest to your community, an update on recreation and meeting facilities, how the board of directors functions through the setting of policies and through the review of the projected budget for the coming year, and any legislative changes affecting your community. There will be a question and answer period following the main body of each meeting.

**Final Thoughts**

It is always worthwhile to pause for a moment, take a step back and consider all the positive events that are happening in our lives. I know that is hard to consider when we are bombarded with negative economic news and a media onslaught of uncivil and shrill messages during the election cycle. But taking stock and being grateful for all we do have is a very positive thing to do. It can change your entire outlook. Breathe, smile! We wish everyone a very happy Thanksgiving.



In 1985, romance writer Nora Roberts married her second husband, owner of a bookstore in Boonsboro, Md., called Turn the Page Books. The couple then bought and remodeled the nearby historic Inn Boonsboro, where they named the suites for romantic fictional couples.

Roberts subsequently wrote a trilogy that uses as background the Boonsboro Inn and the Turn the Page bookstore in a town also called Boonsboro in Maryland. And, yes, the guest rooms are named for romantic fictional couples. Think of Nick and Nora of "The Thin Man" and Elizabeth and Darcy of "Pride and Prejudice."

Roberts' experience in renovating and managing an inn is evident in the "The First Always," "The Last Boyfriend" and "The Perfect Hope." There is, of course,

romance; yet demolition, construction, building permits, and other details are woven into these stories. The work effort that was required to bring the historic inn back to life and to run it as a bed and breakfast is done in these novels by three Montgomery brothers under the guidance of their energetic and visionary mother, Justine.

Family and friendships take center stage in this trilogy, with a gentle assist from a mysterious lady who has been secretly residing in the inn for a long time. She's waiting for someone named Billy. No one seems to know who he is. And so Roberts has also woven a mystery into the three stories.

Each book can stand alone, but reading just one is like watching a TV show that gets cancelled before all the loose ends are tied.

Nora Roberts has published fantasy and suspense also and futuristic police procedurals under the pseudonym J.D. Robb. If the books mentioned here aren't readily available, there are many more to choose from.

Insect damage in Florida lawns can be hard to troubleshoot and identify throughout the year. In a given month, climatic conditions can change dramatically within 24 hours. We can wake up one morning and the weather is in the low to mid-30s and by 5 p.m. the temperature is in the 80s. These strange weather patterns can make insect identification and disease

pressure identification exceptionally hard to the untrained and even the trained eye.

Recently, on a drive through the community with a product representative, we identified a lawn that appeared to be in recovery from drought stress during the June/July timeframe. We talked about the grass – how it was growing and recovering – and then we started talking about the problem. How did it happen? When did we notice it? But through some conversation and remembering back to the instance when it was first noticed, we were both amazed to learn that the problem wasn't drought stress but an insect problem gone undiagnosed.

The insect is called a click beetle or wireworm and it affects Zoysia lawns and a host of other agriculture crops. We have not seen it in St. Augustine, but will keep you posted if we do. The damage is similar to that seen with drought stress and has no other identifiable differences to distinguish it from drought stress. The beetles lay eggs in the soil that hatch and become grub-like insects that feed on the roots. The feeding inhibits root growth and uptake of water and nutrients giving you the drought stressed appearance.

So how do we alleviate the problem? When treating Zoysia lawns it is thought to be important to treat for billbugs, a common pest in Zoysia, in the early spring. With this insect, the treatments need to be in May as well. You can use

the same chemicals to treat these pests as what you are already using if applying for your own lawn. Any over the counter systemic insecticide bought from Lowe's or Home Depot should work well in this application.

Fungal pathogens typically start showing up in the fall as well. Fungus is preventable with proper timing of application of fungicides in the landscape. For fungal pathogens to become active in the landscape, a few environmental factors must be present. First, the temperatures have to be between 65 and 85 degrees. Second, soil moisture has to be at higher levels. The fungal pathogen is already in the soil but without these factors is not likely to spawn and become problematic.

