Recreation Center Update

The staircase will be demolished and replaced with a new staircase and an elevator. During the period from commencement of work, through completion, the Recreation Center will be closed to the public. Keeping It Green

Keeping On Top of the World golf courses green and at the same time striving for environmental sustainability is the focus of Certified Golf Course Superintendent Andrew Jorgensen. "With the Candler Hills golf maintenance building running under solar power, our focus now is on the conservation of our water supply, and we are constantly looking for ways to manage that effort," says Andrew. He added that Florida DEP approved Best Management Practices manual is the bible that he and his staff live by.

Because our golf courses can soak up hundreds of thousands of gallons a day, no stone is left unturned when it comes to conservation. Towards that goal and yet to ensure world-class fairways and greens, more than 70-percent of all water currently being used on two of the three courses comes from the 2.5 million gallon tank of reclaimed water.

The reclamation project was completed in September 2011. Additionally, back in 2002, in collaboration with Marion County, a site-specific sustainability program for On Top of the World was put in place. It included everything from where and how fertilizers would be stored, what are the best management practices for their use, and, when necessary, how will they be disposed of.

Two years ago, the Florida Golf Course Superintendents Association instituted a Best Management Practices Certification Program. So far seven people on Jorgensen's staff have participated and received certifications.

Summarily, because of the acreage that our golf courses consume, they are naturally an integral part of the sustainability efforts undertaken by On Top of the World. In the short time that these efforts have been underway, the results have been impressive enough to warrant recognition and applause from water districts, energy providers and from local governing bodies.

Is It Legal?

SCAM ALERT: Credit repair schemes promise to correct your credit so you can qualify for a loan or mortgage or some other form of credit. Most often, their advice consists of lying on a loan application or obtaining an employer identification number from the I.R.S. Please understand that if you do either of these, you are committing fraud. As countless folks have learned, only time and your effort along with some form of legitimate personal debt repayment plan will improve someone's bad credit.

Q. My neighbor told me that because

I live in an "over-55" community, my children cannot inherit my condominium. Please comment.

A. Not true. I don't know why or how this false information is running around; but as I said, it is false, false, false.

Here's the thing: In an "over-55" community, 80% of the units have to be occupied by at least one person who is 55 years of age or older. Note, please that I used the word "occupied" not the word "owned." In On Top of the World, the Association takes the view that the remaining 20% is for folks who inherit a unit. Thus, if someone who is not 55 years of age inherits a unit, he or she can own it and can occupy it.

However, if someone who is not 55 years of age seeks to purchase and occupy a unit, that person would not be approved. He or she could buy a unit, and therefore own it and could, for example, lease it out to someone who is over 55. However, the tenant must be over 55 and must go

through the approval process. The Association will take legal action in the event someone who is not 55 or older sought to occupy a unit, unless he or she occupied it in a good faith, with someone who is 55 years of age or older.

Let me add this. All persons who occupy a unit at On Top of the World, be it in Clearwater or in Ocala, must go through the approval process and this includes someone who is younger than age 55 but who has inherited a unit. There are no exceptions to the approval process.

Summary: If you live in an "over-55" community, your heirs can absolutely inherit your unit and can own it and possess it. However, in On Top of the World, be it in Clearwater or in Ocala, all persons who occupy a unit must go through the approval process.

Q. What is the difference between an advance directive and a living will?

A. A living will is an advance directive. Most often, however, an advance directive includes a portion for the living will and also, a portion of language to the effect that you designate someone to make health care decisions for you in the event you are not able to do so.

Q. I am very concerned about signing a durable power of attorney because the person I choose will then have a lot of power; won't she?

A. Yes, indeed. That is why I continually harp on the need for selecting an agent who you absolutely, and without question

trust. Maybe it's a child. Maybe it's your attorney or a trusted advisor. It's just my view that it is critical to have a durable power of attorney, because, if some kind of catastrophic event happens to you, you will need someone to take care of you and make business-type decisions.

If you do not have a well-drafted durable power of attorney, and if it is necessary to have some bills paid or some documents signed, it is possible that a guardianship will have to be established. It's best to avoid guardianship. That's why I believe everyone should have a durable power of attorney (and also an advance directive) and the person you select must be completely trustworthy.

Q. Does this come under the heading of mind my own business? The wife of a friend who lives (nearby) is engaged in an affair, or I think it's that. Should I inform my friend about his wife?

A. Um ... this does not appear to be a legal question, or if it is, I can't seem to see it. So I think I'll follow your suggestion and just mind my own business.

Two Important River Basins

What does western Georgia and New England have in common? Both sections of our country played important roles in the production of textile products. It all started in Rhode Island in a little community called Pawtucket just north of present-day Providence on the Blackstone River, which ran from just north of Worcester, Mass. to Providence, R.I. and Narraganset Bay.

In Georgia, the Chattahoochee River starts in the mountains of northern Georgia and goes down to the Gulf of Mexico. This river basin encompasses three states: Georgia, Alabama, and Florida. Both regions have been some of the wealthiest areas in our country and have also been in financial despair.

The Industrial Revolution started when an energetic colonist constructed a mill on the Blackstone River in 1790 to produce woolen materials instead of shipping the raw wool to England for processing. Needless to say, the British Empire was not happy. This mill was called Slater's Mill and was the first step in the Industrial Revolution with Great Britain. The mill still stands today as a tourist destination and is maintained by our U.S. National Park Service.

Many other mills popped up along the Blackstone River and its many tributaries. These mills capitalized by utilizing power supplied from the water to operate their mills. The main river itself was also utilized to transport products up and down the rivers and tributaries starting in Worcester and ending at the docks located in Providence. Where the depth of the river became an obstacle, locks were built for barge traffic, which often utilized horses and mules for power pulling the barges up or down stream.

The demise of the industrial textile industry developed along the Blackstone River when it faltered with the introduction of railroads and vehicle traffic along with increased wages and taxes.

Hundreds of all types of manufacturing plants and mills closed in New England and headed south where taxes and wages were less along with better weather conditions. There had been many types of manufacturing in the south particularly in the Chattahoochee River basin.

Believe it or not, Columbus, Ga. was rated as the third largest shipping port in

the Peach State. It is still a shipping port but much smaller in scale. During the Civil War era, Columbus was the shipbuilding center for the Confederate Navy building ironclads and blockade-runners. Textile goods would be shipped by wagon or rail to Columbus or ports in Alabama where it would be put onto small ships or barges for the trip to the Gulf of Mexico reaching the port of Apalachicola, Fla. Manufacturing mills and plants lined both banks of the Chattahoochee.

Then it happened. Textile mills that had survived over the years were claiming bankruptcy and closing their doors because manufacturers found it to be a lot cheaper to have textiles produced overseas. Taxes levied on these manufacturers along with higher wages demanded by la-

bor unions forced the mills to seek other alternatives.

It was cheaper for companies to send the raw material to foreign ports, have their products produced and then shipped back to the states. One of the biggest textile manufacturers in Columbus and the largest in the United States, Bibb Textile, went Chapter Eleven.

It took years for cities and towns that once depended on textile manufacturing facilities to recover. Most of the larger mills had their own communities attached to the mill. When Bibb went out of business, their town was incorporated into the city of Columbus as were other manufacturing communities.


Both the Blackstone River basin, which is now titled a National Heritage Corridor and is seeking to be approved as a National Park, and the Chattahoochee River basin are now in the process of being completely revitalized. Both areas have new manufacturing plants and plenty of business ventures springing up in both areas. In Columbus what started out as a small army camp during World War II has now

mushroomed into one of the largest military bases in the country – Fort Benning.

The Corridor in New England will become one of the largest National Parks when approved where the federal government will not own any of the property. Massachusetts, Rhode Island, many counties and towns now own it. Both river basins as well as other parts of manufacturing states are lined with vacant and run down mill buildings. Some are being revitalized into senior housing, malls and other ventures.

Prosperity flourishes in both regions attracting tourism to many local destinations. In Columbus, national museums such as the Infantry Museum at Fort Benning, the Civil War Naval Museum, and whitewater rafting on the Chattahoochee River as well as a beautiful 15-mile river walk erected by the city.

In Providence and Pawtucket, you have many tourist venues including the original Slater's Mill complex along with many old historical buildings dating back to revolutionary times and of course various locations along the Blackstone River.

Returning Home from an Extended Trip?

Remember, if you turned down the temperature on your gas or electric water heater before your extended trip, make sure you turn the temperature selection to the highest temperature for two hours, before you use the hot water. Turn it back to your normal operating temperature and flush out the tank (using the drain cock or through your pipes).

Certain non-tubercular mycobacterium may have been growing in the lower temperature (warm) water in a dormant water heater. When you first turn on the hot water flow, you may notice a rotten egg odor and the water will be an "off" color. The solution for this problem is very simple: Turn up the heat above 130°F for approximately one hour. Make sure you turn the temperature back down before resuming normal usage before you start using the water.

Hurricane Season

September is the time we turn our attention to the tropical Atlantic and keep one eye on the weather map. Generally, the management company is able to persevere in its grounds maintenance responsibilities, despite the month of July and August posing challenges with rain. It seems that

every time the mowing crews got caught up, a long cycle of showers pushed them further behind. Granted we need the rain to replenish the groundwater, but it does come with a price.

As we move deeper into storm season, focus may be shifting to storm preparations. This means acting fast on sometimes less than 24 hours notice to secure buildings and equipment from possible wind and rain damage, as well as making sure everyone is clear on their post storm responsibilities for recovery and cleanup.

Residents need to be alert as well and also ready to clean up personal items that may become missiles in high winds. What can't be put in the garage or secured in a closed room needs to be tied down.

I will also remind residents that any addition to the exterior of the home requires prior Association approval. One of the largest factors we consider is the wind rating on the addition. Many awning products have no wind rating. Naturally, these will not be approved. There are quality products that do have a wind rating and have been approved by the Association. Check with Customer Service for details.

Finally, don't forget to update your insurance to ensure any additions to the original structure are included in your policy.

Water Conservation

With all the rain in July and August, it seems odd to be thinking about water conservation. Here's the sad fact: more water is withdrawn than can be sustainably replenished, year over year. Yes, we have these cyclical wet years. We can't count on that continuing. Only a very small percentage of rainfall actually filters back into the aquifer. Withdrawal and depletion occurs much faster than replenishment. To underscore this point, there has been a steady flow of articles in the Ocala Star Banner as well as other publications dealing with either water quality initiatives or conservation initiatives. Interestingly enough, there is an important nexus between the two topics.

In the On Top of the World Communities, including Candler Hills and

Indigo East, over 70% of all water usage goes out as irrigation. Generally, the interior water use favors conservation because new homes in On Top of the World were constructed with low-flow showerheads, faucets, and commodes. However, the efficiency of these fixtures is defeated by allowing water to run for an excessively long time. A simple case in point is allowing the water to run while brushing your teeth or when washing vegetables (two minutes equal approximately 1.5 gallons). I know this never seems like much, but it all adds up surprisingly fast.

Slow drips from a faucet can add up to an additional 20 gallons per day in wasted water. Toilet leaks can waste as much as 200 gallons per day. The most efficient showerheads use 2.5 gallons per minute. Showers should be kept to five minutes or less. Older heads use approximately eight gallons per minute. Changing out the older model heads makes good sense.

Additional common sense ways to lower water consumption are: use the dishwasher when fully loaded, adjust the load selector on your washing machine to match the size load, when washing your car use a spray nozzle on your hose instead of allowing the hose to run. A garden hose can waste 600 gallons per hour.

The biggest use of water is in the landscape. Conservation can begin with an audit of your irrigation system by a licensed irrigation contractor. This involves aiming the irrigation heads correctly, checking for leaks, and correctly setting the irrigation clocks for optimal run time and frequency setting. According to a program begun in Orange County, adjusting irrigation can save up to 22-percent (Source: Florida Water Resources Journal, August 2007). Saved water equals saved dollars for the homeowner. Having a licensed professional check and adjust your irrigation system once a year is a very good investment that may very well reduce your overall water bill.

Owners may wish to consider reducing the irrigation frequency of outlying areas in larger yards. Watering those outlying zones once every 10 days will save a significant amount of water. Judging by water use patterns, the CDD is aware that many residents have not adjusted their irrigation timers to the irrigation frequency as required by Southwest Florida Water Management District. This is the immediate and most basic place to start water conservation.

Customer Service offers a leak detection service for a nominal \$15. They not only look for leaks but check the irrigation controller for proper setting and ensure your irrigation is providing proper coverage per zone. Some of the findings from previous leak detections include: Multiple daily start times on an irrigation time resulting in tens of thousands of excess water usage in a month, hose bibs left running, toilets leaking water, and broken irrigation lines.



**Line must be funded by 50% or \$10,000 whichever is greater at closing. If line is closed within the first two years, consumer will be required to pay back the closing costs.

View From The Library

"Shackleton's Way" pays homage to the leadership skills of British explorer Ernest Shackleton, who began an Antarctic expedition in 1914 when England was focused on World War I, not exploration. More than 1,200 miles from civilization, his ship, Endurance, became crushed in the ice and there was no hope of rescue.

Ten months later, on the brink of starvation, the entire crew was rescued by none other than Shackleton himself, who, with a select group of five men chosen for their character and their specific skills, set sail in a lifeboat, yes, a lifeboat, to navigate (without GPS) some of the roughest waters in the world to find help 800 miles away on the island of South Georgia.

This ordeal is documented in detail in "Shackleton's Way," but the focus of this book is on the leadership skills it took to make the journey, keep the entire crew alive and to persevere when there appeared to be no hope. Sixty years after the rescue, when an interviewer asked First Officer Greenstreet how he survived, he answered with one word: "Shackleton." The collective opinion of the crew was that he was a tower of strength and endurance, and he never panicked in any emergency.

His influence is felt even today, and

some, including a former secretary of the navy and the commander of Apollo 13, believe he has helped them find their way in their careers.

What is it about this man that makes him unforgettable?

Four pages in this book are dedicated to his philosophies. Here are a few excerpts:

Selecting and forming a crew: Start with a solid core of workers you know from past jobs or who come recommended by trusted colleagues. Hire those with talents and expertise you lack, and don't be threatened by them.

Getting the group through a crisis: Immediately address your staff. Take charge, offer a plan of action, ask for support, and show absolute confidence. Keep the malcontents close to you and try to win them over.

Forming groups for the toughest tasks: Divide the staff into teams; give the tedious tasks to the workhorses who don't complain; keep an eye on the details; don't be afraid to change your mind when your plan isn't working.

All of these strategies and more can be rediscovered in "Shackleton's Way," which is located in the biography section.