There are three fungal pathogens that most likely create problems in your home lawn. The first is Rhizoctonia solani, also known as Large Patch fungus, another is the Gaeumannomyces graminis var. graminis, also known as Take All root rot, and the last is Pythium root rot. Again, with the proper treatment program these are 100% preventable.

Another thing to remember is that, when treating fungal problems, fungicides work better at lower preventative rates rather than at the curative rates. Once you start using curative rates, damage has been done and recovery is slow.

Rhizoctonia solani, also known as Large Patch fungus, is probably the easiest

to identify by the "halo" or distinct yellow margin that forms. Another way to identify the fungus is to run the palm of your hand across the potentially infected area and see if the leaf blades come off. If you have the fungus, the leaf blades or sheaths will break off easily. Preventative applications are preferred but if you are trying to save the grass that has been infected, using a systemic fungicide is the best bet. Systemic products are taken up in through the plant while contact fungicides actually come into contact with the pathogen.

Gaeumannomyces graminis var. graminis or Take All root rot has been problematic in the past as well. Most people didn't know they had it while some found out when it was too late. Again, preventative applications are the key to success for controlling this fungal pathogen. A few key factors when dealing with this fungus are soil pH; how acidic or alkaline is the soil? Using acid forming fertilizers to lower soil pH will help, as this fungus prefers pH levels above 7.0. Avoid late season fertilizations and check your irrigation system for proper coverage to make sure that you are not applying too much water.

Pythium root rot is a little easier to control because most of the triggers for this fungus are culturally related or depend on things we can control. Avoid excessively wet roots and try to avoid stressing the grass.

**Genealogical Society**

On Tuesday, Sept. 16, Linda Detweiler, a new member, gave a very informative presentation on the United States Census. The first census, taken in 1790, asked only for the name of the family head; the number of free white males 16 years and older; free white males under 16; free white females; the number of slaves and other persons and Indians not taxed and the town or district of residence.

Up to 1850, age categories were changed and categories added for county of residence; aliens not naturalized; the number engaged in various occupations;

those who were blind, deaf and dumb, insane and "idiots;" the number of "colored" persons; free men "of color" are listed as heads of household by name; slaves appear in age groupings by name of owner.

The 1850 census was the first modern census and added the number of the dwelling house; each person's name, age, sex, and color; the territory or country of birth; whether the person attended school or was married within the year; whether they could read or write if over age 20; the occupation of males over the age of 15; if the person was a pauper or convict; and the real estate value of the dwelling house.

The 1870 census asked if the person's right to vote had been denied. The 1880 census lists the house and street number, each person's relationship to the head of the family, and whether widow or divorced. The 1890 census was destroyed in a fire in 1921. The 1900 and 1910 census

added the month and year of birth; the number of years in present marriage; the number of children born and the number still living; the year of immigration; whether naturalized; whether on a farm or home, whether owned, mortgaged or rented; and whether they could speak English.

So, as you can see, the format of the U.S. Census are reflective of societal trends and language of their time, but can provide a genealogist with a treasure-trove of information on your ancestors, if you are willing to search for it. - TimberRidge has completed their last building and it is filled. They are thinking about building a surgical center.
- Behind the office buildings of Palm Cay is 34 acres in which there is some interest to develop. It is zoned for multifamily units and some business.
- Dunkin Donuts submitted a plan to build on the vacant lot closest to 200 beside Canopy Oak.
- Ace Hardware is coming to Steeplechase Plaza.
- The land between Bank of America and Countryside Farms is zoned for 339 houses in a planned urban development. It is not age restricted. There will be a six-foot fence and a 30-foot buffer between the properties.
- The hill on the left of 200, where the old fire station was, is zoned commercial business and multifamily units. The fencing you see there is to protect the trees.
- The dentist Dr. Dunn is building in front of Lowe's and there will also be an urgent care office.

Did you know the current population in Ocala is 55,000 and Marion County is over 335,000? The Southwest area has a population of 35,000 and will probably soon surpass that number!