Covered Bridge

My wife, Bev and I were in Columbus, Ga. and instead of returning to On Top of the World via interstates, we decided to take U.S. Route 27 from Columbus to Ocala. In other words, drive the scenic back roads.

Browsing the area of travel, I discovered something out of the ordinary for a guy from New England and that was a covered bridge. I was always under the impression that covered bridges were constructed for safety reasons particularly during the winter months. I was wrong, or I should say, partially right.

The main reason for covered bridges was to protect the timber trusses and other bridge materials from the weather. Uncovered wooden bridges had a life span between 10 to 15 years.

As we entered the picturesque town of Blakely, we found the most southern covered bridge in the Continental United States. The Coheele Creek Covered Bridge was constructed in 1891 at the old McDonald Ford.

A ford is a place where a river or other body of water is shallow enough to be crossed by wading. Most fords are normally suitable for vehicles of any type to cross except during heavy rains or spring floods.

McDonald Ford on the Coheele Creek allowed farmers to cross the wa-

ter when water levels were low, however when levels were high, crossing the creek was a challenge.

John Baughman constructed the Coheele Creek Covered Bridge 96-foot bridge for \$490.41. This allowed farmers to cross the ford whether the water level was low or high. It was completely restored in 1984.

Reports state that there are at least 15 covered wooden bridges in Georgia alone and the one crossing Coheele Creek is the furthest south.

It has been reported that more than 10,000 covered bridges were constructed in the Continental U.S. between 1805 and the early 20th century. The first covered bridge was erected in Philadelphia. Today, very few covered bridges remain. Pennsylvania has the most covered structures. Three interstate covered bridges connect two states, New Hampshire and Vermont.

What happened to these historic structures? Most met their demise by high floodwaters washing the bridges away while some just disappeared because of lack of maintenance.

The Coheele Creek Covered Bridge is on the National Registry of Historic Places. Today, the bridge is closed to all traffic. Metal bars prevent any access to the bridge.



Whitewater Rafting

Watching those braving the thrilling white water rapids in kayaks and rafts is just as exciting as riding the rapids themselves. Visiting Columbus, Ga., the Chattahoochee River separates Georgia from Alabama and runs along the western edge of the Peach State in what is described as "the longest urban whitewater rafting in the world."

The rapids, after a few textile milldams were demolished, have put the river back to its original state. The rapids, which are approximately two and one half miles in length, have been described to be "Wild as Colorado and as warm as Costa Rica" and the biggest whitewater in the eastern United States.

Want to "run the rapids" yourself but have never done so? There are outfitters who will teach you along with providing the required safety equipment and watercraft. The rapids of the Chattahoochee can be viewed along Chattahoochee RiverWalk in Columbus, Ga. and the best spot is River Walk Island, which is located below an abandoned power plant. This island is open daily depending on weather and river conditions.

The island is the best viewing position as it is situated at the finale of the rapids. This is where many of those transiting the river whitewater wind up in the water swimming without a craft.

There are many warnings and river park rules. Everyone should be aware of the river's hazards. You must wear a helmet and personal flotation device or life jacket. Don't paddle alone and watch for tree limbs, bridge piers and other hazards. One must be a competent swimmer both on the surface and underwater. The river's water level is subjected to sudden rises and dangerous turbulence. When the alarm sounds, immediately proceed to the nearest shore. Enter the river at your own risk. The rules continue mostly for safety reasons.

Anyone can find the adventure at every skill level whether you are a skilled whitewater rafter or just a novice. There are big and small rapid areas within the two and one half mile distance. The rapids at the Chattahoochee can reach up to 13,000 cubic feet per second in volume making these Peach State river rapids the largest south of Canada and east of the Colorado River.

There are plenty of refreshing locations to quench your thirst or fill your stomach just a couple of blocks from the RiverWalk on Columbus' historic Broadway Street. Watching those "shooting the rapids" is really quite exciting.

Community Patrol

At our July meeting Lieutenant Joiner, Southwest District Commander, responded to the question about the motorcycle deputy seen in the community. On Top of the World has a contract with the Marion County Sheriff's Office to have a deputy come in periodically to monitor traffic.

A patrol member asked the question regarding automobiles parking in the designated golf cart spots in front of Publix

and whether these autos would be cited. Lt. Joiner explained that deputies can ticket people who illegally park in spaces designated for people with disabilities because there is a state statute (316.1955) that allows a warning or a charge of non-criminal violation for those who park illegally. However, there is no golf cart statute regarding illegal parking in a designated golf cart spot so deputies cannot monitor this situation.

He did remind us that within State Statute 316.212 there are some rules about golf carts. Golf carts cannot go more than a speed of 15 miles per hour; otherwise they need to be registered as a motor vehicle. These carts may not drive on sidewalks adjacent to state highways,

such as SR200, because the sidewalks are not at least eight feet wide. No one under the age of 14 is allowed to operate a golf cart (according to community rules: a golf cart driver must be at least 15 years of age and eligible to obtain a valid automobile driver's license).

For safety reasons, golf carts need to be equipped with headlights, brake lights, turn signals, and a windshield in order to operate between the hours of sunset and sunrise. Golf cart drivers must follow the same rules of the road as automobile drivers. (Sources: 2012 Florida Law Enforcement Handbook and On Top of the World Neighborhoods, Community Rules and Standards, updated 4/26/13.)

Also present was Corporal Paul Youmans, assigned to the Southwest District Office, who brought his newly designed patrol car with its purple stripes and decals that say "Break the Silence for Domestic Violence." This, along with the other patrol car that is a half patrol and half taxi, advises that if you take the patrol car when intoxicated it costs \$10,000, but if you take the taxi it may only cost \$10. This is the Marion County Sheriff's Office way of trying to alert and educate the public about these public safety issues.

Two volunteer services coordinators from the Sheriff's Office, Kassi Reidt and Danielle Adams, came to remind the members of several meetings and oppor-

tunities. One of the items was about Code Red, the Rapid Emergency Notification System that has been upgraded to include a weather warning. Residents need to register to receive free emergency notifications on the phone or e-mail by going to www.marionso.com, and click on the Code Red icon and follow the directions. If you do not have access to the Internet, you may have someone who does register for you.

They also encouraged members and residents to join the Heart Walk. The Sheriff's Office is joining with the American Heart Association for this event on Saturday, Oct. 4, at 9 a.m. at the Baseline Road Trailhead, 4225 SE 58th Avenue, Ocala. You are encouraged to join the Marion County Sheriff's Office team by going online at www.marionheartwalk.org. If you have any questions, contact Kassi Reidt at (352) 369-6849.

Keeping It Green

With hurricane season looming over us, and another three months of the season left, many residents are wondering how to care for their trees. These are a few of the questions we hear: What type of tree is in my yard? How will it withstand the winds? Is it too close to my house? Why can't I take the tree down? Is the tree in my yard?

For the most part, many of the trees within the community are somewhat protected. The majority of the winds that these trees are subjected to are in the upper canopy. What this means is that the trees are not stuck out in the open where the full force of the wind is directly work-

ing against the entire tree. Houses, other trees, landscape and commercial buildings all have positive effects on slowing the winds down, keeping major tree failure to a minimum.

Upper canopy winds may still damage trees but typically smaller lateral branches and not main branches supporting the majority of the tree's foliage. Now with that said, trees do fail and there is not a single proven way to determine if a tree is hazardous or dangerous; professionals can only make educated decisions about tree health and abatement.

Has everyone seen the tree that was beautiful one day and the next day it looked like a hat rack? This tree is the product of an uneducated arborist and a homeowner who just paid lots of money for a future headache. This is better known as topping and is not an approved method for tree trimming. Matter of fact, in some counties around the nation, topping a tree can actually be seen as an act of negligence by the county or city and be grounds for a company to lose its business license. Top-

ping trees is particularly bad because it causes an overabundance of growth at the point of the cut. With the overabundance of growth there is little room for proper branch attachments and decay in the main branch is often associated with the cut. Improper branch attachments and decay is a recipe for disaster.

Another form of improper pruning often seen in the community is "lion tailing" or "over thinning." This is fundamentally the removal of too much of the interior lateral and secondary branches causing the majority of the branch weight to be on the ends of the branches thus giving it the resemblance of a "lions tail." This method is also particularly dangerous for tree health due to the unbalanced load the tree is enduring during a wind event. Tension and compression are forces a tree's branches will see during a wind event and with the majority of the branch weight at the ends. These forces often tend to be accentuated, causing failure.

Another problem with "lion tailing" is the surplus of epicormic shoot growth

on the main branches. You would probably refer to these as suckers. Epicormic sprouts form on stems and branches typically in the older wood and can result from the heavy pruning.

If you are considering pruning a tree, first take the time to investigate the contractor, find out if they are licensed and insured to do tree work. Some "tree surgeons" do not want to pay the insurance premiums that a tree company should, so they often do not carry the proper liability for the industry.

Secondly, make sure the contractor is a Certified Arborist with the International Society of Arboriculture. This association tests an individual's knowledge and mandates that the individual maintain continued education in the industry.

Lastly, if a contractor mentions "topping," "lion tailing," or "aggressive or over thinning" ... run! Before you begin any work, get a modification form completed and make sure you are granted permission from the Association before you trim or remove the tree.

Never thaw frozen food by setting it out on the counter at room temperature. The safest method for thawing is to place frozen food in refrigerated storage, at 41 degrees or lower, until thawed. Another method is to place frozen food in a container and place under constant running, potable (drinking) water at 70 degrees or lower so the item is covered and submerged with running water until thawed.

**Citizens
Emergency
Response Team**

I still hear people saying that they do not know what the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) is in our community. This organization developed out of a concept in 1985 at the Los Angeles Fire Department.

They recognized that citizens would very likely be on their own during the early stages of a disaster. They decided that some basic training in disaster survival and rescue skills would improve the ability of citizens to survive until emergency personnel could arrive.

In Marion County, CERT has been under the auspices of the Marion County Sheriff's Office since 1988, and there currently are about 32 teams in the county. Our CERT, in On Top of the World, is a service organization that is trained to meet the immediate post-disaster needs of citizens, especially when multiple residences are involved.

For the past two months, during our monthly meetings, CERT has been working on its first aid skills. In July, we practiced splinting and bandaging broken limbs, treating various types of burns and treating shock. In August, we had a table-top exercise where small teams of CERT

members were given cards describing victims with multiple injuries. The teams were then directed to decide how they would approach these situations by triaging and tagging as to the severity of the injuries and then how they would provide first aid for the injuries.

As you would expect, working with injuries is the area where most non-trained health persons have the most concern. So the more we provide opportunities for the members to be presented with these scenarios the more comfortable they will become with triaging, assessing and treating disaster victims.

It is not too early to call for an application for the next new member CERT training scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 9 through Nov.13 from 5 to 7 p.m. Contact Beverly Case at the Bureau of Emergency Management of the Sheriff's Office at (352) 369-8120 to obtain an application. These classes fill up quickly, so be sure to get your application in as soon as possible. Participating in this service organization is a way to contribute to and give back to your community, so give it some thought and let us hear from you.

The next meeting of CERT is scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 9, in the Arbor Conference Center, Suite G.

CERT meets every second Tuesday of the month at 9 a.m. in the Arbor Conference Center. Persons interested in learning more about CERT are welcome to attend these meetings, or contact Pat at (352) 854-8718.

They began to brainstorm to raise funds. They turned to their compassionate peers and started slowly. Their monthly bunco group gave up the game's prize money to donate, men's golf gave their prize money, and a Bible study group became involved.

The ladies mentioned the seriousness of the situation to the wonderful Women of the World club that not only donated

money but did a food drive, too. Individuals stepped in with checks and food.

Their first donation totaled \$665, not nearly what was needed, but enough to provide one meal for those seniors already in the program. They needed to do more so they went back to Women of the World who agreed to do a monthly collection.

To date, they have donated more than \$5,000 and over 4,000 pounds of food. These monthly collections will continue to be an ongoing project for the 2014-2015 program to assist with the situation that still exists.

The SPCA, under the direction of President Bev Carver, has taken on the responsibility of adding pet food donations for those seniors whose pet companions are family too. Every week, volunteers meet and fill bags of food and special treats for our furry friends. Sue Copeland and her elves lead these workers.

That is the short story of how they got here, but the continuing story is the need that still exists. It propels Andy and Nancy to volunteer because they have a vision to assist the vulnerable and eradicate the shortfalls. After all, the basic thought is "It could be anyone of us" ... so on we go.

Another Member of the Carrot Family

It was August 2007. Button snakeroot appeared on this page. I'm sure you remember the piece; maybe even saved a copy. I did. Perhaps you even remember one of her other names, rattlesnake master. There, I knew you would.

Well, would you believe it? Today, we bring you another member of the carrot family, corn snakeroot (*Eryngium aquaticum*).

Unlike rattlesnake master, corn snakeroot does not like drought. In fact, she much prefers to have her feet wet in sunny, freshwater marshes.

There is some disagreement, however, as to whether *E. aquaticum* is biennial (growing vegetatively the first year and fruiting and dying the second), or a short lived perennial (growing vegetatively for more than one year). If the one pictured here, growing in our garden, persists, perhaps we'll find out. We won't be surprised, however, if she does not endure long, as her habitat here is not a wetland.

As you can see from the picture, near

the top of each multi-branched stalk is a large rounded flower head that looks spiny. What sets this species apart, however, is that the heads are about half inch across and normally a rich cornflower blue.

The flowers are showy for several weeks and attract a wide variety of pollinators.

One source (<http://hawthornhill-wildflowers.blogspot.com/2012/12/corn-snakeroot-eryngium-aquaticum>) states, "This is a plant that either needs to reseed to persist or be replaced every couple of years." (But) "The effort (is) worth the trouble because corn snakeroot, in flower, is a spectacular wildflower."

Come join the fun as our Native Plant Group members continue serving the community by maintaining the Native Plant Garden and Longleaf Pine Trail (8:30 a.m. second Wednesday), the SW 94th Street and SW 89th Court Road Circle (8:30 a.m. fourth Wednesday) and the Belleview Library garden. Believe it: growing native is natural!

Changing Lives, One Pair at a Time

Each year, On Top of the World generously donates nearly 4,000 "retired" eyeglasses to the Lions Club. Have you ever wondered what happens to those glasses? Do you realize you are playing a vital role in supporting sight projects in developing countries?

The Lions Recycle for Sight program operates throughout the year. Lions vol-

unteers collect used eyeglasses and deliver them to local collection centers. Sorted glasses are forwarded to regional Lions eyeglass recycling centers where they become supplies for Lions sight programs in developing countries. The project at the On Top of the World Lions Club is coordinated by Lions Ana Wright, Richard Spahn and Steve Snowman.