## Birders' Beat

It is fall migration time; an exciting time when we hope to see a live bird on its way to a warmer place for the winter. An article in *Birds and Blooms* magazine by Kenn and Kimberly Kaufman entitled "Change is in the Air" identifies birds that are changing their migration patterns; two pertain to Florida, the Rufous Hummingbird and the Sandhill Crane.

The Rufous nests in the northwest and traditionally wintered in Mexico and other tropical destinations. Now, thanks to thoughtful gardeners along the Gulf Coast and beyond, this feisty little bird has discovered Florida. Plant the right blooms in your yard and they may come.

The Sandhill Crane is a year-round resident of Florida but the number of cranes in our state has diminished. In recent years, the cranes nesting in Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan linger too late and only fly as far as Tennessee, Alabama and Georgia; our loss their gain.

I think the Sandhill Crane is one of the most fascinating birds in the USA. I was thrilled when the two in Gordon Daniels' photo at Fort Cooper State Park greeted us. It was a great welcome for the five Unique Birders on the first walk of the season.

## What Could it Be?

What is it? I thought I knew. I do, but then I don't. It's the green center that has me buffaloed – or helianthified.

It's a sunflower (*helianthis*) all right. It has to be: daisy-like flower head, bright yellow petals (ray flowers), and atop long flower stalks.

I'm nearly sure it's a narrowleaf sunflower, *H. angustifolius*; but it could be Paleleaf Woodland, *H. strumosus*, or perhaps Woodland, *H. divaricatus*. One of the references states, "[It] hybridizes with closely related woodland sunflower, (*H. divaricatus*), making it challenging, if not impossible, to tell them apart in the wild."

Our specimen has long, thin, dark green, rough, pointed-tipped leaves with smooth margins.

Now come the interesting parts. Some of the leaves appear to be attached to the main stem across from each other (opposite), and some alternately. This is a very significant difference and very diagnostic. The book states, "alternate."

There are many more leaves on this one than the one in the reference, but no basal leaves, while the reference mentions, "long, thin dark green basal leaves."

But the major difference is that the one here pictured in our Garden of Weedin' definitely has a green center (disc flower). The reference states clearly, "dark reddish-brown center."

So, what does one do when one is (as I often am) stumped in identifying a plant? My answer has been to continue to do research by studying other references and asking others who have proven their expertise. Any ideas?

Have you taken the opportunity to visit the Belleview Library and walk the "fun walk" to view the native garden?

When did you last venture to exercise on the half mile Longleaf Pine Trail and lingered in the Native Plant Garden?

Hopefully you have driven by the SW 94th Street and SW 89th Court Road circle and noticed how the scarlet Firebushes (*Hamelia patens*) have been trimmed so visibility is improved.

Join us in the Native Plant Group, as we welcome autumn, working to grow native.

**World Traveler**

Estonia, the northernmost of the Baltic States, is bordered on the north by the Gulf of Finland, on the west by the Baltic Sea, on the south by Latvia, and on the east by Lake Peipus and Russia. Physically, it falls between Maryland and West Virginia in size, but has a population of only about 1.3 million folks.

For several centuries, the area currently known as Estonia was occupied or governed by the Vikings, Germans, Danish, Holy Roman Empire, Poles, and Swedes. In 1721, the area was captured by Russia, who ruled almost 200 years. While Russia was adjusting to a new form of government after the October Revolution of 1917, Estonia took the opportunity to issue a Declaration of Independence in 1918.

In 1939, Stalin and Hitler agreed to divide Eastern Europe into "spheres of special interest" resulting in the USSR promptly occupying Estonia. Except for occupation by the Germans during World War II, the Soviets maintained control of Estonia, until the country once again declared independence in 1988. The Republic of Estonia finally was officially recognized as a sovereign state in 1991.

Geographically, Estonia is relatively flat, boggy, heavily forested (61% of the country), with many small lakes and rivers. The forests support abundant numbers of wild animals as well as some rare bird and plant species. The country gets about 25 inches of rain, roughly half of what Marion County receives, and it is significantly colder there. It is estimated that there are about 1,500 islands off the coast, two of which are large enough to be separate counties.