Your "retired" glasses embark upon an important journey that brings hope and opportunity to individuals. This journey begins with you depositing "retired" glasses (and cases) at a local collection point ... like the Recreation Center. Lion volunteers collect the glasses, do a preliminary sorting (separating sunglasses, broken frames and single lenses from intact pairs) and then deliver them to the local Lions eyeglass recycling center (Walt's Brake & More in Ocala).

There, glasses from all the Lions Clubs in the area are gathered and prescriptions determined by a lensometer. Once classified, lenses are cleaned and packaged according to their prescription. Lenses are

sent to a central warehouse in Georgia in anticipation of an eyeglass dispensing mission. Missions are only to developing countries as used lenses may not be distributed in the U.S.

Individual Lions Clubs volunteer to conduct a mission. Some clubs make annual visits while others, like ours, provide background support. A typical mission includes the dispensing of thousands of eye exams and the identification of surgery and other vision-related medical needs. Volunteer Lions perform the initial screening using a simple spoon and an eye chart followed by an auto-refractor. Patients are then directed to various optical medical teams where lenses and/or optical care are provided.

The end result is those glasses donated at the Recreation Center are improving lives of others. Your generous donations are raising the hopes and possibilities of people across the world. The Lions Club knows your generously donated "retired" glasses provide a great service.

But wait! There's more - the Lions Club also collects used ink cartridges at the same collection points for glasses. The used cartridges are sent to a recycling center and refurbished. All (100%) of the recycling reimbursement fee are used to send kids to camp each summer at the Florida Camp for Children and Youths with Diabetes (www.facebook.com/pages/Florida-Diabetes-Camp/282480741794416).

Again, thank you for your generous donation of "retired" eyeglasses and used ink cartridges.

Favorite Recipes Dinner Club

Last month, I provided an overview of our club's goals. Simply stated, the idea is for couple club members to take turns entertaining a group of club diners in their homes sharing foods each couple has made to contribute to the meal.

When you decide to become a member of our club, a monthly schedule of how many dinners will be held is created, and you will be included in it.

When we know that you are available to attend a dinner, you will be matched with one of the hosts for that month. This July our vacation took us to North Redington Beach, on the Gulf coast of Florida. Our beach side hotel had a wonderful eatery, Mangos Restaurant, where I had the opportunity to sample their local favorites. After ordering the same dinner twice, I sent them a request for their recipe of the entrée. Shown is their recipe for seaside Gulf grouper. I modified their recipe with "adjustments" needed for simplification.

Seaside Gulf Grouper

Serves 2

- 2 8-ounce pieces of gulf grouper (grilled or seared)
- 4-ounces of baby shrimp (Baby shrimp was not available. I bought the smallest uncooked peeled shrimp, removed the veins and cut them into small pieces.)
- 2-ounces of sliced mushrooms (I bought 4.5 ounce jar of sliced mushrooms and used half.)
- 2-ounces of capers, drained
- 4-ounces of chopped artichokes (I bought 6-ounce jar of artichoke hearts; chopped them and used the entire jar.)
- 8 ounces of alfredo sauce
- 2-ounces of olive oil

Season grouper with salt and pepper. Grill or sear grouper for four minutes on each side until done and opaque. Set aside. In a medium sauté pan, add the olive oil until hot. Add mushrooms, artichokes and sauté for two minutes until cooked. Add the shrimp and cook for three minutes. Drain out excessive water, add alfredo sauce and cook on low for two minutes. Add capers last and salt and pepper to taste.

Spoon creamy white sauce over grouper.

World Traveler

Bruce and Diane Roxburgh, Margitta Claterbos and I just returned from a river cruise from Moscow to St. Petersburg. It was a great trip and, over the next few months, I will be writing articles about some of the places we visited in order to whet your appetite to undertake a similar journey. I am going to start with Kizhi (pronounced KEE ZHEE) Island.

Kizhi is one of 1,650 islands in Lake Onega, the second largest lake of Europe. The lake is located in the extreme north-west part of Russia in the Autonomous Republic of Karelia, next to Finland. Although separated by the lake, forests, and marshes, people living on the islands needed to get together periodically for trade and social contact. Because of its central location, the Kizhi Island became the most popular meeting place.

In addition to trade, the people also went to Kizhi Island to practice their religious faith. The presence of churches on the island has been documented as far back as 1496. One of the oldest surviving buildings on the island is the 22-dome Church of Transfiguration of Our Savior, which was built in 1714. The Church of Intercession, which stands next to the Church of Transfiguration, initially was built in 1694. However, it was reconstructed several times until 1764, when its present nine-dome design was finalized. These two churches and a bell tower form a UNESCO World Heritage site known as the Kizhi Pogost.

The dense forests on the islands meant that all of the buildings in the region were made of wood rather than stone. The churches are built of Scots pine logs about 12 inches in diameter and 10 to 16 feet long. The logs were cut and shaped with axes and assembled without nails! The roofs are made of spruce pine and the domes are covered in aspen, which makes them glow in different colors depending upon the angle of the sunlight.

Notwithstanding the glories of the history of the church, the most interesting

thing to me about the Church of Transfiguration was the ongoing refurbishing process. A Swedish firm has a contract to completely refurbish/rebuild the church. To do this, they selected a point perhaps 10 feet above the ground, lifted the entire church remaining above that level, removed the section left on the ground, replaced it with new logs, and then lowered the upper part of the church back down onto the new base. Then they chose another point perhaps 10 feet above the set of new logs, and will be repeating the process, until eventually they will replace the entire structure with new materials. Keep in mind that there are no nails involved in this construction process! It is a remarkable piece of engineering and construction.

Although the Kizhi Pogost is the star attraction on the island, there are many other buildings of interest. In the 1950s, dozens of historical wooden buildings were moved to the island from various parts of Karelia for preservation purposes. Today, the entire island is an open-air museum with more than 80 historical wooden structures. You don't have to take a river cruise to visit the island; it also can be reached by taking a hydroplane boat operating out of St. Petersburg.







Tennis

Despite the rain, we've had quite a bit of activity on the courts (tennis and pickleball). Please continue to stay well hydrated and come prepared to the courts during hot and humid days.

I realize that as a tennis professional, my guidance is tantamount when students or members are choosing a racquet. Whether they are replacing their existing frame or upgrading to match their improved skills. The following information will help you understand what makes racquets tick.

How to Pick a Stick

BEAM WIDTH: The wider the beam of the racquet (cross section) the more inherent power there will be, therefore, the more power the frame will generate for the player. The narrower the beam width the more the player must generate his or her own power.

PICK UP WEIGHT: It is the amount the racquet weighs in grams or in ounces. A light frame may feel great, but may not play with much stability. Conversely, a heavy frame may be more stable, but it will be more difficult to maneuver and play on the court.

SWING WEIGHT: This is a critical issue in a racquet. It is the function of the pick up weight compounded with the balance of the racquet. If a racquet is light, but also head heavy, the swing weight can be quite high and the racquet unwieldy. However, a racquet that is heavy but head light may have a lighter swing weight. A light racquet with a high swing weight, if it is head heavy, it will exacerbate tennis elbow issues.

STIFFNESS: This is also known in the industry as "RA." A really stiff racquet is going to be very unforgiving and will tend to make off-center hits quite jarring and uncomfortable.

STRING PATTERN: There are two general types of string patterns - open and closed. Open will make the racquet feel more spongy or soft, and closed will feel firmer. More importantly, these two patterns can affect the spin that is placed on the ball. An open pattern helps enhance spin by allowing the ball to lay more readily in the larger string opening. A closed pattern is more densely populated and the space between the strings is much tighter, so the ball does not lay into the string bed quite so easily. A pattern of 16 by 18 or 16 by 19 are considered open, patterns of 18 by 20 are considered closed.

Do you need a new racquet? Not necessarily. But the reasons players need or want to purchase a new racquet are numerous. For instance:

NEW TECHNOLOGY: This will make the game more enjoyable. As the various brands progress, there are changes that make racquets more comfortable and user friendly. If you are having arm trouble, need more power or just looking for more bells and whistles to help you along.

IT'S LONG IN THE TOOTH: If you are playing with a frame that is clearly older and outdated. Frames die and material gets soft and loses its dynamic energy. When this becomes obvious to you, it's time to look for a new one.

HEALTH AND WELL BEING: If you are complaining of elbow issues, a head light frame or even balanced, with lowest amounts of vibration and good dampening qualities, and more forgiving grommet systems, may be the one for you.

Do not purchase a particular racquet because some professional player uses it, the way it looks/feels, or what it costs. You need to demo several racquets based on your style of play. See you on the courts!



"Why do many golfers struggle so much with the short game? Is it lack of practice?" That was the question asked to Dave Pelz in an article for "Troon Golf & Travel." Pelz's focus as a golf instructor is on the short game - from 100 yards in. He states that the basic cause of poor chipping/pitching around the green is not that golfers don't practice, but that they don't practice properly. He notes, "Practice in golf does not make perfect. Poor practice makes permanently poor golfers."

His recommendation is to take lessons from our pro before spending a lot of time practicing so that we don't groove bad habits. This is something for us all to keep in mind especially when we have the opportunity to take advantage of the many clinics being offered at Candler Hills and On Top of the World as well as the availability of the pros to work with us individually.

Pelz also stresses the importance of lag putting, leaving putts inside of three feet of the hole on a consistent basis so as to leave our second putt in a makeable range.

Attention all golf members: Please be sure to read the Golf Membership Handbook to stay abreast of all the rules and regulations of your golfing membership. We would like to put an emphasis on the Membership Medical Suspension Request Procedure. As stated in the membership handbook, "Should a current annual golf member of one of the On Top of the World golf courses become incapacitated during that year, there are several conditions that must be met before receiving consideration to obtain credit for this time period towards the following year's membership fees:

1. Within two weeks of sustaining an accident or a medical condition, the member must submit paperwork describing the condition, which prohibits golf activity to the Director of Golf.
2. The severity of the accident or medical condition must prohibit play for a minimum period of ninety days.
3. A physician's statement must be submitted stating the nature of the accident or medical condition including when treatment began and when the patient was released.
4. The Director of Golf will notify the member if the condition warrants a credit of membership fees towards next year's membership dues.
5. No golf may be played during the time of membership suspension.
6. The Golf Membership Director must be notified before the member returns to any golf participation. We are the only golf course that allows such credits (that we are aware of); however, the process has to be followed to take ad-

vantage of this membership benefit.

All requests for credit will be reviewed by the golf department and must be approved by this department before any credit for the following year will be issued. No refunds will be issued for a membership suspension, except in the event of death for a current golf member. If there is a Couple Membership, the remaining member will receive a credit towards the following year's membership fees."

Just like knowing the USGA rules, it can pay to know the policies and procedures in your Golf Membership Handbook.



Callaway Gardens

How about taking an adventurous excursion to Callaway Gardens located in Pine Mountain, Ga. just a few miles from Columbus. The gardens, which encompass 6,500 acres, is a place in which you can visit anytime of the year. Each visit will present a spectacular vista of different colors as each season brings out different flora. Springtime brings the gardens flora

to life with azaleas of many different colors and as spring continues different flowers bloom making the gardens and awesome colorful sight.

The gardens boast having one of the largest azalea displays in the world with over 20,000 native and cultivated azaleas.

Starting around the middle of November each year, the gardens are decorated

with over eight million lights helping to celebrate the Christmas season.

The facility has many places to explore. The horticultural center is a must stop with a spectacular 5-acres of indoor-outdoor garden designs. One indoor facility, which I call a giant greenhouse, has 28 giant doors that are 24-feet in height weighing some 1,600 pounds each and are so well balanced that they are opened and closed manually. Inside this gorgeous facility is a 22-foot waterfall providing needed moisture to the many plants calling this enclosure home.

Callaway Gardens also has a butterfly enclosure housing hundreds of the colorful fluttery insects. There is also a bird of prey demonstration in which rescued birds of prey are displayed along with daily free-flight shows. The birds fly so close to the human audience that the breeze created by their wings can be felt.

We also visited the vegetable garden complex and were pleasantly surprised to see the quantity and quality of vegetables and fruits being raised. They sell their produce at a farmer's market and at special events utilizing the funds to improve and plant additional items in the garden.

We drove around Callaway Gardens on a five-mile scenic drive passing many lakes and ponds along with two-18-hole golf courses. Many of the roads are lined with Southern magnolias.

One location we passed both on Route 27 and inside the gardens was Robins Lake Beach situated on the shores of Robin Lake. This beach is reportedly the world's largest inland, man-made, white-sand beach. The beach complex offers swim-

ming, an inflatable water park, miniature golf, beach games and more. The gardens also offer a treetop adventure. This adventure features a bird's eye view of the course with 34 aerial challenges including 10 ziplines that travel some 3,000 feet through a natural forest. There are also bicycling trails, boating, fishing, hiking, golf, tennis and a variety of water sports.

There are plenty of other tourist sites in the area of Pine Mountain such as Roosevelt's Little White House, which is a Georgia State Park and a Wild Animal Safari with a three-mile Serengeti driving adventure.

The gardens also hosts special events such as the Fourth of July weekend star spangled beach party, yes, the complex has an extremely large beach facility on one of their lakes. They also have a steeplechase thoroughbred racing on the first Saturday of November along with a sky-high hot air balloon festival on Labor Day weekend.

Accommodations are available within the gardens as well as some local motels in the Town of Pine Mountain. There are eateries within the confines of the gardens and plenty to choose from depending on your appetite in Pine Mountain.

A noteworthy bit of information about the entrance fee to the gardens: active and retired military displaying I.D. cards will be admitted free with spouse and any veteran showing documentation are admitted to the gardens at half price. Otherwise, admission fee for senior adults is \$15.

Both my wife and I thoroughly enjoyed the gardens. We will definitely return to Callaway Gardens at a different time of the year.

Bone Health

One of the best ways to strengthen your bones and manage osteoporosis is by getting regular exercise. One of the worst things you can do for your bones is to be sedentary. Even if you already have osteoporosis, exercising can help maintain the bone mass you have. Here are a few things to keep in mind.

EXERCISE FOR BONE HEALTH:

When you exercise, you are not only building muscle, strength and endurance, you are also building stronger bones. The three recommended types of exercise for bone health and osteoporosis are weight-bearing, resistance training (strength) and flexibility. All three exercises are needed to build healthy bones.