The capital, Tallinn, is a big draw for

tourists as it contains what is considered to be one of the best-preserved medieval towns in Europe. In spite of expanding municipal development, the people of Tallinn have managed to preserve the Old Town area in much of its original form. There are cobblestone streets, medieval churches, and great merchant houses, barns, and warehouses, some of which date back to the 11th century.

There also are many restaurants, bars, galleries, and shops as well as fairs, concerts, and outdoor cafes being hosted in the town square during much of the summer. In December, there is a wonderful outdoor Christmas market that draws tens of thousands of visitors every year.

One of the most famous restaurants in the Old Town is called the Olde Hansa. Margitta and I and Diane and Bruce Rox-

burgh ate dinner there last July and had a wonderful time! It is a three-story building, but there are no windows above the first floor. It is only lit by candles, so it is very dark inside! All of the food is cooked using 15th century recipes and methods; the waiters are in costume and they act in period. Fortunately, they also speak English because, frankly, our ability to speak ancient Estonian is truly rusty! It was good food and a great experience!


The town square has several claims to fame. One, it is the home of Raepateek, the oldest continuously working pharmacy in Europe. They are not sure exactly when it opened for business, but the records are clear that it was being operated by its third owner in 1422. Two, legend has it that marzipan, a world-renowned candy, was first developed at the phar-

macy. Three, it is claimed that the first tree ever to be decorated for Christmas was set up in the Tallinn town square in 1441. This action quickly spread and has become a lasting tradition within the entire Christian world.

The Old Town also has many very old and magnificent churches. St. Olaf's Church was built in the 12th century and, with a tower of 522 feet, was the highest building in the world at the time. St. Nicholas' Church is dedicated to fishermen and sailors and was built from 1230 to 1275.

Estonia is a great place to visit. Because of our cruise time commitments, we did not get out of Tallinn; but Estonia certainly is a place that would warrant a return trip. You should think about it.







This month, I recently had the fun of enjoying one of our favorite scallop recipes. This recipe has been modified to reflect servings for two.

**Seared Scallops with Bacon**  
*Serves 2*

4 slices of bacon cut into 1/4-inch pieces (quantity can be adjusted for personal preferences)

1/2 pound large sea scallops, (I used U12 size scallops) about 8 sliced in half crosswise to form 2 rounds (Note: The U12 scallops I used were frozen, and then defrosted. I rinsed them in cold water and then blotted them dry with paper towels.)

Salt and freshly ground pepper  
1/2 cup white wine

1 tablespoon unsalted butter  
Heat a large sauté pan over medium-low heat, and add ba-

con. Cook slowly, stirring frequently, until brown and crisp, about 8 minutes. Remove bacon with a slotted spoon, and transfer to a paper-lined plate.

Drain excess fat, leaving a thin coat on the bottom of pan. Increase heat to medium; add scallops to pan, and sprinkle with salt and pepper, to taste. Cook until golden brown and opaque, about 2 minutes per side.

Transfer scallops to a serving dish, and add shallots to pan. When shallots are translucent, add white wine; scrape browned bits from bottom of pan with wooden spoon; top with reserved bacon.





How would you like to learn more about shuffleboard and even play a game with some of our regular players? Now is your chance! The Shuffleboard Club is having an open house / lesson session on Saturday, Nov. 15, at 9:30 a.m. at the shuffleboard courts.

experienced players? Don't be! They can actually be an asset to you. If the experienced player is your partner, he/she sometimes can help you win the game. If the experienced player is your opponent, you can observe how he/she plays to help improve your own game.

During the game, you will learn how the score is kept. Whoever reaches 75 points first is the winner. If no winner is reached by the time the scoreboard is filled (16 frames), the partners with the highest score, at that time, are then the winners.