WEIGHT-BEARING EXERCISES:

Exercise is considered weight-bearing when you are on your feet using your leg muscles against gravity. During weight-bearing exercise bone gets stronger by adapting to the impact of body weight against gravity as well as the pull of the muscle on the bone. This weight-bearing activity does not have to be high impact, some activities such as running, jogging, and jumping may put stress on your spine. These high-impact activities may lead to fractures in weakened bones. If you already have bone loss, choose gentler weight-bearing exercise like walking, dancing, low-impact aerobics, and gardening.

Physical activity, such as bicycling and swimming, is great for your heart and lungs. However, these are not weight-bearing exercises and not the best choices for building strong bones. That's because you are being held up by something other than your feet and legs, such as the bicycle or the water. Walking as little as three to five miles a week can help build your bone health. For general health, get at least half an hour of moderate to vigorous exercise five times a week. Forty-five minutes to an hour is even better.

RESISTANCE EXERCISE:

Resistance means you are working against the weight or force of another object. Resistance training supports bone health for the same reason as weight-bearing activity. It

creates a "stress" that the body responds to. Muscles and bones get stronger in response to the stress. Studies have shown that resistance exercise increases bone density and reduces the risk of fractures. Resistance equipment includes: dumbbells, kettlebells, weight machines, and rubber resistance (dynamabands, tubing).

FLEXIBILITY EXERCISE: Flexibility is very important for overall health and injury prevention. Flexibility allows for better range of motion and a decreased risk of falling. Examples of flexibility exercise include static and dynamic stretches, Tai chi and Yoga.

To ensure your safety during exercise for bone health or when managing osteoporosis, talk to your health care provider before beginning any exercise program.

FIT TIP #1: Make regular exercise a priority to prevent and manage osteoporosis. Physical activity decreases the rate of bone loss once it has begun.

FIT TIP #2: Limit your intake of diet sodas, especially colas, which contain phosphorus. Phosphorus increases the acidity in your system and your body's response to neutralize this is to leech the calcium from your bones.

FIT TIP #3: Choose eight to 10 strength training machines or exercises. Perform one to two sets of eight to 12 repetitions and use enough weight or resistance so the last two to three repetitions of the set are challenging.

Billiards

Stop, look, and listen. We've all seen the signs posted at railroad crossings warning drivers and pedestrians to take notice of their surroundings and circumstances before taking action. The same principle can be applied to improve your pool game.

How many times have you missed what should have been an easy shot because of a lack of concentration or focus? For me, this is one of the most frustrating scenarios that can happen. It often adversely affects my play for the next several shots, or racks, or matches, or days, or weeks, etc.

The sooner you stop letting this affect

you, the better your game will be, but I find it hard to forget. One way to help avoid this from happening in the first place is to think of the railroad sign mentioned at the beginning of this column. Before each shot "stop" and decide on what you hope to accomplish with your upcoming shot. Do you want to pocket the ball or leave your opponent in a difficult situation? Do you want to bank the shot or cut it in?

"Look" at the layout of the table. Are there any clusters of balls that you need to break up or avoid (if they belong to your opponent)? Which, if any, of the balls would alter the path of the cue ball to achieve the desired position?

"Listen" to the inner voice of your experience to determine the aiming point on the object ball, what (if any) English to apply to the cue ball, the speed necessary to accomplish your objectives, etc. After you have all that settled in your mind you are ready to assume your shooting position, which should be second nature to you by now.

Once you are in your shooting position, you still have to use the stop, look, and listen routine one more time. The big difference is that in this case you have to avoid them. Don't "stop" your natural stroke. Altering the normal flow of your stroke should only be done on rare occasions such as cue and object balls almost touching, jump and curve shots, etc. When you alter your stroke you tend to miss the spot on the cue ball you normally hit, resulting in a missed shot.

Don't "look" at anything else but the contact point on the object ball. This becomes very hard to do in a busy, close quartered poolroom. Players from other

tables are always walking into and out of your line of sight and, if you look at the movement instead of the shot you'll almost always miss it.

Don't "listen" to conversations going on around you, they are almost as distracting as the movement mentioned in the last sentence. Some players have been known to purposely talk when another is in his/her shooting stance. Being the prince that I am I don't condone nor would ever do this myself. We have plenty of chairs in our poolroom so the best practice is to sit down after your shot. Give it a try.

Until next time, keep stroking and keep your tip dry.

Civil War Naval Museum

Most folks remember reading about or learning in school some of the major battles during the darkest history of our nation. I am referring to the Civil War. Names of that period such as Lee, Grant, Lincoln and battles such as Gettysburg, Bull Run, etc. are quite well known.

But the only naval battle that brings back memories is that of the naval ironclad battle between the Monitor from the north, and the Virginia-Merrimac from the south. Little else is known about other

significant Civil War Naval battles.

The National Civil War Naval Museum is located at Columbus, Ga. It brings to light, "... the navy story. It is the only museum in the United States dedicated to telling the stories of sailors, soldiers and civilians, both free and enslaved, who served in or were affected by the navies of the American Civil War."

Believe it or not, Columbus was the third ranking seaport in Georgia during that period of time and is still an ac-

tive seaport today. Years back, small ships would sail up the Chattahoochee River either by sail or steam from the Gulf of Mexico to Columbus. In fact, many Civil War ironclads were built in Columbus at the Confederate Naval Shipyard situated on the banks of the river.

Entering the museum a smell of burnt wood fills the air coming from the remains of CSS Jackson, which is the largest surviving Confederate warship. When Union forces captured Columbus in 1865, they torched this vessel some 30 miles downriver preventing any usage by the Confederates. It sat at the bottom of the river for 95 years until it was raised in 1961.

Today, the charred remains of this vessel are the centerpieces of the museum. The Jackson was almost 225 feet long, 54 feet wide and weighed 2,000 tons. The

charred timbers of the ship's hull still emit the aroma of burnt timbers.

The Jackson's remains fill one large exhibit hall. A "ghost structure" was constructed over the burnt hull depicting the original ship's dimensions. In the next gallery is the wreckage of Confederate gunboat Chattahoochee, which suffered a "catastrophic boiler explosion just three months after launching."

In the museum's main gallery is the recreated turret of the famous ironclad, USS Monitor, which shows the scars of battle from her fight with the Virginia-Merrimac. The Monitor and Merrimac engaged in battle off the east coast near Norfolk, Va.

This was the first time two ironclads engaged in battle. Both ships suffered direct hits from one another and none penetrated their iron shells. The battle was considered a draw and from the outcome of this battle between two ironclads changed the construction of navy ships forever.

Also in the main gallery is a cross section of the USS Hartford, which was the flagship of the U.S. Navy's First Admiral David Farragut. The display depicts a sailor's life aboard ship. Inside the reproduction of the ship are a recreated birth deck, wardroom and captain's cabin. Farragut was famous in the battle of Mobile Bay saying, "damned the torpedoes, full speed ahead."

In another gallery is a reproduction of the ironclad CSS Albemarle sitting alongside a dock in Plymouth, N.C. during October 1864. Visitors to the museum are allowed to board this ironclad to view the inside of the ship.

Among the many displays and artifacts in the museum, the largest collection of Civil War Naval related flags is displayed. It is the largest display in the country. There are many models of both Confederate and Union ships along with their histories spread throughout the museum.