When you are playing, you may become aware of different terminology used – hammer, St. Pete, Tampa, kitchen ... As you play shuffleboard more often, you will in time learn what a player is talking about. The same way when you see hand signals being used, in time, you will also be able to learn the meaning of them.

After the game is finished, refreshments will be served and you will be able to meet the other players and the captains.



**How much do you sit?**

The evidence is crystal clear; sitting too much is bad for your health. Experts are still deliberating on which comes first ... does too much sitting trigger poor health, or does poor health trigger too much sitting?

Your body adapts to what you do most often. Therefore, if you sit in a chair all day, you'll essentially become better adapted to sitting in a chair. The trouble is that you will become much less adept at standing, walking, bending and extending. This type of movement is critical to our bodies functioning well and allowing us to lead an active, independent life. A healthy body (at any age) should be able to accomplish these movements with proficiency. Your age is not necessarily a determinant of what you are capable of, it's what you do consistently from day to day that will establish your strength, flexibility and ability to function. Your lifestyle is the best predictor of whether or not your health is good or bad.

When you remain sedentary, your body goes through certain physiological changes. For instance, when the bigger muscles in the lower half of your body are not working (because you are sitting), the inactivity sends a signal to your brain that changes your metabolism. These changes cause an increase in your blood sugar levels, and a decrease in the use of stored fat. This, in turn, has a number of ill effects,

from obesity to an increased risk of cancer later in life.

Avoiding the pitfalls of sitting for long stretches of time is easy once you know that all it takes is moving around a few minutes each hour. Yes, you really can just get up and walk around the house or the block to stretch and engage your muscles. It may not sound like much, but an Australian study found that a few minutes of full body movement each hour, could actually make a difference in your health.

When you are sitting, your body goes into a sort of shutdown mode. Because the muscles of the lower body are some of

the largest you have, when you sit for prolonged periods the majority of the muscular system simply stops contracting. This results in a dramatic decrease of blood flow to the muscles and your metabolism slows way down.

Now think about the position of your hips and thighs in relation to your torso while you're sitting. They are bent, which causes the muscles on the front of your thighs, known as hip flexors, to contract slightly, or shorten. The more you sit, the more the fascia (connective tissue in the body) will keep your hip flexors shortened. If you've ever seen a guy walk with a forward lean, it's often because of shortened hip flexors. The muscles don't stretch, as they naturally should. As a result, he's not walking tall and straight because his fascia has adapted more to sitting than standing. Similarly, if you spend a lot of time with your shoulders and upper back slumped over a keyboard, this eventually becomes your normal posture. That's not just an issue in terms of how you look but frequent-

ly leads to chronic neck and shoulder pain. Add all this up, and a person who sits a lot is less efficient not only at exercising, but also at simply moving.

Where do you fall on the sitting spectrum? Studies have classified low levels of sitting as under three hours a day, moderate levels of sitting as three to eight hours, and high levels of sitting as more than eight hours of sitting each day. Don't become a sitting statistic. Get up and move! You will feel better and I might even get to see you in the Recreation Center!

**FIT TIP #1:** Sitting and exercise are two different behaviors, while a one mile walk is good for you, it may not undo the eight hours of sitting.

**FIT TIP #2:** When it comes to exercise, any activity is good. Some is always better than none, and more is better than less.

**FIT TIP #3:** Engaging in light physical activity not only supports physical health but also plays a key role in maintaining memory, language, and the processing of visual and auditory information.

**Brain Health & Executive Function**

What is executive function and why is it important to brain health? Executive function refers to a specific set of mental skills governed by the brain's frontal lobe.

Executive function can be divided into two categories: organization and regulation. Organization is the ability to gather information and prepare it for evaluation. Regulation involves assessing your environment and using past experiences to make decisions and/or behavior changes in response to the information. For example, with Thanksgiving right around the corner, we all know how tempting it might be to indulge in a significantly larger quantity of food than usual. Based on the abundance of food in front of you (assessing the environment) and remembering how stuffed you have felt at previous Thanksgiving dinners (using past experiences) your executive function will remind you that you do not want to feel overly stuffed and uncomfortable, not to mention that this conflicts with your goals in managing things like blood sugar, blood pressure and cholesterol.

The tempo is inconsistent or the composer, arranger adds a few bars of music here and there. The

line dance choreographer adds a few steps called a "tag" or stops and "restarts" the dance sequence to accommodate these inconsistencies in the music.

One of the first dances the newcomers learned was "Old Bones" the dance pattern ends with a sway, right, left, right, left, then start again. Near the end of the song there is an extra four beats of music and we add extra sways to match. This is a "tag." Line dance terminology is part of the learning process you get in the newcomers class.

We are dancing at the Friday night Happy Hour at the Arbor Club Ballroom, Friday and Saturday at The Town Square and our second Wednesday of the month line dance in the Arbor Club Ballroom. November is the month we move up the start time at the The Town Square so check the time and come join us.

Stepping in a set pattern to the beat of the music in a line with your friends is fun. Come dance with us.

# Touring Nashville

A group of residents recently took a motor coach trip to Nashville, Tenn., to visit the city and all its country music venues.

The tour included visiting Willie Nelson and Friends Museum and General Store. Nelson's museum contained many of his photos and mementos from throughout his career. One showcase of interest was the original Martin guitar and Grand Ole Opry microphone pictured with Willie when he first appeared at the Grand Ole Opry in 1963. His pay stub for his performance was a giant \$11.71 for his Opry debut.

Nelson has won many music awards but two memorable ones were his receiving "Entertainer of the Year Award" in 1979 along with a Grammy Award in 1980 for his huge and most memorable song, "On the Road Again." Nelson was inducted into the Country Music Hall of

Fame in 1993.

Right next door to Willie Nelson and Friends Museum and General Store is Cooter's Place. Remember Cooter from the Duke of Hazards? All the cars from that TV show and movie were at the museum as well as frequent visits by Cooter himself.

Who is Cooter? His real name is Ben Jones.

The museum features all kinds of memorabilia, photos, costumes and pictures but the most people stop to see the 1969 "General Lee" Dodge Charger along with Cooter's tow truck, Daisy's jeep, and Rosco's patrol car.

Heading to the suburbs of Nashville in the small community of Belle Meade, the Ocala group visited a famous mansion, home of the famous Belle Meade Plantation, which has a long list of historical figures who resided there. Generals Jack-

son and Harding were family in sorts and owners of the plantation amongst others over the plantation's history.

The Plantation was noted as the best breeding plantations for thoroughbred horses. Some classified the plantations as the equine capital of the world. The Philadelphia Record newspaper called Belle Meade "the most remarkable breeding establishment in the world." Some of the famous thoroughbreds that were used for breeding between 1844 until 1904 were Jack Malone, Vandal, Bonnie Scotland, Great Tom, Enquirer, Bramble and Luke Blackburn. It has been reported that modern racing is still dominated by the bloodlines sired by Bonnie Scotland and Enquirer. It has been stated that all winners of the Kentucky Derby since 2003 until present have bloodlines to Belle Meade.

The plantation, at one time, encompassed over 5,400 acres and today the plantation is a historical landmark with just under 30 acres. The plantation's decline was due to economy in 1900.

The first structure on this land was erected in 1806 and as the plantation prospered the larger house was constructed

and then expanded again and again. Outside the front of the mansion home there are still remains of the Civil War where musket balls pierced the outer surfaces of the home during a brief skirmish between both the Union and Confederate forces.

The group took a self-guided tour of the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum where just about every recording that hit the music charts in a big way was displayed along with many costumes worn by country music stars along with their instruments, photos, and paraphernalia.

The group toured Nashville with a step-on guide and had some free time during the day and evening to visit establishments on what is referred to as Honky-Tonk Street visiting all the Honky-Tonk bars where many of the top-named country music artists got their start after being discovered. Young musicians and singers perform in the Honky-Tonk bars for tips only.