Outside the museum's walls is the exact full-scale reproduction of the USS Water Witch. This ship is an exact replica of a gunboat that was employed by both the Union and Confederate Navies. The ship was a steam-powered side-wheeler. The ship was a portion of the Union fleet blockading Savannah. The Confederate Naval Forces captured the ship during a nighttime raid. The Confederates, unable to escape, hid the Water Witch for months until finally sinking the vessel preventing the recapture by Union forces. Although the ship was closed while visiting this museum, it is generally open for exploring above and below decks.

If in the Columbus area, it would be a worthwhile stop to view this museum.

I am creating whimsical 3D creations on canvas using papier maché made from newspaper ads cut into one-inch strips dipped into a mixture of wallpaper paste and Elmer's glue and then painted. It's all so much fun.

Infantry Museum

Many of you reading this article will remember the lyrics to the infantry song: "You can hear it in the heart of the jungle, You can hear it across the sea, It calls to every freedom loving man,

The cry of the U.S. Infantry, Follow me! Follow me!"

These words of bravery are the first lyrics to the U.S. Army's Infantry Song.

I heard this song played over and over as my wife and I toured the National Infantry Museum at Fort Benning, Ga. just outside the city of Columbus.

Upon entering this structure, which opened in 2009, one enters a great atrium where it is suggested you start your tour. Entering the museum's signature exhibit, "The Last 100 Yards," which is a gently sloped ramp containing life-size dioramas depicting important battles in the Infantry's history.

Some of the dioramas depict Infantry battles including Yorktown, Antietam, Soissons, Normandy, Corregidor, Soam-Ni (Korea) Landing Area (LZ) X-Ray and a battle in Iraq. The soldier figures in these exhibits were very realistic. These figures are not mannequins but cast sculptures of active duty soldiers.

Going up the ramp, your eyes bounce from side to side taking in all the exhibits starting off with sword reeling soldiers in the Battle of Antietam. Just ahead, you see a Huey helicopter depicting a scene for Vietnam and above the chopper is a glider used in World War II. At the end of the ramp is a Bradley Fighting vehicle from Iraq.

The museum facility explains the story

of the United States Army infantryman from the American Revolution to Afghanistan. There are artifacts from all eras in our country's history with interactive multimedia exhibits.

The Infantry song continues: "From Concord Bridge to An Khe Ridge, Through the swamps and mountains and sand, They fight and die where brave men lie, Against all tyrants they stand."

Off the Grand Hall (the main floor of the museum) there are exhibits depicting all eras of our country such as being a world power, to the cold war era, to present day. In the middle of the hall is the Hall of Honor, which is where all the Medal of Honor recipients are honored.

There are plenty of exhibits outside of the main museum such as World War II barracks, mess hall and other facilities of that era plus old and modern army hardware such as tanks, personal carriers, and the list continues. Plus on the outside of the museum is the parade field where graduates of the basic infantry training graduate almost every week. Twice a week, generally Monday and Tuesday, one can watch many aircraft dropping countless scores airborne troops in training as they parachute to earth.

The lyrics of the third verse of the Infantry Song are the same as the first.

One could spend hours upon hours touring this museum honoring our Army Infantry. It would and should be a planned visit if traveling anywhere near Columbus, Ga.





Photo Tip: Taken from "How to Frame Your Shots without Excessive Cropping" by Valerie Goettsch. The cropping tool is one of the most widely used editing tools, mainly because it's easy to forget to frame pictures before snapping the shutter. It is easy to crop images to get rid of ugly background extras, and focus only on the part we want, or to zero-in on a subject's face. If you are planning on printing your images or enlarging them, you'll get a sharper result if you do a little planning before the shot.

Here are some tips for properly framing your pictures:

- Take a minute to compose your shot; see what's in the background before you have people get into position. Then you won't have to rush to get your shot.
- After you've added people to the shot, check out what's in the background on the left and right sides of your subject. Better to adjust your shot now than to have to crop it out. Could objects in the background that provide an attractive backdrop to your image, or is there something in the background that can provide a natural frame for your picture, such as an attractive doorway or staircase?
- When photographing people with scenery or buildings/monuments in the background, the foreground should be minimized. Try to focus fairly close up on your subjects so they don't look like tiny ants in front of a giant building — unless you are attempting to show how big something is in comparison to the people.
- Landscape photos benefit from showing more of the foreground in order to provide a better perspective.

Keep the horizon above or below the centerline of the photo. Placing an object in the foreground can greatly enhance the image. It can be interesting to focus on an object in the foreground and let the background blur, or try the reverse: focus on the background and let a foreground object blur.

By keeping these tips in mind, you'll find you'll use your cropping tool less, you'll keep your printed image sharp, and you'll increase your creative options – from making enlarged prints and posters to calendars, and even blankets and pillows with your favorite pictures.

A Small Southern Town

There is a small town that gained world-wide notoriety back in the 1970s when two brothers placed this town on the map. This little community, mostly made up of farmers of sorts and a few shopkeepers, had a population back then of a little over 650 residents of all ages. The population today is just a little over 700 residents. Not much has changed in this community, as most residents want to keep their little town the way it was.

This town's notoriety reached such huge proportions that the state had to enter into the picture constructing a large information center to handle the influx of visitors. The parking lot is enormous for the town's size and the center is well kept and landscaped. Today, this facility is closed but there is one lady who expressed her position as gardener of the complex.

Some of you readers have guessed where this little town is located and some have no idea. Let me clue you in. The town is located in the southwestern portion of Georgia and the two brothers are former President of the United States, Jimmy Carter and the other brother is Billy Carter. The town is Plains, Ga.

Plains could be described as a whistle

stop or one of those towns that if you blink your eyes while passing through, you will miss it. There are a few houses, large peanut storage facilities and the town's business district consists of approximately seven brick buildings built together in a short block. A large red, white and blue banner is on the face of one building announcing you are in Plains, Ga. home of Jimmy Carter, our 39th president.

Standing on a park-like, well-manicured area in front of the entire shops, one can just about see all of the buildings of interest. Billy Carter's famous gas station is located on the main state road situated on the other side of the railroad tracks and just down the main drag is the famous town's railroad station. This railroad station was Carter's election headquarters.

Off in the distance, maybe just one block, is the town's old high school, which is now the Plains' Visitors Center and Museum. This center is administered by the U.S. Department of Interior and there are national park rangers available to answer questions and provide directions. The museum houses many artifacts and photos of both Jimmy Carter and his wife Rosalynn.

Billy Carter's gas station was made famous, as this station's proprietor was famous for peddling Billy Beer. It had been closed for years but reopened as a museum in 2008. During its heyday, when his brother was president, it was a popular hangout for news reporters and Billy himself. A sign in the gas station museum states that Billy Carter's Gas Station sold 2,000 cases of beer and 45,000 gallons of gasoline a month at the height of the Carter presidency.

The train depot was constructed in 1888 and has since been restored to its 1976 appearance as Carter's presidential campaign headquarters. When he won the election, the townspeople wanted to attend his inauguration as becoming the 39th president. In January 1977, an 18-car "peanut special" train left the Plains railroad depot filled with locals bound for Washington, D.C.

The Carters still reside in Plains in a ranch-style home heavily guarded by security fences and armed Secret Service personnel. Both of the Carters regularly attend the Plains Baptist Church and the former president teaches Sunday school at the church.

Most of the president's former locations such as his school, childhood home, train depot and other locations are controlled and managed by the U.S. Department of Interior.

Traveling in the general vicinity of Plains, Ga. it is advised to make a detour and head over to this Georgian community and visit a part of our nation's history. Who knows, you might run into Jimmy Carter himself.