Two other venues where country music was performed for the Ocala group was at a dinner party where a duet sang all kinds of country music to the delight of the group. The other venue was at Nashville's Nightlife dinner theater where the "best country show" wooed the group with a variety of music. The band at this event accompanied the late Tammy Wynette who was considered the "First Lady of Country Music." The band members are the owners of this dinner theater.

Two top performers took to the stage entertaining the group, which again to the enjoyment of all, was Jeannie Seely who blared out her hit tunes. Her act was followed by Tim Watson, a violinist, who has been heard on stages around the world opening shows for super stars of country music. Tim had the group just about on their feet doing a combination of trick fiddling, crazy comedy routines, and singing with a strong voice.

On the way back to Ocala, the On Top of the World gang had the opportunity to explore Rock City located on the outskirts of Chattanooga, Tenn., on top of Lookout Mountain.

It has been stated by Rock City that seven states can be seen from a point called Lovers Leap in the so called "Fairyl-land," which is 700 acres of rocks of all sizes and shapes. During the Civil War on the slopes of Lookout Mountain, both Union and Confederates claimed that seven states could be seen from the summit of the mountain. The view of seven states has not been proven. Back in 1823, the top of the mountain was described as "a citadel of rocks."

What a trip. What an excursion. On Top of the World participants are still talking about their Nashville experience.





**Opera**

The 2014-15 season of the Opera Appreciation Class will begin on Thursday, Dec. 4, at 1 p.m. in Meeting Room #3 of the Hobby Building. All opera lovers should mark their calendar.

In December, we will start the season with a Puccini opus as we have done for the last six years. Last year, we started out with a very light work, "La rondine." "Il trittico" is a totally different kind of work containing three one act operas designed to be performed the same night. We are going to see two of them, "Il tabarro" and "Gianni Schicchi," Puccini's only comedy. These short operas were Puccini's last ones.

In January, we will see a Rossini composition. Usually when you think about Rossini, a comedy like the "Barber of Seville" comes to mind. This year, however, we are going to see a new staging of his "Otello" by Opernhaus Zürich. From

1816 to the 1880s, Rossini's "Otello" was in the standard repertory, but it was replaced by Verdi's version. We are going to see how Rossini adapted Shakespeare's "Othello," which is a little different than Verdi's.

In February, we will see "Falstaff," which is Verdi's only comedy and his last work. This rendition was staged at La Scala in 1893. Like Otello by Verdi and Rossini, it is an adaptation from a Shakespeare play. The production that we will see is from the Glyndbourne Festival from 1976 starring Donald Gramm and Benjamin Luxon. Kay Griffel and Elizabeth sing the female roles and provide their share of comedy.

For the month of March, we study the Tales of Hoffmann by Jacques Offenbach - the composer of many operettas. Tales of Hoffmann was his entry into the opera world and was so successful that it is still in the standard repertory. Our production is from the Royal Opera of Covent Garden with Placido Domingo singing the lead. His three lovers are sung by Luciana Serra, Agnes Baltsa and Ileana Cotrubas. Geraint Evans sings the role of Hoffmann's rival.

We close out in April with a Donizetti

masterpiece, "Lucia di Lammermoor" based on a novel by Sir Walter Scott. We are going to see a 1982 Met production with Joan Sutherland singing the lead role that she had been singing for 20 years. Her lover is sung by my favorite tenor, Alfredo Kraus.

This is the schedule for the Opera Appreciation Class for 2014-15. All of the productions are first rate with superior casts, and I look forward to seeing them on our 50-inch screen with the class. I encourage all opera lovers to help us start the year by coming to Meeting Room #3 of the Hobby Building on Thursday, Dec. 4.

**The New Pretenders**

Because of the number of new people living in our community, I think giving you a little history of The New Pretenders might be interesting. A troupe called "The Pretenders" was started by Ruth Daldin in 1996, with the first show being presented in February 1997. At that time, the troupe consisted of only eight women and four men, with no band. They sang 20 songs that first year.

It wasn't until 2000 when the famous entertainer, Ken Colen, began to sing with the troupe. When Ruth moved in 2003, the troupe regrouped with Diana Morgen as the director. In recognition of the change, the troupe was renamed to "The New Pretenders." Another big change for 2003 was the addition of a five-piece band.

Today, we have an 11-piece band with dedicated instrumentalists, seven women and seven men singers (with occasional additional singers from the band), and four staff people. Our repertoire also has increased to include 29 to 30 songs. Historically, the troupe has performed two shows a year at On Top of the World, but in 2010, we started offering a Sunday afternoon performance, which has proven to be very popular.

The troupe has performed every year since 1997, except for 2013 when we took a one-year sabbatical. We have come a long way since that first performance in 1997. We think we are getting better and better each year, and suggest that you should not



# Thanksgiving, Then and Now

We all know that Thanksgiving is a national holiday celebrated to give thanks for the blessing of the harvest. The day has its historical roots in religious and cultural traditions. We celebrate the feast that started in Plymouth in 1621 with the early pilgrims giving thanks for a good harvest.

We all have our own memories of Thanksgiving with our families. I remember the great feast of Thanksgiving with my family with my folks spending days getting ready. My dad would go to the local poultry farmer and order his turkey. He would order a bird, not a tom but a hen, weighing in around 20 to 22 pounds. Mom would be in the kitchen baking pies, which included the ever-popular apple, pumpkin and mincemeat pies. She would also cook down cranberries for the sauce complementing the turkey.

The day before Thanksgiving, Dad would pick up the turkey and bring it into the kitchen where he would finish plucking out the remaining feathers and give the bird a good bath after removing the giblets. The bird would be drip dried and placed in a roasting pan, covered with a wet towel and placed outside on the front porch. Back when I was a kid, it was always chilly in late November.

The stuffing was made the day before so the soda cracker crumbs and pieces would absorb the poultry season and onions. That would be placed on the front porch also with a covered wet towel.

Thanksgiving morning, before the crack of dawn, faint noises would come from the kitchen as mom or dad would stuff the bird and place it in the oven after stitching the bird's cavity preventing the escape of the stuffing.

While my folks prepared all the vegetables, I would head off to the local high school football field for the annual Thanksgiving rival game with a neighboring town. If our hometown won the Thanksgiving Day game and lost all the

other games in the season, then it was a successful year on the gridiron.

Returning home after spending a cold morning at the game, the smell of the turkey dinner filled the house. Around 2 p.m., it was time to sit down and enjoy this fantastic meal with family and guests.

Generally, we started the meal with a glass of apple cider. Then I can remember hearing the words, "pass down your plate" so that the turkey and stuffing could start to cover the plate. The giblet gravy was passed around as was the mashed potatoes, squash, turnips, carrots, boiled onions, and other vegetables along with the homemade cranberry sauce. I almost forgot the hot rolls and celery sticks.

I would take a spoonful of this and a spoonful of that; it became evident in my mind that I had a mountain of food on my plate to consume.

I can still hear my mother saying to leave room for dessert. After the meal, who could eat dessert even though those pies looked scrumptious?

Then it was time to get the ice skates and head for the local pond to work off the full stomach feeling before returning home and having a turkey sandwich, pie and a cold glass of milk.

What a blast from the past! Look around our community today. So many of our family traditions still remain but some have also been simplified. Some folks will prepare a big meal inviting over friends while some will have family visit and others will head to their children's home for the festivities. Others will opt to head to local eateries. Other folks may have purchased the entire turkey dinner, or parts of it, at local restaurants and grocery stores and bring the cooked meal home only having to warm the meal and serve it on Thanksgiving.

Instead of baking pies it is much easier to purchase them in a local store or restaurant, and instead of making homemade cranberry sauce it is much easier to open a can, whole or jellied.

After the meal, we generally will sit down in the easy chair in front of the TV and watch some of the afternoon's football games before falling asleep. Awaking after the game and wondering what the outcome was and then having a piece of pie.

However you celebrate, I wish you all a happy Thanksgiving!
